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## BROTHER HENRY DOTTERER SR.

Bro. Henry Dotterer Sr. was the father of elder Eli Dotterer of Junction and minister Henry Dotterer of Bluffton, both deceased, also Bro. Andrew Dotterer, a minister of our Junction church, and Bro. Ben Dotterer, who is living at Mansfield.

Bro. Henry Dotterer was born September 29, 1836, in Baden, Germany. He came to America, to Ohio, with his parents, in 1849. He preached the gospel for about 35 years, and was ordained elder in April, 1893, by Bros. Rudolph Witzig and Jacob Honegger.

He bought a small farm of 80 acres, and worked hard to clear the land. He died during the year of 1905, at the age of 68 years. All of us who remember him must say that he was a true, humble, kindhearted brother, and a good example to the whole brotherhood.

Now, to explain about a purchase of land which he made, and how he made the deal, we will have to go back some 60 years. Some of our older brothers may remember how, in the nineties, there was a spirit of land speculation which swept over the midwestern states. Most of all in Illinois and nearby states, men would buy land and farms, not with the thought of tilling the soil or making a home for their families, but to make a quick sale, selling at a large profit. This raised the price of land and caused a hardship for such men who wanted to buy a farm for a home and make an honest living for themselves and their families.

Now the sad part of all this was, that some of our brothers were enticed into this evil of speculation. So, in order to curb this evil, our elders found it necessary to call a brother meeting, which took place at Morton. The exate date is not recalled, but it was around the year 1902, more or less. At this meeting, a number of brothers were called upon to explain, to give an account

of their land dealings. Brothers Rudolph Witzig and Christ Gerber, from Gridley and Fairbury, and Bro. Joseph Huber from Kansas occupied the pulpit. One brother made an open confession, that he was willing to pay back the profit which he made on his farm deal. Other brothers were questioned.

There was quite a discussion about this matter.

Then, all at once, Brother Henry Dotterer arose, spoke in his soft, gentle way, and said, "Brothers, I also bought some land, and I will explain how I went about it. I had a small farm, and my boys were growing up, so I felt if I could buy a piece of land next to my farm, I would have work for them and be able to keep them at home. Now, this is the way I went at it. I took my concern to God in prayer, and asked the Lord for a token if it could be His will that I buy that land. I prayed that, when I go out on the road, the owner of that land should meet me on the road. So, when I went on the road, here came the owner of that land. We spoke with each other about me buying his land. We came to a peaceful agreement and made a satisfactory deal." Then, Bro. Dotterer slowly sat down again.

It was stated from the pulpit, that the other brothers who bought and sold land should compare their dealings with the Bro. Dotterer way. Here was much food for thought.

We can take a wonderful lesson from this, and we do well in all important matters, if we first seek the advice and counsel of God. In so doing, we honor our God, and the blessing will follow.

## MY SOUL IS SAVED AND I AM COMFORTED

(The first part is from a letter (part of which was in last month), where Bro. Froelich so ably answers an invitation to a meeting unapproved of God. Samuel Froehlich's words at sunset should be a comfort to all who are holding true.

The editor)

By a formal union, all those who teach otherwise would have the right to teach in our church, without the inner unity of the doctrine of Christ. That shall not be.

We would have to unite with such organizations that have accepted those who departed from us or who were expelled, whereby they prove sufficiently that we do not belong to one church, for the one church of Jesus Christ has not many entrances, but only one.

This I know, that the true brotherly love rests only on the truth, as it is in Christ Jesus . . . . Where the truth is and conquers, there is the community of saints, of itself and without conferences.

In one year, Brother Froehlich held up to 450 meetings, generally consecutively, chapter for chapter, verse for verse, of various books of

the Bible. He held many children's instruction meetings, undertook visitations and tiring journeys... wrote from 200-300 letters annually, and his diary.

Samuel Heinrich Froehlich died January 15, 1857, at the age of


 $53\frac{1}{2}$  years.

The mortal remains were buried in Strassburg, where he had taken refuge during the period of perse-cution. A simple gravestone in the St. Helena Cemetery marks the end of his earthly pilgrimage.
Toward the last, he said:

"I shall die, Lord my God. Mayest Thou keep Thy holy ones from temptation that is in the world, that they may not perish, but abide in Thee, and give them eternal life . . . . For the prince of this world is prepared with his whole power of darkness, and preachers of unrighteousness who seek to destroy Thy work, to mislead Thy elect. Thou knowest that I have not sought glory before men, but only to further Thy glory and have declared Thy name before all, and have not been ashamed of Thee, and have fought until this hour."

Then, after speaking with Brother Weiler, who had watched at his bedside, about experiences of faith and his fears, and about the congregations and his family, he comitted himself to the Lord, saying,

". . . I do not regret our going out; we would and should let nothing frighten us, and if all unite to honor God, then there is no enmity and no foreign spirit can work among us. My soul is saved, and I am comforted in the Lord."

It was then they began teaching in English.

With God's help and grace, he was able to serve in Sunday School for thirty-three years, and had some very faithful brothers to help. Bro. Joe Stoller moved from Ohio and held an important place in the Sunday School, until ill health prevented him from continuing. He is still missed by those who knew and loved him. Bros. Dave Kieser and Lowell Stoller, Joe's son, taught a number of years and are now both ministers and much loved by everyone. Richard Seidel and James Ringger, very loving brothers, also served with Will.

The most interesting thing Brother Will observed while in Sunday School was to be kind and loving to all the children, rather than too strict, for it will bear more fruit. The many blessed hours we spent together in Sunday School will ever be remembered. Bro. Will still loves to assemble once in a while with the brothers and sisters in Sunday School, to spend an hour with our beloved youth. We teachers warmly welcome him and enjoy

I remember, when I was about

ten years of age, one of our song leaders would roll the "R" in "Ruh, Ruh" (Hymn No. 10 in the long book). As long as I was home, whenever my sister and I sang that song, we would try to make our "R" roll the way that brother did.

We didn't get to church every Sunday, as our children and grand-children do. We lived about six miles in the country and didn't have a car until after my eleventh birthday. When we drove the carriage and horses, there wasn't enough room for all of us.

I can well remember the times when I did go to Sunday School. When I was in the older class, the one brother would stop speaking and say, "Listen, Boys" (in German of course), and all of us would pay more attention for awhile. In the younger class, the lesson consisted of reading a story and then writing from the lesson what we had read in German, as far as time permitted.

My father lived to be 80 years old and was a bed patient the last year of his life. Among the many cards he received were some signed, "Your former Sunday School pupil". This was very touching, but does show that the seeds planted in young hearts do not all fall on stony ground — many fond memories remain in the hearts of both the children and teachers.

At present, there are six brothers and six sisters teaching in our Sunday School. Bro. Arnold Rassi is our superintendent. The past month, our attendance has averaged 159 per Sunday. I believe that God is pleased with the efforts of our brothers and sisters, who give their time for this work, and as parents, we should advise our children to realize what is being done for them.

The oldest teacher (in age) at present is Sis. Hannah Koch. Hannah has been teaching since January, 1946, and during these seventeen years, has had 118 different children in her class. She began teaching fifth grade only, but soon had both fifth and sixth grades. She remembers her students (both present and former) with cards on their birthday and at Christmas. She has been very helpful to souls when they repent, and the time she spends writing letters to converted souls who are on their tour of duty in the service of the government and away from home at school is very much appreciated by those who receive these letters.

Most of Hannah's students well remember the very wonderful object lesson stories she tells. Such lessons on "Faith", How God Feels About a Hypocrite", "Climbing the Steps to Heaven", and many others really impress young souls. Upon the suggestion of one of her first pupils, Sis. Hannah began compiling these lessons, poems, and stories into a scrapbook for each one and has continued to do so throughout all these years.

Sis. Hannah carries out her duty in a quiet, humble manner and wishes no praise. She only wants to do this work in a way pleasing to the Lord.

Sisters Ella and Lucille Schweigart and Vi Koch were put in as teachers the same Sunday as Sis. Hannah. They, too, have been very loving, patient, and kind, and have sown may good seeds into the tender hearts of our young children, in their seventeen years in this work. May God continue to richly bless them.

Another problem, their parents are not very much understanding about Sunday School, nor all kind of true Christianity, I believe. Here in our Sunday School in Tokyo, we have not enough teachers; only two, Sis. Atsumi Satoyoshi and myself now, so we made two classes. We divided; one is from small children to 4-year primary school children, and another class is from 5 year to Junior high school children. Our Junction church is located approximately 8 miles northwest of Paulding, or 11 miles southwest of Defiance: State Route 111 to the Junction of State Routes 11 and 637, thence ½ mile south on Route 637, and ½ mile east on a gravel road. The church house is located on a presumed hilltop, alongside a

farm pond.

The church is named after the hamlet "Junction", which derived its name from being located and built at the junction of the old Miami and Erie Canal (which extended north and south between Toledo and Cincinnati) with the Wabash canal, which junctioned here and went west to Fort Wayne. These were barge canals and were traveled by flatboats, drawn by mules on each bank of the canal. Incidentally, our church is located just one-half mile west of the for-mer aqueduct of the Miami and Erie Canal and the Flat Rock Creek, a historic spot.

Our members are mostly farmers or retired farmers; a few have worked in factories and various other occupations. We, being northeast of Paulding, seem to be on the outskirts of what the writer has heard referred to as the "Garden Spot of a Nation", this particular "spot", lying south and west of Paulding, being quite level and rather productive soil.

Our soil tends to be heavy and needs to be farmed carefully, to be productive, which continually reminds one of the Christian life. The land here is rather level, some being a little rolling, which is appreciated, for we rely much on

surface drainage.

There is considerable timber and what we call "second growth" in our locality, and there are a number of sawmills in the vicinity.

Approximately 106 children attend Congerville Sunday School, ranging in age from 3 years through high school. The following shows the number of students in each class, and the present teachers: Bible Class, 20, Frederick Knapp and Ben Knapp; 7th and 8th grades, 8, Duane Steffen (and formerly Art Wettstein); 5th and 6th grades, 18, Bob Knapp and Harvey Schieber; 3rd and 4th grades, 16, Don Schrock and Ed Steffen Jr.; 2nd grade, 7, Ruth Schumacher; 1st grade, 10, Marjorie Knapp; 5-year-olds, 5, Doris Knapp; 4-yearolds, 12, Irene Schrock and Polly Schrock; 3-year-olds, 10, Betty Miller, Jeanette Knapp and Alice Schieber (Including one to substitute for all women's classes); Superintendent, Fredrick Knapp.

Men teachers are chosen by majority vote of the congregation. At a meeting of the teachers, ministers and trustees, following this election, the superintendent and women teachers are chosen by majority vote of this group.

At an election held Wednesday, May 1, Bros. Keith Roth, John Schieber and Chris Miller were chosen to replace outgoing Bros. Frederick Knapp and Duane Steffen, and also Bro. Art Wettstein, who has moved to Eureka. Following this election, at a meeting of teachers, ministers and trustees. Bro. Bob Knapp was elected superintendent and Bro. Harvey Schieber, assistant superintendent. Sis. Alice Schieber will now teach 4year-olds, in the place of Sis. Polly Schrock, whose term expires this year. Sis. Sarah Dietrich was elected to serve as a substitute teacher.

The regular Sunday School term coincides with the regular school term. We do hold classes in the

summer for those who wish to attend. However, during these months, absence is not counted against the attendance record.
