Depart from evil, and do good; and dwell for evermore. For the LORD loveth judgment, and forsaketh not his saints; they are preserved for ever: but the seed of the wicked shall be cut off. The righteous shall inherit the land, and dwell therein for ever. The mouth of the righteous speaketh wisdom, and his tongue talketh of judgment. The law of his God is in his heart; none of his steps shall slide.

asking us to strive to hold on to our precious faith. We are living in perilous times. Satan is walking about as a roaring lion, seeking whom he may devour. Truly we need God's protection and guidance.

How may we detect a teaching that is false? Satan would offer his counterfeit doctrines in place of God's

true teachings. We will take refuge in God's Word, we will listen to the advice He gives us. When we use His perfect standard, we can readily discern the imperfections and falsities of counterfeit teachings. "Through thy precepts I get understanding: therefore I hate every false way." "Therefore I love thy commandments above gold; yea, above fine gold. Therefore I esteem all thy precepts concerning all things to be right; and I hate every false way."

We have dug deep for our foundation and have anchored our house on solid rock. Our God will keep us and will fight for us. He has given us His word in plain, easy-to-understand language. God is truth; when He has spoken something, we can rest on it as unshakeable. Let us take Him at His word, believing it is true just because He has said it is. We are happy for a living assurance within us that our God is and that He is a rewarder of those who diligently seek Him.

Following are some of the teachings that have been delivered to us. When anyone would question them, give them God's answer. And love will be decisively firm, in meekness instructing those that oppose us, if God peradventure will give them repentance to the acknowledging of the truth.

God is three persons, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost. "And 2

Jesus, when he was baptized, went up straightway out of the water: and, lo, the heavens were opened unto him, and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove, and lighting upon him: And lo a voice from heaven, saying, This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased." "Behold, a virgin shall be with child, and shall bring forth a son, and they shall call his name Emmanuel, which being interpreted is, God with us." "... the Jews sought the more to kill him, because he not only had broken the sabbath, but said also that God was his Father, making himself equal with God." "Jesus answered and said unto him, If a man love me, he will keep my words: and my Father will love him, and we will come unto him, and make our abode with him. . . . the Comforter, which is the Holy Ghost, whom the Father will send in my name, he shall teach you all things, and bring all things to your remembrance, whatsoever I have said unto you."

Jesus arose from the dead. "The Lord is risen indeed, and hath appeared to Simon." "And he said unto them, Why are ye troubled? and why do thoughts arise in your hearts? Behold my hands and my feet, that it is I myself: handle me, and see; for a spirit hath not flesh and bones, as ye see me have."

There is an eternal punishment for sin. "And they shall go forth, and look upon the carcases of the men that have transgressed against me: for their worm shall not die, neither shall their fire be quenched; and they shall be an abhorring unto all flesh." "And if thy hand offend thee, cut it off: it is better for thee to enter into life maimed, than having two hands to go into hell, into the fire that never shall be quenched: Where their worm dieth not, and the fire is not quenched."

Christ's second coming is still in the future. "Immediately after the tribulation of those days shall the sun be darkened, and the moon shall not give her light, and the stars shall fall from heaven, and the powers of the heavens shall be shaken: And then shall appear the sign of the Son of man in heaven; and then shall all

the tribes of the earth mourn, and they shall see the Son of man coming in the clouds of heaven with power and great glory. And he shall send his angels with a great sound of a trumpet, and they shall gather together his elect from the four winds, from one end of heaven to the other." "For the Lord himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God: and the dead in Christ shall rise first: Then we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air: and so shall we ever be with the Lord."

We in our natural state are sinners. and are only saved through the sacrifice of our Lord Jesus. "As it is written. There is none righteous, no, not one: There is none that understandeth, there is none that seeketh after God. They are all gone out of the way, they are together become profitable: there is none that doeth good, no, not one." "For I know that in me (that is, in my flesh.) dwelleth no good thing: for to will is present with me; but how to perform that which is good I find not." "But now the righteousness of God without the law is manifested, being witnessed by the law and the prophets; Even the righteousness of God which is by faith of Jesus Christ unto all and upon all them that believe: for there is no difference: For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God; Being justified freely by his grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus:"

God created all things. "And God saw every thing that he had made, and, behold, *it was* very good." "God that made the world and all things therein, seeing that he is Lord of heaven and earth, dwelleth not in temples made with hands; . . . And hath made of one blood all nations of men for to dwell on all the face of the earth . . ."

There is no chance of being saved after death. "But Abraham said, Son, remember that thou in thy lifetime receivedst thy good things, and likewise Lazarus evil things: but now he is comforted, and thou art tormented. And beside all this, between us and

you there is a great gulf fixed: so that they which would pass from hence to you cannot; neither can they pass to us, that would come from thence." ". . . the hour is coming, in the which all that are in the graves shall hear his voice, And shall come forth; they that have done good, unto the resurrection of life; and they that have done evil, unto the resurrection of damnation." "For by thy words thou shalt be justified, and by thy words thou shalt be condemned."

Jesus Christ alone is through whom we can approach the Father. "For verily he took not on him the nature of angels; but he took on him the seed of Abraham. Wherefore in all things it behoved him to be made like unto his brethren, that he might be a merciful and faithful high priest in things pertaining to God, to make reconciliation for the sins of the people." "Wherefore he is able also to save them to the uttermost that come unto God by him, seeing he ever liveth to make intercession for them." "For Christ is not entered into the holy places made with hands, which are the figures of the true; but into heaven itself, now to appear in the presence of God for us:" "For by one offering he hath perfected for ever them that are sanctified." "Having therefore, brethren, boldness to enter into the holiest by the blood of Jesus, By a new and living way, which he hath consecrated for us, through the veil, that is to say, his flesh; And having an high priest over the house of God; Let us draw near with a true heart in full assurance of faith, having our hearts sprinkled from an evil conscience, and our bodies washed with pure water."

It is essential that we teach men should repent from their sins, then rest on the power of Christ's atonement, bury their sins in the water of baptism, and receive the Holy Spirit with the laying on of hands. "Therefore leaving the principles of the doctrine of Christ, let us go on unto perfection; not laying again the foundation of repentance from dead works, and of faith toward God, Of the doctrine of baptisms, and of laying on of hands, and of resurrection of the dead, and of eternal judgment."

HOW TO LIVE A CONTENTED LIFE

Our Master has with his own life purchased for us a reconciliation with God. Do we realize the value of our companionship with our God? Jesus said, "These things I have spoken unto you, that in me ye might have peace. In the world ye shall have tribulation: but be of good cheer; I have overcome the world." The blood of our Saviour has purchased perfect peace for us.

Sin, like a sharp knife, severed our relation with God. What horrible devastation it wrought on our soul. "... the wicked are like the troubled sea, when it cannot rest, whose waters cast up mire and dirt. There is no peace, saith my God, to the wicked."

It was not so when man was first created. It was not so in my childhood. And, thanks be to God, it is not so now for those who have accepted the invitation of Jesus, have repented of their sins, and are now living for the Master. "O God, thou **art** my God; early will I seek thee: my soul thirsteth for thee, my flesh longeth for thee in a dry and thirsty land, where no water is; To see thy power and thy glory, so as I have seen thee in the sanctuary."

"Jesus answered and said unto her, Whosoever drinketh of this water shall thirst again: But whosoever drinketh of the water that I shall give him shall never thirst; but the water that I shall give him shall be in him a well of water springing up into everlasting life." Jesus spoke in terms we can easily grasp. Yet the meaning of the words can only be fully understood by those who have the mind of Christ. There is no doubt in a believer's mind that God satisfies our soul. We break forth from a drooping dead plant into a beautiful blossoming flower. "For, lo, the winter is past, the rain is over and gone; The flowers appear on the earth; the time of the singing of birds is come and the voice of the turtle is heard in our land; The fig tree putteth forth her green figs, and the vines with the tender grape give a good smell. Arise, my love, my fair one, and come away." Jesus called us o'er the tumult of life's fitful sea, to walk with him in rejoicing evermore.

Soon it will be springtime again. Life will again come into our fields, woods, and gardens. We were once barren and dead, we had no life in us. We were a slave to our passions, and were in torment from our sins. We wandered about chasing bubbles that would vanish e'er we touched them. The dead leaves were piled high, and each day were added more. The stale, rancid air of sin stuck sullenly in us. We were gasping for breath. We were lonely, and tried to satisfy our loneliness with the enjoyments of this world. "None eye pitied thee, ... to have compassion upon thee; but thou wast cast out in the open field, to the loathing of thy person, in the day that thou wast born."

Then Jesus came to us. He tenderly called us. "Verily, verily, I say unto you, The hour is coming, and now is, when the dead shall hear the voice of the son of God: and they that hear shall live." God's goodness led us to repentance. We had to see how utterly lost and deprived we were. "I will arise and go to my father, and will say unto him, Father, I have sinned against heaven, and before thee, And am no more worthy to be called thy son: make me as one of thy hired servants. And he arose, and came to his father." Like a player on a football team, we had to exert ourself, shake ourself from our lethargy, and push right through to the goal. We went right against our flesh, and praise be to our God, with whom all things are possible, we achieved victory. "And from the days of John the Baptist until now the kingdom of heaven suffereth violence, and the violent take it by force."

God gave us his peace. "For every one that asketh receiveth; and he that seeketh findeth; and to him that knocketh it shall be opened." We had not earned it in anywise. But we had to see and admit we were a sinner before we were saved and this admission had to come from the heart. And of the abundance of the heart, the mouth speaketh. God spoke through Jeremiah, "And ye shall seek me, and find me, when ye shall search for me with all your heart." We should praise our God for his gift to us. Jesus "was wounded for our transgressions, he was bruised for our iniquities: the chastisement of our peace was upon him; and with his stripes we are healed." Yes, we did many bad things as sinners, but we admit and confess them and because our Saviour received our punishment for every one of them, we are forgiven. "For he hath made him to be sin for us, who knew no sin; that we might be made the righteousness of God in him."

Now we are new creatures. Our soul has been swept clean of all the foul air of sin and we have fresh, pure, heavenly air reviving us. We have no more burden of sins. What a wonderful Saviour is Jesus our Lord! He has brought springtime to our soul. Through the woods of contentment we journey, by the quietly flowing streams of peace. And surely his beautiful flowers of the Spirit blossom forth in exquisite beauty." "... the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, Meekness, temperance:" Truly we sit in heavenly places with Christ Jesus.

Our God fully meets any emergency in our lives. The Lord is realistic. When sorrow comes and some of our fond dreams lie broken in a casket. when our daily lives are interrupted by the departure of a loved one, we can turn to God for relief. Like a child comes to mother and confides in her, crying and telling all its troubles, we can go to our Father and unload our burden of grief on him. Ye observe days, and months, and times, and years." "Stand fast therefore in the liberty wherewith Christ hath made us free, and be not entangled again with the yoke of bondage."

Dear fellow-soldier, do guard yourself with vigilance. We believe we have been called and chosen as God's elect, but we must make our calling and election sure. We should always place this first, no matter how narrow and rough the way seems to accomplish it. Only then can we be progressing on to victory. "My little children, let us not love in word, neither in tongue; but in deed and in truth." Following his guide-book, the Bible, we will find through patience a solid love growing and binding the brethren together.

To love in the way the Lord set forth in His Word is to grow in unity. To love means a daily and minute by minute battle. It means a constant offensive against all the evil thoughts that come. "(For the weapons of our warfare are not carnal, but mighty through God to the pulling down of strong holds;) Casting down imaginations, and every high thing that exalteth itself against the knowledge of God, and bringing into captivity every thought to the obedience of Christ;" How quickly we do or say or think something about some brother or sister we ought not. And then when we harbor these thoughts they begin to smoulder and flame into open divisions. James writes: "But if ve have bitter envying and strife in your hearts, glory not, and lie not against the truth. This wisdom descendeth not from above, but is earthly, sensual, devilish. For where envying and strife is, there is confusion and every evil work." To recognize these thoughts is essential to eliminate them. We all must battle them. The battle-field is first our own heart. Go to your prayer closet and pour out your supplications to the Father who wants to help you. All power has been given to Jesus both in heaven and earth. We would throw our hands up in despair if it were not for God's almighty power. By deliberate action of yourself through the help of the Lord defeat these uncharitable parts or thoughts, and parting with them, go on your way ready to accomplish the Lord's orders. When you have won the victory over yourself, you will have accomplished much on the road to victory. To know your own self and keep your body under subjection is a constant battle.

Departing from your prayer closet, you are an instrument through which God can help bind the brotherhood together. Go to His word, and especially the New Testament, read it over and over again, until it becomes printed on your mind. Translate his words into action on your part. Your very life will become a living testimony and a living force.

Love untarnished within the heart will show itself in outward actions. Full love will bring full actions. And it will accept the shorter end, having a kindly voice in every answer. When your love has reached the standards set forth in I Corinthians 13, you will find God's will being fulfilled more. This is a yardstick by which we can measure the depth of our love.

When God has loved us so greatly that he gave his only Son to die for you and me, should we not love him in return? When we have this boundless love dwelling within us, let us yield and rest in its ocean, pouring out his matchless love to all we contact.

The Lord never asks of us what is beyond our ability to do. When he requests something to be done, we will find he has also given the power to accomplish the task. He has given us the power to love one another. His own Spirit dwells within us, and he is love. If we do not love, the entire responsibility will rest with us.

So let us bend every effort to love all men in deed and in truth. "By this we know that we love the children of God, when we love God, and keep his commandments. For this is the love of God, that we keep his commandments: and his commandments are not grievous. For whatsoever is born of God overcometh the world: and this is the victory that overcometh the world, even our faith."

A friend loveth at all times, and a brother is born for adversity.
