As often as I visited with him, he greeted me with the question, "Well, how are things going in the most important matter of all?" Each time, I became embarrassed and still did not wish to let him notice it.

Once, however, when he asked me again as to the most important matter of all, I could not help but ask him the counter-question, What he meant by this. The dear pastor composed himself, grasped the opportunity, and began to preach to me of repentance to God, knowledge of one's self, faith in Christ, etc. But he preached to deaf ears. I understood not a word. His sermon seemed in part foolish to me, in part vexatious.

Yet, I was honest enough to write down at home in my diary the main thought which had stayed with me: Through the knowledge of God, man comes to the knowledge of self; that is the truth which Christ taught us, and to which we arrive only through re-

pentance.

From that day on, a whole year passed before I felt the slightest trace of this knowledge of self, and it is clear that, if the grace of God wished to make something of me to His glory, it certainly had in me the greatest of all sinners, a fit object in whom to manifest, even in me, the greatest riches of the patience and pity of our Lord Jesus Christ, that I, in turn, should have pity towards my brethren in the flesh who still wander in error along the course of this world, and after the prince of darkness.

It pleased God well to awaken me from the sleep of death. He passed by me, and saw me lying in my blood. He said to me, as I thus lay in my blood, Thou shalt live! (Ezekiel 16:6)

True, I did not as yet grasp and understand correctly what I said. Indeed, I also did not as yet know the Lord Jesus Christ and the necessity for His atonement and redemption, for it was not yet the burden of my load of sin which had driven me to the Saviour of sinners, but merely the conviction, "Thou must change; otherwise, thou canst not become a minister."

From now on, with all earnestness and might, I wished to shun sin, which I now recognized as sin, and knew not that it did not lie within my power to overcome a mastery which had for so long bound me with chains of darkness. But it was as if the Lord, to whom I had made my vow, had taken me at my word, although it was really He who had taken me by my hand and, with all His goodness, drawn me to Him.

Beginning with this day, the whole scene changed. He never left me. I found rest and peace nowhere. My whole body, indeed the whole world, became too narrow for me. I sought for something which should fill the endless emptiness which had now arisen in my soul, and I did not find it.

I went out into mountain and forest, knelt and prayed and cried out in lonesome places. My whole being was longing, sorrowfulness and anxiety. I sought the Lord Jesus Christ with ardent fervor

and many tears.

Written by Bro. Rudolph Graf Mrs. Lena Tschantz Wright was born in 1878 at Bluffton, Ohio, and was the oldest daughter of Carl and Anna Tschantz. The Tschantzs, Rupps, and VonGuntens immigrated to Ohio from Switzerland in 1873 as a group.

Later, these three families moved to Ashtabula County, and located in the midst of a group of our faith. The pious life of these brethern became cause for the awakening of the parents of these families. They became helpful members of this fellowship. It was in this environment that Lena spent her youth.

The early 1890's proved disastrous to these farmers and the money panic of 1893 forced them to seek their living elsewhere. Many moved to Akron and vicinity, where they found employment in

It was here, in 1906, that Lena married Allen Wright, and to this union were born five children. The young couple had a prosperous grocery business for several years, but Mr. Wright was stricken ill and became an invalid until his death in 1923. History

(Historical data furnished by Joel J. Kipfer, William Kipfer Sr. and others)

A group of Mennonites came to this community from Switzerland, in 1850 or 1851. Among them were the Strahm and Kipfer families. Some of them had heard Samuel Froelich preach in their native land and had a desire to hear more of this doctrine.

Several years later, Matthias Strahm and Ulrich Kipfer decided to visit the minister at the Apostolic Christian Church in Monroe County, Ohio, in an attempt to get someone to preach in the Wells County community.

They started their journey on foot, in March of 1858, with a few lifts, by way of wagons, along the way. They often became discouraged, but each would urge the other on, until they arrived at their destination.

After the first evening of talking to Brothers Joseph Bela and Isaac Gehring there, they knew they had found what they were seeking.

A few weeks later, Joseph Bela arrived at Wells County, and found eighteen souls ready for baptism. Ulrich Kipfer was the first bap-

tized.

Joseph Bela held meetings in various homes, until the small flock was started. Matthias Strahm became its first minister.

The meetings continued in houses and barns, until 1867, when the first church was built on the present site, the land being donated by the Benedict Baumgartner family. It was a simple building, and was known to other brethren as the "New Ville Church".

Nicholas Baumgartner, who moved here from Iowa scorting after the Civil War, became the second minister, and later was crdained as elder. Matthias Strategic and family and a few other families moved to Kansas in 1870. Jacob Shar became the third minister.

Early burials were made in the New Ville (Vera Cruz) Cemetery The first burials in the church's own cemetery, located west of the second church building, were made

im 1879.

Jacob Shar and several other families moved to Oregon in 1879. Adam Hartman became the next minister. He later was ordained as elder, and served until his death.

The church kept growing so the building had to be enlarged in 1881 or 1882. The corner lot was perchased in 1887, and a home was built for possible caretakers of the church.

Ulrich Kipfer and Jacob Klosfenstein helped in the ministry in those days. Samuel Fiesley, a minister from Monroe County, Ohio, moved here in 1889, and served until his death.

The first church was razed in 1897, and the second erected in the

same year.

John Aschliman and Godfrey

Rauch started preaching in 1898, or a short time later, and Daniel Gerber and John Moser were next added to the ministry, in 1903.

Godfrey Rauch became the next elder, and in 1929, Henry Dotterer

the next minister.

This building was getting overcrowded by the late 20's, so it was remodeled and enlarged in 1933. Ground was purchased for the

second cemetery, in 1935.

Samuel Aeschliman and William Fiechter were added to the ministry in 1936, and, after the death of Godfrey Rauch, Samuel Aeschliman was ordained to be elder, in

The building again became overcrowded so a fuilding fund was established in 1945.

John Yergler was chosen to the

ministry in 1947.

Church building was begun in 1949, just north of the old church building and completed in 1950. The old building was used until after the new one was finished.

Ormille Ringger was ordained to the ministry in 1954, and Carl Kip-

fer in 1959.

The first eighteen converts were baptized in a pond. There had been a beavy rain the night before. After that, they were usually baptimed in the Wabash River, a little west of the Vera Cruz bridge.

History

The first church of our faith in America was established in the year 1850 by an elder named Benedict Weyeneth, who came from Switzerland to French Settlement -which is now called Croghanto preach the Evangelical doctrine.

In the year 1852, Elder Weyeneth ordained, as an elder, Joseph Virkler, who was the eldest of seven sons, who came with their parents from Alsace-Lorraine. Joseph Virkler's father, Rudolph, was the patriarchal head of the entire Virkler family in this section, and was a Mennonite preacher in France, before emigrating to

this country.

Peter Virkler succeeded his brother as elder in 1867, following Joseph's death in 1866. Peter traveled quite extensively, and founded the churches in Oregon. After Peter's death in 1889, Solomon Virkler, a son of the former Joseph, was ordained elder, about the year 1891. The next elder to be ordained was Alpheus Virkler, in about the year 1903. He was a brother of Solomon's and a son of Joseph. He spoke in both German and English, as did his predecessors. The next elder to be ordained for our churches was Philip Beyer, in 1938. Brother Philip was a great-grandson of Rudolph Virkler. He remained our elder until his death in 1958. A number of elders from other churches helped serve us at different times. Elder Bro. John Bahler of Connecticut is presently serving us, since the death of our own dearly beloved elder.

The first church at Croghan was erected about the year 1855, and was across the road from the present one—where the cemetery now lies. A new Church was built in 1866 at the present location. In 1901, extensive repairs were made on the church, and again in 1929, the entire interior was remodeled. Again, in 1961, the basement and kitchen were remodeled and the baptistry was moved upstairs, behind the pulpit.

History In the year of 1900, the John Abersoll family moved to Wolcott, Indiana_from Illinois_to establish a home. At that time, there was no congregation of our faith here, but since there had been a number of families settled at Remington, the Abersolls gathered with them for services. They met at the home of Bro. John Schieler, who was their minister.

It was not long until more families began to settle here, some of the early ones being, the Andrew Abersolls (parents of John), Andrew Lehmans, Theodore Bolliers, Ben Farneys, Jacob Kellers, John Zehrs, Dan Zehrs, Chris Helderles, Dan Farneys, Fred Ankers, Charles Blumes, Amos Sauders, and others. As the congregation grew, they held services in the various homes, one Sunday at Remington and the next Sunday at Wolcott.

By April, 1922, the need was here for a permanent place of assembly. John Abersoll, Jacob J. Keller, and Theodore Bollier were appointed as trustees, and a piece of land was obtained from Eben H. Wolcott, in the southwest part of town, at a cost of \$300. The exact time when construction was started is not known, but it is said to have been around 1902 when the

building was completed.

During the time the building was being constructed, the townsmen offered to the congregation the use of the old school building as a temporary place of assembly. It was at this time that Bro. Amos Sauder was selected as minister of the church here, and, not long after, Bro. Andrew Lehman was added to the ministry. Bro. Chris Gerber of Fairbury, Illinois, served the congregation as elder.

The frame building which was constructed at that time was in use until October 5, 1952, when the congregation moved into the new building, erected just north of the old structure. First services were held in the new building on Octo-

ber 12, 1952.

Ministers other than Bros. Sauder and Lehman who have served here were Bros. Jacob Merkel, John Trachsel, Will Furrer and our present ones, our elder, Bro. Irvin Lehman, and Bros. Alfred Bahler and Vernon Schwab. Some of our older members tell us that the first English services conducted at the Wolcott Church were in 1911, by Bro. Alph Virkler of Croghan, New York.

At the present time, we have 74 members, 49 children attending Sunday School, and approximately

54 families who attend.
