WHY READ THE BIBLE

(Concluded)

We who are prepared go in the rapture. Jesus explained in Luke 21, verse 36, that we shall be "worthy to escape".

The Lord, on his white horse, leads the saints back to the earth. Revelation 19, "... the armies which were in heaven followed him upon white horses, clothed in fine linen, white and clean." The Lord will come back to earth to smite the nations and to rule them with a rod of iron. (Read Revelation 19, from verse 16 to end.)

Satan is taken to the bottomless pit, and tied with a chain for 1,000 years. The souls who refused to accept the mark of the beast and were martyred by the antichrist and his evil band will be resurrected. Resurrected saints will reign with Christ (Revelation 20:4). Read Isaiah 11.

After the 1,000 years, Satan will be loosed for a season (Revelation 20:3). During the millennium, Christ will reign in Jerusalem, and with the people hold the feast of the tabernacles (see the prophet Zechariah 14:16-19). After the millennium will come the second resurrection (Revelation 20:5). There will be 1,000 years between the first resurrection (the rapture), and the second.

Satan will be loosed for a season to deceive the nations of the earth. He will gather his followers with him (Revelation 20:8). Satan will be loosed to separate the faithful from the unfaithful. Fire comes down from God to devour the unfaithful ones (Revelation 20:9).

Satan will be cast into the lake of fire, where the beast and the false prophet are.

Now the great white throne will be established. God will judge. All the unsayed, according to their works (Revelation 20:12,13), will be cast into the lake of fire (Revelation 20:14).

Those judged at the great white throne will find out what their punishment will be, according to their works. While all of the unbelievers will be cast into the same lake of fire, it is easy for God to make one portion hotter. It would not be like God to punish a small sinner as severely as a real wicked one. We can read several places in the Bible where there will be a difference in the punishment, the same as there will be a difference in the rewards of the saints. Christ spoke in Luke 12, verses 47 and 48, about this difference.

Now comes the new heaven and the new earth, where all the converted and faithful souls will live forever. Revelation, chapter 21, tells a great deal about the new heaven and the new earth. It would be well to read the whole chapter, and also chapter 22. It will be a perfect place. Revelation 21, verse 4 says, "And God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes; and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying, neither shall there be any more pain: for the former things are passed away."

A good description of the new heaven and new earth is given in chapters 21 and 22. I'll only quote the size of it. It will be about 1400 miles long, 1400 miles wide and 1400 miles high. Words cannot explain what a wonderful place it will be. We can read in I Corinthians 2, verse 9, "But as it is written, Eye hath not seen, nor ear heard, neither have entered into the heart of man, the things which God hath prepared for them that love him." We'll just have to wait until we get there to see how really wonderful a place it will be.

Isn't it worth reading the Bible

daily, praying daily to the Lord for help and guidance, if we can finally inherit such a wonderful place, if we remain obedient, true, and faithful to God's word to the end? Let's refer back to Amos 8, verses 11-13, where it explains how terrible it will be for the unconverted, already in the tribulation. These same people heard or could hear the true word of God and could have repented.

All unbelievers will finally be cast into the lake of fire. This is not a consuming fire as we have here today, where we put a piece of wood into the fire, and it burns up. The lake of fire is a non-consuming fire. Those who go there will burn and keep on burning, and will never be burned up. For how long? For eternity!

It is hard to explain eternity, but how much longer that is, than our life here on earth, which the Bible explains to be threescore and ten, or 70 years. A brother, years ago in a sermon, tried to explain eternity in this way. He said, "If a bird picked up a grain of sand in the Pacific Ocean and flew with it to the Atlantic Ocean, and then went back to the Pacific for another grain . . . when the time would come that all the sand from the Pacific would have been carried to the Atlantic, eternity would only have begun.

Let us all be encouraged with great zeal to read the Bible, pray, and be obedient to our dear, merciful Lord, who did so much for us, so we can reach our heavenly home, instead of being cast into the lake of fire. It is the Lord's will that all shall be saved, and not one lost.

Those who have neglected to read the Bible will surely be sorry some day.



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MY EXPERIENCES IN A COMMUNIST PRISON IN YUGOSLAVIA

[Continued from Last Month]

I then told her of my experience during the night. She then said, "Father, I begged the guard to take one of my blankets over to you to keep you from getting cold, because I had two blankets." She also gave me a few handkerchiefs and a piece of soap, and then I went to my cell again.

We were then put into the main prison. Our daughter was placed in the women's prison, about four miles from where I was. In my prison room, there was only room for about 20, yet we were 125. The space for one prisoner was only about 16 inches in width, hardly room to move—we were lying there like "herring in cans"—one, one way, and the other the opposite. It was full of lice . . . And, what made it especially bad was because they had put thieves and murderers in with us, and if one got against them or bumped them a little, they began to "cuss" and "swear", which hurt us even more.

Next to me lay Bro. Oberman, the elder who recently died at Bahlingen — Elder Bro. Franz of the Hungarian language. . . . One Sunday (he was so sad) said to me, "Bro. Henry, we will never get out of here alive again." Then I said, "Listen to me; the people of this world often spend all of their wealth for their children's education, and here we are in the very 'Highest School', all free of charge. Do we have reasons to complain"? Then he said to me, "You are right." In such ways we tried to comfort one another in our sorrow.

We were always to take our cap off when meeting a policeman. Once I missed doing it, for which I was immediately led away, and was taken down into a deep, cement room. It was winter, and it was cold. In the evening two policemen came and stripped me of all my clothing except my underwear and socks. I had to sit this way in the cold all night. I took one of my socks off to lean on, and the other I kept exchanging, from one foot to the other, trying to keep warm all night long.

In this distress I prayed to God and said, "LORD, Thou hast been able to bring Thy three servants out of the fiery furnace; now please drive the cold out of here and keep me from harm." The next morning about nine o'clock the police brought me my clothing again and took me back to the brothers. The brothers asked me, "Where were you? We saw when they took you away, and we prayed for you all night long . . . And just look at yourself, how blue you are all over." I told them, "Yes, I know I am blue from the cold but it does not hurt me at all."

From there I was led to another room, where beside me was a captain of King Peter's Army. He said to me, "Mr. Mueller, if you want to write a letter to your daughter, I will take it with me and hand it

to her." I spoke of the danger if he should get caught with it. He said, "Just write, and I'll take the responsibility." He really got the letter to her.

Another time, he asked me again to write to my daughter, because he was going over. I again warned him. He again said the same words about letting it be his responsibility.

This time he met up with a woman in the yard. Thinking it was a woman prisoner, he gave her my letter, but she happened to be a policewoman and reported him at once. He was questioned, then he came back to me and told me of the trouble he was in. He no more than had it said, when the police came to get him. I was questioned by a tall young man. He asked me if I had written the letter, and I said "Yes". He asked me to read the letter, so he could write it. I did.

The letter read: "Dear child. be submissive to the government, for there is no government that is not ordained by God, and as soon as the government is convinced that we are innocent, they will set us free."

Since I had written in this particular way, he did not criticize it. He, too, knew why I was in prison. As he looked at me he said, "Do you believe that Jesus is coming again?" I told him Jesus will surely come again, but not in a manger. but for judgment. He asked me if Jesus would also judge those who had judged me. I said, "If their judgment was unrighteous, then He will judge them." Then his eyes filled with tears. He asked me again, "Do you for sure believe that Jesus is coming?" I said. "I am steadfast to believe He is coming." He then begged me to forgive him his transgression, and promised he would never again cause me trouble. He said, "Go on", and did not report me. Again I could clearly see how the good Lord had stepped in the middle, and brought fear into a heart because of the coming judgment.

With me in my room I had six German generals and other officers, also King Peter's two guardians. King Peter was still a minor. so he had to have two guardians.
