THE BOOK OF BOOKS

We have heard a great deal in the past few weeks about New Year resolutions. Most of them are broken before much time passes. But there is one that we should all make which would be to our benefit, and that is—to read the Bible more diligently. Why is it such an important book? It is the Word of God. Its theme is Jesus Christ. Let us review a few inter-

esting things about this wonderful book.

We are told that as Sir Walter Scott was lying on his death-bed, he called, "Bring me the Book." "What Book?" asked his son-in-law. "There is but one Book, the Bible," was his reply. Although he was surrounded by 30,000 volumes he recognized the Bible

as the Book of books. He knew that all others were the work of man but this one alone the work of God. Yes, it is indeed such. The Apostle Peter tells us in one of his letters that "holy men of old spake as the Spirit gave them utterance." In Paul's letter to Timothy, we read, "All scripture is given by inspiration of God and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness." These and many similar scriptures prove definitely that God is the Author.

No other book, including so-called sacred writings of the great religious systems of the world, contains a single prophecy. For the writers of those religious books to have made a prophecy that never came to pass would have been to brand the whole work a human composition. Therefore, the Bible is the only book that has ever made a prophecy and it is full of them, many of which have been fulfilled to the smallest details, hundreds or thousands of years later. We find that the very place where Jesus was to be born had been prophecied many hundred years before His birth. His crucifixion and resurrection were likewise foretold by the prophets and we all know how certainly this was fulfilled. Hundreds of other examples are found as one reads the Holy Word. Even today we stand and look in wonder as we see many prophecies being fulfilled before our very eyes. As we view the turmoil in which the world finds itself, is it not a fulfillment as never before, of nations rising against nations and kingdoms, etc., as foretold by the Lord Himself?

Science and astronomy have proved the accuracy of the Bible. Astronomers have found that a full twentyfour hour day has been lost from solar time. A certain athestic astroncmer also discovered this fact some time ago. A God fearing co-worker advised him to search the Scriptures for the answer concerning the lost day. He began reading at the beginning of the Bible. As he came to the book of Joshua, Chapter 10:12-14, he found where Joshua had asked God to allow the sun to stand still about a day. Checking with his figures, he found up to that particular time only twenty-three hours and twenty minutes had actually been lost. He then continued to read in order that he might find the forty minutes still missing. Second Kings, Chapter 20: 8-11, gave the answer. King Hezekiah had been told by God through the prophet Isaiah that he should prepare to die. Hezekiah turned to God in prayer for help. In answer to the king's prayer, God informed him he would extend his life 15 years. Hezekiah asked for a sign that he might believe this. God turned the shadow on the sundial back ten degrees. This was the sign. Now ten degrees means exactly forty minutes. With this the astronomer laid down the Bible and exclaimed, "Lord, I believe."

Of most importance, the Bible is the Book of instructions which God has left us to lead and guide us through this war-torn, sorrow filled world to that beautiful home on high where all sorrow and distress shall be taken away. It tells us "we have all sinned and come short of the glory of God," but not without the remedy which is the shed blood of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. If we can but see our lost condition and in true repentance flee to Him, He will forgive our sins and give us a "Peace that passeth all understanding." He is the rock on which we build our house

of faith, the rock in which we hide in times of danger from within and without. When we pray, we are talking to God; but when we read the Bible, God is talking to us. The Bible is like a letter from God. Do not our young men, who are far away from home, enjoy letters from their loved ones? Often they read them over and over again. How much more should we appreciate God's letter, the Bible, and read it much! May you be urged again to read this Book, every day, believe it, follow its instructions, and God will give you the Victory.

We of the staff wish everyone of you a happy and prosperous new year. We know not what it has in store, but we can ask God to guide us on the right path. We know that if it is His Will, peace can soon be restored and every soldier and sailor can again be reunited with his loved ones back home. Let every one pray for peace and not live for self alone but for others, and for Him who holds all power in His own hands. Then and only then can we be happy now and through the eternal ages of eternity.

Science and Religion

Editor's Note: The following is an excerpt from Brother Froehlich's writings in which he quotes from a book that treats of astronomy.

I have been reading in L. A. Kahler's "Cosmology" and have noted the following selections, which are so important that they may be used in a spiritual way:

I.

"The telescopes have, indeed, been instrumental in permitting us to recognize objects in the sky whose possibilities are beyond the fancies and the imagination of man, unless these are set right by instruction. But such instruction must be accepted as faith by all persons who do not have the necessary instruments and who do not understand the necessary calculations. The great men who have explored the nature of the heavens may, with justice, demand such faith, because they explain and define in a simple and clear manner the intricate phenomena which seems to be inexplicable at first sight. These men are at home in the entire extent of the heavens at any given moment . . . So let us follow them, dear children, and accept the revelations which they give to us about the great house of the universe."

Why shouldn't the Creator of the world demand even a greater faith?

II

"A Prussian clergyman, N. Copernicus, was the first man to prove that the sun and the stars do not move around the earth, but that, on the contrary the earth revolves daily and annually. But the people could not be converted to truth very quickly. An Italian astronomer, Galileo, a hundred years later was sent to prison by the pope of his day when he upheld this truth, because it was said he pretended to be wiser than the Holy Scripture. But no matter, even if the advocates of truth die, or if they are subdued, truth itself never dies and in the ned it is unfailingly victorious. All astronomers now think as Copernicus and Galileo thought."

And this principle is still more forcibly true when it is a matter of

preaching the Gospel!

III

"In the year 1785 Baron van Zach predicted with absolute certainty that a heavenly body, similar to our earth, must be in existence between the planets Mars and Jupiter. He calculated its orbit and desposited his assertions in sealed letters in London and in Berlin, so that they could be compared with the actual facts when this planet would be discovered. (At a later date the four planets Ceres. Pallas, Juno, and Versta were located in that space.) Just consider the power of human intellect when man, having trained and developed it in scientific knowledge, knows how to use it. Persons without number gaze at the sky without knowing what they see. But this man indicated as a certainty something which neither he nor anybody else had ever seen. Remember what I said about having faith in the teaching of cosmology. And with what a trustful confidence must we, the unlearned people, accept the statements of these men who proceed from maxims and principles which stand the test of time."

And what a great, trustful confidence must we not bring to the word of God, who has made everything!
