The holy conception was of the Spirit (Matt. 1:18). "Now the birth of Jesus Christ was on this wise: When as his mother Mary was espoused to Joseph, before they came together, she was found with child of the Holy Ghost." The Holy

Spirit openly appeared at Christ's baptism by John, and afterwards led him into the wilderness (Luke 4:1). "And Jesus being full of the Holy Ghost returned from Jordan, and was led by the Spirit into the wilderness."

In Christ's charge to the apostles are the words (Matt. 10:20), "For it is not ye that speak, but the Spirit of your Father which speaketh in you." Now, if we are brothers and sisters in Christ, we also have the promise of His Holy Spirit to lead us in our spiritual life, and we shall be able to feel and also understand the blessedness of the Holy Spirit.

Elder's Meeting at Rittman, Ohio 1942.

All true Christians and members of the body of Christ feel most grateful for their adoption as the sons and daughters of the Most High God, realize that they are saved by grace and out of love, and that their service and devotion to their Lord must also proceed out of a heart of love. Therefore such service, devotion and obedience is not compulsory, but voluntary.

Yet at the same time they realize that their liberty may not be used as an occasion to the flesh, and that the Spirit must rule, and the flesh be held in subjection. The separation from the world must continue if we are to continue as God's people, and we cannot have fellowship with the world if we would have fellowship with God. . . .

The meeting throughout was governed by the spirit of brotherly love and a willingness on the part of each to give consideration to the opinions of the others. The same wishes and aims, concerns and fears were manifested by all.

The first matter taken into consideration was the radio.

...we do believe we have a duty to warn members and friends alike of the misuse, and the danger to their faith and Christian life. By this is meant light and worthless music, reports of prize fights, ball games and other sports, foolish conversations... As much as anything do we consider harmful ... sermons which are spoken by men ... who instead of warning the sinner and leading him to repentance speak only to please the ear ...

Our Pioneer Family

We have chosen the Rudolph Virkler family as our pioneer family. In 1815, a French count founded what was known at the time as French Settlement, at Black River. It was mostly virgin forests, still inhabited by Indians, and the pioneers had to make the land productive at the expense of great effort and privations. People were needed, so Count de Chaumont sent one of

his men to Alsace Lorraine for colonists, and among these were the families Virkler and Farney. In the year 1834 they arrived in this country, after forty-two days on the ocean, landing at New York, traveling up the Hudson and then to the French Settlement, where they bought a large tract of land.

The head of the Virkler family was Rudolf, father of seven sons and a daughter. At the request of his oldest son Joseph, Benedict Weyeneth came from Switzerland to America in 1847, and the first congregation of Evangelical Baptists (Apostolic Christian) was founded here, with Joseph Virkler as the first elder. He was active and traveled much for the proclamation of the Gospel. His successor was his brother, Peter Virkler, who as a powerful preacher traveled all over America, and founded the congregation in Oregon. In the year 1871, he made a journey to Europe to visit the congregations there. He was succeeded, as elder, by his nephew, Solomon Virkler, who died in 1897 and was replaced by his brother, Alpheus Virkler, who preached partly in German and partly in English, and was perhaps the first to preach English in our congregation. The first meetings were held in the homes, with the first meeting place in New York State arranged in the year 1855. A church was built near Croghan in 1866, and in Naumberg in the year 1862. All these first believers rest in a common cemetery in the so-called French Settlement, and across the road from the Croghan Church.

Stories are still recounted of the hardships endured by these early settlers and their families, as they wrested a living from the land and built homes hewed from the forests. Travel from place to place was mostly on foot, and ministering brothers walked from meeting place to meeting place, sometimes in the evenings, when they sang hymns to scare away the wild animals. There were also epidemics of sickness, one of diphtheria taking the lives of many of the small children in the vicinity. The Virkler and Farney families intermarried, and their descendants comprise a large part of our congregation today. In each generation of Virklers since Rudolph, there have been brothers who were called upon to minister to the congregations of our two churches. From the fifth generation, there are at present five ministering brothers: Leland Hirschey, Robert and Ralph Beyer of the Naumburg congregation, Norbert Steiner at Croghan and Andrew Virkler at Bay City.

APOSTOLIC PIONEER

Bro. Edward Haab, first minister of our Milford church, was a true Apostolic pioneer in our community. Born in Zurich, Switzerland, he immigrated to the United States over one hundred years ago, when he was ten years old. His first home was in Morton. His marriage to Lyda Graff took place in 1880; to this union were born ten children.

From Morton he moved to Claytonville, Ill., where he was a black-smith by trade, also selling farm implements. While living there he attended the Cissna Park church and was helpful in the ministry

there.

Soon after the turn of the century two real estate men, the Neff Bros. of Milford, visited many of our Illinois churches and were successful in selling farm land to some families. In 1904 Bro. Ed moved his family to this community. Just previous to his coming, the families of George Hartter, Adolph Rudin, Emil Kaiser, Henry Waldbeser and Jake Krauter had also made this

move

Here was a nucleus of people, all of the same faith, who banded together to form our first congregation. Bro. Ed ministered to them, as they gathered in a small house just west of town. A year later more Illinois people joined them. These families are as follows: the Henry Rassis, Christ Grimms and John Rassis from Cissna, the Matthew Weissers and Andy Rapp, his mother and sister Mary from Fairbury.

By now the group was too large for the small building in which they had been gathering, and Adolph Rudin gave a parcel of ground for a church. This was the land on which our present church stands. One of our present brothers recalls that the Neff Realtors, who sold the farm land to these families, offered to give \$1000 toward a church building. Recalling that the money was considered a large sum, courage was taken by the group to begin building a church home. The original building was built in 1906, and Bro. Ed was the only minister.

After the building of the church, the congregation grew by more families moving from Illinois. From Cissna Park came Ulrich Beer, Frank Beer, Andy Beer, Emil Baumgartner, John Ruch, John Zbinden, Theodore Haab and Miss Mary Steiner; from Roanoke, Fred Wuthrich; from Tremont, Fred Graff: from Congerville, Joshua Zimmerman; and from Fairbury, the Chris Kammerer family. Children of the Andy Armbruster family of Fairbury also set up housekeping here. with three boys, Jake. Andy and Fred farming while their sister. Dora kept house for them. John and Emily Hoerr, son and daughter of the John Hoerr's of Fairbury, tended their father's land here also, later giving over the farm to their brother, Dave and his wife, Rose.

More early families in the church's history were the Metzgers, Martins, Schmidgalls and Riggenbachs. It was recalled by one of our members that the first funeral in the new and original church was Anna Mary Rapp, mother of Andy and Mary. She died shortly after her arrival to this community.

With all of these families came many young people, and Bro. Ed was instrumental in starting a German Sunday School with the help of two teachers, Bros. Andy Rapp and Fred Wuthrich.

A few years later my grand-

father and his family, the Simon Beers, moved from Mansfield, and the George Stieglitzs moved from Metamora, Illinois.

Assisting Bro. Ed in the ministry now was Bro. Andy Rapp and Bro. George Stieglitz. These brothers faithfully ministered to the congregation's spiritual needs.

Bro. Ed had a deep concern for the young people, that they might find their way to the Lord. He used to preach that the Lord first had to instill a desire in the hearts of the unconverted to seek Him. Many of our faithful members, who used to listen to his sermons as unconverted souls, remember his influence and helpfulness in showing them the way to their Lord.

He was loved and respected the community. throughout newspaper clipping, brittle and yellowed with age, lovingly saved by a relative since the time of his death tells that he "was well and favorably known throughout the community and was very congenial. He held a prominent place in the German church and was an enthusiastic member, commonly spoken of as one of the keystones of the church."

Previous to his death, a young man was asked by the congregation to assist Bro. Ed. This was Bro. Theo. Beer, my father, and I have heard him say what loving encouragement and kind helpfulness Bro. Ed gave to one who felt so inadequate to serve the needs of the church.

In years to follow, after Bro. Ed's death, Bro. Henry Beer was the congregation's choice to add to the ministry-and later, Bro. Elmer Hartter. Now we also have Bro. Walt Steffen to minister to our need. These three brothers, along with Bro. Theo. are our present

ministers.

As we look back over the beginning of our church home here in Milford, we can only marvel at the separate paths that led so many God-fearing families to find their homes here. We also feel a deep thankfulness to those who cared enough about their faith to form a new church in this community, so that sixty years later it is still here for us to enjoy, and to find a haven in—as we go to worship the God in whom we found our salvation. Surely it is our responsibility to preserve this faith for which so many people worked so diligently. May the Lord instill in our hearts a desire to do so.

AT THE LAST STATION

[Many know Edward Kambly. As a faithful and proved pilgrim, he has journeyed with the shining city glowing in hope. Edward has a brother, Paul, from Switzerand. This artice is by Paul. The words are in beautiful harmony with the spiritual life as shown in scripture.]

Not very long ago I visited a brother in the faith who was very ill. After we had exchanged greetings he said, "I am at the last station". These words were said by a dying man.

Neither the author of this article nor anybody else should think, There is still time; the last station is still very far away. Moses, the man of God, realized the fraility of human life, and he said, "The days of our years are threescore years and ten; and if by reason of strength they be fourscore years, yet is their strength labour and sorrow; for it is soon cut off, and we fly away..."

What do we do when we are traveling, and the conductor announces that we are arriving at the last station? Certainly we shall gather our luggage and get ready to get off the train. Often we can see that travelers who have much luggage also have many difficulties when leaving the train. Is it not so, that also in our religious life we often burden ourselves with too much luggage? We know that the messenger of death is on his way by

day and night; he knocks at the door of the king's palace, as well as on the door of the servant's hut. To King Hezekiah the prophet Isaiah had to deliver the message, "Thus saith the LORD, Set thine house in order: for thou shalt die, and not live."

How is it with the faith of the children of God, and which preparation have they to make before arriving at the last station? Our departure is near, "For here have we no continuing city, but we seek one to come." "For we know that if our earthly house of this tabernacle were dissolved, we have a building of God, an house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens." "... flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God; neither doth corruption inherit incorruption."

Since this is our faith and our hope, we are well advised if we do not encumber ourselves with too much luggage, with things which have no value for eternity. What the apostle said can also be applied for us and for our time, "For we brought nothing into this world, and it is certain we can carry nothing out."

The parable of our Saviour of the talents cannot be taken seriously enough. Every brother and every sister has been entrusted. We all without exception will have to give an account of what we have done with these talents.

When we arrive at the last station and step over the threshold of eternity, there will be a great luggage control. Then it will become evident if and how we have traded with the entrusted talents. We are well advised if, before arriving at the last station, we thoroughly control our luggage. How easily it could happen that we carry with us things which are absolutely worthless.

There will be many who have deceived themselves. Let us hear what our Saviour had to say: "Not every one that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the kingdom of heaven; but he that doeth the will of my Father which is in heaven. Many will say to me in that day, Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in thy name? and in thy name have cast out devils? and in thy name done many wonderful works? And then will I profess unto them, I never knew you: depart from me, ye that work iniquity."

that work iniquity."

There could not be a greater self-deception; hope that works will be appreciated, but get severely rebuked from God... wanted to perform great works, but forget love.

It will be too late if we don't realize until the last station that we lack "oil" (love). The foolish virgins realized too late what a mistake they had made. How many lamps will go out when the bridegroom comes. Especially in our time, we have so many reasons to

look at the hands of the world clock.

There is no doubt that sincere endeavours are made for the spiritual welfare of the communities of the faith. We should not think our brother's opinion unimportant, and declare our opinion as the only right one. Let us beware of loveless judg-

ment!

How can we recognize the tricks of the enemy? Open eyes must admit that Satan has succeeded already in smuggling many worldly traits into our communities, traits which should not be. In the spiritual field, the danger is great that we absorb all kinds of alien ideas. The danger of becoming worldly and shallow is greater than many brothers and sisters may think. We

should, therefore, be sincerely concerned that our dear youth is prop-

erly guided.

A revival is a grace of God, but must not be taken for a conversion, for a turning away from sin and a willing surrender to Jesus. When we build a house and do not make a strong foundation, we should not be surprised if the building gets bad cracks after some time. Superficial conversions may have impairing effects on our faith and on the life of the community.

It has been said that our communities are in danger of becoming worldly and shallow, but this is not the only danger. It must be admitted that we could drift into a state in which we would cling too much

to written rules and laws, instead of letting ourselves be guided by the law of love in our hearts. Such rules will not further our inner life, but instead the danger is great that we might judge the "other man's servant" unkindly. The Holy Bible warns us against just such judgments (Romans 14:4).

We all approach the last Station. What about our luggage? What can we take into eternity? How is our faith, and what is our solace? Many things which we think important are unimportant before God. Let the

Holy Bible tell us.

"And now abideth faith, hope, charity, these three; but the greatest of these is charity."

GUARDING AT GOD'S GATE

We are God's people. We are His flock. He bought us with His own blood. We are partakers of His holiness.

Holiness holds so much. It's nice to feel clean. It's nice to be white as snow. Holiness is God's. Give thanks at the remembrance of His holiness. Some have the challenge of space and other discoveries. Here is exultant joy. Here are deep things beyond comparison, and beautiful heights waiting.

It's very important to guard our house. Yes and No are reverse sides of faith's coin. "Beloved, believe not every spirit, but try the spirits whether they are of God: because many false prophets are gone out into the world."

Jesus told about the thief. Paul plainly told the watchman in Acts 20. The apostle John said "try". This means prove. The devil always attempts to circulate counterfeit ideas. If Satan has his way, he is going to destroy. Not one excepted, each of us is figured in his plans.

To listen to God or not is a matter of life or death. How rests in reading and hearing. Through John it is put very good. "Hereby know ye the Spirit of God:" How good to recognize the gentle voice.

"Every spirit that confesseth that Jesus Christ is come in the flesh is of God: And every spirit that confesseth not that Jesus Christ is come in the flesh is not of God:" No one has right to individual meaning to this, privately drawn. In God's book, He explains and defines.

In the dark night are savage wolves. They wait to tear fiercely into one of the flock. Certain members of the body are given of God the gift to tell the spirits apart. (See I Corinthians 12:10.) Some humble brother or sister holds a treasure. A shepherd's sharp eyes may pick out the form of a waiting killer.

We listen to John again, "and this is that spirit of antichrist, whereof ye have heard that it should come; and even now already is it in the world." Black sin has no compartments. We are glad there are good people, beside those we have proved. There are also many, many wicked people. Pharisees and Sadduccees have their modern counterparts. One may seemingly be a fine speaker. The Scripture is known and quoted. If one is not proved, there is danger in association. The same devil that comes as an angel of light also tortures without mercy. He revels in the whole list of grisly crimes. How frightful would it be to be swept into his everlasting condemnation.

Have we wonderful success? "Ye are of God, little children, and have overcome them: because greater is he that is in you, than he that is in
