those that are in the family of God, worry should be a very small part of their life. "And which of you with taking thought can add to his stature

one cubit?" Luke 12:25. Corroding solicitude will not bring you the least of the things you fret about, though it may double the evil of wanting them. We of the family of God are admonished to cast all our cares upon Him, for He careth for you. I Peter 5:7. This is where our faith comes in, we must without the least doubt believe these inspired words of God. What a wonderful privilege this is to cast our burdens, worries, and anxieties upon Him who is able to bear them. "For He" is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think, according to the power that worketh in us." Ephesians 3:20.

We are not to worry over anything. The Apostle Paul instructs us in one of his letters to the Philippians, chapter four and verse six: "Be careful for nothing; but in every thing by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God." In these instructions we find the word everything; this means all, not just part of them or most of them but ALL. It is very important that we let ALL our cares and worries be known unto God, for we know that He demands justice and also deals with us justly. Here again our faith must take a great part. We must have complete confidence in His judgment, and know that He is always right.

The Apostle Paul also tells us in I Corinthians 7:32, that he would have us free from cares. What a glorious reason it is that he wants us free from these temporal and wordly cares. How utterly do we, dear ones, fail to take advantage of them. So that today we cannot say this affiction is not for me because it is not the same as Paul's. But every affliction or weakness, whether physical or otherwise, should be the thorn in our flesh and should make us strong in our weakness, for Christ's sake.

Whatever the cause or reason for our worries or anxieties, we must remember that God never promised that His children would be free from trial. In John 16:33, He tells us that in the world we shall have tribulation. "That the trial of your faith, being much more precious than of gold that perisheth, though it be tried with fire, might be found unto praise and honor and glory at the appearing of Jesus Christ." I Peter 1:7. If it were

not for these things would we realize our need of Him? It also tends to bring us much closer to Him, for in times of great distress and troubles He is our only comfort and consoler. Paul said, "We know that all things work together for good to them that love God." Romans 8:28.

In closing just a thought to the ones that are yet on the outside of God's family, and cannot call unto God as their heavenly Father. Your lives may well be full of cares, anxieties, and worries; for this world is full of them and you have no one to cast them upon that is able to bear them. Our dear Lord and Savior beckons to each and every one of you. For He says, "Come unto me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest." Letter from Austria

Neumarkt-Kallham in Austria, November 15th, 1946

Translated letter written from above Displaced - Persons - Camp.

Dear Uncle John, Aunt Mina and Cousins!

Everything that may serve you for this earthly life as well as eternally may be granted you of the Lord out of his infinite love and mercy. This is my heart felt wish and greeting to you in the hope that this letter will reach you and find you all well and in the best of health.

At least I succeeded in obtaining an address in Mansfield through which I hope to establish communication with you and to tell you briefly of our situation. Perhaps it is already known to you that all Germans in Jugoslavia were thrown into concentration camps without discrimination whether or not anyone was politically active or not. And so captains of Titos, partisan-party did not halt before believers, in spite of the fact that these believers did not even join the German - Dulturbund and remained in every respect neutral, also during the war. This is not strange, since Tito became an ardent follower of Stalin. If Stalin for the time being tolerates Religion. I do not believe the Stalin-Saul became a Stalin-Paul, but rather that his present attitude is only a political checker-move. But that the Germans even went farther and persecuted the Jews, who still are God's people should become our doom. So, all we Germans have to atone for it but worst of all the Jugoslavian-Germans could not flee in time.

With the prisoners is also Uncle Ludwig. He was taken to Rudolphsgnad (Banat) in December 1945. Young Bewi was taken away already in the summer of 1945 to a destination unknown, however, this much is known that he is in slave-Labor in Russia. Aunt Bewi could not endure it when they took away her daughter and was taken "home" soon afterwards to the Father above where there is no more pain nor sorrow. I thought that you already had connection with Uncle Ludwig until he asked for your address a short while ago

from us few from the Banat who in the last moments could flee to Austria.

My father died last winter on January 30th, 1946 of hunger in camp Rudolfsgnad. The same happened to my sister Bewi, leaving behind 8 children of which the oldest is 13. Of course all children were thrown into the same camp with their mother. Daily ration per head: 5 ounces cornmeal in a trough and a thin watersoup. Nothing else! My brother Ludwig was also transported to Russia January 1, 1946. To this day no token of his being alive. Of my other brothers and sisters I know nothing definite as they are scattered in all directions of the wind and only a short time ago it was possible to establish connection through Serbian members who smuggle mail in and out of the Serbian camps. Such an open letter I received from my sister Mina, who is also in camp with three

Last winter daily over 100 persons were taken from the Serbain camp as dead and buried in a big hole. No coffins and without clothing. However, those that are in the faith hold fast to their Lord and remain true unto death. My sister-in-law (Matthias' wife) in one of her last letters from the camp writes with a faith and trust that reminds one of the early Christian persecution.

The larger part of the members in

Austria are from Jugoslavia, Croatia, and Jugoslavian state of Batschka. From the Banat Jugoslavia hardly anybody got away. Altogether approximately 300 persons. Every Sunday there is Church. Swiss brethren, among them Br. Kambly was here twice and served us with gifts both after body and soul. These were blessed hours. There were also baptisms, sorry I was not yet among them. However, I hope with the grace of God, his great grace and mercy to be able to establish the covenant of peace so that I soon can sing: "To me free grace has been accorded—" (Zionsharp 220). Indeed, I can already praise the Lord for his wonderful love! I am thankful unto the Lord that for me things went as they did. Had I remained at home, I do not know if I would have found the Lord with all my earthly ambitions. That our father cared little for the business you had already observed on your visit in 1928. With him farming was the more important. However, when father transfered the business to me, I immediately expanded and modernized, Business increased by leaps, My last inventory was 3.6 Dinar (Note: Webster's dictionary states a dinar is about \$0.02). But I have to confess that I did not always deal rightly as I had seen and learned if from my father, I forgot God and my salvation and all else. I had only one goal and one thought: "How can I enlarge my possessions?" . . . But that I was happy in this condition I cannot assert. Of peace of the heart there was no trace and all that is vain my heart loved, how should it be possible to

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Dead Man Lives Again!

A True Story

The most startling event in all human history rocked the intellectual and scientific world 2000 years ago when a murder victim in Palistine, dead three days, came back to life.

How often did the dear Saviour meet me on the way and who wanted to lovingly give me his Hand but I rejected always this gracious hand of the Saviour instead of, as a miserable sinner reach out to the undeserved mercy and become thankful to my Redeemer. How often did the Lord so visibly bless me and so clearly that it was the hand of the Lord, but nothing moved me, I remained deaf. The war came with all its evil consequences and so it happened that one night — as the Russian front was already upon us - we were suddenly attacked by Partisan troops and being awakened by cries of the women and the shooting, I had just enough time to escape through the back window. I went through cornfields and finally reached Croatia and from there to Austria. The first night I spent in a cornfield clad only in night shirt and pants. That was a terrible night for me. That I should leave my riches for which I put in everything and to which I attached my whole heart, so suddenly and almost naked, I had never thought possible — "then whose shall those things be, which thou hast provided?" (St. Luke 12:20) — thus it is written in the parable of the rich fool. Indeed, I awoke and now my heart knows only one goal and one prayer: Lord grant me a pure heart and grant me in thy great love and mercy the grace to gather heavenly treasures, to attain to the heavenly home from which no one shall drive us and will remain forever!
