His expressions were a miracle. They were so full of meaning. He seemed to be drifting, somewhere in the Great Beyond, but could always be called back, by calling his name. He heard the angels calling. He saw . . . he didn't say what, but ended his sentence with, "Coming! . . . Coming! . . . Coming!" Was it

his little child?

In death, he left such precious memories. The last 24 hours were spent singing phrases and tunes of hymns, with prayer, and giving some words of care.

His favorite song was, "Nearer My God To Thee". That was the hymn he requested the church brethren to sing for him on Sunday. They came at the lunch hour. Later, he said, "Isn't it wonderful it could be Sunday, so I could hear my favorite song." He also said, "I wonder which of that group will meet me there first?"

On Monday morning, sometime around 9, two of his granddaughters sang, "Nearer My God To Thee", with him. He sang accurate bass.

Later, he began the tune, without words, "All is o'er, the pain and sorrow", one line . . . over and over. Then, the last and final tune. It, too, was one phrase only, repeated over and over, "Come, Come Sweet Death".

About 20 minutes before he passed on, he spoke very distinctly and plain.

"I am going to the fountain of eternal love."

Then . . . in a fading voice, "Won't it be wonderful there?"

At 12:14, Monday noon, he was gone.

Breakfast in a farm house's roomy kitchen, steeping in fragrant food. Nearby were the cellars, where the harvests were stored. Around the large table were seated mother, father, ten children and Uncle Bill, from Illinois. After eating heartily, father took down the Bible and read some, while all little heads were bowed—minds were kept well fed, too.

Then he announced, "Boys, the chores!" Cows were milked by hand and horses harnessed. Everyone was busy with his own activity. Soon all were ready. Excitement was high. You see this was the first day to have services in the new church.

There were rubber-tired buggies, carriages, and wagons with trusty horses, well-groomed and high-spirited, arriving—as the hour for beginning church services neared. Some had walked on that December morning, and some had come on

horseback. Yes, there were some new faces revealed, as the people climbed down from their conveyances. How pleased, the ones who had previously met in homes, for church services, were to see these new families who had just moved in from Iowa. The horse stables were located at the opposite end of the church

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grounds.

There were snow-covered roads and fields on that first Sunday morning, but doors swung widely open, and there was friendly warmth inside. How good it seemed to hear Bro. Fred Koehl speaking in clear and tender tones, teaching a strong faith, deep and true.

Many of the early families immigrated from Switzerland and Germany and settled in this area. The church building remains much the same; the grounds and building have been well preserved.

We learned to appreciate and respect the church from our youth, and this has stayed with me until this day.

It is 68 years this month (August) that I left Monroe County, Ohio.

"Old Church Days Feature"

When the Silver Lining editor (and news correspondent) requested a stroll down memory lane, exploring the old church days, my thoughts were instantly relayed to the little girl who tagged at her mother's heels, hoping for another story. These stories were veritable spiritual treasures, which helped lead me to Jesus! I am thankful that I was able to persuade my dear mother, Sis. Rose Miller, who is one of our older members, to recall a few of them in her own words . . .

"I am asked to write something

of my early Christian life for the Silver Lining. I really don't feel worthy, but in my weakness and with the Lord's help, I will try.

I repented when I was fourteen, and was baptized when I was fifteen years old, by Bro. Henry Souder of Leo.

When I was seventeen, I came to Silverton, Oregon, to my uncle and aunt, Bro. Sam and Sis. Elizabeth Kaser. I soon came to Portland, to do housework, as that is what the sisters did at that time. I found the brothers and sisters very humble and spiritual-minded, as they had gone through many trials during 1905. There were only a few, and at that time they assembled in homes. In 1909, when I came to Portland, they had just finished a small church on 30th and Pine Sts. As some came back, and a few moved out here from the East, we had a nice little church. We were all in peace and unity and full of love. Bro. Rudolph Diriwachter (whom many of you may remember) was our minister at that time.

I can never thank my heavenly Father enough for the great love, mercy, and grace He has given me, to hold fast to the faith. I am now seventy-two, and He has helped me through joy and sorrow. I have found much comfort and strength by reading my Bible and Zion's Harp, which were given to me when I repented.

With God's help I expect to hold fast to our church, respect our

dear elders, and keep close to our dear Saviour, who made all things bearable for me. Now I have that heavenly home to look forward to, for which I thank my dear Lord Jesus day and night." Sis. Rose Steffen Miller.

Later, my mother went back "home" to Elgin, Ill., and after her marriage to my father, the late Bro. Guy Miller, resided in Pulaski and Gridley (Ill.).
