willing to search the scripture farther than the statement of, "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved." If we believe in the Lord Jesus, we will be more willing to accept his teachings and begin where he says, "Except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish." (St. Luke 13:3.) To abide by the meaning of repent, we must turn back and be sorry for the errors of our past life and make right the wrongs which we have committed against our God and fellow men. This can be accomplished by prayer to God through the High Priest, Jesus Christ, and by making amends to our fellow men whom we have wronged.

From an earnest desire to seek forgiveness from the Heavenly Father and our fellow men, we can expect peace from the Heavenly Father and forgiveness from those whom we ask it if we will exercise true faith in prayer. When we have received peace of heart and mind, there comes a desire in us to have companionship with Christians in song and worship to praise and honor our God in prayers of thankfulness. We are now willing and desirous to testify of our faith to those about us and especially to those of our congregation who are witnesses of our testimony.

John the Baptist said in St. Matt. 3:11, "I indeed baptize you with water unto repentance; but he that cometh after me is mightier than I, whose shoes I am not worthy to bear: he shall baptize you with the Holy Ghost and with fire."

Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life. For if we have been planted together in the likeness of his death, we shall be also in the likeness of his resurrection: Knowing this, that our old man is crucified with him, that the body of sin might be destroyed, that henceforth we should not serve sin. For he that is dead is freed from sin. Now if we be dead with Christ, we believe that we shall also live with him: Knowing that Christ being raised from the dead dieth no more; death hath no more dominion over him. For in that he died, he died unto sin once; but in that he liveth, he liveth unto God. Likewise reckon ye also yourselves to be dead indeed unto sin, but alive unto God through Jesus Christ our Lord. Let not sin therefore reign in your mortal body, that ye should obey it in the lusts thereof. Neither yield ye your members as instruments of unrighteousness unto sin: but yield yourselves unto God, as those that are alive from the dead, and your members as instruments of righteousness unto God. For sin shall not have dominion over you: for ye are not under the law, but under grace. What then? Shall we sin, because we are not under the law, but under grace? God forbid."

We are all happy to be able to have a Christian fellowship with these newly formed Christians and they also in their new found faith are humble and will gladly and willingly go hand in hand as true Christians on this path of life.

Now that we have answered our own question of "What shall I do to be saved?" by repentance and being baptized with water and the Holy Ghost, the urge impels us, by the Grace of God to go forward in Christian faith, not only for ourselves but that our light and love may also help other souls to attain this Christian fellowship that we all may stay true until the end, then have companionship with the saints in everlasting life.

# CONFESSION

Confess your sins one to another and pray one for another that you may be healed. James 5:16.

"They are baptized of him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins." —Matthew 3:6.

"He shall confess his sin which he hath done."—Numbers 5:7.

"I acknowledged my sin unto Thee ... and Thou forgavest the iniquity of my sin."—Psalm 32:5.

"If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins."— 1 John 1:9.

"Confess your sins one to another and pray for one another that you may be healed."—James 5:16.

"Pour out your heart before Him." --Psalm 62:8.

Here a delicate subject is broached. Here the Word of God touches the most sensitive spot of the human heart.

A peculiar timidity against revealing what is in its depths lies in the human heart. Adam, already, tried to hide from the all-seeing eye of God. Cain feared that his wrong doing, which he wanted to cover up, would be read on his forehead.

And this aversion against the disclosure of what is in the innermost part of the heart, this false pride, has unfortunately deterred many people from conversion or has retarded them in it.

From whence does this timidity come? Is it not awakened and nursed by the power of darkness because it knows that thereby it can check people on their way to salvation?

Since it is true that a person feels that confession comes too near to him, what is more natural than that he seeks to deny its necessity? Yet what does contention help, and how far does philosophizing bring a person? What does the Word say—the Word which is the unchangeable foundation of truth, and to which we are not permitted to add nor yet to take anything from it. The Bible passages quoted are only a few out of many, and they show most clearly that it is God's will.

Moses, already, taught the people that they should confess their sins.

David who, as no other, could decribe the inner conflict of the soul was also led through confession.

The result of the fiery preaching of John the Baptist was repentance, and the fruit of repentance was confession. (Matt. 3:6). It was not something that was manifested in several individuals merely, but rather all that were seized by the Word went this way.

James says plainly: "Therefore, confess your sins to one another, and pray for one another so that you may be healed," (James 5:16) and thereby he tells us plainly that a confession that is made to God only without the presence of a witness, is not the way that God has chosen.

It is not possible to attain the fulfillment of the promises of salvation without being obedient to the Word of God. And if we de not follow that guiding line, we are "blind and shortsighted." (II Peter 1:7) Many examples out of life show that he who keeps his bosom locked stands as before a mountain and gradually becomes hardened, while on the other hand a pouring out of one's heart would smooth the way.

Nothing is ordained of God without having a definite good purpose. Also confession is not given as a command of God for the purpose of showing His superior power, but rather confession undoubtedly serves to further our salvation.

An unrepentant heart excuses its evil deeds, glosses over them, or denies them. The fundamental requirement to redemption, however, is sincerity, for only to the upright does God give success in attaining this. The clear proof and the first fruit of uprightness consists in this and that a person acknowledges his sins with a broken heart, and admits them freely and without adornment. "I acknowledged my sin unto Thee."

Nothing is more dangerous than a tightly closed heart; no where else has the power of darkness such an opportunity to exercise its power. A heart that is thus tightly closed is obstinate, proud and lacking in uprightness — all unpraiseworthy qualities which repel grace; thereby Satan's power has the opportunity to assert itself. The opening of the heart breaks this might; grace finds entry and works wonders. James points out plainly that a person then has an increased strength at his disposal for then people can pray together about the matter in order to be healed.

Necessary and God-pleasing as confession is, it is in no wise a work through which forgiveness can be earned, as is often falsely proclaimed. Forgiveness is and remains an unmerited gift, and it must be credited solely to the merit of Christ. It is true that confession brings a great relief, but this relief is not to be confused with the peace of God which comes into the heart only through forgiveness.

It is, however, very true that a person cannot open his heart to everyone. Trust is necessary for this, and trust cannot be forced. He who receives confession must especially be equipped for it by God. He must be fatherly, loving and discreet, and must be filled by the Spirit cf God to forgive and forget.

We have, however, not only done wrong in regard to God; we have also grieved or injured or in various ways harmed people. We can give no better testimony of the grace of God than humbly to acknowledge our wrongdoing and to apologize for it. It is good, however, not to neglect that opportunity of testifying of Christ's wonderful way of salvation.

If people were given their choice whether or not to confess, it would be easier to understand the fact that they hold back as they do. But the choice is a different one: Either to acknowledge honestly and to find forgiveness and be saved—or on the great day of the Lord to be openly uncovered in all one's ugliness, in disgrace and shame, and to stand and receive judgment without having a chance then of receiving salvation. What is better?

We call in friendliness to all closed and hardened hearts: Go to God still today! A Father-heart is open to you.

# SALVATION I AM CRUCIFIED WITH CHRIST: NEVERTHELESS I LIVE;" (GAL. 2:20)

Today many hear and believe the Gospel of Salvation, which first of all declares "how that Christ died for our sins according to the scriptures, and that He was buried, and that He rose again the third day, according to the scriptures;" (1 Cor. 15:1-4). But even though they believe this, they have no assurance of Salvation, see no change in their lives, and are left to wonder where we go from here?

The answer is: TO THE CROSS, which cannot remain a distant and merely historic fact, but becomes to us a very real and personal matter for in the "reckoning of Faith" I see myself there CRUCIFIED WITH CHRIST, knowing that as a sinner I have forfeited my right to life inand with Adam. "THOU SHALT SURELY DIE," I have fulfilled, at the cross "because we thus judge, that if ONE died for ALL, then were And being dead I ALL DEAD." am also BURIED WITH HIM by baptism into death. This burial marks the END OF THE OLD, and all the "old things are passed away." And they "beheld the sepulchre, and how His body was laid." (Luke 23:55).

The grave is the end of the visible, but we by FAITH IN THE WORD which saith so, and not by feeling or emotion, do reckon ourselves like as Christ, to be dead indeed unto sin,-(no more dead in sin)—but alive unto God through Jesus Christ our Lord." The believer has died by the law, which condemned him, unto that law and has thus passed out from under its jurisdiction, so that he is "no more under the Law but under Grace" (Rom. 6:14). He has severed his ONDONE position "IN ADAM" and terminated it when crucified with and buried with Christ by baptism into death; and having been planted TOGETHER in the likeness of His death, the BELIEVER also arises TOGETHER WITH HIM in the likeness of HIS RESURREC-TION unto a NEW LIFE, a NEW POSITION, a NEW RELATION-SHIP which places him "INTO CHRIST" as a NEW CREATION, with old things passed away and with GOD being the Creator of the NEW in the realm of the invisible, the Spiritual and Supernatural, of which Isaac is a type, while Ishmael is a type of the natural "in Adam."

How can I KNOW about these things and that I pass "out of Adam" and "into Christ," since I can neither SEE nor particularly FEEL such passing away of the OLD and presence of the NEW? The answer is: We RECKON these things, (which are heavenly) to be SO and TRUE by placing implicit FAITH in the testimony of the WORD of God and a full TRUST into the PERSON and WORK of CHRIST, "after that we heard the WORD of TRUTH. the Gospel of our Salvation: in whom also after that we BELIEVED, we were sealed with that Holy Spirit of promise, the earnest (deposit) of our inheritance until the Redemption of the purchased possession, unto the praise of His Glory." (Eph. 1:12-14) "Blessed are they that have not seen, and yet HAVE BE-LIEVED."

Being "IN CHRIST"-there is therefore no condemnation to them which are "IN CHRIST JESUS"... for the Law of the "Spirit of Life" (which has jurisdiction) "in Christ Jesus" hath made me FREE from the Law of "Sin and Death." (which has jurisdiction "IN ADAM" and condemns the sinner to death,hence the name: The Law of Sin and Death.) It is written and engraven in stones in a letter which KILLETH its transgressor, for "Sin is the transgression of the Law,--it is the "ministration of CONDEMNA-TION and of DEATH, it has but an inferior Glory and a "done away" jurisdiction to them which are "IN CHRIST."

How were we made FREE from this Law and removed from its ju-

risdiction and reach, its due processes of Justice, its condemnation and curse and the death it pronounces upon the transgressor? Were we set FREE by simply "making void the Law" and ignoring its claim upon uc, its verdict of "guilty" and its sentence of death? Doth our Faith then operate to make void that Law which is holy and just and good? Does our Faith constitute a merit sufficient to atone for our offence or will now true repentance, confession, and sorrow set aside its verdict, reverse its sentence, disarm itself and exercise forgiveness in MERCY? When the "guilty must die without mercy"! All such would be contrary to JUSTICE and TRUTH and even would be looked upon as bribery to make void the Law and cause Justice to miscarry.

Through Faith do we then make void the Law? God forbid! Yea, we establish the Law. How? By submitting to and accepting as a just recompense of reward the full penalty of the Law, which is death, executed upon ME, when I WAS CRUCIFIED, in the reckoning of that FAITH, and DIED IN THE DEATH OF MY SAV-IOR and TOGETHER WITH HIM.

"I AM CRUCIFIED,-I AM DEAD! through the Law and TO THE LAW; "For he that IS DEAD is FREED FROM SIN." The "LAW OF SIN AND DEATH" in its holiness and majesty is vindicated, its wrath appeased, and its offender destroyed, and it is once more established: "THE WAGES OF SIN IS DEATH." But for the RESURRECTION OF THE DEAD, assured and established by the Resurrection of Christ, this would be THE END of our race,and the book of its Tragedy closed in mourning among the "Morning Stars" and "Sons of God" (Job 38:7) and with the banner of God's Glory at half mast for ever. BUT: "As in Adam all DIE, even so in Christ shall all be made ALIVE." (1 Cor. 15:22.)

"Were you there when they crucified my Lord?—Were you there?

Were you there when they laid Him in the tomb?—Were you there?

in the tomb?—Were you there? Were you there when God raised Him

# from the dead?—Were you there?"

YES! I WAS THERE! And it was there, that I was baptized INTO JESUS CHRIST, when I TOGETH-ER WITH HIM was baptized INTO HIS DEATH and BURIED WITH HIM in His tomb by baptism into death. And I was there when God "hath RAISED US UP TOGETH-ER,"—and I GO there as often as my FAITH can span the distance of time and space. WERE YOU THERE?
