
Be ye not unequally yoked together with unbelievers: for what fellowship hath righteousness with unrighteousness? and what communion hath light with darkness?

The Apostolic Christian Church is not a creedal church, strictly speaking, for we are bound only to the Holy Scripture, and believe it to be the groundwork of our faith. Yet, from time to time since its founding, we have written a confession of our faith.

CHRISTIANITY IN JAPAN

In all countries, there are great many religions, but there has been a tremendous outgrowth of new religions in Japan since World War II because of the new religious freedom. I read that Japan leads the world in police stations and new religions. In regard to Christianity, the number of different groups in Japan are not a few, because this is the first time in history that missionaries could enter this country so freely. I believe that this is indeed a wonderful blessing from the Lord. However, the num-

ber of Christian groups which preach and teach true repentance and the new birth in and through Jesus Christ are so few in comparison with the other. I must wonder why. The crucified Christ is emphasized and revered, but the risen Christ is not emphasized nor embraced. This is one of the biggest reasons why the true faith cannot make very much progress. The gospel is not complete without the resurrection.

Satan is very busy working in the hearts where the risen Christ is ignored. This is especially true because the people of Japan have a feeling of superiority and they are accustomed to the idea of sacrificing one's life for another.

The morals are not based on conscience, but on what is most advantageous for family name and personal reputation. From standpoint of education, there leads to been great changes. However, the old ideas and customs remain. From weddings to funerals, the education of children, parents and relatives is obligations to one an-

other and that the weaker must alys give in to the stronger. A reison that is skillfully melted and adapted to this flourishes. There are some Christian groups who attempt to adapt to the situation in order to be more successful. Nevertheless, there are some who continue to emphasize that there is only one way, one God, one Christ, and who do not attempt to compromise.

When Buddhism came into this country, Buddhists were persecuted by Shintoists, but today Buddhist influence is very great. There is a proverb in Japan, "Give way to that which is long," which means that if something is long, comply with it, even if it is wrong. Therefore, almost all Japanese will laugh off that which they know to be wrong, in order to maintain

"peace." However, Scripture says, "Therefore to him that knoweth to do good, and doeth it not, to him it is sin." James 4:17. This is the outstanding difference between Christianity and other religions.

Most churches in Japan are greatly influenced by strong customs. This also includes the ministers. This is really unfortunate; we must more earnestly seek God's help and guidance.

Our customs have been made by people, but God's Word is from God. To say that noncompliance with God's Word under the circumstances can't be helped is just an excuse.

There are three kinds of people who attend church in Japan. (1) Thinking of Christianity as a means of achieving a higher civilization, they attend out of pride. (Europe and America have a Christian background and are very much advanced,) (2) Some attend because they think that Christianity

is much the same as other religions, offers benefits when in trouble, healing when sick, etc. (3) Others, having truly repented of their sins, having found peace through Christ, they love God and attend church as true believers.

You may feel it strange that I, a Japanese, should have written like this. I, too, feel it somewhat strange. If I had not been associated with American service men and missionaries so much since the end of World War II, I would probably still have the old idea that Japan is the greatest and most perfect country on earth. Earnest reflection causes me to give the preceding analysis.

It is the truth; I cannot help but write it. Of course, I too am a Japanese; I love Japan, and I love the good points of old Japan. I feel we must not lose much of our Japanese traditions. In spite of all difficulties, I am very thankful to have been able to repent and find Christ.
