

IN MEMORIAM

OF BRO. YOSHITO INOUE

We were saddened to hear that our beloved brother, Yoshito, passed out of this life, on March 7, after a long impairment of his health. Bro. Yoshito reached the age of 25 years, being converted during the years between 1955 and 1958. He was baptized, upon his confession of faith, in August, 1958, by Bro. Mangold and myself, along with nine other converts.

There survive him, his mother. Tamino, a sister in faith; a converted brother, Akito; and younger members of the family. His father was converted and preceded him in

death by about two years.

Bro. Yoshito became impressed with Christianity at the age of 14, while he stayed with the Ehnles. In 1955, when Bro. Mangold and I visited Japan, he attended our meetings-riding his bicycle 15 to 20 miles.

When Bro. Mangold and I returned to Japan in 1958, we found him awaiting to be baptized, which was carried out at Shioda in the name of the Lord.

He soon became useful in the ministry of the Word. He had exceptional talent to speak, in both English and Japanese, and demonstrated, in spite of his youth and frail health, such a stability in the true faith as is seldom seen in our

About two years ago, he submitted to surgery and never regained his health. He often said, "I am not afraid to die, but I have many things I want to do yet." He told his mother, "I wanted to show others, especially the American brethren, that I was a true, humble and faithful believer over a period of many years—that I would not fluctuate in my walk of life as a believer.'

Shortly before his death, he was bothered a great deal by Buddhist chanting which he could hear next door. He was truly converted from Buddhism.

During his last days, he painted a picture of a ship, its bow pointed

heavenward, while being besieged by huge waves. When his mother asked why he painted such a picture, he said, "I drew a picture of a ship about to sink; it has struck a rock, but still it has hope.'

The day before he died, he begged his brother, Akito, to take him into the church, which is nearby. It seemed he wanted to die there, but he was too weak to be moved. He called his brother, Akito, and, the best he could, said, "Please speak out more and more the true joy." These were his last words. He carried with him into eternity his aspirations and faith in Jesus Christ.

I shall never forget my last visit with Bro. Yoshito. He called me into a room and said, "Bro. Schrock, you are our elder, and we want you to tell us whatever you see to be needful, so we can maintain a true church." Thus we parted, never to meet again in this sinful world, but I am comforted in looking forward to meeting our dear Japanese brother in His glorious kingdom.

The dark hours of that first Good Friday when Jesus hung on the cross in pain and in anguish are pressed deeply into the heart of a soul that is called to repentance-when only the Lord can cause one, through His Word, to fully understand and realize the price that had to be paid to satisfy God, where it is written in Isaiah 53:11, "He shall see of the travail of his soul, and shall be satisfied

When the Lord does this to a soul, he can never forget his Saviour, nor be unthankful the rest of his life. When God causes one to understand how Jesus had to suffer for our sins, and lets one feel the death penalty of a lost condition for a time, the dark hours of repentance compare with the sorrow of Jesus, as He hung on the cross.

As He hung on the cross in pain and in anguish until death, so are the hours of true repentance, until our sorrow for sin has caused us to die thereunto. How cleansing this is, when God causes one to feel that, when Jesus cried out with a loud voice in pain, that this had to be done to pay for our sins. And to think, it was our sins that caused the soldier to lift his spear and pierce a large gash in His side, that blood and water should run out of one who was worthy of being called a perfect Lamb of God. True repentance causes one to kneel in sorrow and shame.

Then, as the Lord lay dead in the grave, so we become dead to sin, having no more desire to live in sin, but rather to be alive unto righteousness. Again, as the Lord arose on that first Easter Morn, out of the grave unto a glorious resurrection, where even God sent the angels down into the garden, so it is after the dark hours of repentance are over. God gives the peace that passeth all understanding, and a soul is relieved and forgiven by the Almighty God. How wonderful is the plan of salvation!

Then again, we want to remember the words written in Romans 6:5, "For if we have been planted together in the likeness of his death, we shall be also in the likeness of his resurrection".

As Christ arose out of the grave, so shall we also arise out of the grave and stand before God to give account of this life, on Resurrection Day.

Thanks be to God, that He did not leave His Son lay in the grave, but lifted Him up, a victor over death, sin and the grave. He is now in the heavens, interceding for you and me, when we fall to our knees in prayer.

RESURRECTION AND PEACE

"Why seek ye the living among the dead? He is not here, but is risen . . ."

"This message, heralded by the angels to the women who came to our Saviour's sepulchre early in the morning, was the news the world had been waiting to hear for centuries. It was evidence that He had conquered death and the grave, as He said He would when he walked and talked with his disciples.

It gave His followers, then, and all believers from henceforth, the hope of emerging victorious over death and the grave, through Him. Jesus' own disciples found it hard to believe that through death their Master would be victorious over His enemies and the arch-enemy of our souls. Satan himself. They were yet carnal in some of their aspects of thinking about the resurrection or the possibility of the resurrection of their Lord and Master. They were human, just as we, but the Lord dealt in equity and justice with them, as He yet deals with mankind today. They were given the privilege to see and converse with the resurrected Lord, which to them was the evidence they needed, to be as it were, "a clincher" to their faith in Him.

forgotten. They commemorate His resurrection with a special service on Easter, and that's about it; this is all the meaning any of these two great events have to them.

One cannot fully appreciate Jesus' birth unless he understands this as the beginning of God's presentation to the world of His plan of salvation, nor can he fully appreciate Jesus' death unless he understands this as the finished work of the self-same plan. The understanding of this mystery cometh not by learning according to human wisdom, nor does it come by much studying of Bible history, per se. It is completely separate from anything one can achieve as a result of his quest for knowledge in the human vein. It cometh as a revelation from God, the Father, to those who become willing to be obedient to the doctrine left us by Jesus Christ, who is the author and finisher of our faith.

Disobedience, then, is that which separates man from the full riches of the love of God. We are all, by nature, disobedient to the laws of God; that is why God instituted the new birth of water and the spirit, whereby man could become a new creature in Christ Jesus and not obey the natural lusts and desires of the flesh, but rather allow himself to be led by the Spirit of God. The scripture reminds us, "... as many as are led by the Spirit of God, they are the sons of

God."

Let us rejoice in what the Lord has revealed to us, and by His grace, keep the faith.
