

DESCRIPTION OF JESUS CHRIST

There is in existence a very remarkable and detailed description of Jesus of Nazareth, obtained by Napoleon Bonaparte when in the city of Rome; one that is not per-haps familiar to many people. It is contained in a letter written by one Publius Lentulus, the Roman Governor of Judea to the Roman Senate and in the days when Tiberius Caesar ruled the Roman world. It was the invariable custom of Roman Governors to supply the Roman Senate every possible item of news and information which might be of use or interest to the Senate.

When the Christ was preaching in Judea and working his good works, there was keen interest in Rome and much curiosity about his sayings and doing, and naturally in what he looked like. So Publius Lentulus took his stylus

We believe the church cannot exist without order and service, which Christ ordained among His disciples. Jesus told them that no one should exalt himself over the in hand and wrote down all that he had seen or heard. Coming from a Roman official, I think it is a remarkable letter. Here is what he wrote:

"There appeared in these days a man of great virtue, named Jesus Christ, who is yet living among us, and of the Gentiles is accepted for a prophet of truth, but his own disciples call him the Son of God.

"Charity suffereth long, and is kind; charity envieth not; charity vaunteth not itself, is not puffed

up, Doth not behave itself unseemly, seeketh not her own, is not easily provoked, thinketh no evil;

Rejoiceth not in iniquity, but re-

joiceth in the truth; Beareth all things, believeth all things, hopeth all things, endureth all things.

Charity never faileth:"

From I Corinthians 13

He raiseth the dead and cureth all manner of diseases. A man of stature somewhat tall and comely, with very reverent countenance, such as the beholders may both love and fear. His hair, the color of chestnuts, full ripe, plain to his ears, when downward it is of more orient and curling, waving about his shoulders. In the midst of his head is a seam or partition of his hair, after the manner of the Nazarenes; his forehead, plain and very delicate; his face without spot or wrinkle, beautiful with a lovely red; his nose and mouth are formed so nothing can be reprehended; his beard thickish, in color like his hair, not very long, but forked; his look, innocent and mature; his eye, grey, clear and quick. In reproving, he is terrible; in admonishing, courteous, plain spoken. Pleasant in conversation, modest with gravity. It cannot be remembered that any have seen him laugh, but many have seen him weep. In proportion of body, most delicate to behold; in speaking, very temperate, modest and wise. A man, for his singular beauty, surpassing the children of man.'
