I am so thankful for His love and grace in my afflictions, and for the love and happiness I found each day for all these years. His help has carried me through in sorrow and joy. My prayer is that everyone would have this joy and hope of salvation. May He abide with you and yours always, and grant you much wisdom and understanding to do His will.

My dear Bobby—Like all the others, dear son, I love you, so thankful you are a good son. Have been so thankful to have you close to us, and appreciate all you have done for us. God bless you, and keep you in His loving care. Watch and Pray.

My dear Jeanne—I am trying to write a few lines to each of you dear ones . . . I am so thankful for God's grace and help each day. Without His help I could not make it. I want so much for you to accept our dear Lord through repentance. This is the only way to find true happiness in sorrow especially, and in joy too. In the history of Israel, the land of Egypt represents the world. The Hebrew people as slaves were typical of the sinner in bondage under the law.
