Man cannot forgive sins, but by bringing the sins to light, it takes the power from the evil one, which relieves the burdened heart. This, then, proves the honesty of the heart, the desires to be united with the body of Christ. Restitution must be made to all who have been offended.

When we have done all this, and for membership.

earnestly and humbly sought our God in prayer for forgiveness, God is then willing to forgive all unrighteousness, and to fill the heart with comfort and peace. This peace is the most precious thing that a believer has.

We are taught in God's word, which is our true guide, to come out from the world and touch not the unclean things, which are the things that the world enjoys and has pleasure in, such as movies, smoking, drinking, the evil programs over TV, and radio's sports of all kinds.

If we become a child of God after a true repentance, and would again entertain and entangle ourselves with these things, we could not expect our Saviour to accept us as a brother or sister when He again returns . . . or if we would be called out of this life. We would not have a promise of eternal life.

As the ingredients of a cake are drab and rather tasteless, and not until they are all worked together and properly baked can we enjoy the completed delicacy, so, likewise certain incidents of our life seem cold and disheartening. We often fail to see the end in view. As time goes on, our Heavenly Father can use a trial, together with other experiences, to His glory, and to our humbling and purification.

This consoling scripture passage is for the soul who loves the Lord. Though God loves all people (but He is grieved at the smallest sin), all men do not love God. We can only call God our heavenly Father through the born-again experience and through the indwelling Holy Spirit.

God looks at us from the top or bright side of a cloud, but we see only the underside. The pattern of cloth or fabric would be uninteresting if there were no dark threads along with the light ones to make up the complete pattern. The Scripture says "... no chastening for the present seemeth to be joyous, but grievous: nevertheless afterward it yieldeth the peaceable fruit of righteousness unto them which are exercised thereby." Hebrews 12:11.

However, the Christian's life is not only made up of trials and troubles, lest we would faint by the way, but His ways are ways of pleasantness, and all His paths are peace. "He will not always chide: neither will he keep his anger for ever." Psalm 103:9 How consoling to know and feel, "Like as a father pitieth his children, so the Lord pitieth them that fear him." Psalm 103:13.

So let us take heart and believe that each trial, temptation, heartache, discouragement and obstacle, linked together with our joys, blessings and successes, will be used by God to fit us for service on earth, and then to serve Him forever in eternity.

Early History Of The John Conrad Farm

About 1830, Jacob Conrad, father of John Conrad, left Alsace Lorraine, France, for religious reasons and came to America. He resided in Stark county, Ohio, for

some years.

He must have been a real pioneer, for in 1853, he loaded his family and all possessions he had into a covered wagon, and with two oxen, he made the long trek to Indiana, coming through Ft. Wayne, passing the site of the old Indian fort. As a guide, he followed the St. Joe River to Leo—(called Hamilton at that time). He had to ford the St. Joe River where the Leo bridge now stands.

He bought up the entire parcel of land in this swampy river bottom where wild hogs and deer roamed the forests. This contained the John Conrad farm, the J. J. Conrad farm and the Elias Conrad farm, later known as the Joseph and Laura Schlatter farm. A few miles from here, a parcel of land was purchased for the oldest son, Jacob Conrad.

Their first home here was a log house. Here John Conrad was

born, in 1858.

In 1880, Jacob and Elizabeth Conrad, father and mother of John Conrad, deeded 1/2 acre of their land where the Apostolic Christian Church now stands for the consideration of \$1.00, for a little church This was the first church house of our denomination in this part of the country. Many changes have been made, and a new church has replaced the old.

When John Conrad was 18 years old, he spent one winter in Illinois, going to German school taught by Father Hohulin. He had many fond memories of that winter.

In June, 1879, he married Mary Schlatter of Leo. They continued to live in this log house, where 10 children were born.

In the winter of 1892, in zero weather, the 14-inch-thick ice was cut out of the St. Joe River, and be was baptized by Brother Bella. Mary his wife was baptized some years later.

He built the first cheese factory on this farm. Swiss cheese was made here for many years. Also, in later years he built the first brick-

yard in this section.

In 1912, he built the brick house, which still stands across the highway from the present church. He enjoyed people, especially receiving all visiting members with gladness. They were always welcome, and Mother Conrad was always ready and capable to take care of the many visiting members.

John Conrad lived his entire life on this farm. He died in 1938, at the age of 80 years. Mary his wife preceded him 8 years.

Five children are still living today: Mrs. Emma Frautschi, Toledo; Herman Conrad of near Leo; Rose, Diana and Adele Conrad of Ft. Wayne.

History

(By Fred Grimm)

In the year 1918, Bro. Andrew Yackley and his family moved from Hancock to a farm south and east of Taylor. This was the beginning of the Taylor church, for soon, several other families moved here from Oakville, Peoria and Morton, including Bros. Otto Gerst, Ben and Joe Wiegand, Charlie Koelling and families, several of the Hoerr brothers and Ezra and Les Gerst.

By 1926, five families of members and a few families of friends were here. They met in homes on

Sunday, to have Sunday School and also for hymn singing. Sometimes, copies of sermons preached by our brothers in other churches were read. About once a month, ministering brothers from Oakville and other neighboring churches came to hold services. Usually these services were conducted in homes, but sometimes in a country school.

Early in 1926, the Taylor members, desiring to have a local minister, invited Bro. Edward Grimm of Elgin, Iowa, to move to the Taylor vicinity. On Feb. 1, 1926, he and his family, Bro. Will Butikofer and family, and Eli Sutter and family moved here. Regular Sunday services were then held in homes, until about May, 1926, when a small tract of land with a small 4-room house was purchased by the members and friends. The house was remodeled into a church. Bro. Ed Grimm made the pulpit & pews, some of which are still in use in the present Sunday School.

On July 4, 1926, the first services were held in the church. This building was to suffice for two or three years, until a new building could be built on the same portion of land. There were now seven families that served lunch, and a total of fifteen members. The location of the church is right by the Fabius River levee, the river call-

ed "Fabby".

The church was blessed with a few new converts, even this first year, and other families moved here, including Bro. Fred Frieden and family from Elgin, Iowa, in 1927, and the Rudy Hoerr Sr. family from Morton in 1928 (John, Dan, Rudie and George were already here).

The church grew slowly with the addition of new converts. In 1930, fourteen repented and were added to the fold. Bro. Elias Winzeler of Tremont and Bro. Emil Schubert of Peoria were the elders. There were now 35 members, and 15

families serving lunch.

But now the depression came, and some families were forced to move away. The building of a new church also had to be postponed. About the year 1935, Bro. Otto Gerst was elected to help Bro. Ed Grimm in the ministry, but in a short time he moved to Oakville. In the fall of 1937, Bro. Ben Wie-

gand was put into the ministry. On Nov. 29, 1937, Bro. Ed

Grimm died of a heart attack, leaving Bro. Wiegand alone in the ministry. By now, several families had moved away, leaving the church with only about ten families.

In June of 1938, Bro. Fred Grimm was elected to help in the ministry. In the spring of 1947, Bro. Ben Wiegand and family moved to Forrest. Then in March, 1948, Bro. William Cottrell was elected to serve in the ministry.

By 1949, even though the group was quite small, there were a number of children and young folks, so it was suggested by several members that a new church should be built. In Aug., 1950, our present church was dedicated. When plans were being made for the new church, we had eight families serving lunch and there were 22 members. Bro. Noah Schrock of Oakville was the elder at the time and served until Dec., 1961.

In July 1955, Bro. Gerald Sutter was elected to the ministry, which gave us three ministers.

Bro. Fred Grimm was ordained elder in Dec., 1961.

We now have 22 families that serve lunch, 57 members, and about 40 Sunday School students. Our regluar attendance is about

110 persons.

The following poem was written by Bro. Ed Grimm in the early days of the church, in 1926. When there were only seven families, he would always go to church early to build the fire, then wait for the people to come. While waiting for their arrival one Sunday morning, this poem was written. It is sung to the melody of "The Little Brown Church In The Vale". The members and friends, including the little children, enjoy singing it.

The Little White Church On The Levee

There's a church on the levee by the Fabby,

No lovelier spot far around,
Where the children of God love
to gather,
In communion with Him to be

found.

It is there in that church on the levee

That I often find peace for my soul,

When trials and sorrows would crush me.

Perhaps one of the few ministers of our congregation who is remembered by many, and yet who pioneered in this community, was Jos. A. Banwart.

He came to West Bend from Elgin, Iowa, with his parents, at the age of six years. They travelled by covered wagon, drawn by horses. They also brought a yoke of oxen, which were often used to pull the wagon free, when it was hopelessly mired in mud. These strong beasts were also used to break the new prairie land for cultivation.

His chore as a boy was mostly watching the cattle as they grazed the long prairie grass. There were no fences to keep them in bounds, and it was necessary for the boys to herd the cattle on horseback. He used to tell of being able to stretch the prairie grass above his head, when on horseback.

Their new home was a sod-hut, with dirt floor and an open fireplace which furnished warmth and in which they did their cooking. There were no trees except along rivers and creeks, so it took some time until they could build even a log cabin.

Indians were numerous, but did not disturb the white people, so long as they were allowed to roam as they pleased and help themselves to grain.

There were no doctors near, so the pioneers were dependent upon each other to minister to the sick, and always kept some simple drugs and remedies on hand. Joe, as he was called, often ministered to the sick, and even helped prepare bodies for burial. We surely cannot grasp the strength and fortitude these people needed. The entire dependence upon God must have given them this strength.

It seems interesting that in his days, this one man saw the transition from travelling by plodding beasts of burden to the faster modes of travel by railroad, then by car, then by air.

He and his wife, the former Mary Mathys, also of Elgin and West Bend, had a family of six sons and four daughters, all of whom survived their parents.

He began his ministry on his 30th birthday, having been asked to preach a funeral in the absence of the residing ministers, who were on a trip. His preaching was "not with enticing words of man's wisdom", as he had very little formal education, but his experience and love for his fellow man gave him the education most necessary.

In his later years, he once made the remark that the two best things in life are peace and health, which are worthwhile for all of us.
