"And these signs shall follow them that believe; In my Name . . . they shall take up Serpents; and if they drink any deadly thing, it shall not hurt them." (Mark 16:17-18)

I have before me a clipping from a recent issue of TIME Magazine describing a "religious service" in which a certain southern preacher quoting the above passage of Scripture, holds in his hands, as shown by a photographic picture, two giant rattle snakes, crying that he "got the power now-he got the 'nointing." Such use of poisonous reptiles are by no means isolated occurrences in the south. The Chicago Tribune reports, under date of October 17, a court trial resulting from such a "service," which in some states are unlawful. The TIME article also reports that one of the worshippers at that "service" had faith in the power of the Lord great enough to "drink a deadly thing." He died of strychnine poisoning. His wife, standing beside the grave, said: "Ernest just had too much faith."

You say such an idea of a "religious service" is fanatical and ridiculous, and perhaps it is. But how do we know? The southern preacher squarely" "stands on scriptural grounds and he quotes the WORD of GOD as a basis for his FAITH and fearlessness that he will remain unharmed. He will, no doubt, insist that his friend Ernest was hurt, because he had "too little faith," while the widow of the victim thinks he had "too much faith." Who is right? The Scripture involved here is in the New Testament at that and is a promise to-and a sign to follow them that believe.

There are other SIGNS enumerated as following the believer: they shall cast out devils,—speak with new tongues and heal the sick. A number of religious sects practice the "speaking with tongues" and "divine healing" as a prominent part of their program, while they may not undertake to "cast out devils" although there would be a large field for that,—nor would they think of treading on serpents and drinking poison without harm. Yet ALL of these SIGNS men-

tioned belong TOGETHER (and some more) and follow the believer or NONE of them will. Where one applies, the others likewise apply. We cannot elect to practice some and reject the other SIGNS. We have chosen for our purpose the extreme signs of serpents and poison, because they make the absolute necessity of "RIGHTLY DIVIDING THE WORD OF TRUTH" the more readily apparent, if we are to be established in the "PRESENT TRUTH" and "prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, WILL of GOD" for the believer today.

Before we proceed in our endeavor to "rightly divide" this particular Word of Truth and make it an example of how to study to be approved of God and comparing Scripture with Scripture, let us remind ourselves of a few helpful truths about the Bible.

It is a good sized volume in which GOD HAS SPOKEN. Speech reveals the will, the thoughts, the purposes, etc., of the Speaker. This revelation of the things of God is a progressive one; He did not reveal everything at once. God spoke "at sundry times and in divers manners" and dispensations. God's Book covers things spread over thousands of years. In CHRIST did ALL THE FULLNESS of the GODHEAD DWELL (Col. 2: 9), but even He while on earth did NOT REVEAL ALL, for He said: "I have yet MANY THINGS to say unto you, but ye cannot bear them now. The Spirit of Truth . . . shall hear . . . and . . . receive of MINE, and . . . shew you THINGS TO COME." (John 16:12). The Apostle Paul received further revelations of Jesus Christ of the GOSPEL HE PREACHED (Gal. 1:11-12): of the mystery of translation (I Cor. 15:51), of the mystery of Israel's present blindness in part (Rom. 11-25), and of the mystery of Christ "which in other ages was not made known unto the sons of men, as it is now REVEALED ... by the Spirit," and "which from the beginning of the world hath been HID IN GOD." (Eph. 3:1-9). Lastly, caught up to the third heaven, he had an "abundance of REVELA-

TIONS" by "unspeakable words, which it is not lawful for a man to utter." (II Cor. 12:1-7). This points to an "abundance" of things even now still "hid in God" as mysteries yet to be revealed, many at the appearing of Christ in power and great glory. As examples may be mentioned Col. 3:3-4: "For ye are dead, and your LIFE IS HID with Christ IN GOD." And again in Rom. 8:18: ". . . sufferings . . . are not worthy to be compared with the glory which shall be REVEALED IN US."

A certain adjustment, therefore, on the part of God's servants in the light of NEW REVELATIONS, became necessary, and still is. He finds as Peter says concerning Paul's writings: "Some things hard to be understood, which they that are UN-LEARNED and unstable (not established IN GRACE) wrest, as they do also the other Scriptures, unto their own destruction." (II Peter 3:16). "Snake services" and we may add "tongue services" and "healing services," however well meant, are the result of "WRESTED SCRIP-TURES" by the unlearned. It means that certain Scriptures are forcefully pried loose out of their orderly setting and DISPENSATION, and are forced into a setting and a mould of man's ideas, which too often are foreign to "the PRESENT TRUTH" (II Pet. 1:12), and present a picture of confusion, and not of harmony. But "God is not the author of confusion." (I Cor. 14:33)

If a servant of the Lord, therefore, would be approved of God and unashamed, he must "study" and LEARN to "rightly divide the Word of TRUTH." -And he must also be a servant of the Lord, and not of sin. A purged "vessel unto honour, sanctified, and meet for the Master's use, and prepared unto every good work," avoiding "foolish and UNLEARNED questions" and the strife they gender (II Tim. 2:20-26), or else he may be "Ever LEARNING, and never able to come to the knowledge of the TRUTH." (II Tim. 3:7)

The sun is the light of day and the light of life for every living thing under the sun, but it takes a rainbow to display and bring out for observation its many hidden colors in a most (Continued on page 8)

Thanksgiving

"I will praise the name of God with a song and will magnify him with thanksgiving."—Ps. 69:30.

This is the month that brings us "Thanksgiving Day." Well did the early Pilgrims, coming to our shores, perceive that man has a duty toward his Maker. To perform this duty faithfully must ever be man's foremost thought. To a child of God, Thanksgiving shall not return only once a year, but each day shall be a Thanksgiving Day, for

We are thankful for the material things which have been shared unto us during this past year; we are thankful for the religious freedom which we enjoy in our land, especially when we consider the millions in foreign lands who are deprived of even the necessities of life, and gradually are being brought unto the yoke of slavery; and last but not least, we are thankful for this precious faith which was once delivered unto the saints. If our eyes are trained and employed to count the benefits and gifts which God presents to us, they will pass before our eyes like an endless army whose number no man can count!

Let, therefore, Thanksgiving teach us to be truly thankful; learn to count some of the benefits of God, and add to the number the new ones. This was the aim of David when he spoke to himself prayerfully, "Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all his benefits." It is so much more comfortable and rational to see what we have to be thankful for and to rejoice accordingly, than to have our vision filled with our lacks and our needs. Happy are they who possess this gift! Blessings may fail and fortunes vary, but the thankful heart remains. The happy past at least is secure and heaven is ahead.
