"And unto Adam he said, Because thou hast hearkened unto the voice of thy wife, and hast eaten of the tree ... cursed is the ground ..." (Gen. 3: 17).

"And in thy seed (Abraham's) shall all the nations of the earth be blessed; because thou hast obeyed my voice." (Gen. 22:18).

As we have pointed out previously in these articles, Faith in God must rest upon promises of God. We have seen that 'Abrahamic Faith' accepts the Word of Promise, given by God, as positive evidence of things not yet seen, and doubts not in the least the certain performance of that promise. When the fulfilment of a promise is delayed, then we hope for that we see not, and do with patience wait for it. With "the full assurance of hope unto the end . . . Faith and patience in-

To give light to them that sit in darkness and IN the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of peace.—St. Luke 1:76-79. herit the promises." (Heb. 6:11-19). "For when God made promise to Abraham, because he could not swear by no greater, he sware by himself," though "it was impossible for God to lie" and not keep His promise. So we have a hope as an anchor of the soul, both sure and steadfast.

We also pointed to the promises of God to include both temporal blessings in earthly things, and "all spiritual blessings in heavenly places in Christ." (Eph. 1:3). The temporal blessings, such as health, long life, peace, prosperity, and security, center largely around a future converted Israel, the natural or 'sand seed' of Abraham, with their 'promised land' and their Kingdom restored to them, under their long-awaited Messiah, the great Son of David, seated upon the Throne of his father David, in the coming millennial dispensation of the Glory and Power of the reigning Lion of the tribe of Judah, who (strangely enough) is both "the root of David" and His Son.

The "spiritual blessings in heavenly **places**" are heavenly, invisible, and eternal things,—such as the gift of imputed Righteousness, the Forgiveness of sins, the gift of the Holy Spirit, the gift of Eternal Life, etc. These blessings, being spiritual and eternal, are not visible and material, as the temporal blessings are. Faith alone, resting upon the promises of God, can know them, see them, receive them as verities and possess them, like Moses, as being greater riches "than to enjoy the pleasures of sin for a season."

"NEW MAN," They are for the which is renewed in knowledge after the image of Him who created him: a NEW CREATION in Christ, where there is neither Greek nor Jew, nor any other standing or relationship according to the flesh; but Christ is all and in all. (Col. 3:10-11 and 2 Cor. 5:16-17). It is the spiritual or 'star seed' of Abraham, born from above, pilgrims and strangers in the earth, like father Abraham; they have their conversation in heaven (Phil. 3:20) and know in themselves that they have in heaven a better and an enduring substance. (Heb. 10:34). They have a Name written in heaven, a Kingdom within them, and a King now, who is set down with His Father in His Throne (Rev. 3:21). They look "for that blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of the great God and our Saviour Jesus Christ;"-"the blessed and only Potentate, the King of kings and Lord of lords."

These then are a peculiar race and people; theirs is a unique and dual family relationship: by virtue of their 'Abrahamic Faith' they are the **Children of Abraham** (Gal. 3:7-9); by virtue of their 'Faith in Christ Jesus,' they are **the Children of God** also; and being Christ's, they are Abraham's seed, and heirs according to the PROMISE. (Gal. 3:26-29).

However, before we proceed to consider further spiritual blessings, to which the believer with 'Abrahamic Faith' is heir according to the promise, we would like to explore another quality of this 'Abrahamic Faith' in the light of the verses of scripture, quoted above from Genesis. And by way of contrast, we will also take a look at, what we might term, 'Adamic Faith.' Both are 'Fathers' and both have many children; both had an inheritance for their children, and it may be assumed that Adam, like Abraham, had a Faith. But notice the vast difference in the inheritance these two fathers left to their prosperity. Adam, acting out his faith, brought a CURSE upon the earth, involving all the nations of the earth; Abraham, acting out his Faith, brought a BLESSING for all the nations of the earth.

The assumption that Adam had a true Faith and fully believed the Word of God, which forbade him to eat of a certain tree under pain of sure death, is justified, in view of Paul's statement that "Adam was not deceived" (1 Tim. 2:14). Adam was (created) **righteous** and **believed God**. Abraham was no better when he **believed God** and was **righteous** before God (Gen. 15:6). So far they had an even break: they were both believers, and they were both righteous, although they possessed these things in reverse order.

However, under the pressure of perhaps the greatest temptation which can come to men, involving their heartstrings of human love, and a fiery trial of Faith, which 'put them on the spot' and face to face with the 'crisis' of their lives, demanding a fateful decision, the record says of Adam: "Because thou hast hearkened unto the voice of thy wife ..." while of Abraham it says: "Because thou hast obeyed my voice."

Abraham believed God, and also OBEYED the voice he BELIEVED. We have here the "obedience of faith" (Rom. 16:26), a working, a living, a justifying, and saving faith. A faith that not only BELIEVETH the WORD and VOICE OF GOD, but also OBEYETH the WORD and the VOICE OF GOD. OBEDIENCE to the Word and Voice of God, as against any other word or voice, even that of human reason and human love, is ever a test of true and SOUND FAITH.

Adam, on the other hand, if he was not deceived and the Scriptures say he was not, likewise BELIEVED the Word and the Voice of God, but OBEYED NOT what he believed, and with open eyes and deliberate will, he transgressed, with a full knowledge of the consequences of his act of disobedience. Thus Adam set the pattern for a numerous class of 'Believers' so-called, who 'believe' and yet DISOBEY. As a class, the word calls them "children of disobedience" rather than children of unbelief, because according to their own testimony, they do 'believe' but according to the testimony of their works, they disobey.

If Adam really believed the Word and the Voice of God saying concerning the tree of the knowledge of good and evil: "in the day that thou eatest thereof thou shalt surely die," then how is it, you ask, that he did eat and transgress, knowing that he shall surely die? Did he not just come from the hands of his Maker a perfect creature, with his faculties wholly unimpaired, and his will wholly uncoerced by sin and its ravages upon the human constitution? The filesh was not then "sinful flesh," in which no good thing dwelleth, and the Law or the Commandment was not then "weak through the flesh." He was more perfect and beautiful in his manhood and spotless virtues and nobility of character, reflecting his maker's glory, than any of his sons after him.

What then? Did he deliberately make light of the commandment and trifle with death? Certainly not, but seeing his bride deceived, and in the transgression, and under the sentence of death, he preferred to DIE together WITH her, than to LIVE WITHOUT her. In this he, the FIRST Adam, became "the figure of him that was to come" (Rom. 5:14), that is Christ, the last Adam. He forsook his father God, and did "cleave to his wife." LOVE is a greater power than FEAR.

Thus we may say: Abraham believed, became righteous, and obeyed. And note: he became righteous FIRST and then he OBEYED. He did not first obey and then become righteous, as it were, by his obedience, which would seem more reasonable to the human mind. For if righteousness would follow obedience, rather then precede it, then would righteousness be attained by works and not obtained as a "free gift" by imputation "to him that worketh not, but believeth on him (God) that justifieth the ungodly, his Faith is counted for righteousness." (Rom. 4: 5).

Thus the scriptures clearly forsee and state that "by the obedience of one (even of Christ) shall many be made righteous" and not by THEIR OWN obedience (Rom. 5:19). It is therefore not THEIR OWN Righteousness, which they may claim, as a "reward of debt," but CHRIST'S Righteousness which is imputed unto them as a **free Gift of Grace**.

Under Grace, God can never become indebted to men to owe us anything, and yet shall He freely give us **ALL THINGS with Christ** (Rom. 8:32). Under the Law, God, the righteous Judge, is honour bound to reward him that worketh with a "just recompense of reward," be that a blessing to him that "worketh good" or a curse to him that "doeth evil." Under Grace the man is blessed "to whom the Lord will not impute sin." (Rom. 4:8).

OBEDIENCE is ever given expression BY WORKS, regardless whether we be under the Law or under Grace. But there is this difference: under the Law, works precede and produce righteousness as we OBEY; under Grace, righteousness precedeth works; they are the **works of Faith**, produced in "obedience of faith" (Rom. 16:26).

OBEDIENCE to another is the subjection of the WILL to another WILL. Faith is in the realm of the invisible, in the heart, and God knows its genuineness with or without works; but if Faith, in testing and trials, fails to produce works in OBEDIENCE to the Word and the voice it claims to BELIEVE, that Faith does not fit the pattern of Abrahamic Faith and does not "justify" or have "righteousness imputed," and leaves the possessor of such Faith without the forgiveness of sins and without Peace with God (Rom, 5:1).

It is still 'Adamic Faith,' which believes but OBEYS NOT the Word of God. It believes one Voice and obeys another voice. As to mother Eve, she "being deceived," **believed NOT** and therefore **obeyed NOT** the Word of God. Among her children, perhaps the largest number follow in her footsteps: they DO NOT BELIEVE and DO NOT OBEY the Word and the Will of God. Only he that doeth the Will of God abideth forever.

"Examine yourselves, whether ye be in the faith; prove your own selves." Do you stand and walk in the steps of that Faith of father Abraham, or of father Adam, or in the steps of mother Eve?

Annually the Passover was to be celebrated as a memorial of the redemption of Israel from the bondage of Egypt.

Christ observed the Passover; the last was with His disciples shortly before His suffering and death and He then instituted the Lord's Supper of the new covenant. "And he said unto them. With desire I have desired to eat this passover with you before I suffer:" (Luke 22:15). Referring to His impending suffering, death, and resurrection, Jesus united the hearts of His disciples in their love to Him and toward each other. "And he took the cup, and gave thanks, and gave it to them, saying, Drink ye all of it; For this is my blood of the new testament, which is shed for many for the remission of sins." Jesus is our Passover and through faith in His atonement our sins are passed over. The Lord's Supper, therefore, for His converted ones is a remembrance of the sacrificial death of the Lord for our redemption. It should bring a renewal of love for the Lord, a new life through the remembrance of the experience of salvation, and thereby a strengthening. A glorious privilege it is for us to be following the commandments of our risen Redeemer! It is wonderful how Christ would nurture this bond with His Church on earth through The Lord's Supper till He comes again. It is His testament to His Church. In the breaking of the bread as His body and the drinking of the wine as His blood, Jesus has created something that ever and anew, in the most intimate manner,

unites our hearts with Him and His(church. According to I Corinthians 11:26 we should thereby partake of the Lord's death till He come.

Taking part in The Lord's Supper is a very earnest occasion, a matter of conscience, as we see from 1 Corinthians 11:27-29.

When the Lord Jesus instituted The Lord's Supper with His disciples, suffering and death were immediately before Him. Of this the true Christian will remind himself and shall so go to The Lord's Supper—calling to remembrance the Lord and His death for him.

Announcement is made beforehand when the congregation is to partake of The Lord's Supper; the members are held to self-examination of their state of faith and are admonished to come to The Lord's Supper in reconciling state of love and peace. If love has suffered or the peace has been disturbed, the responsible ones are first to be reconciled.

The keeping of The Lord's Supper shall not be neglected and the believer shall make every effort to remove hindrances (lack of love, disharmony, an unreconciling spirit, offense). The urge to have the Lord's Supper should not come only from the elder, but rather, if possible, from the bosom of the congregation.

"And upon the first day of the week, when the disciples came together to break bread, Paul preached unto them, ready to depart on the morrow; and continued his speech until midnight." Are we listening to our Master and are we showing His death till He comes? By means of the observance of the Lord's Supper, love and fellowship are newly strengthened, and the soul is more intimately united with its God and Lord, with renewed courage of faith to continue fighting the good fight.

The Lord's Supper is not observed in order to receive the forgiveness of sins in some mysterious manner; the certainty of this forgiveness must have previously been attained by every participant in this Supper. Whoever is unworthy, that is, whoever is unclean or leavened in heart, or irreconcilable, and thus receives The Lord's Supper, receives no blessing, and what is more, he heaps guilt upon himself, because he does not discern the Lord's body.

Let us rejoice in that we have been redeemed by our Lord. "Forasmuch as ye know that ye were not redeemed with corruptible things, as silver and gold, from your vain conversation **received** by tradition . . . But with the precious blood of Christ, as of a lamb without blemish and without spot:" With willingness of heart and with peace with our brother, let us keep this sacred ordinance. We know that those who live in Him are spotless, and His promise is "and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world. Amen."

"Cast thy bread upon the waters: for thou shalt find it after many days."

"Ye are the light of the world. A city that is set on a hill cannot be hid. Neither do men light a candle, and put it under a bushel, but on a candle-stick; and it giveth light unto all that are in the house. Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven."

"Therefore all things whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them: for this is the law and the prophets."

"And Jesus went about all the cities and villages, teaching in their synagogues, and preaching the gospel of the kingdom, and healing every sickness and every disease among the people. But when he saw the multitudes, he was moved with compassion on them, because they fainted, and were scattered abroad, as sheep having no shepherd. Then saith he unto his disciples, The harvest truly is plenteous, but the labourers are few; Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he will send forth labourers into his harvest."

"How think ye? If a man have an hundred sheep, and one of them be gone astray, doth he not leave the ninety and nine, and goeth into the mountains, and seeketh that which is gone astray? And if so be that he find it, verily I say unto you, he rejoiceth more of that **sheep**, than of the ninety and nine which went not astray. Even so it is not the will of your Father which is in heaven, that one of these little ones should perish."

"And Jesus said unto them, Come ye after me, and I will make you to become fishers of men."

"And Jesus answering said, A certain man went down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell among thieves, which stripped him of his raiment, and wounded him, and departed, leaving him half dead. And by chance there came down a certain priest that way: and when he saw him, he passed by on the other side. And likewise a Levite, when he was at the place, came and looked on him, and passed by on the other side. "But a certain Samaritan, as he journeyed, came where he was: and when he saw him, he had compassion on him, And went to him, and bound up his wounds, pouring in oil and wine, and set him on his own beast, and brought him to an inn, and took care of him. And on the morrow when he departed, he took out two pence, and gave them to the host, and said unto him. Take care of him; and whatsoever thou spendest more, when I come again, I will repay thee. Which now of these three, thinkest thou, was neighbour unto him that fell among the thieves? And he said, He that shewed mercy on him. Then said Jesus unto him, Go, and do thou likewise."

"And seek not ye what ye shall eat, or what ye shall drink, neither be ye of doubtful mind. For all these things do the nations of the world seek after: and your Father knoweth that ye have need of these things. But rather seek ye the kingdom of God; and all these things shall be added unto you."

"And the Lord said unto the servant, Go out into the highways and hedges, and **compel** them to come in, that my house may be filled."

"And Jesus said unto him, This day is salvation come to this house, forsomuch as he also is a son of Abraham. For the Son of man is come to seek and to save that which was lost." "And other sheep I have, which are not of this fold: them also I must bring, and they shall hear my voice; and there shall be one fold, **and** one shepherd."

"Ye have not chosen me, but I have chosen you, and ordained you, that ye should go and bring forth fruit, and **that** your fruit should remain: that whatsoever ye shall ask of the Father in my name, he may give it you."

"And a vision appeared to Paul in the night; There stood a man of Macedonia, and prayed him, saying, Come over into Macedonia, and help us. And after he had seen the vision, immediately we endeavoured to go into Macedonia, assuredly gathering that the Lord had called us for to preach the gospel unto them."

"And now, behold, I know that ye all, among whom I have gone preaching the kingdom of God, shall see my face no more. Wherefore I take you to record this day, that I **am** pure from the blood of all **men**. For I have not shunned to declare unto you all the counsel of God."

"For there is no respect of persons with God. For as many as have sinned without law shall also perish without law: and as many as have sinned in the law shall be judged by the law."

"How then shall they call on him in whom they have not believed? and how shall they believe in him of whom they have not heard? and how shall they hear without a preacher? And how shall they preach, except they be sent? as it is written, How beautiful are the feet of them that preach the gospel of peace, and bring glad tidings of good things!"

"I know thy works: behold, I have set before thee an open door, and no man can shut it: for thou hast a little strength, and hast kept my word, and hast not denied my name."

"And whosoever shall give to drink unto one of these little ones a cup of cold water only in the name of a disciple, verily I say unto you, he shall in no wise lose his reward."

"And ye also shall bear witness, because ye have been with me from the beginning."

CONFESSION

"And were baptized of him in Jordan, confessing their sins."—Matthew 3:6.

"Then they shall confess their sin which they have done . . . "—Numbers 5:7.

"I acknowledged my sin unto thee ... and thou forgavest the iniquity of my sin."—Psalm 32:5.

"If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us **our** sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness."—I John 1:9.

"Confess your faults one to another, and pray for one another, that ye may be healed . . ."—James 5:16.

". . . pour out your heart before him . . ."—Psalm 62:8.

Here a delicate subject is broached. Here the Word of God touches the most sensitive spot of the human heart.

A peculiar timidity against revealing what is in its depths lies in the human heart. Adam, already, tried to hide from the all-seeing eye of God.

And this aversion against the disclosure of what is in the innermost part of the heart, this false pride, has unfortunately deterred many people from conversion or has retarded them in it.

From whence does this timidity come? Is it not awakened and nursed by the power of darkness because it knows that thereby it can check people on their way to salvation?

Since it is true that a person feels that confession comes too near to him, what is more natural than that he seeks to deny its necessity? Yet what does contention help, and how far does philosophizing bring a person? What does the Word say—the Word which is the unchangeable foundation of truth, and to which we are not permitted to add nor yet to take anything from it. The Bible passages quoted are only a few out of many, and they show most clearly that it is God's will.

Moses already taught the people that they should confess their sins. David who, as no other, could describe the inner conflict of the soul was also led through confession.

The result of the fiery preaching of John the Baptist was repentance, and

the fruit of repentance was confession. (Matt. 3:6.) It was not something that was manifested in several individuals merely, but rather all that were seized by the Word went this way.

James says plainly: "Confess your faults one to another, and pray one for another, that ye may be healed" (James 5:16), and thereby he tells us plainly that a confession that is made to God only, without the presence of a witness, is not the way that God has chosen.

It is not possible to attain the fullfillment of the promises of salvation without being obedient to the Word of God. And if we do not follow that guiding line, we are blind and shortsighted. Many examples out of life show that he who keeps his bosom locked stands as before a mountain and gradually becomes hardened, while on the other hand a pouring out of one's heart would smooth the way.

Nothing is ordained of God without having a definite good purpose. Also, confession is not given as a command of God for the purpose of showing His superior power, but rather confession undoubtedly serves to further our salvation.

An unrepentant heart excuses its evil deeds, glosses over them, or denies them. The fundamental requirement to redemption, however, is sincerity, for only to the upright does God give success in attaining this. The clear proof and the first fruit of uprightness consists in this, and that a person acknowledges his sins with a broken heart, and admits them freely and without adornment. "I acknowledged my sin unto thee."

Nothing is more dangerous than a tightly closed heart; no where else has the power of darkness such an opportunity to exercise its power. A heart that is thus tightly closed is obstinate, proud, and lacking in uprightness—all unpraiseworthy qualities which repel grace; thereby Satan's power has the opportunity to assert itself. The opening of the heart breaks this might; grace finds entry and works wonders. James points out plainly that a person then has an increased strength at his disposal, for then people can pray together about the matter in order to be healed.

Necessary and God-pleasing as confession is, it is in no wise a work through which forgiveness can be earned, as is often falsely proclaimed. Forgiveness is and remains an unmerited gift, and it must be credited solely to the merit of Christ. It is true that confession brings a great relief, but this relief is not to be confused with the peace of God which comes into the heart only through forgiveness.

It is, however, very true that a person cannot open his heart to everyone. Trust is necessary for this, and trust cannot be forced. He who receives confession must be especially equipped for it by God. He must be fatherly, loving and discreet, and must be filled by the Spirit of God to forgive and forget.

We have, however, not only done wrong in regard to God; we have also grieved or injured or in various ways harmed people. We can give no better testimony of the grace of God than humbly to acknowledge out wrongdoing and to apologize for it. It is good, however, not to neglect that opportunity of testifying of Christ's wonderful way of salvation.

If people were given their choice whether or not to confess, it would be easier to understand the fact that they hold back as they do. But the choice is a different one: Either to acknowledge honestly and to find forgiveness and be saved—or on the
