

The Apostolic Christian Church was first organized in the state of New York, in 1848, and has since been organized in a number of different states.

... adopt opposition to war or participation therein in any form, as a part of its creed according to the teaching of Christ, since its organization.

Foundation and Principal of Church

First of all, a true conversion

from sin to holiness, from darkness to light, and risen with Christ through baptism, and then obey His teachings, and follow Him by His Holy Spirit, which will lead us in all truth if we stay true unto Him.

The following in reference, refer to why we oppose to render such service that would be under the combatant strife of the nation.

- St. Matthew the 5th chapter;
- St. Matthew the 26th chapter, from the 51st and 52nd verse;

St. Luke 3rd chapter, 14th verse; the 6th chapter, from the 27th to the 32nd verse; the 9th chapter, from the 54th to the 57th verse;

Romans: the 12th chapter, from the 19th verse on.

And we believe to honor the laws of our government, as they are ordained to bear the sword not in vain, as we can find in Romans the 13th chapter.

But as to our belief, we as member and faithful attendant of the Apostolic Christian Church shall not use the sword, as we can read in the gospel. It is not our belief to serve in any combatant strife, and has always been the rule of the church according to the teaching of Christ to forbid its members to participate in war.

This record and statement is true to the best of our knowledge and ability.

WE BELIEVE



(From a booklet submitted by Bro. Will Stettner. This was written by Christian Schlipf and dated September 18, 1878.)

"... We believe and confess that Jesus Christ commanded His disciples and followers and all those who believe in Him, those He purchased from the world and redeemed with His blood, that revenge belongs to God and not to man.

He forbade man all revenge, because such does not agree with the teachings of our Lord and Saviour, for mankind should love one another. Christ teaches, Love your enemies; do good unto those who despitefully treat you. Therefore, we as Christ's followers cannot kill our enemies. The word of God teaches, "avenge not yourselves, but rather give place unto wrath: for it is written, Vengeance is mine; I will repay, saith the Lord."

Christ came to bring peace among men, and men should love one another. Because the world does not comprehend God, nor live according to the ways which Jesus Christ taught, there are wars and strifes among nations and peoples,

and it cannot be different as long as mankind does not obey Christ's teachings.

Although the few on earth who believe in Christ cannot take part in such combat but must look to Christ as their example, we do realize that we owe to our honorable government such service as they request of us, if we can serve in a noncombatant way. Where it is asked of us to take up weapons to kill, we cannot serve in such capacity, on account of our faith and conscience, even though we esteem our honorable government.

If we would kill others, we would sin against God and His word, and we do not believe that our honorable government would force us to do such. Rather than to commit sin, we would choose to suffer and wait, until it pleases God to turn the hearts of the government to be favorable to us in such matters.

We will gladly and faithfully perform any duties which the government lays upon our brothers whose lot it becomes to serve in the army in a noncombatant capacity. As our government has had proof since the years 1847 and 1850 and in

more recent years, some of our brothers served their allotted time in the army, and were released with a very good record, although on account of their faith they did not bear arms. It is not on account of malice or disobedience; therefore, God will look graciously upon us.

Should the government grant us these favors, we will accept them thankfully from our honorable

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government, which we esteem and onor very highly, and also thank god for His grace if He can lead the hearts of our government according to His will. However, should our honorable government refuse, and not be willing to grant us these favors, we will not sin against our

God and His commandment, and there would be nothing else for us to do but take the consequences, suffering if need be.

We had the highest crest in history, when it rose to 24.8 ft., but it would have been much higher if the levees had held. So far, we have had three major levee breaks within approximately 20 miles, all on the Illinois side of the river. About 25,000 acres are flooded, all rich bottom land. The levee protecting the West Quincy and Taylor bottom, where many farmers from our congregation live, has been rebuilt since the 1960 flood. It was still necessary to patrol day and night, when a boil or a ground hog hole needed to be taken care of. However, the district to the north had a weak levee and has given much anxiety, as it threatened to break several times, but is still holding at this time.

With the first crest, a levee north of Quincy gave way, but for the time being they were able to keep it from flooding the southern part of the district. HISTORY (Oakville)

The following early history of the Oakville church was written by our friend, John Kuntz, 85 years old. He and his wife, Sister Lydia (Rein), now live in Burlington and attend the Burlington church.

In the year of 1900, the government finished the levce along the Mississippi River with horses and scrapers. In 1901, the land agents got busy and listed all the land they could along the Mississippi River, and sold it from \$40 to \$75 per acre. At that time, my father, Christian Kuntz, bought our first farm at \$60 per acre, near Oakville.

Coming from Gridley (Ill.) were the Christian Kuntzs and their children, John, Joseph, Samuel, Mary, Jacob, David, Daniel, Elizabeth, Lena, Emma, Christ, and Amelia. Other families were the Fred Donner family and their children, Edward, Emma, and Dena; Jacob Yergler and his sons, John and Jacob, the Henry Gerst family and her father, Christian Rich; Dan Mangold; the John Stoller family; the Cramer boys, Joe and Gene; the Theophil Binkle family; the Andrew Yackley family; the Peter Glaser's; the William Frank family; the Daniel Kempf family; John Ellenson and Henry Ellenson, Herman Neust and John Neust, Paul Gerber and his family.

We organized to build a new church in the fall of 1903 on the Otto Gerst farm, east of the David Sheridan farm. Otto Gerst donated one acre. (He was our song leader for many years.) In the fall of 1903, the new church was built. Until the church was built, we would gather in one another's homes and sing. As we did not have any minister at that time, one of the members would read a chapter in the Bible. Henry Gerst was chosen to read the Bible and review the Holy Woto the congregation.

In the spring of 1904, other families moved to Oakville, including the Albert Reiman family. He was one of our ministers. Other families moving at that time were the Albert Rauhaus and the George Heinold families. Land owners not living in Oakville were Fred Bleuer, Jacob Wuttrick, Theophil Steffen and others.
