ed the true gospel, here and there. He pointed men to Christ, for repentance, faith, and baptism, according to the words of Christ, as the first Christians had done.

On January 9, 1836, Froelich wrote: "It never entered my mind that I should found a sect here on earth, rather it was and is my purpose to gather children to God... I placed myself wholly into His hands, that He might lead me according to His good pleasure."

Froelich began his work in Leutwil, his former congregation.

Hardly had the news spread that he was there, when from 200 to 300 persons gathered every evening, that he might preach the word of Christ to them. Some also

came to spy; the majority, however, from desire.

Within a week, many hearers, whom he had instructed before and in whom God had prepared the way, requested baptism. Froelich examined them carefully, to be convinced of the uprightness of their faith and knowledge, and admonished them to count the cost of following Christ. Then he baptized them, according to the instruction of the Lord. On Palm Sunday, he could celebrate the Lord's Supper with 38 members, for the first time.

Meanwhile, the foe was not idle.

When many were gathered together, a gendarme appeared and ordered that all who had sheltered Froelich must appear before the district magistrate. As Froelich did not permit himself to be intimidated, and continued to preach the good tidings, a summons followed. He was told to leave the village at once, and to return to his native Brugg. In vain did he refer to the highest Aargau court and traveled to Aargau to the magistrate. He was dismissed with a warning. Later on, a gendarme dragged Froelich out of a meeting, and brought him to the magistrate at Lenzburg.

In ansewr to the question, "Who had commanded you to preach?", his reply was, calmly, "Christ". The angry official raised his hand to strike him, but withdrew it. He tore his clothes, emptied his pockets in order to find his books. Then, he ordered the gendarme to put him in prison. When Froelich appealed that the magistrate at Aargau had not arrested him, he was allowed to go free, and began his wearisome journey to Brugg.

Froelich once more turned to Bost at Geneva: "... In Aargau, I was arrested and banned. Where shall I go?"

He would like to go with Paul, to learn of him, how with simplicity the gospel might best be spread.

HISTORY

1904 - 1962

At the turn of the century, three elder brothers from Illinois, Jacob Rich, Engelbert Grusy and Dan Mangold, of Gridley and Roanoke made a survey of the Oakville-Huron bottom lands. On their advice, six families migrated to this community to make their homes. They were Otto R. Gerst and Theophil Fischer of Roanoke, Henry K. Gerst of Gridley, Andrew Yackley of Peoria, Peter Glaser of Cissna Park and John Voelpel of Morton.

This small group held one meeting in the one-room school, which was known as the Williams school, located on land now farmed by David Sheridan, directly across from the farm now operated by Richard Anliker. Thereafter, they assembled in homes, until 1904, when a new church was built, a half mile north of this school building.

Bro. Peter Glaser was first to begin preaching, and a few weeks later Bro. Henry Gerst assisted him. The following spring, Bro. Albert Reiman and Bro. Albert Rauhaus moved from New Boston, Ill., to this side of the Mississippi. Bro. Reiman was a minister, and he continued to help Bro. Gerst, as Bro. Glaser ceased in the ministry.

This same year, a number of other families moved to this community. They were the John Stoller, Fred Donner and Chris Kuntz families of Gridley, Peter Mauer of Roanoke, John Benninger of West Bend, Fred Sutter of Morton, Dan Kempf of Congerville, Wm. 12

Frank and George Wieland of Cissna Park. Later, between 1908-1910, others came from Cissna Park and Morton, namely Paul and Joseph Reeb, Fred Siegle and George Heinold. Many others moved in from time to time, mainly from Illinois. Among them in the year 1916 was Bro. Noah Schrock, who came from Congerville.

During World War I, due to an edict by the state government and because of the war with Germany, it was ordered by officials to hold services in the English language. At this time, Bro. Schrock (at the age of 25) and Bro. Wm. Rauhaus were chosen to serve. After the emergency was over and Bro. Henry Gerst became more fluent in the English language, Bro. Rauhaus chose to resign.

In the year 1935, the congregation decided, after another influx of families (many from Minnesota), to move and remodel the church building. It was moved to the present location on State highway 99, 3 miles south of Oakville. At this time, the congregation numbered about 35 families, including friends.

Two years later, in March, 1937, Bro. Reiman met with a very tragic automobile accident, taking his life. Bros. Gerst and Schrock felt that a helper should be added to the ministry. After much prayerful thought, it was decided to call both Bros. John Wagenbach and Gust Scheitlin to the ministry. They began serving in the fall of 1937.

More families continued to move into the community from time to time, and by the early 40's, there were more than 60 families attending church.

In the early spring of 1940, Bro. Schrock was ordained as the first elder of the Oakville church. He was installed by Bro. David Mangold of Roanoke, assisted by Bro. Schubert of Peoria and Bro. Carl Rassi of Morton.

On Sunday morning, Nov. 5, 1944, a disastrous fire greeted many of the members as they came to church, burning the building to the ground. Due to war-time emergency, a new building could not be erected at once. Not till the early spring of 1946 did it become possible to begin a new structure.

Adding to the difficulty of building was another disaster to the community. This time it was a flood which affected most of the congregation. This took place on Jan. 7, 1946. No lives were lost, and with help from our brethren from other churches throughout America, rehabilitation took place, so that a crop was planted and harvested on schedule, and the new church building was under way.

On Sept. 21, 1947, we had our first meeting in the new church. Open house was held the following Sunday for the community, and on Feb. 15, 1948, we had formal dedication services, which was attended by a large number of members and friends throughout the Middle-West. Bro. Philip Gutwein of Francesville held the dedicatory address.

Bro. Henry Gerst passed away April 4, 1954. On June 6, 1956, Bro. Harvey Heiniger was added to the ministry. Because of crowded conditions, a balcony was put into the church in 1957, which will seat about 125 people. On Oct. 19, 1958, a group of members from the Oakville congregation began to assemble at the Burlington church, that we had purchased some time previous for mid-week services.

At present, we have about 108 families, 184 members and 142 Sunday School children.

In 1904, a new church building was built in the northeast part of Pulaski. It was ready to be used in January, 1958. The lot was donated by Bro. Keith Stevig, who later moved to Morton.

The ministers serving through the years, beside the ones mentioned above, were John Miller, Chris Wagler, Sam Miller, Mike Miller, and Guy Miller. Serving now are Albert Wuthrich and Cleo Rinkenberger.
