"I had been an inexplicable riddle to myself, and I did not know what was to become of me. Therefore, it was, in a measure, a consolation to see that others had experienced similar things.

Now, for the first time, my suf-

fering began.

What I had to go through from now on, in a literal sense, is inexpressible. Everything that fire and water, hammer or sword, may bring about is as nothing compared with the unfathomable sea of trouble and misery, wherein I thought I must sink.

I wept night and day, and writhed like a worm in the dust, when it is trodden upon. Like Job, I lay in the dust. In no human being, in no friend, could I confide, nor could I reveal myself to anyone. All theological or rationalistic lectures became an abomination to me, for I was now in another school.

For a long time, I remained in this fiery furnace, until at length, faith in Jesus Christ the crucified brought me rest, peace, and light, and made place within me for a new creation. From then on, Jesus Christ was the center of my whole life and sphere of activity.

However, I was kept constantly under the discipline of the Holy Spirit, for not until now did the struggle against my old nature and against the law of sin, which dwelt in my very members, become serious.

After a stay of two years in

Basel, I was obliged to return to my home, principally for economic reasons, in October, 1825.

Here, in my father's house, a new school or period of my life began, in which I was to be further trained, developed, strengthened, invigorated, and grounded, so that I should not enter as a novice into the important office which preaches atonement.

Here I applied for the exam-

ination, as a candidate for the ministry, which was postponed to the following spring.

At the request of my parents, I preached for the first time in my native Brugg, the Sunday before Christmas, and met with such general approval, that I should have become anxious and afraid, if the honor of the Lord had not counted for more with me than all personal vainglory among men.

I did not again preach here until

Good Friday, 1826, and that proved to be a veritable Good Friday for me. Instead of expressions of praise, I reaped only ridicule and reproach. It produced an entirely different effect from the praises I had received; it was necessary and wholesome for me.

Now, for two entire years, there came over me fiery tribulations that are beyond description. Only He who knows the heart, knows what I suffered. I preached Christ here, there, and everywhere in the country. But in every minister who allowed me to preach, I gained a new opponent.

With such preparation and fore-bodings, I approached my examination. The principles which I brought to light in the compositions made such an unfavorable impression upon the members of the church council, that I failed in the examination, and was put back a year. The Lord had resolved upon this, also, for my further testing and purification.

In the course of this year, oppression often rose to extreme, both from within and from without.

After a sermon which I was compelled to preach, in a church of a member of the council, among other things, he wrote my parents, who were already troubled and dissatisfied because of my set-back: "... your son is not on the right road with regard to his doctrine, and in all sincerity, he should be advised to enter upon a better course, if he wishes to be accepted

Yet, we may gather this, there was knowing. The inspired preacher says the spirit returns unto God who gave it. And David says he will go to the child that went be-

Our Lord descended to that place.

While His body lay in the tomb, "he went and preached unto the spirits in prison;" He was with people there, there was awareness, and there was communica-

into the ministry . . . In any case, he will do well if he will soon present new sermons composed in a different spirit." They now began to vehemently urge upon me that I should preach in a different manner, and indeed like others, so that I be not excluded from the ministry entirely.

The Lord, however, amidst all these attacks of the foe, still gave me patience and courage to endure everything. Yes, even death, rather than abandon the recognized and

experienced truth.

In September, I had a sudden attack of sharp pain in the chest, so violent that I could hardly draw a breath, and for many days seemed near death. That was followed, for an entire year, by cramps in the chest and most difficult respiration. But never did I experience more vividly in my heart the unspeakable friendliness of the Lord

place, with Him . . . at Home! That first, after departing . . . What does God show us?

We immediately go to His home. "We are confident, I say, and willing rather to be absent from the body, and to be present with the Lord." While on resurrection morning we shall also be with the Lord, here we peer into that beautiful home. The spirit is gone, absent from the body.

It's a beautiful hope. Looking beyond, many of our loved one's expressions have glowed in radiance of its beauty. Verse after verse of scripture adds up to a place of glorious happiness, "to depart, and to be with Christ; which is far better".

Try this in your song: let your heart soar with the words.

Hope is "Looking for that blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of the great God and our Saviour Jesus Christ". Then at that time, we'll have a new body.

But that moment, just beyond the sunset, is ours, too, just beyond To Day.

A "Thank you" comes from our elder brother, Silas Leuthold, to "all those who remembered me with prayers, cards, good wishes, and gifts, during my illness."

(Note: Our ministering brothers, Andrew Dotterer and Henry Manz, have gathered the infor-

mation for the history.)

In 1849, Christopher Henry Dotterer, grandfather of the present Dotterer family (that are still living) came to the U.S.A. from Baden, Germany, with his family, and settled in Morrow County, Ohio, which at that time was cover-

ed with heavy timber.

He went back to his native country on a visit in 1864, and only then learned to know of the Apostolic Christian faith. While there, he heard that there were also churches of this faith in Leo, Ind., and Archbold, Ohio. Upon his return home, he went to visit the Leo church and asked his son, Henry C. Dotterer, to go with him. It happened that Bro. Michael Zimmerman from Carlock, Ill., was there at the time. This was the first sermon of our faith that they heard in this country. Soon after this, they both became members. Christopher Dotterer also had four other sons and two daughters. Although the other sons did not become members, the two daughters

Since there were other settlers in the community of German descent, the Dotterers went to visit them and tried to get them interested in the Apostolic Christian faith. Most of them belonged to some other teaching, but the Lord blessed the efforts put forth, and one by one was added to the fold. They began to gather together in homes for worship, and followed this practice for a number of years. If I recall right, one sister, Verona Brenkman, walked 5 miles to services, carrying a child in her arms. One of her sons is still living, who is now 93 years old. He became a member not very many years ago, and at the present time attends the Ft. Wayne, Ind., congregation.

In 1892, a church house was built at the present location, Bro. Henry Dotterer and Bro. Andrew Schrenk being the ministers, with the first services being held Sept. 11, 1892.

The church was raised, a basement put under, and the building somewhat enlarged in 1913. This never came to be a large congregation, as many of the younger generation went to larger towns or

cities further away to obtain work.

Traveling to larger towns was mostly done with boats drawn by horses or mules. The canals were also made with horse-drawn tools and hand labor, which was a large project, working through the dense timber. One canal ran from Cincinnati, Ohio, to Toledo, Ohio, about 200 miles. The other came from Ft. Wayne, Ind., and the two joined in Junction, which gave it this name.

The church house is standing on the farm that Henry Dotterer purchased during the Civil War, over a 100 years ago. Also the cemetery, known as the Dotterer cemetery, is on the same farm, ,where some of 5 generations of Dotterers are lying at rest. This farm has been kept in the family ever since, with one of the granddaughters living there at the present time.

Bro. Elias Dotterer, whom many of you knew, was the oldest son of Bro. Henry Dotterer. He was born on this farm and lived there

all the days of his life.

She was the oldest of the daughters, so had to bear the early burdens of helping mother cook, wash, iron, and all the other chores so common around those early farm homes

She was married to John Riedell, September 30, 1911, and shortly after, moved to Wichita, Kansas, where he became associated with the plumbing business, until his death in 1940. They have two children, Robert and Alton.

She became converted and was baptized in the Burlington Church by Elder Brother Kerz, May 21, 1912, so became the first member of the Apostolic Church in Wichita. The following year, the Alfred Lambert family moved to Wichita, thus forming the nucleus of the present day church in Wichita. She recalls the many times that Bro. Alfred walked to their home and would pray with them. She says "Those were wonderful days". Truly the Lord was with them and was kind to them, and the warmth of their Christian love toward each other was lasting, and the memories of these long-ago days still stirs Sister Marie's heart.

The zeal to attend services has never left her, for even now, when she is not really physically able to come, she will take a taxi and attend, if only a half day.
