THE FLOOD

Sunday morning dawned on the isle of Krakato. The year was 1883, the month, August.

But it was dark . . . a dust and pall from the volcano. Flames leaped and reddened the sky. Windows rattled . . . the earth rumbled.

Monday, the 27th . . . an explosion was followed by another. . . . Then, came the catastrophe. One tremendous convulsion blasted, it is estimated, one cubic mile of the island away. Three thousand miles distant, the boom was heard four hours later.

In 1904, Bro. Edward Haab moved from Cissna Park, Ill., to the Milford community. With him came in the same year the following families: George Hartter, Adolph Rudin, Emil Kaiser, Henry Waldbeser, and Jake Krauter.

At this time, the Neff Brothers, who were engaged in the farm real estate business, were instrumental in getting the Illinois families to

purchase land here.

Edward Haab was the first minister of the Apostolic Christian Church. They held services first in a small residence converted into a church assembly room. The family of George Haab now occupy this residence.

In 1905, several more families, mainly from the Cissna Park area, came to Milford. These were as follows: Henry Rassi, Christ Grimm, and John Rassi. The Mathew Weisser family came from

Fairbury, Illinois.

In 1906, Adolph Rudin willed a parcel of ground, from land which he owned at the northwest part of Milford, as a site for our present church. The building was approximately 34 by 66 feet in dimension. An assembly room to accommodate around 150 occupants, a dining room, and a Sunday School room were provided. To the north and west of the lot given, were constructed inexpensive but substantial horse and carriage barns. Transportation by means of horse and buggy were the only means of conveyance at that time.

The first trustees of the church were: Edward Haab, Adolph Rudin, and Henry Rassi, and these were recorded in the Auditor's

In 1907, the following families moved to this community: Ulrich Beer, Frank Beer, Andrew Beer, Emil Baumgartner, John Ruch, John Zbinden, Theodore Haab and Miss Mary Steiner. This group came together from Cissna Park.

The Michael Metzger family came earlier; his son, Michael, and family, also several other children came with him. The father, Michael, helped Bro. Haab some in the ministry. A daughter, Mary, cared for the church.

In 1907, the Fred Wuthrich family came from Roanoke. The Fred Graff family came from Tremont; Joshua Zimmerman and family

came from Congerville.

Around the years 1908 and 1909, German School was conducted in the church by Edward Haab, with a few assistants.

The first Sunday School teachers were Andrew Rapp and Fred

Wuthrich.

In the spring of 1912, the Simon Beer family moved to the Milford vicinity from Mansfield, Ohio Ulrich Beer had lived in the vicinity for several years, and his brother, Simon, cherished the thought of spending his latter years with his brother. However, Ulrich passed away early in 1912, before the Simon Beer family got to Milford.

The George Stieglitz family of Metamora, Ill., located here in 1913.

The Apostolic Christian Church considers the Sunday School of great importance, and has made provision for ten classes in Milford, ranging from beginner's to the adult married group. Emphasis is laid upon the teaching of sound doctrine, which it is hoped will lead eventually to conversion and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ.

The present Ministers are Theo Beer, Presiding Elder; Henry Beer and Elmer Hartter. Carlton Beer is Sunday School superintendent.

The present trustees are Oscar Graff, Andrew Kammerer, Ezra Beer.
