"Beloved Brother in Christ. Greetings in our Lord. I am enclosing parts of a letter from Bro. Willis Ehnle, dated 11/9, that Bro. Schrock has recommended be given consideration for publication . . . " (The foregoing words were from Bro. Ben Maibach, Detroit.)

In Japan, there are temptations to no longer bear one another's burdens, to no longer believe one another, to no longer maintain an uplifting hope, and to no longer endure those things which confront us, but the love of God throws out all these temptations and holds forth a victory in the end through our Lord, Jesus Christ.

Bros. Noah Schrock and Ben Maibach left last evening for their return trip to the United States. They are no doubt in Portland now, as transportation nowadays is very fast indeed. The brothers spent 16 days with us. The first few days were spent in Tokyo, where we counselled together con-cerning the word of God and putting it into practice in the church. The next couple of days our two visitors and I visited Sis. Atsumi Takai and her husband in Osaka. We rode on the new Tokaido line, the world's fastest train; the brothers were amazed at the smoothness of the ride. In Osaka, Mr. Takai asked if they were going to start any more churches in Japan, and indicated they would like us to have meetings in Osaka. Thus, it has come about that one of us brothers from Tokyo is to go to Osaka once a month to hold a meet-

"From Osaka we went to Kofu, a city of about 200,000 people, in the vicinity of our two churches. One week was spent with our country churches, most of the time being spent in personal conversation with individuals.

"Takeshita-san had a long visit

with the brothers, at which time I interpreted.

"It was decided that someone should live in the Shioda church beside Sis. Asakawa. If God is willing, my family will move out there, and Bro. John Klaus' family will move to our Tokyo church. Bro. John has some nice meetings out at Fuchu, where he lives now, but he can still keep up these meetings from here—as it is only about 15 minutes away by car.

From here on, the lines are from Bro. Ben Maibach of Detroit.

"Bro. Noah Schrock and I made the long trip to visit our brethren and friends in the Orient, leaving home October 19. We spent the evening with the brethren from the California churches at Altadena, where services were well attended, then departed for Honolulu, where we spent a night and changed planes, leaving the following day for Tokyo. Although the plane was scheduled for a stop at Wake, it was bypassed. We arrived at Haneda the evening of Friday, October 22, having lost a day crossing the International Date Line. We were warmly welcomed at the airport with many tears and kind embraces. Saturday, October 23, we went to Fuchu, where Bro. John Klaus holds Sunday School services in the afternoon; then on Sunday services were held at the Tsutsujiga-oka church.

After several interviews and counselling with brethren and friends, we left October 28 for Osaka, making the 350 mile trip in about 4 hours. We were very pleasantly surprised and encouraged to hear a request from Sis. Atsumi's husband for the Apostolic Christian Church doctrine to be preached, because he and a group of about 15 souls had become very disillusioned with the nominal Christian church, and it was evident to him that his wife had a faith that was much more substantial than that to which he had been exposed.

WHILE YOU

(The following was submitted by Bro. Herman Norr. A beloved brother and elder, John Bahler of Rockville, puts forth the way he feels. It behooves us all to gain the greatest treasures that will meet us on the other shore.)

Does it surprise you to learn that the Believer will not be rewarded for what he leaves in a will? It sounds that way according to II Corinthians 5:10.

At the judgment seat of Christ, Paul says, Each Believer will receive the things done in the body.

A will is of no effect while the testator lives; it is a mere scrap of paper. It costs the testator nothing to will it. He sacrifices nothing. The report comes out that . . . so and so . . . died. How much did he leave? He left it all. He had no choice about leaving it, and he left everything . . . But it was only after the man left the body that the will was in effect. The man gave nothing.

Of course, it is often necessary for Believers to retain certain properties during their lifetime and to will them to heirs or to God's work. We are aware of this. However, there is no sacrificing for Christ after death. That must be done in the body, and that is what brings the reward.

APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN CHURCH — WORLD RELIEF

A meeting of the A. C. C. World Relief Committee was held at Rittman on Nov. 17. All committee members and a goodly number of Treasurer representatives and guests were present.

The Treasurers report stated that \$76,221 was contributed by the churches, as of Nov. 6 The committee is grateful to those that contributed to this worthwhile cause.

Projects sponsored were

A. Food, Clothing and Christmas bundles to the starving and needy.

B. Self-Help — through distribution of cattle, pigs, goats, rabbits and chickens, Agricultural handtool kits, needle trade kits, sewing machines, woodworking kits etc. to the needy, to enable them to help themselves.

C. Medical — support to hospitals abroad where emergencies

developed.

D. Education — Two schools and classroom equipment, enabling over 200 children to attend school that would not have been able to without your help.

E. Distribution of \$38,800 was made in the U.S. to victims of flood and tornado. Many families lost leved ones and all earthly possessions.

The need for help is increasing daily. In many countries, 50% of the people die of Malnutrition. Refugees in Vietnam has increased from 80,000 at the beginning of the year to about 750,000 at the end, because of the escalation of the military activities.

Your committee, with the help of the Almighty God, plan to continue distribution where help is needed most, in the categories of starving, medical, self-help education.

To assist in this worthy cause the following additional members were appointed to the committee—Bros. Francis Rother, Morton, Arthur Leuthold, Ellsworth (Minn.), and Arthur Gasser (Smithsville, Ohio). They, along with Bros. Herman Kellenberger, Elgin (Ill.), Henry Beer, Milford, Arthur Gudeman, La Crosse, Wendell Gudeman, Francesville and Herman Norr, Leo, comprise the committee.

Collection of used clothing and Christmas bundle preparation was

explained.

Sisters Maryann and Millie Fischer, Roanoke, gave a very interesting presentation on salvaging of used clothing and the development and operation of sewing groups.


