GRIDLEY, KANSAS Mrs. Rudy Bahr HISTORY

(Gathered and written by Sis.

Lydia Bahr).

These dates and information were acquired recently by questioning Bro. Jacob Beck, formerly of our congregation. He is a resident of the Apostolic Christian Home at Sabetha. There seems to be no existing records on hand; they may have been destroyed in the fire which ravaged our church in 1910.

This small community of church "goers" must have been settled in

southwest Coffey County sometime during the 1870's. Land was cheap, but crops were made unproductive by drouths, prairie fires, and grasshoppers, which took their toll from the sweat and toil of the plucky pioneers. Many of these pioneers had to break the virgin prairie for cropland . . . some of them returned to eastern churches, where living conditions were more endurable.

There was also a settlement that sought the more productive Verdigris River Valley; these as a rule fared somewhat better. Then, to provide a church midway for the two communities, they met in the newly-organized school district now

known as the Erret district. A family of Mosers lived near there. Members would take their noonday lunch with them and spend their noon hour at the Bro. Moser home, where coffee would be ready.

More people came to Kansas as the land became productive . . . also there was now a promise of a good livelihood in the native grasses, which nourished herds of cattle. The water problem was solved by excavating farm ponds, which were filled by rains in their season.

Later, since transportation to Sunday meeting was only by wagon or open carriages, the folks from the Verdigris valley built a church about 10 miles farther west. Then, the Coffey County folks soon followed with a building about 8 miles north and east. Thus, there were two small churches built. The first Coffey County Church was built in 1881. Bro. Beck stated, that he came with his parents directly to this community from Germany, in 1883, when he was about 6 years old.

This first church was destroyed by a tornado in June, 1895. It was rebuilt the same year on the same location. Again it was destroyed this time by fire, in 1910, and rebuilt in the little town of Gridley

the same year.

The first ministers in the Coffey County Church (now Gridley, Kansas) were Bros. Joseph Huber and Christian Wagler. Asking Bro. Jake for some of the names of the early members, he named Adam Schief, John and Edward Kaufmann, George Metszer, Leibigs, Nicholas Isch, Shoets, Raafs, Krafts, etc. Later on, Jacob Schuch and Peter Kraft ministered.

Bro. Huber was our elder until his health failed; then we were served by elders from neighboring Eastern churches. Jacob Somerhalder was elder for about fifteen years, from the early twenties.

Jacob Raaf, Henry Bahr, and John Somerhalder were some of our more recent ministers.

Our church is still small—there is no industry near by to keep our young people with us. But we do have and experience much love and harmony amongst our members.

Our life here must needs be simple; we depend on God's blessings for our livehood, and often experience unproductive years . . . yet have always been bountifully provided.

Our present ministers are Bro. Sam Huber (grandson of Bro. Joseph Huber) and Bro. Loren Strahm. Bro. Sam Anliker, Lamont, serves our church as elder.

We are always glad to have visiting ministers in our church. It is so wonderful to have the same "food" prepared and "fed" to us by a little different method, when we can feel it is always God inspired.

CHAMPAIGN-URBANA, ILL. Ben Blunier

Services are now being held in Champaign, the first and third Sundays of each month, at Latzer Hall in the University YMCA Building, 1001 South Wright St. This is right next to the University of Illinois campus. LEST WE FORGET In Memory of Elder Brother Emil Schubert

In loving memory of one who was laid to rest, attaining God's kingdom, thirteen years ago, we write a few words, in thanksgiving for the many blessings we and our church received, through the grace of God, in the many years that he served his congregation.

Born September 22, 1874, in Saxony, Germany, he was married to Anna Sieber of Saxony in 1895. They both heeded the Lord's call in Germany. The challenges of the new world brought them, in 1906, to Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

Seeking the Lord's way, his convictions were tested and strengthened in Philadelphia-life being hard in a new country, especially to one with limited knowledge of the English language. But the Lord makes many impossible challenges blessings in disguise, and within a few years, a new home was found in Peoria. The Lord provided him with the gift of being handy with hands and with a keen mind, thus offering all the ingredients necessary to raise and nourish his beloved family.

For forty years or more, he preached and lived God's gospeltraveling far and wide to expound the living words. His heart was always with those less fortunate, and with the Lord's help, he wept with those that wept and rejoiced with those that rejoiced.
