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# SOUND IN FAITH

"That he might be the FATHER of all them that BELIEVE... who also walk in the steps of THAT FAITH of our FATHER ABRAHAM... who is the FATHER OF US ALL." (Rom. 4:11, 12, 16).

While we ever should be Looking unto Jesus, as the Author and finisher of (our) FAITH (Heb. 12:2), "we also are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses" and elders of long ago, who BY FAITH have "obtained a good report." The report of a few of these witnesses and elders of Faith we find in the pages of the Holy Scriptures, some enumerated especially in Hebrews eleven. But the unnamed great cloud of Witnesses of Faith have their report indelibly recorded on heavenly pages. "These all died IN FAITH . . ." "And these all, having obtained a good report THROUGH FAITH . . ." (Heb. 11:13, 39), "were strangers and pilgrims on the earth," and even now yet wait to receive the inheritance of the desired and promised better and heavenly things which by faith in a faithful God, who cannot lie, they so long ago already did possess.

Outstanding and unique among these ELDERS OF FAITH is FA-THER ABRAHAM. It should be profitable to consider his report in some detail for those who desire to "walk in the steps of THAT FAITH of our father Abraham."

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# TIME TRENDS

This is written on Memorial Day, a day originally set aside for commemoration of our honored dead. It was meant to be a day when flowers were to be scattered on the graves of the soldier dead, not only as a symbol of appreciation; but also to remind all of us of the price that was paid that we might enjoy life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.

#### TREASURED VERSES

Make a joyful noise unto the LORD, all ye lands. Serve the LORD with gladness: come before his presence with singing.

Know ye that the Lord he is God: it is he that hath made us, and not we ourselves; we are his people, and the sheep of his pasture.

Enter into his gates with thanks-giving, and into his courts with praise: be thankful unto him, and bless his name.

For the LORD is good; his mercy is everlasting; and his truth *endureth* to all generations.—Psa. 100.

However, like many of our holidays, the original purpose became a side issue as the reigning spirit of our times stepped in and began to hold sway. Christmas became commercialized as a gift-giving time by many, while the Greatest Gift of all, the Son of God, became the Forgotten

Man of Christmas. Thanksgiving, instituted by the early settlers as a day of thanks to God for His divine protection and His innumerable blessings, became a feast day, with little recognition of the providence of God. So, on this Memorial Day, the intended solemnity is barely remembered, as millions of our fellow countrymen take to the roads and to the air to get away from work and worry, as warnings are flashed of two hundred or more impending deaths as a result of accidents.

Now it is not my purpose to be a gloom-caster; however, these happenings portray a trend of the times; they are an indication of how quickly the solemn, serious things of our time are supplanted by those less worthy.

We are living in what is commonly accepted to be the Laodicean church age, an age lukewarm—neither hot nor cold—and therefore perilous to the spirit. However, it is true in a spiritual sense as well as in a material sense, that the darker the night is, the brighter the light will shine. Therein lies not only our spiritual duty but also our spiritual opportunity.

The greatest progress made by the Church has been during days of adversity and in times of persecution. The re-awakening of our own Church occurred during times of religious intolerance and bigotry. However, opposition only caused increased faith,

and imprisonment greater zeal. Driven from one town to the other and from one country to another, our forefathers in the faith eventually crossed the water to found their homes in a foreign land, our land. Like Abraham they were, strangers in a strange land looking for a city whose builder was God. Congregations were established, converts were added, and the work of the Lord prospered—the light was kept shining.

This pioneering spirit seems to have somewhat abated with us, perhaps because there is no longer persecution and hardship. And yet in our very well-being we must be watchful, lest we become self-sufficient and no longer find it necessary to "lean on the Everlasting Arms" of God. Of particular moment then is the need of prayer and the holding of daily devotions. The holding of family devotions is a matter which should not suffer neglect. There is nothing more beneficial, more spiritually wholesome, than this matter of daily communion with God. It not only renews and invigorates our faith, but it also serves the highly desirable purpose of planting spiritual seed in the heartsoil of our children.

First, upon what grounds does the Scripture call him "the father of us all" who believe? Why is he not simply one of the many believers of old? Why is he set apart as a father, especially in view of the words of Christ: "call no man your father upon the earth: for one is your Father, which is in heaven" (Matt. 23:9). This latter expresses the relationship of the CREATOR to the CREA-TURES, who through Adam, "which was the son of God," must be recognized as the origin and fountainhead of all human existence and life, and implies responsible Fatherhood. The Fatherhood of Abraham on the other hand expresses a relationship which is spiritual in character, and is a kinship solely based upon a "like precious faith" with Abraham. That God would place a man "subject to like passions as we are," and who was not without faltering steps, into such a unique position as to make him "the FATHER OF ALL THEM THAT BELIEVE" and by promise give him a heavenly and innumerable Star Seed, which at the same time are also the "children of God," begotten of God according to His abundant mercy (I Pet. 1:3) and "of his own will begat he us with the word of truth" (Jas. 1:18), is a revelation of almost incredible implications. It so intertwines the human with the Divine, the natural with the supernatural, the temporal with the eternal, and all as the workmanship of God (Eph. 2:10), that when God's accomplishment of the NEW IN CHRIST will be unveiled before heavenly Principalities, the Wisdom of God,-now appearing as foolish-

What, tho' I might live without the Savior, When I come to die, how would it be?

O the joy of having all in Jesus! What a balm the broken heart to heal! Ne'er a sin so great, but He'll forgive it, Nor a sorrow that He does not feel!

Melody No. 182 Zion Harp. ness in the world,—the Power of God,—now appearing as weakness,—the Love of God, His boundless Grace with majestic Truth and Righteousness, will be lifted to a new height and praise and glory, and power and blessing and honour will redound and exalt His holy Name, "throughout all ages, world without end. Amen."

Perhaps the clearest statement in Scripture, which makes ABRAHAM the FATHER OF ALL BELIEVERS after Him, is the Word spoken by God Himself: "Look now toward heaven, and tell the stars, if thou be able to number them: . . SO SHALL THY SEED BE." (Gen. 15:5)

Now "Seed" are ever Children, and Abraham had a natural Seed or "children of the flesh," as most parents have under the original or Adamic blessing: "Be fruitful, and multiply, and replenish the earth." (Gen. 1:28). This blessing was renewed unto Noah (Gen. 9:1), but "That which is born of the flesh is flesh":-they are ever "children of the flesh." But Abraham, unlike any other man ever living, was blessed also to have a multiplied spiritual Seed BY PROMISE, which at the same time would be the "children of God," and of which Isaac is a type. Thus we read:

"Neither, because they are the seed of Abraham, are they ALL CHILDREN: but, in Isaac shall thy seed be called. That is, they which are the children of the flesh, these are NOT THE CHILDREN OF GOD: but the children of promise are counted for the seed." (Rom. 9:7-8)

And again: "Now we, brethren, as Isaac was, are the children of promise." (Gal. 4:28)

But now, while there is a multiplied star Seed included in the promise to Abraham, there is also a ONE SEED included as his Seed, which is Christ. And it is through Jesus Christ that the blessings of Abraham come upon all the families of the earth. And the BLESSINGS of Abraham come only with the FAITH of Abraham.

"Know ye therefore that they which are of FAITH, the same are the children of Abraham.... So then

they which be of FAITH are blessed with faithful Abraham" (Gal. 3:7, 9).

"For ye are all the CHILDREN OF GOD by FAITH in Christ Jesus. And if ye be Christ's, then are ye Abraham's Seed, and heirs according to the promise." (Gal. 3:26, 29)

Let us then endeavor to examine the FAITH of our father Abraham, in the light of the Word of God, that in turn we may also examine ourselves, whether we be IN THE FAITH, and "walk in the steps of THAT FAITH of our FATHER ABRAHAM," in order that "the blessing of Abraham" be also upon us.

According to the definition of Hebrews 11:1, "FAITH is the substance of THINGS HOPED FOR . . .," it is very reasonable to assume that Abram HOPED FOR children from Sarai, but she was barren, and as the years passed by and age came along, the realization that he must remain without the blessing of a child of his own and without an heir must have weighed depressingly upon this godly couple. For otherwise Abram was greatly blessed, a rich man with a large household. (Gen. 13:2 and 14: 14) "And Abram said, Behold, to me thou hast given NO SEED: and, lo, one born in my house is mine heir." (Gen. 15:3)

It appears that at the age of seventy-five Abram received the FIRST PROMISE. It included *greatness* as a Nation, a *great Name*, of being blessed and being made a blessing; of a seed which will possess a LAND. (Gen. 12:1-8). In Genesis 13:14-17 this promise is renewed, first of the LAND and then with emphasis upon his Seed to be as innumerable "as the dust of the earth."

This PROMISE of being made a great Nation, of Dust Seed or Sand Seed and a Land for them to dwell in, is looked upon as the natural posterity of Abraham, which are "the children of the flesh" and which "are NOT the children of God." This Promise relates largely to the temporal blessings, in "the times of refreshing," and "the times of restitution of all things" according to Old Testament prophecy; the time of the Restoring again of the Kingdom to Israel in the yet future millennial

reign of Christ. (Acts 1:6, and 3:19, 21)

Based upon these PROMISES, the FAITH of Abraham continued TO HOPE for natural children, for a name, for a nation, and for the possession and inheritance of the blessed and promised land, in which he sojourned as in a strange country. Perhaps around the age of eighty-two he received the SECOND PROMISE, when he was bidden to "LOOK NOW TOWARD HEAVEN, and tell the stars, if thou be able to number them:" "SO SHALL THY SEED BE." And "Abraham BELIEVED GOD."

This look toward Heaven in FAITH for an innumerable, heavenly or Star Seed is what we are primarily interested in TODAY. For they are "the CHILDREN OF GOD BY FAITH IN CHRIST JESUS," where "There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither bond nor free, there is neither male nor female." They have a heavenly citizenship, a heavenly inheritance (Eph. 1:11) (Col. 1:12). They are blessed with all spiritual blessings in heavenly places (Eph. 1: 3), and they are "THE CHILDREN OF PROMISE," as Isaac was, and "are counted for the SEED" - even Abraham's SEED, irrespective of race or color, or sex.

Since then Abraham's spiritual Children, the promised Star Seed, have a "heavenly calling," Abraham, "the father of us all," also looked for a City whose builder and maker is God. He confessed that he was a stranger and a pilgrim on the earth . . . and desired a better country, that is, an HEAVENLY (Heb. 11:13-16) And as he, the FATHER OF US ALL, was, so are we in this world.

In Genesis 13:14-15, Abraham is bidden to "Lift up now thine EYES, AND LOOK . . . for all the land which thou SEEST, to thee will I give it." Here was the PROMISE of an EARTHLY inheritance and a Seed to possess it. The fulfilment of this promise is still in the future.

But in Genesis 15:5, Abram is bidden to "LOOK NOW TOWARD HEAVEN." Here is the PROMISE of an HEAVENLY INHERITANCE and a spiritual Seed to possess it. Every Believer walking in the steps

of that FAITH of our Father Abraham today, who walketh by FAITH and NOT BY SIGHT (II Cor. 5:7), who LOOKS by FAITH upon the INVISIBLE things PROMISED, and not with EYES upon the VISIBLE to be now possessed, is of Abraham's Seed, and an heir according to the PROMISE. And we have FAITH in PROMISES, just as we believe in the Word, the Character, the Faithfulness, and the Ability to perform of Him that PROMISED.

# Count It All Joy

Our line of testing lay in the fact that the promises all seemed to be for the future, while we needed a present help. When month after month went by, then year after year, and there was not the slightest indication of any answer to our heart-cries! The physical suffering was well-nigh more than the human could bear. The agony of pain baffled description. Often upon our lips was the question, "Why?" Were our lives not wholly given to God? Had they not been outpoured in obeying His call to "the uttermost part of the earth"? We might say, "Lord, what wouldst thou have me do-where wouldst Thou have me to go?" But the question "Why" should be left entirely with our Father.

Instead of making any explanation whatever of the baffling providences, or unraveling the mystery in which we found ourselves enfolded, the Holy Spirit drew our attention to four words in James 1:2. Strange words to be given at a time when hearts were bleeding and breaking! Indeed, we found no comfort in them. There was no glad response in our hearts. If he had but given the promise "I will come and heal him," or "It is I; be not afraid," a glad Amen would have burst from our lips. We did not wish to receive the message which James 1:2 contained: it seemed that our Father was bidding us do the impossible. How could we "count it all joy," with life slowly ebbing away, days of usefulness gone, the heathen world deprived of the ministry of one of God's choicest servants? This could not be! "Count it all joy" when we found ourselves in a furnace seven times heated? Impossible!

Not only was my beloved companion lying in the very valley and shadow of death, but the heavy overstrain due to years of missionary activity, battling with strange climates, Satanic powers, and now, this last greatest of all trials, was making deep inroads upon physical strength. This

loved one's helplessness was literally crushing my heart. From childhood our lives had been inseparable, and often at the close of the day we would sit in the fire-light and visualize a long life together.

Joy at such time? One memorable morning He spoke gently: "My child, I did not bid you feel it 'all joy,' but 'count it all joy.' " He sent me to His Word, and "my spirit made diligent search." Weymouth translates James 1:2 thus: "Reckon it nothing but joy, my brethren, whenever you find yourselves hedged in by various trials." Searching the epistles of my favorite Bible hero, I found Paul's written testimony in 2 Cor. 12:10 revealing the secret of his power. A free translation renders this verse: "I take pleasure in being without strength, in being chased about, in being cooped up in a corner, for when I am without strength I am dynamite."

Webster's dictionary gives an analysis of the word happiness: the root word is "hap" which mean that happiness comes through chance or circumstance. Psalm 106 threw new light upon this subject. Away back yonder was a people who praised God; whose hearts were filled with joy when they saw His mighty works and understood His dealings with them. This was a sort of circumstantial praise. The sad record follows "They soon forgat his works."

New light was beginning to dawn. I found in the Word of God that joy is the fruit of the Spirit, independent of means or circumstances; a well-spring flowing from the heart of Jesus right into ours. "All my (fresh) springs are in thee," wrote the Psalmist. "Drink, yea, drink abundantly, O beloved," and let the joy of the Lord be your strength.

What wonderful secret was God revealing to me? The light seemed like the breaking of dawn. Something was lifting me; nay **Someone!** "Arise, shine; for thy light is come!" This message was ringing in my soul, and

there, right there, in the midst of the most trying experience of my entire lifetime, I placed my weak, trembling hand in His strong one, and told Him that "at his word" I would "count it all joy." Life was completely changed from that moment. A new vision had been given. Into my heart stole the peace that "passeth all understanding." An arm upheld, and has continued to uphold moment by moment throughout the crisis years which have followed.

"The dark-brown mould's upturned By the sharp-pointed plow, And I've a lesson learned.
"My life is but a field Stretched out beneath God's sky, Some harvest rich to yield.
"Where grows the golden grain? Where faith—where sympathy? In a furrow cut by pain."

We cannot be real sympathizers till we have been real sufferers. If we would be a wound-dresser of souls, our own wounds must needs be bound by the great Physician. Dear Fannie Crosby was never permitted to look upon the green fields, nor the lovely sunset, yet she counted it all joy and her uplifting hymns are sung around the world. The deepest joy needs pain to give it birth.

I do not profess to know the philosophy, nor understand the Divine alchemy, but I do know that if we will take God at His Word, and count by faith, count in the darkness, just because "God hath said" count, He has a way of performing things, bringing forth richest harvests from lonely desert wastes, and glorious glows of sunset from out the blackest clouds.

One day, in the midst of those crisis years, there was added to our almost unspeakable testings and buffetings, another of even greater proportion. We were leasing the dwelling which we occupied. Three months before the expiration of the lease, the agent called, stating that the property had been sold and giving notice to remove at once. This occurred during the season of the year when houses and apartments in Southern California are most difficult to secure, for tourists from all sections of the country

come to spend their winters in her sunny clime.

How was this news to be broken to the beloved sufferer? For months he had been carefully shielded from hearing anything of an unpleasant or exciting nature. The doctors had warned against attempting to remove him even from one room to another, lest the slightest strain have a fatal ending. Oh! the suffering in spirit at this moment. What were we to do? Where were we to go? We were "entangled in the land" as much as were the children of Israel encamped on the banks of the Red Sea. Exodus fourteen was read many, many times. What comfort it brought to note that God in taking His children through mystery was unbaffled, undismayed. He led them clear through! Israel's deliverance from bondage was associated with mystery and terror, that God should lead them through the sea in its most awful aspect, in the depth of midnight. With all the triumph and joy which accompanied the event. its mysteriousness was distinctly and awfully marked. They moved through mystery and after mystery. following the One whose footsteps were not known. God deliberately beclouded things which they had the right and ability to understand. The ability to comprehend is what was wanting. Finite wisdom has no place in God's dealing.

The cry of the heart at this time was "Awake! Awake in our behalf! Make bare Thine arm!" Satan was right at hand suggesting, "Pity yourself! You are forsaken of God, and this is the proof! Did not I warn you of this when you went to the mission field leaving all behind?" He reminded us of the beautiful home which might have been ours: of the radiant health my companion might now be enjoying; and other delights too numerous to mention here. But. "greater is he that is in you, than he that is in the world." Thanks be unto God!

Above the awful roar of the storm was heard a sound of gentle stillness: the voice of the tender Shepherd again speaking to His lone sheep, and saying, "Count it all joy! What you

know not is known to me. I'll take you through, however you're tried!" "In quietness and confidence" was my strength as I leaned upon the everlasting arm! Entering the sick chamber I drew near the couch where the precious sufferer lay amid the shadows of the evening. Taking his hand in mine I gently broke the news that the home had been sold and that we would be compelled to remove at once. How graciously God covered our defenseless heads with the shadow of His wings. He had gone before and prepared the way. The one who was known to his friends as the "smiling invalid" asked calmly: "Are you counting it all joy?" And he asked the question with a smile. Soon the room rang with the duet, for we took our harps from the willow and sang not only the Doxology, but the chorus of a dear familiar hymn.

Together, we counted it all joy and trusted. Often in the other years, had we stood together on the seashore watching the waves as they came rolling in from far out among the breakers. Suddenly, they would break in a long line of foam upon reaching the sand, and we would gather lovely pearl-lined shells filled with the soft-toned music of the deep—the echo of the undertone. These seashells would be carried home as mementoes of that particular place, for such mementoes carry fragrant memories.

Today, after that awful night of storm, when God worked for us as only God can work, causing the sea to go back, we have another memento, and can "call back" to every tested and tried soul, "Hitherto hath the Lord helped us."

The next day a friend suddenly appeared on the scene. He had traveled across the country, more than three thousand miles, arriving on almost the exact hour when a reply had to be given to the agent. Our friend said: "I wish to give you a home of your own, and have come here for that purpose." He had known absolutely nothing of our great need. Will you tell me who gave him the information? Who worketh like Him? Who is like unto our God doing wonders? "As for God, his way is perfect."

Not only was the new home provided, but the heart of the agent was changed, and we were permitted to remain in the leased quarters another month. When the day for removing came, God had so strengthened my beloved sufferer, that, for the first time in many months, he was enabled to walk down the stairs, out into the fresh air, and across the four squares to "the place which our Lord had made." The new home had been designed by a woman whose husband was a patient in a sanitarium. Hoping that he would recover sufficiently to be removed, she had planned the bungalow to suit an invalid. There was a fireplace made of cobblestones along one end of the rooma cozy, cheery place; there were built-in desks and library shelves, a sun-room - a comfortable, unpretentious, wee place, greatly loved by us because God gave it. It was here that we spent six beautiful golden years, the last of my beloved's earthly life and ministry. In this "our desert place" whither He whiled us apart with Himself, "Streams in the Desert" was written. And it was here within these walls, also, that the plans were perfected for the evangelization of the world in our generation. Although God did not stretch forth His hand to heal, we were both enabled by His grace to count it all joy until an angel escort came and carried the loved one
