Sermon by the Late Elder Henry Souder

If we are willing, having the good will and having faith in Jesus to not only hear or read the words which He has spoken, because as we have heard and often spoken of that not in hearing are we blessed but in doing, but also to do that which it says. And if we are so willing to obey the teachings of what Jesus our Saviour has spoken in this and also a few of the chapters before, we shall read the teaching of where Christ was up on a mountain and of where He assembled together His disciples and gave them His teachings. Now if we are willing to believe that these are words which He has spoken Himself and that He is also willing to hear our prayers asking of Him what we are in need of, because He is keeping His Father's teachings.

If God was to take us away from this life, He should find us in the straight and narrow way and not in the wide path. With our sins and by our strength we can do nothing, but if we trust, and also consider, what we feel we are in need of and what we are lacking, we can ask, for God is willing to give these things to us. We will not be judged if we believe and trust in Him. The Saviour has preached on the mount to great multitudes and He compared the people to a house. "And the storm may come and the wind will blow our house down." They will not build on the sand but on the rocks where they can lay a solid foundation. And if we are wise we will build according to His good teachings and He is the Rock and the firm foundation. Therefore, those who are willing to enter into the straight gate, if I am not mistaken His disciples came unto Him. and He taught them that a few would be saved. He said, "We shall enter into the straight gate." It may at times seem a little hard and discouraging, but if we will keep in the straight path and stay true to Him we will have our reward by getting through the straight gate. pleasing unto Him, and what if He should come and find us all in sin and doing deeds displeasing to Him, we are after all leading a different life. But we must do as we pray unto Him and He has to put the will into our hearts. Jesus hears our prayers and heals our wounded spirits. Jesus has the power to cast out devils and we can read of such devils being cast out of the hearts of the people. Of course, we all possess a will and God will not take that away from us that we will be kept from temptation; whereby we might be lost and cast into the fire that so long has burned and cannot be quenched. It is our desire that we could put more trust in Him.

If Jesus should come and find us all just as we are doing now, what would we do or say?—We would say, "O! can't God help us?" Some may think that after a person is a Christian it is easy for him not to enter into temptation, but not so. We have to keep right on the straight path and not give the evil one a chance.

We can both love and fear God. If children have fear of their parents and not love, they will not be brought up the right way, and if they have love and no fear, they will be disobedient. And so it must be fear and love together.

We sing that song — "Nearer My Home, Nearer my home today than I have been before," and one place it is—"Nearer my home today, perhaps than now I think." God has given us the warning, and we cannot say—"God did not give me a chance." Often little children are called as we have found in the times past. The children are saved as long as they are innocent. "Suffer the little children to come unto me. . ." God said we cannot come into the kingdom of Heaven only as little children.

The Lord's children sometimes get into trouble, we find, but we should take the good children for a pattern. Even if sometimes something may happen, the Lord accepts our prayers. As we sing in one of the beautiful

songs-"When we all get to Heaven, what a day of rejoicing that will be." And so we want to prepare ourselves, especially also our children. Accept the preaching of John, whose words are still kept in store if his body is dead. The words have to go on yet. When he came, he said everyone should prepare themselves. God is warning everyone that when the Lord comes there will not be any more time. And as we have already mentioned let us consider eternity a little. What is our life compared to eternity. As it is written, three score and ten or four score. Perhaps one may live eighty years. There is now and then one that will live ninety or one hundred. But what is 100 years compared to eternity? And when this life is over, we will enter into eternity, whether it is Heaven or not.

Sometimes members will get careless and then they will enter into temptation. They should try instead to be a light and an example to the others. (Sometimes people say there is no God and so you see we have tests.) If we want to be willing we must accept and eat the whole Lamb. When Moses went to take the children of Israel out of Egypt, God told them to slay a lamb and to eat the whole lamb. And now we have a Lamb slain for us and it is Jesus. And we are to accept the whole teaching and we cannot expect to do that which we want to do and then expect to meet God in Heaven. We all want to make heaven our home and to take the cup which was spoken of (and which is so much better for the flesh).

If we want to get to Heaven, we cannot get there by our own will but by the will of God. But we have to pray to the Saviour, "If it be possible that this cup pass from me: nevertheless not as I will, but as thou wilt." We don't know, dearly beloved, in what way we are to enter into the Heavenly Kingdom. Let it be as it will if God will only strengthen us. When the disciples told Christ that they wanted to sit to the right and to the left, He answered them that they should sit to the right and left

"We could wreck the front page Pyramids" is the slogan of a building wrecking concern. Who couldn't? But the question is, could you build the Pyramids? It isn't what you wreck, but what you build, that counts in life. So it is with the character of young men-you can build soberly and honestly for years, and some godless companion can lead you into a night of sin that may mean the wanton destruction of nearly everything we have built up. Our only hope is in Christ. Christ for deliverance from sin of the past, and Christ for the Deliverer when the temptation would be too much for us.

So the spiritual life that has been generated in us through the Word of God needs cultivation also. Even under the handicaps and under the pressure of much work we should devote some time in the reading of the Psalms and the Scripture and spend some time in earnest prayer whereby we draw close to God to dwell in Him and He in us. Let us give the Lord His tithe in taking time to seek Him.

Paul gives us one of the best answers. Listen to him talk to the Corinthians. (I Cor. 15:3) "For I delivered unto you first of all that which I also received, how that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures; and that He was buried, and that He rose again the third day according to the Scriptures." He began with the crucified and risen Christwith the atonement and the resurrection. The plan is just as fixed as are the stars in the Heavens.
