(Upon request, Sis. Minnie Aeschliman has supplied some information about their son Bro. Dale. His beautiful, touching life has left a trail of courage for us, following not too far behind.

The editor.)

We quote from a letter, written from Camp Shelby, Mississippi. The date, May 15, 1941. It is written to his father and mother, Bro. Sam and Sis. Minnie.

"Dear Folks, It is now 8:30 . . . It was my turn to scrub the floor . . . I and Homer (Bro. Homer Reineck) read the letters I received today . . . (Johns' had a dollar bill in the letter. They shouldn't have done it. They are too good to

. . . since I have been carrying the rifle, I never felt right; always from time to time I had a heavy feeling. I made myself clear about using it, but I still couldn't see why I should be drilling. When I get the letter you sent me, I got busy again and thought that I would see the captain again . . . I just happened to see Laurin (Bro. Laurin Bertsch), and we talked things over a little, and I told him that I was going to have something done. He said he got to see the chaplain, the one who is a major, and he was awful nice . . . he was not in, so I didn't know what to do.

Lt. Denboe was in; he is also a chaplain . . . He was not a pleasant man to talk to at all concerning our belief. I finally made up my mind I would talk to him, because I wanted to get it off my mind and could not rest till something was

I went in and told him about my work the last few weeks and that I thought this wasn't at all non-combatant work. He asked me where I got this, that I wanted non-combatant work. I told him about, "Thou shalt not kill."

He told me . . . I was entirely wrong. Oh, I prayed that the dear Lord would have things all come

out all right, and that I could stand my ground and not be ashamed of my belief ...

He asked me if we had any money . . . I told him I didn't care about the money part of it at all, and I was no coward, that I would do any kind of work, and even work on the front if they asked it of me, as long as it was non-combatant. He said he still thought I was asking the other man to take my place; I said I had a card that gave me the privilege of having non-combatant work. He asked to see it, and we talked a long time

"And the four and twenty elders and the four beasts fell down and worshipped God that sat on the throne, saying, Amen; Alleluia.

And a voice came out of the throne, saying, Praise our God, all ye his servants, and ye that fear him, both small and great.

And I heard as it were the voice of a great multitude, and as the voice of many waters, and as the voice of mighty thunderings, saying, Alleluia: for the Lord God omnipotent reigneth.

Let us be glad and rejoice, and give honour to him: for the marriage of the Lamb is come, and his wife hath made herself ready.'

. . I told him that we had folks in the other war, and they are as respected as any citizen that we have in Bluffton . . . He said, Are you sure you aren't yellow? I told him I was not. He said, Think it over, and I am telling you just like I would tell my own son. I told him that one thing they could never make me do is kill anyone. I said this is one thing you can't make me

This morning, I went out to the field till 9:00, and I went to my 1st Lieut. and told him about it, and that I would like to go and see the major before dinner. This was the first time I talked to him about this, and he said I had better wait till noon, because maybe I couldn't find him, and at noon he would get me a special appointment. After dinner, we were just lined to go on the hike, and he called me to the side and told me to stay with the company till Monday morning, and he would have something else for me. So at last I guess the time has

"... give my greetings to all the dear brothers and sisters in faith you wish to tell. I often think of them. So will close with love to all, and may God be with us till we meet again."

(Life's changing pattern comes. Bro. Dale goes across. His unchanging, dauntless courage and love toward the goal is a tower that beacons out victory to us.)

"Jan. 12, 1943. Somewhere At

To The Loved Ones At Home We are now many days at sea; Our destination is unknown to me, But whether I'm on sea or land, I'll put my trust in Jesus' hand.

I've left the home I love so well And more dear friends than I could tell.

But even though I'm far away, My thoughts will be with you always.

Sometimes I sigh at all this strife That's come to pass in my young

Then I think how many more Have bore a heavier cross before.

Oh our dear Saviour suffered great pain,

But did He murmur or complain? He bore His cross and victory won. He said, Not mine, Thy will be done.

At night when I lie down to sleep, I ask in prayer that He will keep Us from all evil and from harm And protect us with His mighty

I ask that He will safely bring Us to our friends and home again, Back to the harbor we left before, Where we'll see lights along the shore.

There is another harbor though Where we will all wish to go, And oh what glorious joy 'twill be To anchor there so safe and free.

Dear Folks: While we are sailing on at sea, I wrote this little poem, which I'm sending you . . . Love, Dale".

(A few words are penned at the top of another letter, "His last letter home to Sam and I".)

"Philippine Islands . . . Dear Folks: Just a few lines this evening to leave you know I'm okay. I received Mom's letter of December 27 a few days ago. Dad's letter of January 3 arrived before Mom's.

It's hot and sultry here tonight. I suppose quite different from

home . . .

Mom, you mentioned how you often wonder where I'm at and what I'm doing. Don't worry about me, Mom. We'll just hope and pray everything will turn out okay, and that before too long we'll all be together again. After all it doesn't matter so much what happens if we are prepared to die, does it? I have so many weaknesses and shortcomings yet, but will try and each day serve my God a little better, and learn to know him more and more . Give my hearty greetings to all. Love, Dale."

A few more penned words, "The tele. we rec'd Mar. 10, 1945".
"Mrs Minnie M Aeschliman . .

your son technician third grade Dale H Aeschliman was killed in action thirty one January on Luzon

A Letter

Dear Mrs. Aeschliman: . . . On the night of 1 Feb. 1945 our battalion bivouacked at the entrance to Zig Zag Pass . . . Just at dusk Dale was returning to his foxhole, after treating a sick man. A shot rang out on a nearby hill, and Dale

Dale was one of the best liked men in the organization. Dale had been with us all the time we were overseas. When the boys had something wrong that didn't require the doctor's presence, they always asked for Aesch. His cheerful disposition and eagerness to help others won him a host of friends. If our

wishes could help, Aesch would be back with us . . . Robert C. Thomas. Captain, Infantry, Commanding."

Another letter . .

"Dear Mrs. Aeschliman: Last January, your son Dale gave us his Bible for safekeeping during our operation. The other day we found his Bible and two songbooks with our equipment . . . Dale was a fine Christian, and he devoted himself to reading his Bible at every opportunity. His cheerful Christian living was an inspiration to those who knew him . . . Cullen B. Jones, Chaplain (Capt.) USA, Regimental Chaplain."

And still another . . .

"Dear Mrs. Aeschliman . . . I can tell you that Dale was liked by all the men in his outfit, and he faced the task before him like a man. I know I can't express in words the way I feel about Dale's death, so I will not try, and I think you will understand . . . Yours, Robert Gei-

STANDING STANCH IN THE SERVICE, WORLD WAR 1

Macon, in the South, was then a city of approximately 15,000. A young brother, Harry Bucher, had been sent here for army training. Being away from home, he was lonesome.

One day . . . perhaps a Saturday . . . he looked down the street. He saw a man. He thought it looked like his father, Brother Bucher. Yes, it was that dear face that meant so much for him. Bro. Bartel Rapp and he had come. What joy to meet those for whom our hearts long.

Permission was granted by the brigadier general to hold a meeting. One or more of the boys secured a hotel room. They gathered to-

gether.

Some of the boys brought Zion's Harp hymnals in German. (Bro. Harry had brought a gospel hymn.) When it was time, Bro. Rapp pulled out his German scriptures.

Bro. Harry had a uneasy feeling. Most of the services were held. When it was time for the last song, the door swung abruptly open.

There were two military police, and two civilian police. The MP's took the four boys, locked them up. The civilian police took Bros. Rapp and Bucher.

Paul and Silas sang praises in the prison. Bro. Harry Bucher brought along his Gospel Hymnbook. There, on the floor of that military prison, they sang hymns.

Bro. Harry was led out. The questioning included about the services and the German hymnal. Then, he was put back in the cell. Before too long, they were released. Bros. Rapp and Bucher were also released by the police.

In his days in the army, he suffered other things, also. Calm and confidence in faith, he stood firm. The Lord gave grace and an answer at all times.

SHALL I ENTER AS A NON-COMBATANT?

Written by a World War II Veteran

"Ye have heard that it hath been said, An eye for an eye, and a tooth for a tooth: But I say unto you . . . Love . . ." To Peter He said, Put up thy sword into the sheath: for all they that take the sword shall perish with the sword.

John answered the soldiers, "Do violence to no man, neither accuse

any falsely . . . ''

Life has many decisions man must face, and many times it is hard for a person to decide which way to go. This is especially true when a young man receives his induction notice, stating he is to be drafted into military service.

Many of the boys in this country have learned the ten commandments when they went to Sunday School, and all can well remember No. 6, "Thou shalt not kill." This truly must place a conviction into every heart, that it is wrong to take another man's life. Then on the other hand, Satan (the author of pride) will say to you, What will your friends and neighbors say, when they hear that you desire to enter the military service as a noncombatant." This voice, my dear friend, do not listen to, for surely you can serve in the armed forces without carrying a weapon. (Note: for every ten soldiers, it takes seven to service and supply three fighting men.) There will be a place for you in the military, and you can still serve your country and be a good citizen.

Now may I relate some of my experiences as a soldier in World War II, for in sharing our experiences, we may help someone in a similiar situation. I registered with my draft board as a non-combatant, and was given a classification as such (I-AO) ... then was inducted, and went to the Reception Center. From there, the draftees are sent to different camps throughout the

country. I was not a converted man at this time, but still had the convictions that I wanted non-combatant duty.

The officers at the Reception Center wanted to test my sincerity. and sent me to an Infantry Basic Training Center, where I took my 6 weeks of Infantry training. (I was supposed to be placed in a non-combatant organization) . . . then to another camp, to join a regular Infantry Division, which was to be

my permanent outfit.

During this time, my parents were much concerned that I did not make more of an effort to be transferred to a non-combatant unit. which gradually inspired me to start working on a transfer, with the help of our battalion chaplain. He was a kind and considerate man, and helped as much as he could. He went to Division Headquarters and arranged a meeting for me with the staff officers of the personnel

There, the officers tried to convince me that I was wrong for not taking up arms to defend my country. The 1-AO draft card was presented, plus the Act of Congress paper, which our corresponding elder (during World War II) sent me. (Taken from 76th Congress, 3rd session, Chapter 720, Public No. 783 (a) sec. 5 (g). Upon presenting these papers, the officers said, "Put him in the medical detachment of his own outfit."

It would have been much easier to be transferred to a new outfit, because of the ridicule and snide remarks from the men . . . But this all brought me closer to the Lord. I received training now as a medical aid man, was told how important it is to be a good aid man, also of responsibilities. It was impressed, that job was very dangerous!

Then, on the last furlough before

going overseas I could finally surrender self, sought the Lord in repentance, and was taken into the precious and holy faith. What a relief to know that I was reconciled with my God. When we entered battle, one could feel that should it be God's will to take me from this life, I was ready to go.

Things were real now, and serious, in battle. The medical corps men were really praised, -not that we wanted it, but what a vast difference from in the States, where we were called "Pill rollers" etc. Over there, it seems all the fellows want the aid men to be their best friend.

Any soldier that does his training conscientiously will answer when duty calls. So it was with me, to try always to do my part as a good soldier, obeying all orders.

One early morning, our company was attacked, and under heavy enemy fire, two of our men were wounded from machine gunfire. The call for a medic was sounded, and as was drilled in us previously, knew I must answer the call for duty. It was frightening, but I left my covered position, and crossed approximately 40 yards of open ground to bind the wounds of two comrades.

After the attack, our officers from the line company said, "You could have waited until the attack eased off before going out to aid the men". This act was put down for a citation, and later received a medal for heroic achievement. Never after that was heard one more remark about being a slacker,

So you see, one can enter into the military service as a non-combatant and still do your part, serving your country. Thanks and praise be to God, that we live under such a benevolent government.

Thank God, by his grace I could listen, and no one could talk me out of it again. I still get much strength from hymns which are a message from God's Word.
