REPENTANCE: God's Way of Salvation

"In those days came John the Baptist, preaching in the wilderness of Judaea, and saying, Repent ye: for the kingdom of heaven is at hand."...

"Then went out to him Jerusalem, and all Judaea, and all the region round about Jordan, And they were baptized of him in Jordan, confessing their sins."—St. Matthew 3:1-6.

Of late there is a doctrine which is acquiring more and more attention. The teachers of this unscriptural doctrine seek to teach that all men will eventually be saved and become heirs of eternal life by just believing that Jesus is the Son of God. The Scripture passage at the head of this writing tells us most assuredly that men must also repent, which means carrying godly sorrow for one's sins, and that through this period of repentance we turn away from sin and cease to live therein.

Repentance brings about a change of heart and mind so that once being pardoned from our sin, we find grace through Him to abandon sin in our lives. John the Baptist also speaks of confessing their sins. If we search the scriptures, we will find that confession is one phase of this work of grace which finally will lead us to full salvation. We must not forget that repentance and confession are two necessary requirements, and to fulfill these, we must have faith in God and believe that the Word of God is true.

serve all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you alway, *even* unto the end of the world. Amen."

"And they went forth, and preached every where, the Lord working with *them*, and confirming the word with signs following. Amen." There are yet four months, and *then* cometh harvest? behold, I say unto you, Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields; for they are white already to harvest. And he that reapeth receiveth wages, and gathereth fruit unto life eternal: that both he that soweth and he that reapeth may rejoice together. And herein is that saying true, One soweth, and another reapeth. I sent you to reap that whereon ye bestowed no labour: other men laboured, and ye are entered into their labours."

"Then Peter opened *his* mouth, and said, Of a truth I perceive that God is no respecter of persons: But in every nation he that feareth him, and worketh righteousness, is accepted with him."

"For whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved. How then shall they call on him in whom they have not believed? and how shall they believe in him of whom they have not heard? and how shall they hear without a preacher? And how shall they preach, except they be sent? as it is written, How beautiful are the feet of them that preach the gospel of peace, and bring glad tidings of good things! But they have not all obeyed the gospel. For Esaias saith, Lord, who hath believed our report? So then faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the word of God."

"Yea, so have I strived to preach the gospel, not where Christ was named, lest I should build upon another man's foundation: But as it is written, To whom he was not spoken of, they shall see: and they that have not heard shall understand."

"Not boasting of things without our measure, that is, of other men's labours; but having hope, when your faith is increased, that we shall be enlarged by you according to our rule abundantly, To preach the gospel in the regions beyond you, and not to boast in another man's line of things made ready to our hand."

"Unto me, who am less than the least of all saints, is this grace given, that I should preach among the Gentiles the unsearchable riches of Christ; And to make all *men* see what is the fellowship of the mystery, which from the beginning of the world hath been hid in God, who created all things by Jesus Christ: To the intent that now unto the principalities and powers in heavenly *places* might be known by the church the manifold wisdom of God, According to the eternal purpose which he purposed in Christ Jesus our Lord:"

"I exhort therefore, that, first of all, supplications, prayers, intercessions, and giving of thanks, be made for all men; For kings, and for all that are in authority; that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and honesty. For this is good and acceptable in the sight of God our Saviour; Who will have all men to be saved, and to come unto the knowledge of the truth. For there is one God, and one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus; Who gave himself a ransom for all, to be testified in due time."

"But the heavens and the earth, which are now, by the same word are kept in store, reserved unto fire against the day of judgment and perdition of ungodly men. But, beloved, be not ignorant of this one thing, that one day *is* with the Lord as a thousand years, and a thousand years as one day."

The Lord is not slack concerning His promise, as some men count slackness: but is longsuffering to usward, not willing , that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance. But the day of the Lord will come as a thief in the night; in the which the heavens shall pass away with a great noise, and the elements shall melt with fervent heat, the earth also and the works that are therein shall be burned up. Seeing then that all these things shall be dissolved, what manner of persons ought ye to be in all holy conversation and godliness, Looking for and hasting unto the coming of the day of God, wherein the heavens being on fire shall be dissolved, and the elements shall melt with fervent heat?"

"And this gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness unto all nations; and then shall the end come."

"And Jesus answering said, A certain *man* went down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell among thieves, which stripped him of his raiment, and wounded him, and departed, leaving him half dead. And by chance there came down a certain priest that way: and when he saw him, he passed by on the other side. And likewise a Levite, when he was at the place, came and looked on him, and passed by on the other side. But a certain Samaritan, as he journeyed, came where he was: and when he saw him, he had compassion on him, And went to him, and bound up his wounds, pouring in oil and wine, and set him on his own beast, and brought him to an inn, and took care of him. And on the morrow when he departed, he took out two pence, and gave them to the host, and said unto him, Take care of him; and whatsoever thou spendest more, when I come again, I will repay thee. Which now of these three, thinkest thou, was neighbour unto him that fell among the thieves? And he said, He that shewed mercy on him. Then said Jesus unto him, Go, and do thou likewise."

Sound in Faith

"Now to Abraham and his seed were the promises made."

"... God gave it (the inheritance to Abraham by promise." (Galatians 3:16-18)

"Now I say that Jesus Christ was a minister... to confirm the promises made unto the fathers." (Romans 15:8)

"By faith he (Abraham) sojourned in the land of promise . . . with Isaac and Jacob, the heirs with him of the same promise."

"These all died in faith, not having received the promises, but having seen them afar off . . ." (Hebrews 11:9, 13).

Without PROMISES, FAITH cannot thrive and wax strong.

It should be carefully noted that God, in dealing with Father Abraham, for the most part gave him PROMISES of an inheritance in the "afar off," rather than in the "at once" possession. The dispensation in which Abraham lived is, therefore, rightly called the Dispensation of PROMISE. For FAITH, to be FAITH in God, cannot rest upon things seen and already possessed, but it must rest upon a PROMISE, the performance of which is still in the future. FAITH will accept a PROMISE and is sure of its performance, as though the accomplished fact was already a tangible and evident possession. If the fulfilment of the PROMISE is delayed, FAITH will not stagger through unbelief, for HOPE will step in and sustain FAITH, so that it will work patience (James 1:3). "But if we hope for that we see not, then do we with patience wait for it." (Romans 8:25)

We see then in this pattern of Arahamic Faith that it rested upon definite PROMISES made by God and not upon any fancied ideas men may have. It "is the substance of things hoped for," and it HOPED FOR THINGS because God has PROMISED them. It is "the evidence of things not seen" because FAITH accepts the UNSEEN PROMISE of God as an accomplished fact. If performance is delayed, FAITH will work patience and HOPE will steadfastly wait for the things as yet unseen. With FAITH, the PROMISES of God are as good as the very possession of things; we are persuaded of them in walk and behaviour; we embrace them as an here and now possession; we see them and rejoice over them (John 8:56) and enjoy them with thankfulness to God, the giver of all good gifts, though some of the things promised be "afar off" and death will remove us before we have received all the promises, as was the lot of the elders of Faith before us.

The possession of things PROM-ISED, in the reckoning of FAITH, has made many "poor of this world rich in faith, and heirs of the kingdom which he hath promised to them that love him." (James 2:5) Looking upon the "unseen," they took joyfully the spoiling of their goods, knowing in themselves that they have in heaven a better and an enduring substance. "For ye have need of patience, that, after ye have done the will of God, ye might receive the promise." (Hebrews 10:34-36)

How does OUR FAITH so far fit the pattern of the Abrahamic Faith? Is it based and rooted in God's PROMISES? Is it a Faith that "worketh patience"? Is it a "patience of hope" (I Thess. 1:3), waiting for things as yet unseen and accepting them as evidence? Do we judge Him FAITHFUL who promised (Hebrews 11:11), and we are fully persuaded that, what God had promised, He was TO ABLE ALSO PERFORM? (Romans 4:21)

Now the PROMISES which God made to the Adamic race through Abraham and his Seed take in a very large territory. In fact they include the inheritance of "all things" and blessings. (Revelation 21:7) Its scope includes the inheritance of the "world" or the earth, with temporal blessings, which, of course, is typical of things seen and temporal to be realized largely in the millennial Kingdom dispensation. (Romans 4: 13)

Again the PROMISE of THINGS NOT SEEN and of "spiritual blessings" (Ephesians 1:3) are partly to be realized and possessed by FAITH, *here and now*, available to believers in all dispensations. Partly they are reserved in heaven, as an inheritance incorruptible, and undefiled, and that fadeth not away (eternal). (I Peter 1:4) The full revelation and glorious possession of some of these things may only take place in the time of "all things new" and the timeless ages of the Day of God when God will be "all in all." They may include the things concerning which it is written: "Eye hath not seen, nor ear heard, neither have entered into the heart of man, the things which God hath prepared for them that love him." (I Corinthians 2:9)

"Now to Abraham and his seed were the promises made," which SEED IS CHRIST. It is then Christ who is the HEIR OF ALL THINGS. "For all the promises of God in him *are* yea, and in him Amen." (II Cor. 1:20) "For it pleased *the Father* that in him should all fulness dwell;" (Colossians 1:19) "And of his fulness have all we received, and grace for grace." Therefore, we, as children, are "joint-heirs" with Christ of all things and of all the fulness of God. (Ephesians 3:19)

The first of THINGS NOT SEEN. which Abraham inherited and possessed by Faith, was the GIFT OF RIGHTEOUSNESS, as it is written: "Abraham believed God, and it was counted unto him for righteousness." (Romans 4:3) As Abraham was, so are his children today JUSTIFIED BY FAITH (Romans 5:1). Justified is a judicial term and means to be declared righteous or "freed from sin" (Romans 6:7). Righteousness and sin are opposites, and one cancels out the other. In Romans 5:15-18. Righteousness is referred to six times as a GIFT or FREE GIFT, for it is imputed and freely given, not as a reward, but as an inheritance of God's unseen riches, as we read of Noah that he "became heir of the righteousness which is by faith." (Hebrews 11:7)

Next of THINGS NOT SEEN, and as a companion of the first—the Gift of Righteousness—or the "blessedness of the man, unto whom God imputeth righteousness without works," is the BLESSEDNESS of INIQUITIES FORGIVEN, or SINS COVERED. "Blessed is the man to whom the

This blessedness of Iniquities forgiven, of sins covered and not imputed, is quoted from Psalm 32 by David, who was under the Law and by that Law should have died for his sins, as many died before him and after him for the same offences. His forgiveness therefore, was in fact only a PARDON, by which pardon the law was not fulfilled, but rather set aside. It was a temporary expedient, permissable only in view of the coming Cross and the Christ, and David's Faith in Him, who came not to destroy the law, but to fulfill. "For

... Till heaven and earth pass, one jot or tittle shall in no wise pass from the law, till all be fulfilled."

This side of the Cross, and under GRACE, forgiveness goes infinitely further and is an infinitely greater blessing, and is now called "JUSTI-FICATION." It is justification from all things, from which we could not be justified by the law of Moses. (Acts 13:39) In fact, the Law cannot justify from a single offence in a single work or word. It will justify only the perfect man (James 3:2, Matthew 12:36). But "in many things we offend all." And the "offender" under the law will not be a blessed man, but a cursed man.

But now Christ "was delivered (into death) for our offences, and was raised again for our justification." (Romans 4:25) Since He died for my sins, fulfilling the just demands of the law, justice cannot IMPUTE these sins to me anew and exact its penalty a second time, or Christ has died in vain. And here is where a mere PARDON falls way short: there

is no suffering for sin here, just a waiving of the penalty. This satisfied "mercy" but not "justice." BOTH must be satisfied, and GRACE does it. My forgiveness is not just a pardon, and I am a blessed man, whose sins are not IMPUTED unto him, not only because Christ once suffered for them, but also because by MY FAITH I too RECKON myself to have been crucified together WITH HIM and do RECKON myself "to be dead indeed unto sin" and by the Law have I died unto the law, accepting its sentence of death as just and holy, thus together with Christ fulfilling the law and satisfying its demands and exalting and acknowledging its position and truth with every jot and tittle to be more enduring than heaven and earth. I thus justify God and, trembling in reverend Awe, I assent that the holy wrath of God and His just indignation should by rights be visited upon and fully spend itself at the Cross, where my Saviour and I together with Him were crucified and died together. He because of love and I because of sin.

SOUND FAITH will RECKON these THINGS NOT SEEN to be TRUE in a simple BELIEF OF THE WORD OF PROMISE. It will be persuaded by them and embrace them. It will drink the cup with Christ in Gethsemane, and will be baptized with His baptism (Matthew (on the Cross) 20:22, Luke 12:50) into Jesus Christ, into His death, and buried with him in His grave. It will know and reckon by faith the old man crucified, the body of sin destroyed (Romans 6), and OLD THINGS to have passed away (II Corinthians 5:17). He finds the end of the road with the first Adam in the nothingness of the dust of the earth.

But Christ did not only die for our offences, He also "was raised again for our justification." And as SIN IS NOT IMPUTED because of HIS DEATH, even so RIGHTEOUSNESS IS IMPUTED because of HIS RES-URRECTION. A "pardoned" sinner has forgiveness, but NO righteousness. A "justified" sinner was duly judged, condemned, and died, and was buried with Christ and thus paid his debt to justice in full. But "like (Continued on page 11)

The Bible In Every Man's Own Tongue

It is estimated that there are approximately 3000 different languages and dialects spoken by tribesmen and nations around the world. Some of these are basically similar, and many different.

The command and the challenge of the Church has been to "give the Bible to every man in his own tongue." This task has gone steadily forward until at present the Bible in whole or part appears in some 1088 different languages and dialects. It is difficult to be accurate in the count, for with each passing few months a new translation appears and thus adds to the number. The results of Bible Societies in printing these translations are amazing, and God honors His Word in these thousand and more tongues.

But what about the remaining two thousand that have not yet received a Bible translation? Whose burden and whose task is this unfinished work?

At the forefront of the missionary advance has always been the work of Bible Translators. Many early missionaries to all lands were translators. Carey, for instance, gave India the Bible in thirty-six languages and dialects.

But within the last twelve to fourteen years, God has laid this work in a peculiar manner upon the heart of W. Cameron Townsend to undertake the task of finishing this uncompleted service to the kingdom of God. And now in a scientific and systematic manner the labor is going forward under heaven's richest blessings.

Dr. Townsend and his associates have organized the Wycliffe Bible Translators for the specific purpose of translating the Bible into the languages of the earth. Already they have made a dent in the remaining number.

Years earlier Dr. Townsend was invited to send translating missionaries into the various tribes of Mexico where the language had not been reduced to writing. These translators faced the task often of reducing the language to writing, and from this basis proceeded to translate the Bible into the tongue. This was followed by schools which taught the people to read in an elemental manner.

God blessed these youthful translators in an amazing manner until they worked in approximately fifty tribes without the Bible. Translation went forward and as the Bible translations were finished the American Bible Society published the editions. This is indeed one of the finest pieces of missionary work being done anywhere in the world today.

To expedite the labor of translating, Dr. Townsend and his workers opened Camp Wycliffe at the University of Oklahoma and a similar camp in Canada where yearly a summer institute of linguistics is conducted. Here would-be translators and outgoing missionaries are sent to master the basic principles of language handling, such as learning to speak, reducing the language to writing, translating, etc. These are scientific courses taught by some of the world's greatest Christian Linguistic experts for the expressed purpose of training future translators to reduce languages to writing, and to finish this task of "giving the Bible to every man in his own tongue."

God has blessed this organization until now more than 150 missionaries are working under its direction. Over fifty missionary boards co-operate in the venture. Many of these translators are in Mexico, where Dr. Townsend has opened a Jungle Camp to train missionary enrollees to meet the problems of jungle life.

Shortly ago came a call from Peru for the Wycliffe Translators to enter that country. Back in the unexplored regions of the Eastern Andean slopes are some of the world's most passedby peoples and tribes. For instance in South America alone there are more than 300 spoken languages without the Bible, practically all of which have never been reduced to writing.

This entrance into Peru is the opening wedge in the advance to conquer these tribes and languages for the Bible and Christianity. Into the jungles these brave young missionary translators are marching, the Cross held high in the forefront of their advance. The Missionary Aviation Fellowship is furnishing a Christian pilot, Betty Greene, who is speeding the transportation of these workers and their equipment to their jungle locales.

It will not be long until the success of the Translators in Mexico will be duplicated in Peru. Already the Venezuela government through the channels of the Orinoco River Mission has sent a request for Dr. Townsend to visit them for the purpose of plotting an advance to the tribes without written languages and without the Bible. There are plans on foot to train ten young translators to labor among Siberia's indigenous tribes.

Siberia at present is a closed field, but God opens doors in answer to prayer and in response to consecrated preparation. The field of the world's forgotten tribes is ripe for a Christian conquest. It might require martyrdom, at least blood and tears and prayers. But the missionary movement has never asked about the hardships, the price of progress. The one acclaim has been, "Here am I Lord, send me." — Wycliffe Bible Translators, 1305 N. Louise St., Glendale, California.

as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father," even so also hath he "quickened us together with Christ," "and hath raised us up together . . ." (Ephesians 2). There, a "justified" sinner is a BLESSED MAN to whom sin is not imputed; he is a much more BLESSED MAN to whom RIGHT-EOUSNESS IS IMPUTED, even the blameless, spotless, and perfect Righteousness of Christ and of God. His standing is "in Christ" a "new creation" with "newness of life." He is a SAINT OF GOD, to whom there is NO CONDEMNATION (Romans 8:1), and nothing can be laid to his charge. It is God that justifieth (Romans 8:23-34). These THINGS are UNSEEN, but PROMISED by God and appropriated BY FAITH ---HERE AND NOW.

In a mountain region in Bulgaria two men with rifles held up a Bibleseller and took the little money he had, and in response to his proffer, accepted a Bible from him. A few months later as the Bible-seller entered a village home, one of the men who had robbed him sprang up and embraced him with joy and told how the Book had brought him to repentance and a new life. In China's far west, a Szechuan man was traveling through the mountains "preaching and selling Gospels as hewent. He fell

among bandits, to whom he continued to tell his story with earnestness. They thought him harmless and let him go. But when the robber chief had read his books, he sent after the (man and from him received a New Testament, and later renounced his foot-pad life, became a baptized Christian and the recognized headman of the village near which he joined the church." In a single recent year, reports of colporteurs of the American Bible Society from three widely separated countries brought word of the direct power of the printed Gospel in the conversion of three men, each planning a murder of revenge.

A missionary pressing into the isolated interior of an island in the Philippines found a little colony of eleven Christians who had never seen a missionary or a Christian teacher or pastor. They had gathered about a man to whom distant friends on another island had sent a Bible and a few letters about their faith. A church in Panama resulted from the hold a Bible half buried in the sand came to have upon its finder. An inquiry in Egypt revealed that in eighteen out of twenty-one conversions from Islam to Christianity the principal and in some cases almost the exclusive factor was the reading of the New Testament.

How many Christians are tonguetied when it comes to saying a word for the Lord. But their tongue is very loose when it comes to talking about the world, the flesh and the pleasures of this life.

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
