This was the most outstanding event that took place in the world. The wise men from the East came to Jerusalem saying, "Where is he that is born King of the Jews? For we have seen his star in the east, and are come to worship him." (Matt. 2:1-2) - revealing that the Christ came first to the children of Israel as their king, He did not deny when He was asked of Pilot, "Art thou the King of the Jews? And he answering said unto him, Thou sayest it." Mark 15:2. We concluded our last article in the Silver Lining, expressing the hope that we might trace and place, by "rightly dividing the Word of Truth," some verses in Mark 16 into their proper and harmonious, and God glorifying, dispensational setting, in a future article.

TREASURED VERSES

Blessed BE the Lord God of Israel; for he hath visited and redeemed his people,

And hath raised up an horn of salvation for us in the house of his servant David;

As he spake by the mouth of his holy prophets, which have been since the world began:

That we should be saved from our enemies, and from the hand of all that hate us:

To perform the mercy PROMISED to our fathers, and to remember his holy covenant;

-St. Luke 1:68-72

To make the picture, at which we are looking, more complete, we will add the two preceding verses, containing the so called "Great Commission," and read:

"And He said unto them. Go ye into all the world, and preach the Gospel to every creature. He that bebut he that believeth not shall be

damned. And these signs shall follow them that believe; In my Name shall lieveth and is baptized shall be saved: they cast out devils; they shall speak with new tongues; They shall take up serpents; and if they drink any deadly thing, it shall not hurt them; they shall lay hands on the sick, and they shall recover." (Mark 16:15-18).

I am fully aware that many would object to connect some of these signs with the Great Commission, but the holy scriptures joined them together by the use of the little word "AND." What therefore God hath joined let not men put asunder.

In this picture we see the outline of a tremendous WORLD-WIDE Program of DISCIPLING ALL NA-TIONS, baptizing them in the Triune Name of the Godhead, and teaching them to observe all things whatsoever Christ had commanded his disciples. This program was inaugurated by One, to whom "all Power is given ... in heaven and in EARTH" (All Governmental Power and Executive Authority (I Cor. 15:24), and He will back it up and see it through with a definite promise given to his Disciple Emissaries that He will be with them alway, even unto the end of the World (Matt. 28:18-20). As He was about to begin His Rule in the midst of His Enemies, that they may be made His footstool (Ps. 110 and 1

Cor. 15:25), and sending forth His disciples, "as sheep in the MIDST of WOLVES," now on a world-wide scale, as He once did on a national scale, (Matt. 10:16) into enemy held territory, it is reasonable and to be expected that Christ would delegate POWER to His Messengers, which is superior to "all the power of the enemy" so that they may "take up serpents" or tread on them and scorpions, or drink a deadly thing and be not hurt, even as "nothing by any means could hurt" the SEVENTY in Luke 10:17-19 and the TWELVE Disciples in Matthew 10, all of whom He sent once before, limiting at that time their Mission or Commission to Israel only, saying: "Go not into the way of the Gentiles, and into any city of the Samaritans enter ye not: But go rather to the lost sheep of the House of Israel."

The Emissaries of the Great Commission also had the gift of HEAL-ING, as did the Twelve Disciples and the Seventy, as they had been sent forth. And FIRST on the list of the POWERS given all the three groups, we especially observe is the POWER AGAINST UNCLEAN SPIRITS and DEVILS to CAST THEM OUT IN THE NAME OF CHRIST, or the MESSIAH in Hebrew (Matt. 10:1). This is a very significant point to consider in our effort to place our text in Mark, along with the others referred to, into their right and harmonious dispensational setting. For it is evident that the "casting out of Devils" and their number is legions,-means a loosening of the "unnatural" grip and a gradual breaking down of the Power Satan,-the Prince and Ruler of this World,—has and exercises in and through men and nations, to deceive and destroy them. These spirits are called "UN-CLEAN" because they are not in "Kinship" with the genuine HUMAN SPIRIT, which God breathed into the nostrils of the First Human Being, Adam. How these unclean spirits of Devils find the Sin-caused crevices or breaches in the temple of the human Body and force themselves in to exercise their unwholesome influence over the Human spirit, from the mildest form down to the complete enslavement and domination of the human spirit and the total usurpation of power over the will and the Body of the rightful owner, in extreme cases to the point of self-destructive insanity, is somewhat of a mystery and not now to be further considered here. It is only to be recognized here as an undeniable fact.

It is likewise a fact that the world has seen "dark ages" and murderous wars of "sweat and blood and tears," which defeated the victor and the vanquished alike, because of the presence of a sinister satanic power, that twisted the judgment of men and Nations, and led them apparently helplessly to their OWN DESTRUCTION. Cain, though a very religious type, was of that "wicked one" and slew his brother, only to discover that it made him a sinner with sin and punishment greater than he could bear.

Satan is the "PRINCE of this WORLD" and rules through legions of his angels or devils in cooperation with him in the affairs of the World, as a largely unrecognized Power behind the curtain, but with the ruinous and devastating WORKS only too evident on every hand, in every land and in every age. Directly Sattan with all his legions, cannot create a single blade of grass, nor can he directly, without permission, destroy a single blade of grass, but makes HIS WORKS effective and present in the World of men, through human instrumentalities.

Christ, the "PRINCE of the HOUSE OF DAVID" came to destroy the WORKS of the DEVIL," and the Devil, fearing the enmity and the heel of the "Seed of the Woman," sought to destroy Christ "from the cradle to the grave." In this he used as his instruments, Herod, the vain puppet King, Judas, the thief himself called "a devil," the rulers of Israel who plotted to destroy Him because of envy, and Pilate, the crooked Politician, who sacrificed an innocent Life to please the mob. But never, in all the history of the Universe, did ever any scheme of crooked plotting backfire with a like clear cut, decisive, and glorious Victory for God and the Truth on the one hand, and on the other hand a like devastating defeat to Lies and the Father of Lies and the forces of Evil was never before administered, nor will ever gain in endless ages become necessary.

Now we said that the Power to cast out Devils and the exercise of that Power as Chirst began to do and commissioned others in ever greater numbers to carry on and to expand in its scope from the Nation of Israel to all the world, has very great significance. It is the number ONE sign of the "At Hand-ness" of the KING-DOM OF GOD; the impending establishment of the long-promised and hoped for MESSIANIC RULE of Righteousness in the EARTH. The answer to the prayer: "Thy Kingdom come. Thy will be done, as in heaven, SO IN EARTH."

We base this on Luke 11:14-23, but especially on verse 20: "But if I with the finger of God CAST OUT DEV-ILS, no doubt the KINGDOM OF GOD IS COME UPON YOU." This KINGDOM was announced by Gabriel (Luke 1:33) preached by John the Baptist (Matt. 3:2) and as the GOSPEL OF THE KINGDOM with SIGNS following, preached by the Lord Jesus (Matt. 4:23), the Twelve (Luke 9:1-2) the Seventy (Luke 10: 9 and 17-19) and on a world-wide scale to every Creature (Mark 16: 15), which falls into the "END-TIME" (Matt. 24:14) and the yet future "Great Tribulation," probably lapping over into the partly established Kingdom of GLORY and POWER, with the "King of the Jews" upon David's THRONE OF GLORY.
