THANKSGIVING

Thanksgiving is the grace of God operating in the soul of a believer. The word of God is the place to look, how we can best pour out thankful hearts to Him.

"Thanks be unto God for His unspeakable gift", precious, beyond telling. Gratitude connects every good gift, every perfect gift with the gift of Christ. Thanksgiving redounds to God for all things; "in every thing give thanks". The rejoicing we have in the Lord and the everlasting consolation make every possible variety of dispensation a token of good. The Christian privilege is to find reason for gratitude in all things, "for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning you".

One of the precious things given is that our government has given our sons the privilege of doing noncombatant duties. How good this is, they can without interference obey the command of God to "Do violence to no man". When called on to carry stretchers, they can without great fear go out into the battlefields to pick up the wounded and bring them back to safety.

Being thankful to God began in the early days of God's true people. Read the "Song of Moses", sung to God after the passage of the Red Sea. They were thankful for all things the Lord had done. Read about Deborah's praise to the Lord, and of Hannah. "My heart rejoiceth in the LORD..." Samuel was born in answer to prayer. This was such a great joy, but Hannah knew what to thank the Lord for first. It was for her salvation.

I Chronicles 16: "O give thanks unto the LORD; for he is good; for his mercy endureth for ever. . . . And all the people said, Amen, and praised the LORD."

"At midnight Paul and Silas prayed, and sang praises unto God: and the prisoners heard them." This encourages us to thank God day and night, under any circumstances. It can be a great influence, even as to the jailer.

Ephesians 5, ". . . Speaking to yourselves in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody in your hearts to the Lord". I Peter 2: ". . . ye are a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, an holy nation, a peculiar people", which m e a n s a special people, "that ye should shew forth the praises of him who hath called you out of darkness into his marvelous light".

Let us count our blessings. Those who were born in this great country too often take for granted the freedom we have. All we need to hear to make us partly realize what religious freedom is, is to listen to displaced persons tell of the whippings and other mistreatments received.

We can be assured of God's will concerning thanksgiving, "For all things are for your sakes, that the abundant grace might through the thanksgiving of many redound to the glory of God." How many can from experience say that great sorrow has befallen, which we could hardly take at the time? Afterwards we can thank God. We learned to be humble. It brought us close to the Lord. We received more faith in prayer. It is good that we could see how well our Lord meant it.

II Corinthians, ". . . Being enriched in every thing to all bountifulness, which causes through us thanksgiving to God." Paul was teaching about the value of giving. A precious promise given is, "He which soweth sparingly shall reap also sparingly; and he which soweth bountifully shall reap also bountifully."

"Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give; not grudgingly, or of necessity: for God loveth a cheerful giver." May not such a one be sure that he shall be a gainer? Are not the love and favor of God better than all other things, better than life itself? He can cause us to have sufficiency. The honor is lasting, the reward eternal. Works of charity make us truly rich. If we think them to be saints of t h e household of faith whose wants are great, how ready should we be to do them good.

True Christianity is yielding ourselves to the commanding influence of truth. Sincerity is shown by works. This will be for the credit of our profession, to the praise and glory of God.

In Philippians, the Apostle tells, "Be careful for nothing; but in every thing by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God." Do not fret or have any anxiety about anything. In everything, by definite requests with thanksgiving, continue to make your needs known to God . . . Not only stated times, pray upon every particular emergency. "Continue in prayer, and watch in the same with thanksgiving".

giving". Let us read Rev. 7:12: "Saying, Amen: Blessing, and glory, and wisdom, and thanksgiving, and honour, and power, and might, **be** unto our God for ever and ever. Amen."

KEEP THY HEART WITH ALL DILIGENCE; FOR OUT OF IT ARE THE ISSUES OF LIFE

The word heart is used in Scripture as the seat of life. It means mind, soul, spirit. It is the center or inner part.

The Scripture speaks of man's heart, as early as Genesis 6: 5, "every imagination of the thoughts of his heart was only evil continually."

The next verse tells us that it grieved the Lord at His heart that He made man.

Jeremiah 17:9: "The heart is deceitful above all things, and desperately wicked: who can know it?" Jesus spoke of the things that defile man, "For from within, out of the heart of men, proceed evil thoughts, adulteries, fornications, murders

Many Scriptures speak of the evil of the unconverted heart. This paints a very black picture of man in his natural state. Our first parents disobeyed God, so sin entered into the heart. These Scriptures describe man's heart after the fall.

We have a choice, either to accept the salvation God offers through His Son, or reject His Call.

God searches and tries the heart. "Shall not God search this out? for he knoweth the secrets of the heart." Psalm 44-21. We always tried to justify ourselves for the deed we did, and God also knew this. "Every way of a man is right in his own eyes: but the LORD pondereth the hearts." Proverbs 21:2.

KEEP to continue sweet, fresh, or unspoiled. Sweet, not sour.

Fresh (this would indicate pure, clean). Not my will, but Thy will be done. Unselfish How is your heart?.

THY HEART... That part of you that shall survive the grave. This heart is your soul that will take part in one of two resurrections. As k yourself. Where will I stand at that time, before the great white throne?

WITH ALL DILIGENCE. "Daniel purposed in his heart that he would not defile himself with the portion of the king's meat, nor with the wine which he drank: therefore he requested of the prince of the eunuchs that he might not defile himself." Because of this purpose in his heart, God brought Daniel into favor and tender love with the prince of the eunuchs. God always honors and rewards our sincere actions for His cause, although we do not always recognize this.

We must always remember that every blessing we have and enjoy are gifts from God's bountiful hands. He gave His Son, the Lord Jesus Christ for the salvation of each soul, whosoever will come to Him in true and upright repentance, follow Him into the watery grave of baptism, and arise to a new life, to walk with Him. We should always praise, honor and give thanks to God for these wonderful blessings, as Malachi says, "lay it to heart."

Barnabas came to Antioch, when he "had seen the grace of God, was gled, and exhorted them all, that with purpose of heart they would cleave unto the Lord." Purpose: settled intentions. Cleave: adhere to, be faithful. Barnabas told them that it should be the settled intentions of the heart that they should be faithful to the Lord.

Jesus told the great multitudes the cost of discipleship. "If any **man** come to me, and hate not his father, and mother, and wife, and children, and brethren, and sisters, yea, and his own life also, he cannot be my disciple. And whosoever doth not bear his cross, and come after me, cannot be my disciple." The purpose of the heart should be to turn your life over to the Lord to fulfill His Will.

FOR OUT OF IT: How can we keep evil thoughts from entering? God gave us a watch dog for the heart, our mind. First, we desire those things in thoughts that do not belong to a Christian. The sense of sight is a great offender. Genesis 3:6: "And when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was pleasant to the eyes, and a tree to be desired to " II make one wise, she took . . . Samuel 11:2: tells that David saw -"was very beautiful to look upon." This caused David to commit his great sin, which cost him many hours of sorrow and repentance. These could have been used to labor

for the Lord.

Watch and pray, the tempter may be near us Keep the heart with jealous care. Lest the door a moment left unguarded, evil thoughts may enter there!

ARE THE ISSUES OF LIFE. Leviticus 17:11: "For the life of the flesh is in the blood . . ." The heart keeps the blood flowing though our bodies for growth, for upkeep, cleansing, healing. Every hour your heart puts forth enough energy to carry a 150-pound man from the street to the roof of a three-story building. It beats approximately 4200 times each hour.

In order to have spiritual life, we must have a clean heart. This can not be done by our own righteousness, by doing good deeds, by keeping the commandments. It must be cleansed by the shed blood of Jesus. Then, we must keep the commandments and endeavor to keep the fruit of the Spirit, "love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, f a i t h, Meekness, temperance: against such there is no law." Only then we will have the true issues of Life, not only for this life, but also for the hereafter, eternal life.

Let us all try to cultivate the fact that we have an ever present God, who knows all about us and knows us better than we know ourselves. Our prayer should be, "Create in me a clean heart, O God; and renew a right spirit within me."

ROCKVILLE, CONNECTICUT Carlton J. Lanz Why The Autumn Coloring

Autumn colors, having just put on a magnificient display and once again passing for another year, give the forest a brief moment of glory. This, of course, we know is a work of wonder of the Creator! The songwriter tells us this, where he writes; "How wonderful, O Lord, is Thy creation!" Do we know how, and why, these vivid colors come to be? A brilliant display of nature, they appear only after the leaves have been sealed off from the tree. The deep rich colors that we see result from chemical changes that take place as the leaf dies, as the complex sugar-producing mechanism breaks down. Although the spectacular show of colors does nothing for the tree, sealing off the leaves is essential to survival.

Wherever there is winter weather, broad-leaved decidious trees must, in effect, seal themselves in to live through the cold months, when water is locked in the soil and not available. As summers end, the nights grow longer and the temperatures fall, a corky abscission

(sudden termination) layer forms where the leaf joins the twig. No more water can then get in or out of the leaf through the stem. The green color comes from the chlorophyll that helps the leaf manufacture sugar. Deprived of a constant supply of fresh water, it then breaks down and disappears. Now the yellow and orange pigments, called carotenes, become visible. They have been there all along, but hidden by the chlorophyll (the green). The reds and the purples can be seen in many species, but not necessarily every year. If fall days remain bright and the nights cold, the leaves of some species will go on making sugar until all the chlorophyll is gone. Since the leaf is sealed off from the tree, the sugar accumulates and reacts with minerals already there. With this in mind, can we not see the reason for the hymn-writer saying, "How wonderful, O Lord, is Thy creation!

On June 28, a memorable day in our lives, my wife Tillie and I left for Europe at 8:00 p.m. from Chicago's O'Hare Field. Cloud formations are so beautiful from above, as are various air views of the earth, water, cities, rivers etc. We wondered how the pilots and navigator could get us down through these thick clouds and pinpoint a landing at Frankfurt or Zurich, when all we could see was clouds. We started our descent over Holland. Thick clouds covered Europe from mid England on. Often we resigned ourselves to God's care, Not our will but thy will be done.
