God's Inexpressible Gift Irvin Stoller

"I am Alpha and Omega, the beginning and the ending, saith the Lord." Rev. 1:8.

Christ gave many revelations of Himself; "I am the light of the world," "I am the bread of life," and "I am the good shepherd." They reveal a complete picture of the Christ as Saviour and Lord.

In John's declaration we see another picture: "Behold the Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world." St. John 1:29. We can believe there were many passages that were familiar to his listeners. They knew of the story of Abraham who was about to sacrifice his only son, as atonement for sin, when God stopped him and provided a ram for the sacrifice. They knew of the Levitical codes which demanded the shedding of the blood of the lamb for the remission of sins. They were likewise familiar with the Messianic prophecies of Isaiah, in which not only the temporal leaders, but also the suffering servant were presented. Therefore in saying, "Behold the Lamb of God which taketh away the sin of the world," John was obviously pointing out Jesus and God's provision of atonement for sin, God's sacrifice-whose blood could redeem, and God's suffering servant, who was be brought as a lamb to the to slaughter, and bruised for our iniquities. manded a certain amount to be given. What then does the Bible teach that applies to us in the Dispensation of Grace? In searching the scriptures we find numerous passages on this subject, but space would not permit to refer to all. The following instruction was given by the apostle Paul to the church at Corinth: "Upon the first day of the week let every hath prospered him." 1st Corinthians 16:2. Most of God's people keep books to a greater or lesser extent or know within reasonable measure to what extent "God hath prospered him." But we ask, "What portion of our income shall we give to the Lord?" This the Lord has left for us to decide for ourselves. We read further, "He which soweth sparingly shall reap also sparingly; and he which soweth bountifully shall reap also bountifully. Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give: not grudgingly, or of necessity: for God loveth a cheerful giver." II Corinthians 9:6.7. It would be in God's power to force us to serve Him in everything and especially in giving Him a portion of our income; but we see plainly that it must be voluntary on our part. In the Old Testament days, a tenth or tithe was required as a minimum. Ought we to give less? Let us make up our minds whether we want to give that much, or more, or less; remembering to give our gifts cheerfully and not grudgingly. God is a God of order and we should do this as orderly as possible.

What a blessing there is in giving! Christ taught that "it is more blessed to give than to receive." Who is there that has ever given cheerfully to some one in need or to the Lord's work for spreading the gospel that has not been richly blessed? Let us

not give with the idea that God will always reward us with material gain but rather in the spirit of love toward God and our fellow men. And yet we can read in the prophet Malachi, chapter 3, verse 10, "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in mine house, and prove me now herewith, saith the LORD of Hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it."

Our Lord, in a sermon, taught the following: "Give, and it shall be given unto you; good measure, pressed down, and shaken together, and running over, shall men give into your bosom. For with the same measure that ye mete withal it shall be measured to you again." Luke 6:38.

The question sometimes arises as to where the money should be given. There are always regular needs in the church. If everyone would give as the Lord has prospered him, the problem of raising money would be more easily solved.

There are two great present day needs for funds. Let us consider the European distress among those of like faith. If we would realize in a small way what suffering is the lot of many of God's true followers, we would look with shame upon the small gifts we have given. No doubt they and we often wonder why God seemingly has forsaken them. Could it not be that He is trying us to see if we will give a part of the bountiful blessing He has bestowed on us? Many prayers are offered for those unfortunate ones, but what are we doing to help God answer our prayers? The story is told of a small boy who had often heard his father, a rich farmer, pray for the poor, but he never saw his father giving anything to help them. One day after the father had again earnestly prayed for the poor the small son said, "Father, I wish I had your corn crib." "Why?" asked the father. "I'd help the Lord answer your prayer," answered the child. What a rebuke! Do not many of us need such a rebuke?

The other great present day need is the spreading of God's Word. God has never changed His command given to His disciples when He told them, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature." We have an avenue opened to us in purchasing Bibles, or portions thereof, in foreign languages where God's word is little known. Will we do our part to furnish the gospel to as many people as possible? Not many can go, but practically all can give. Will we be unaccountable if we have not done all in our power?

Perhaps other avenues will open for us to help spread God's word as the last days are approaching and the Lord's second coming is nearing. We all need to pray, but funds are needed as well. Let us examine ourselves in the light of the scriptures to see if we are doing our part.

Whenever He shines into the heart or a home, He brings wisdom in the way of guidance, purity in the sense of goodness, and beauty in the form of splendor—all that the sun is to the world about us—and vastly more. "Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the Word of Truth." (II Tim. 2:15)

In our last article we have emphasized the fact that the TRUE and the FALSE, the GENUINE and the IMI-TATION or COUNTERFEIT, are present in our world side by side. No less personalities, than Christ the *Truth*, is promoting the one, and Satan, the father of *lies*, promoting the other.

When we ascribe considerable success to Satan's efforts, we do so not because of a personal judgment and opinion and a confidence we have in them, but rather as a matter of Scripture Revelation and an implicit confidence we have in it. Both the true and the false are sown in our world as the field; the seed for the one is the WORD of truth and for the other the beguiling word of deception. Both grow, develop, and ripen to fruitage side by side until the separation of the harvest time, as indicated by the parable of the "Wheat and the Tares." (Matt. 13:24).

If we, therefore, are not to be deceived and led away with the error of the wicked, and fall from our own steadfastness (II Pet. 3:17), we must, as pilgrims and strangers traveling in hostile territory, depend wholly on the safe-conduct and convoy of the word of truth and the Spirit of truth to guide us safely home. We must know the truth, hear the truth, love the truth, and walk in the truth. (John 8:32, 18-37, II Thess. 2:10, II Jno. 4). As there is a Spirit of truth, there is also a spirit of error. (I Jn. 4:6). "THY WORD IS TRUTH." Jno. 17:17).

Thus we should find both for our faith,—that it may be the belief OF THE TRUTH, and for our walk, that it may be in the truth,—a basis and a reason for it in the word of truth. But having said that, we have not said all. For Satan, too, knows the WORD, and hesitates not to quote it to tempt the very one who himself is the Truth. But when Satan quotes Scripture, he mixes a doubt or a lie

with it, as in the case of Eve, or he suggests it for mis-application, as inthe second witness to the truth, confirms or disallows by bringing to mind another Scripture, thus guarding and leading the humble and teachable into "all TRUTH" and gives him discernment of the "spirit of error." It seems strange indeed and hard to concede that any written Word of God could be used to deceive, but we are in total war, and soldiers will tell us that the enemy which wears our uniform, speaks our language, and poses as our friend, is the most dangerous.

It is therefore apparent that if we would be approved of God and unashamed in our service record, we must recognize the need not only for knowing the holy Scripture as a letter, but also for a wise and right application of the word of truth by "rightly dividing" the same. We must "study," or apply ourselves more thoroughly, here to be "established in the present truth" (II Pet. 1:12), and to attain a certain skill in handling the WORD of GOD without deceit (II Cor. 4:2) and in its right division.

In this "study" for a right division of the word of truth, I believe the Holy Spirit,—the Spirit of truth,—is eminently the TEACHER, as it is written:

"Which things also we speak, not in the words which man's wisdom teacheth, but which the HOLY GHOST teacheth; comparing spiritual things with spiritual." (I Cor. 2: 13). And again:

"But the anointing (the Holy Spirit) which ye have received of Him abideth in you, and ye need not that any may teach you: but as the same anointing teacheth you of all things, and is truth, and is no lie, and even as it hath taught you, ye shall abide in him." (I John 2:27). And again:

"And it is the SPIRIT that beareth witness, because the SPIRIT is truth. He that believeth on the Son of God hath the witness in HIMSELF." (I John 5:6 and 10).

It is interesting to observe, that

while the Holy Spirit shall teach us all things, He shall not speak of Himself, for He shall receive and take of Christ and bring all things to our remembrance, whatsoever Christ hath said. And Christ spoke not His own, but His Father's WORD. For while the Son was in the earth, He glorified the Father, in whose name He came. The Son spoke not His own word, He did not His own will, nor His own work, but the Father's who sent Him. When the Son had finished the work in the earth which the Father had given Him to do, and was received up and glorified in the Heavens, the Holy Spirit was sent to glorify the SON in whose name He came. And the Spirit likewise, representing the Son, to whom the Father has committed all things, does not speak His own WORD, nor do His own work, but Christ's who sent Him, that He may glorify the Son and not himself. (John 14:24-26, and 16:13-15, 17:4 and 8).

A true Christian, and only he who has the Holy Spirit is one, who would wholly fill his God appointed place while on the earth, will ever be careful to fall in line with the example of these heavenly Guests. Therefore the words which a Christian speaks will not be his own, but "the oracles of God." His ministry will not be in his own, but "as of the ability which God giveth: that God in ALL THINGS may be glorified through Jesus Christ." (I Pet. 4:11). And his work will not be the fruit of his own energy, wrought in the flesh, but it will be the work and the fruit of the HOLY SPIRIT IN HIM. (Gal. 5:22-25). The Holy Spirit can convict, reprove, comfort, witness to the human spirit, and bring to our remembrance a written WORD OF GOD in His mission to teach and counsel and warn, but being a SPIRIT, "which has not flesh and bones," he desires hearts and bodies purified by Faith, to dwell in (Acts 15:8-9), and needs yielded members of such bodies to bring forth His Fruit in His power, manifested and wrought through human instrumentalities. Thus the Holy Spirit and the Spirit filled believer with Him, glorify Jesus Christ, the Son, and through the Son also the (Continued on page 7)

(I Cor. 1:29) Only that which is of the Holy Spirit is "OF GOD," is acceptable "TO GOD" and is the GLORY OF CHRIST, and OF GOD. For: Thine is the kingdom, and the power and the glory, forever, Amen.

Men may share in this glory as Christ is in them, the hope of glory. (Col. 1:27) "For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God;" (Rom. 3:23) Therefore no man,-no Prophet, Priest, or Saint,-will ever stand in the presence of God in His own glory, but in the glory of Christ; the Holy Spirit is now in the earth to glorify Him, and the believer, as he is "filled with the Spirit," - the Power that worketh in him, he becomes the channel and co-worker of the Holy Spirit, in His present work to glorify the Son, and through the Son also God the FATHER.
