The Lord Is at Hand

The reason why we should let our moderation be known unto all men, according to Paul, is that "the Lord is at hand." This has a twofold meaning. The Lord is nigh unto His own with His Spirit, support, comfort, witness, judgment, internally in heart and conscience. We are never alone, that should spur and prick us on to do good and not to do evil. He is a quick witness against us and an unbribable judge. If we do what is good and right then He gives us the testimony of a good conscience before God. But if we become guilty of something that is not right then He will not spare us. Inwardly He makes everything clear and manifest to us. Before this inner judgment-seat we must give account for everything that happens, so that the evil, impure movement and desire may not be put into action but is at once stifled and destroyed in its beginning.

The evil that has been done cannot be undone, as much as one may rue it; it may perhaps occur under the Law but not under grace. We do not want to sin first, in order to have remorse afterwards and to seek forgiveness; rather we do not want to sin at all and thus keep our conscience clean. For this purpose the Holy Spirit, Christ's substitute, is with us, that He may hold judgment in us and root out all evil with absolute strictness, so that we need not come into the future judgment with the ungodly; and here also the word is in place: "The Lord is at hand."

It is with men as with the earth: the inclination to weeds is in the tilled soil as it is in the believing person, but as one cares for a separated piece of land—garden or farm acre—in order to keep it in condition and in a fruitbearing state, and must always be at work to cleanse the soil that the weeds may not grow, so we must expend effort among the separated people especially that nothing unclean and unreal may grow up that might smother the seed of the Word and overwhelm the soil.

If care is lacking in this inner and outer supervision, then in a few years a garden of God (a spiritual man) can altogether become corrupt and changed into a desert.

So it was with the finest and the most fruitful of all lands, Canaan, in the 70 years of the Babylonian captivity, and is still so in comparison with its former blessed state. Whoever in his daily life forgets the watchword: "The Lord is at hand," to do the righteousness of God out of pure love in Christ must fear Him as the future judge.
