Conclusion

It is very evident that the formality (existing on some of the early trips we had made) is completely broken down; openly and unashamedly many of the Japanese wept as we departed. This important break-through reveals that our loved ones in Japan make the same emotional experience as we do in America, contrary to popular belief.

As the plane left Haneda at 8 p.m., about 25 dear souls waved frantically. We began the scheduled 8½-hr. flight, nonstop to Seattle. In 1958, approximate time to fly from Tokyo to Los Angeles was 30 hours, and required two stops; on

this trip over the Polar route, the actual flying time was less than 8 hours. We arrived safely in Seattle at a quarter till twelve, Monday, Nov. 8, eight hours earlier by the calendar than we had left Tokyo, due to the fact, that in crossing the International Date Line we had gained a day. As soon as we had cleared customs, we departed for Portland, where we were met by Bro. Robert Miller. Services were held at the Portland Church Monday evening.

Tuesday morning we departed for Chicago, where Bro. Schrock was met by Bro. Al Fisher, who transferred him to Aurora (where he could make his trip by train to Burlington). I proceeded to Detroit to meet my loved ones.

We certainly appreciated the prayers and support of all the brethren and friends who committed us to Almighty God for wisdom, guidance, and protection. We are both agreed that our trip was a blessed one and most essential. We were particularly grateful for the cooperation of all the Japanese brethren and Bro. Willis Ehnle, and have pledged our continued support, and have assured them that brethren will make annual visits as long as they are requested and necessary, and were particularly encouraged to see several young fathers in attendance at the services, who seem to be quite interested. It is our earnest prayer that God will bless these struggling pilgrims in this far-off nation.

May the Lord continue to

Although it was announced at the meeting and is in the memorandum, unfortunately many of our brethren are not aware of this change, and consequently are forwarding their contributions to Bro. Schrock at Burlington, Iowa. This requires that he countersign them, mail them to me, where they have to be resigned again and then deposited in the bank here. Then I acknowledge each contribution. It is not only a delay, but requires duplication and the possibility of losing some of these funds. Checks should be made payable to the Apostolic Christian Mission Fund, sent to me at either my home, preferably, or at our church in Detroit. Individuals may request specific payment of their funds or a portion thereof to a particular work, but in general we apply it to the general fund. Withdrawals are made after the elders who serve on that committee give their approval, or have given their approval in the past. The monies in this fund are used to carry on the work in the Orient, in Alabama, and San Antonio, or wherever it is felt that the elder brethren can support the work. . . . Ben Maibach.
