In looking back, we wonder what prompted the pioneer families to leave their homes and established churches, to find new homes and start a new church community. They must have had the courage and faith to believe that the Lord would help and sustain them in their undertaking. They faced many hardships and privations that the younger generations have not had to experience.

Nearly fifty years ago, the first families that came to this Mississippi River bottom came because land was cheaper here. It was hard work to clear and develop the land, and since it had earlier been flooded, the levees were built higher, which put a high tax on the land, bringing a heavy financial burden on them.

The first ones to come in 1918 was the Bro. Andrew Yackley family from Hancock; in 1919, the families of Bro. Otto Gerst, Bros. Ben and Joe Wiegand and Ezra and Leslie Gerst, all from Oakville, Bro. Charlie Koellings, Peoria, and John, Dan, Rudie and George Hoerr, Morton.

Services were held in the homes; when no minister was present, they had Sunday School and at times read sermons of our ministers of some of our other churches.

In 1926, Bro. Edward Grimm, who had been a minister for many years at Elgin, Ia., moved here with his family, including Bro. Will and Sis. Marie Butikofer and Eli and Elizabeth Sutter.

A month after coming here, 1-yr.old Joel Butikofer and 2-yr.-old Edward Sutter died the same day of what was diagnosed as bronchial pneumonia. Since there was no church or cemetery, the little boys

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were buried in the lawn of their Grandfather Grimm's home.

In 1930 there were fourteen converts, which brought new courage to the small flock. As the years passed, the congregation slowly grew in number. The children started bringing their friends to Sunday School, and as they grew to the age of accountability many of them repented along with our children.

Again looking back, we can see a purpose in those pioneers leaving their homes and coming to a strange community. Through their coming, many have heard of the way of salvation through the blood of the Lord Jesus Christ, and one soul is worth more than the whole world.

APOSTOLIC PIONEER

Adolph Herzog was born in 1862 in Schoftland, Switzerland. He spent his boyhood days there in a home with a thatched roof. His father, who was a school teacher, died when Adolph was a teenager, and he then went to live with an uncle who was a lawyer.

After he completed his schooling, he entered an apprenticeship in city administration. Later he spent some time in the Swiss army, and at the time of his marriage was working in a bank.

In 1887 he married Adele Wirz, who also lived in Switzerland. Her father was a minister of our church, and it was then that the first contact with the church was made.

For two years after their marriage, they operated a flour mill in Switzerland. It was in 1889 th a t they came to the United States and settled on a farm near Tremont. Here they found work in a feed-mill owned by Bro. Jake Berchtold. It was during the time they were working for the Berchtolds that they repented and were baptized.

He was a well-educated man and had a very beautiful penmanship. He used a feather, and his writing was treasured by many people. It was he who completed many of the marriage licenses of the couples who were married in our Tremont church. He also wrote out the dinner lists, and hanging in our church dining room, we have an early dinner list in his handwriting.

In seeking out information for this article. I was impressed by the good report everyone had of him. I never had the opportunity of knowing him, but I have been inspired by hearing of his walk of life. I was told that he was a man of godly order, filled with love so abundantly that it could be clearly seen by all. Even his neighbors made the remark. "If all men were like him, there would be no war." He was well thought of, not only in the church, but by his neighbors and the friends of the truth. His favorite book was the Bible; he lived by its teachings, and was always willing to lend a helping hand.

He was a strong pillar in the church, serving for many years as a trustee and Sunday School teacher. It is still evident today that he was loved by his pupils. He was a very interesting speaker, and taught the children with love and patience.

One sister told me that one of her Sunday School teachers once complained to him, because the children couldn't answer the questions. In the presence of the children, Bro. Adolph admonished him to have more patience, and they were comforted, for they had been trying to do their best.

His wife, Sis. Adele, was confined to her home for many years, but she, too, was always willing to lend a helping hand and offer encouragement and sympathy to those in trouble. Even though she was unable to attend church, she knew all of the children and could call them by name. Very few ever left their home without something—a small gift for the children and food for the adults. On the many occasions when various groups from church came to sing, they would always request that one more hymn be sung yet, and then one more, and it was only with reluctance that they bid them farewell.

Bro. Herzog passed from this

life in 1937, at the age of 76, and his wife, Sis. Adele, in 1953—at the age of 87. He was laid to rest with the testimony that he had been a good believer and had always met the children of God in true love and fellowship. Bro. Mangold had the funeral service, and for his text used, "... Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord . ." (Rev. 14:13)

I am sure that Bro. Herzog would want all the honor and glory to go to God, but it is always a comfort when we can testify of those who have passed on before, that they have fought a good fight and have kept the faith.

On the shelves, not heavily stocked, stood jars of golden yellow honey and several other familiar food items purchased with money from a fund supported by those using the apartment-or perhaps occasionally from an outside donation.

Desirous to visit the big Army Brooks Hospital nearby, Bro. Ernest Herman, assigned to a certain work there, arranged this and took several of us on an abbreviated tour through this large institution. The president had visited here not long ago, and according to reports, the security to protect him was great. Riflemen and security guards were on roofs and all over.

The big sprawling cemetery we visited, a little farther on, was worth the few minutes we spent reading inscriptions on some of the stones, headstones in every direction and in line any way one looked. Military personnel and members of their families from every conflict this country has ever been in are buried there. New graves, ten, twelve or even more, we saw, are opened at a time and stand that way in readiness . . . One reminds himself how positive death is. In one of his recent sermons, Bro. Sam Aeschliman reminded his hearers of this when he said, "I and you will face the grim Reaper . . . don't think there is one here who will not face the Living God!"
