COMMUNION

From the days of Moses onward, God had instituted certain memorials that were to be exercised, so that His people would not forget what great things He did for them.

One of these is the "Passover", which commemorates the deliverance of Israel from death, the night that the firstborn in every home in Egypt was slain. The assurance that they would escape was based upon the blood of the lamb upon the upper sill and 2 sideposts of their houses, and that they would not go out of their houses until morning.

They were commanded to keep the Passover each year as prescribed, and they were to tell their children of how God had delivered them from death on that terrible night.

By the divine direction of God, it was timed that the true Lamb of God would be slain at Calvary at the precise time of the Passover season. He was now the true Lamb of God, and no longer was the Paschal lamb needed, to be offered. As was the Passover, the offering up of the Lamb of God was to provide a way to escape eternal death and judgment.

The night the Lord was betrayed, after the usual Passover observance, He instituted the Holy Supper. By using the bread to represent His body, and the fruit of the vine His blood, He gave the pattern as to how this should be carried out.

First, He took bread and gave thanks, and brake it and gave unto them, saying, This is my body which is given (broken) for you; this do in remembrance of me.

Likewise also the cup after supper, saying, This is the New TestaAbove all, God is in the picture. He breathed the breath of life. We are of Him. Once we went away. When He returned us to Him. and came Himself to dwell, our life became hid in His. We live in heavenly continent in our heart. Trusting, our life is guided and enriched above the expectations of human thought.

All that we do can be done unto Him. Work, for the night cometh when no man can work.

ment in my blood that is shed for you.

In the light of this simple but sacred exercise, we must accept it that the main objective was that, throughout future generations of the New Testament church, the believers were to observe it so as to remember what He has done for us.

Later on, the apostle Paul, I Corinthians 11 writes, "For I have received of the Lord . . .", making it clear that the high apostle was to provide the church with guidelines as to the proper approach to the Holy Sacrament.

He placed the Holy Sacrament in its proper perspective, being entirely separate from their social events, with which the Corinthians had combined it.

He also exhorted that each one "examine himself", and then let him eat. So, a self examination of one's self is a condition to partaking of Holy Communion. While it is true that the feast should not be held "with the leaven of malice and wickedness", I Corinthians 5:8, (which in itself suggests a recon-

cilation with anyone for whom we bear malice, also a bringing to light any wickedness, in order to escape partaking unworthily, which would bring damnation instead of blessing), in the statement, to examine one's self, certainly gives us no right to examine someone else.

It is utterly unscriptural to use the approach to Communion as means to sanctify our brother and compel him to yield to a reconciliation.

We must not lose sight of the real purpose of Holy Communion, to remember the Lord's death and suffering. If we do this sincerely & humbly, the blessed result will be a renewal of our love to Him, a feeling of humility and gratitude, which begets a renewed love to those who are His brothers and sisters.

The Lord knew the weakness of our human instincts, that we are so inclined to give ourselves credit of having been obedient and pious. He feared that we might allow a buildup of self righteousness, and forget that only through His suffering and by His grace we are what we are . . . So this remembering Him was to empty us of all self, and give open recognition that it is not that we love Him, but that He loved us and gave Himself for us.

Thus, together renewed in spirit, we leave behind us our struggles, and move on toward the goal.
