She packs the moments with God's sunshine in service . . . that's Miss Clara. She understands these Southland people, and loves them. Sister Clara Heiniger has the talent, the tender patience, to help and serve.

They need to be companied with. They need courage. They need to be shown sometimes the how of

everyday duties.

Mileage is rolled up to meet dear

hearts.

She helps for the day ahead both for herself and others.

It's a new station wagon now . . . one day three bushel of beans were loaded to be worbed. Wild plums make good jam. Blackberries grow wild . . . they make good dessert. Water cress that growed in the spring at Georges' found ready market and

trade for things needed.

shall be as the olive tree . . ."

The land drops away as pretty as a park over at Mountain Home Apostolic Christain Church. Pines are provided by a good Provider who has made all things beautiful.

This is the church known to some as Hillsboro. Sunday afternoon dawns in spiritual splendor for hum-

ble hearts.

Building was started in '40, finished in the spring of '41. The basement was roofed sometime after the fire of '43. Now you enter from the side away from the road, with the lovely view so near.

Inside, it is wonderful to hear those voices chorus in rich, beauti-

ful songs. Oh, how they sing!

Southland charm is beautiful, as "The Old Rugged Cross" rings in music marvellous. From the heart the tones rise into the blue of afternoon worship service.

"And they shall be mine, saith the LORD of hosts, in that day when I

make up my jewels:"

Young Miss Carol had made a beginning toward the fragrant life. Her tender heart looked heavenward. Then she was influenced by some friend or friends She did drape some things on that could only come from pride's empty stuffiness.

After supper, we picked up Brother

Henry and headed for Clydes'.

In a former day, Henry attended a certain group. One day the minister asked for a collection for a certain purpose. He didn't get much. and threw it back at the people. Henry gathered those who came with him. He never went back.

Still he had no religion. He prayed that he might find the old time religion. God heard his prayer.

A niece brought him the ad one day. It was in a paper, and it told about Bibles...an offer to provide to

those who needed.

A letter went north to Amos Hartzler, asking for seventeen Bibles. Amos wrote back for more complete information, so he would have the names and addresses of each. Henry took note that Amos did not want to make merchandise.

Before the Bibles arrived, a car came with Brothers Noah and Amos Hartzler, Brother Bauman, and an other brother. That first meeting in the Southlands was attended by a

large group.

Down in the ravine near Mountain
Home Church and Henry's is a
spring. Across the brooklet, a dam
was built, giving waist-high depth.

Here Henry was baptized.

It was the beginning of a wonder-

ful work in the Southlands.

"Let not your heart be troubled: ye believe in God, believe also in me."

Road 33 strikes in a northerly way. As you near or are leaving hill-top Country, there is a scene of lovely, distant beauty. The waters and land meet in a triumph of loveliness.

Before long, we hit road 20, and then we were driving into Clydes'.

Henry went in first.

Then we.

Time was running out.

He lay on a bed with metal ends. Besides was his wife fanning him. He lay kind of doubled up, a sick boy. It was said he had no pain, but he didn't feel good. Cancer had grasped.

Forty years. Once he had been a boy at daddy's knee. Then the years

of hard living.

We were told he had looked heavenward.

Clyde wanted to sit up. When he was sitting, he put his head down

near or on his lap.

Otto read . . . "Let not your heart be troubled" . . . a few verses. Then he prayed. Henry was on one knee,

praying beside his boy.

When tears come, hope leaves the near for the scene beyond. Coming down the rugged road into the Valley, there are glimpses of wondrous beauty. All is glorious delight.

". . . speak, and hold not thy peace: For I am with thee, and no man shall set on thee to hurt thee: for I have much people in this city."

A sweet little girl stood in the Muck Valley Apostolic Christian Church and recited, "When I get through with this old clay house of mine . . ." Her little brunette sister, standing beside her, helped with her whisper.

This is the church on Landersville route. In '53 the deed for the building was received. Opening services were exactly one year after opening

services at Athens.

There's a fine class of teen-agers. A drive-in theatre is near-by, but that does not keep these young people from Sunday evening services. Surely the far off angels are near. Perhaps heaven whispers with hushed expectancy of hope to come.

We looked to wondrous Calvary ... and viewed the victory that won

joy and peace.

Sister Clara went to the window one night. The time was 3:00. She felt she should look out the window. She opened the shade, and looked.

The moon had a large red streak

through it!

Then she opened her Bible. There was that verse spoken through Joel: "The sun shall be turned into darkness, and the moon into blood, before the great and the terrible day of the LORD come."

Aunt Bertha is a lovely sister.

She can quote poems and scripture verses from memory. She had very wise counsel about sitting in on those whose works do not follow.

Aunt Bertha has that art of hospitality, shown plainly in friendliness, chicken, corn bread, and a table-board of delicious food-stuffs.

Evening services were held on June 24, Wednesday, at the George Kellvs'. By lamplight we sang "Near The Cross" and other hymns.

Brother George has a weak heart. Since we saw him on Sunday, he had been in the hospital at Pulaski.

Now he lay on the bed . . . as you sing, you look . . . the eyes of a saint are shut . . . he loves his Lord. Then

he opened his eyes again.

The tiny tots had went through their own kind of a busy day and lay on the beds. A chorus of girls and women sang beautifully in that Southland charm. It was about the country church and how precious it

was.

"I beseech you, therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God . . ."


