There are so many events that point to the last time and the fulfillment of prophecy. II Peter 1:19: "We have also a more sure word of prophecy; whereunto ye do well that ye take heed, as unto a light that shineth in a dark place . .." II Peter 1: 12, 13: "Wherefore I will not be negligent to put you always in remembrance of these things, though ye know **them**, and be established in the present truth. Yea, I think it meet, as long as I am in this tabernacle, to stir you up by putting **you** in remembrance;"

Because of the wickedness of man, God destroyed that world of superb perfection which He h a d created for an habitation of man. Let us not overlook the word of God found in II Peter 3:5-8,

"For this they willingly are ignorant of, that by the word of God the heavens were of old, and the earth standing out of the water and in the water: Whereby the world that then was, being overflowed with water, perished: But the heavens and the earth, which are now, by the s a m e word are kept in store, reserved unto fire against the day of judgment and perdition of ungodly men."

There never was a time in the history of man when physical advantages, comforts, luxuries, and leisure were so widely distributed as in our age. Our age is an age of worldliness, carnal-mindedness, and where violence and corruption abound.

In many instances in Europe and Asia, room is made for atheistic communism, a way of life worse than paganism. It is no longer a question of what God, or gods, but it is no god at all. The curriculum of schools in the Soviet, from the first grade to the highest college level, is now teaching atheism enthusiastically and persuasively. Multitudes are becoming indoctrinated.

It is sad to relate, in our seats of higher learning—the colleges and universities of our country, where the leaders of the next generation are being trained, the authority of the Bible has often been completely eliminated. The miraculous elements of the entire Bible, the deity of Christ, the atonement of Christ, the resurrection from the dead, in fact most of the fundamental articles of

our Christian faith, are either questioned or openly denied, even ridiculed. Instead, sin has been reduced as a mere maladjustment, the result of frustration or merely a form of antisocial living.

The college graduate of today is the teacher of grade and high school tomorrow. He is the future textbook writer, the editor of our magazines, the newspapers, and other publications. He will hold influential place in society. Thus, the unbelief which is dispensed today will gradually penetrate down through the strata tomorrow.

Men have been calloused to human suffering and misery. Human life to many is the cheapest thing today. Even some churches have become calloused to a deplorable degree, rather than contend for righteousness and justice.

Remember how the words corruption, violence and wickedness occur in the description of the generation of Noah? If we were to characterize our age of today with two words, these words would be violence and corruption.

Ephesians 6:13: "Wherefore take unto you the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand."

Some years ago, the condition in some modern American churches was characterized in a rather striking manner: This church had been wedded to the world, & the world is now her married name. She is now truly the church of the world, as formerly she was the church of God. This church was not gaining the world, but the world was gaining the church.

Preachers must be produced suitable for the church of the world. They do not lead the flocks; the flocks lead them.

The law of God has been set aside. Man no longer fears God, or fears to transgress his commandments. Certainly where there is no fear of God, there is no respect of man. All restraint has been removed.

Let us heed the warning, Luke 17:26, "And as it was in the days of Noe, so shall it be also in the days of the Son of man."

Such is the picture of the world today. In the chapter which gives the reason why God brought the world-wide flood upon the f i rs t world, we read, "And God saw that the wickedness of man was great in the earth, and that every imagination of the thoughts of his heart was only evil continually. . . The earth also was corrupt before God, and the earth was filled with violence. And God looked upon th e earth, and, behold, it was corrupt; for all flesh had corrupted his way upon the earth."

This description most certainly fits our generation. The world is ripening fast for judgment. Let us consider the words found in II Peter 3:

"The Lord is not slack concerning h is promise, as some men count slackness; but is longsuffering to us-ward, not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance. But the day of the Lord will come as a thief in the night; in the which the heavens shall pass away with a great noise, and the elements shall melt with fervent heat, the earth also and the works that are therein shall be burned up."

Revelation 3:2, 3, 5, 6, "Be watchful, and strengthen the things which remain, that are ready to die: for I have not found thy works perfect before God.

Remember therefore how thou hast received and heard, and hold

fast, and repent. If therefore thou shalt not watch, I will come on thee as a thief, and thou shalt not know what hour I will come upon thee...

He that overcometh, the s a m e shall be clothed in white raiment; and I will not blot out his name out of the book of life, but I will confess his name before my Father, and before his angels.

He that hath an ear, let him hear what the Spirit saith unto the churches.

One of the first, if not the first member of the congregation at Rittman, the community formerly known as Chippewa, and later called Wayne County, was my greatgrandmother, Anna Steiner. She was the wife of John Steiner, who evidently was a minister of another church.

The first sermon preached in this community by a minister of the Apostolic Christian Church, formerly known as the Neu Taufer or New Baptist church, was by Bro. Isaac Gehring of Monroe County. He made several trips either by foot or horseback, a distance of about one hundred and forty miles. The services were held in a home near where the present church stands today, with only a few people attending, probably the immediate family and a few neighbors. Why this Anna Steiner was dissatisfied with her former faith or her husband's church, I will not try to say, but the absence of a true repentance and new birth seem to be what convicted some of those early converts, when they heard the gospel preached, and God could touch their hearts. The same holds true today.

Evidently she had quite a hard life, her husband not being in accord with her newly-found faith. They were the parents of thirteen children, and she often walked to church, sometimes as far as five or six miles, carrying a child and no doubt other children following her. Sometimes when she would get home it was dark, the door was locked, and she would have to spend the night outside the house.

I do not mention this to accuse or judge her husband, but rather to call attention to the zeal and desire those people must have had to hear the word of God and to attend the service of God's people.

Her daughter, Barbara Horn, who was my grandmother, was also soon converted, as were nearly all of her sons and daughters in later years. They were Peter, Levi and Barbara Horn of Rittman, Dan of Sabetha, John of West Bend and later of Morton, Jacob of Morton, Eli of Leo, Mary Sorg of Mansfield, Lydia Dotterer of Junction, Verena Moser of Morton, Elizabeth Kuerth of Gridley, Sarah Conrad of Leo and Catherine Sommer of Mansfield.

The time of which was mentioned was about one hundred years ago: the conveniences with which we are familiar today were unknown then. This community was not a rich community, and people sometimes suffered hardship and privation. There was very little money; food, clothing and shelter were very plain, and acquired through hard work, careful planning and saving. Education was very limited, wages very meager. Could this probably be one reason why the gospel of salvation with its many promises of a future home of the soul, free from sorrow, pain and care, had such a strong appeal to them? It was the goodness of God and the love of the Master and for the Master that led them to repentance.

There was a young man present at that first service of Bro. Gehring, who pretended to have no interest in the preaching, and even scoffed at it. Nevertheless he was soon converted and became the first minister of the Rittman church. That was Daniel Steiner, who became the father-in-law of Bro. Noah Hartzler, who was the first elder at the Rittman church.

There was another wife of a minister and a sister of a bishop, who both became converted and were of the early members of the Rittman church. The Lord said, Think not that I am come to bring peace, but rather division, and so it came to pass.

Pioneer Feature

I would like to write a few lines about my Grandfather Moser, as I feel he was one of the pioneers of the Bern Church. Nicholas Moser was born in 1842 in Bern, Switzerland, where he grew to manhood. His father was a cobbler by trade; the family was very poor. At the age of 14 he repented. In his youth he also learned the cobbler trade, and through his lifetime repaired his own shoes.

In 1867, to escape compulsory military training he, in company with others, came to America. (At that time there was no other way but to bear arms in that country.) Also in the group was Sis. Elizabeth Adam, his bride-to-be, but due to so much red tape, they waited to be married until they arrived at Forrest. He rented a farm and lived there 13 years. All of their children were born there except the youngest.

In 1879 he bought 80 acres of prairie at \$5.00 an acre, built a house on it, and in Dec. 1880 moved his family to Bern. In a matter of a few weeks, tragedy struck the family. Between Jan. 1, 1881, and March 6, five of their seven children died of diptheria. They had already lost three infants in Illinois. This left them their oldest child, John-12, and a five-vear-old girl, who died 3 vears later. (The last night before moving, some of the children stayed with a family who had sick children, not knowing it was the dreadful killer of diptheria. In Kansas, they in turn brought it to the large family of grandfather's sister, the Mes-serlis, who lost many of their children.

In 1883 they had another son, Joseph, my father. Grandfather often told us about those days of heartache and trials, but through it all they kept their faith and trust in the Lord. In 1906, Grandmother passed away at age 65. In 1887, Grandfather had gone back to Switzerland and brought his aged father and a sister to America. This sister now kept house for him and my father. Sis. Christena was a dear little person, I am told, and passed away in 1911. Grandfather then made his home with us the last 13 years of his life, until 1924. At the age of 81 he passed away.

He was a strong pillar in the church, a rather stern brother, never too timid to speak up on what was godly church order. He also was a trustee, treasurer of the Building Aid, and a song leader. He would choose a song, then "read" several verses without opening his book. He was well read in the Bible and would recite whole books to us, and we never grew tired listening, as he made it interesting and impressive to young minds.

History

1850—Bro. Joseph Virkler came to Peoria from the state of New York. Bro. Virkler delivered the first sermon of the Apostolic Christian faith here.

1852—Bro. Johannes Kreinbuhl, who was a minister, and six other members came to the home of Sis. Sommer, which was located across the river on the Metamora Road, and held services there.

1857—John Hartman of Dortmund Lippe, Germany, and a Huette came to the United States and settled in St. Louis, Missouri. They were of the Baptist teaching. After coming to Peoria, they joined the Apostolic Christian Faith. About twenty souls gathered in John Hartman's home on Monroe and Caroline Streets, where Bro. Hartman was their minister. Shortly after, Bro. Schlatter and Sis. Porig came to Peoria.

1865—Bros. Heiniger and Rickle, Sisters Pilza and Brunner came to Peoria and assembled with the believers.

1867—Bros. John Schneider, J. W. Schmidt, and Felix Cromer came to Peoria. J. W. Schmidt was a tailor and in his later years moved to Eureka, where he was mid-Elder with Bro. Michael Mangold in Roanoke.

1874—The Assembly Room at Bro. Hartman's house became too small for the growing congregation. A decision was made to build a frame church house at 511 Green St. The church house was completed on May 10. In this year, Sis. Haefli and Bro. John Spies came to Peoria. In later years, Bro. John Spies moved to Elgin.

1876—On March 4, Bros. Rudolph Rusterholz and George Stieglitz came from Germany to Morton, and from there came to Peoria. George was a minister and later a mid-Elder, until his health failed. Bro. Stieglitz died May 10, 1903. 1894—Bro. Rudolph Witzig was

1894—Bro. Rudolph Witzig was appointed as elder of Peoria, having been elder at Gridley. Bro. Witzig was born Sept. 13, 1833, in Switzerland, coming to Gridley in 1883. He usually visited the Peoria church once a month. Bro. Andrew Rapp of Morton supported Bro. Witzig until he died May 2, 1911.

1896—The members in Peoria decided to build a larger church, since the church house built in 1874 was now too small. The old frame church was torn down, and a brick building costing \$7,500 was erected on the same site. The members elected four trustees, Peter Sommer, John Schneider, Rudolph Rusterholz, and Jacob Schilz, who was in later years a minister.

1910—Bro. Emil Schubert became minister in Peoria. Bro. Schubert c a m e from Rodlids, Saxony, Germany. He arrived in Philadelphia in 1905. From there he went to Morton, and then to Peoria in 1907.

1912-February 12, the elders decided to build a home for the old sisters. A building at 711 N. Monroe was purchased and called the Apostolic Christian Home. Bro. John Schneider, Jr., was in charge until his death May 4, 1912. After Bro. Schneider's death, Bro. Emil Schubert was in charge. Following Bro. Schubert, responsibility for the Home has gone to Bros. Michael Weyeneth, Samuel Getz, and Reuben Herman. On February 12, Bro. Bartel Rapp, elder of Morton, was put in charge of the Peoria Church, since Bro. Rudolph Witzig had reached an old age and was in failing health. Witzig died November 17, 1912.

1924—Bro. Bartel Rapp died January 23. Bro. Michael Mangold, elder of Roanoke, was given charge of the Peoria Church. Bro. Mangold died April 19, 1930, at the age of 71.

1929—Bro. Emil Schubert became elder.

1947—Bro. Emil Schubert's health failed, and Bro. David Mangold, elder of Roanoke, was put in charge. Bro. Schubert died August 14, 1950. Membership and congregation had grown. The brick church house on Green Street was now too small. A decision was made to build a new church, and land was purchased at 3420 N. Sheridan Road.

1949—Ground was broken for the new church.

1950—The new church house was dedicated December 10, having cost approximately \$350,000 and seating 950 people. Bros. Michael Weyeneth, Chris Koehl and Roy Sauder were ministers. The Building committee consisted of Bros. C. C. Hoerr, Sam Getz and Henry Leman. The trustees were Bros. Sam Getz, C. C. Hoerr, Henry Leman, Chris Sauder, and W. O. Schlipf.

1959—Bro. David Mangold resigned April 19 because of his health, and the eldership of the Peoria Church was turned over to Bro. Silas Leuthold, elder of Princeville. Bro. David Mangold died on December 4, 1964, at the age of 72. 1965—Bro. Roy Sauder was ordained elder on Jan. 3. Present ministers are Elder Bro. Roy Sauder, Bros. Michael Weyeneth, Jim Hoerr, and LeRoy Hartman.

1966—A new Apostolic Christian Home for the Aged has been constructed at 7023 N. E. Skyline Drive. The residents of the Home on Monroe Street moved into their new home June 22.

APOSTOLIC PIONEERS

When we think of Apostolic Pioneers, we can believe this was one, even though he was called to his heavenly home 67 years ago. In one of the papers it mentioned 2,000 to 3,000 were estimated to be in attendance at the funeral. The regular train had a special coach for those coming from afar. Many came to pay their last respects and love to the great man whose spirit had been animating their church for years, and whose life's work was an open book to them all.

John Reeb was born in 1836 in Alsace Lorraine. His parents were of the Lutheran teaching. One day a soldier came around selling Bibles. He told this soldier he wasn't satisfied. The soldier told him about a religious sect and took him to these people, which was the Apostolic Christian Faith. When he heard the first sermon he said, "This is what I want." He repented and was baptized. At the age of 19 he was made minister, and later became an elder. He was married to Anna Blanck. They were blessed with 6 children.

On October 10, 1889, they with five of their children left Alsace Lorraine to come to the USA. (One son came before, to escape going to the army.) There was a group of about 40 that accompanied them. Among them were the Geyers, Emil Feller, Bauers, Mangolds, and others. They crossed the ocean on the ship "La Torraine". Some were afraid the boat would sink, and one was quoted as saying, "Oh no, Minister Reeb is with us, and I know God will not let anything happen to us."

Often in the evening, whoever was able and wasn't seasick would go on the deck to sing from the Zion's Harp. Elder Reeb selected the hymn GOD IS STILL WITH ME.

Noah's ark long drifted

on the surging flood,

But with eyes uplifted,

- trusted he in God.
- When throughout life's journey raging storms I see,

This shall be my comfort:

God is still with me.

They sailed with happiness into the Haven of New York. To their surprise, Bro. Mike Mangold and Bro. Leman of Roanoke came to New York to meet the boat.

He settled on a farm near Cissna Park, across the road where our old church stood, and his great grandson, Curtis Sauder, now farms this.

He was much respected and had a loving way with young people. In the year of 1893, a group of 81 repented and were baptized. There are still three living members of that group, Sisters Ida Eisenman and Anna Beer, which we feel are the

two from our church who have been Christians the longest, and Sis. Freda Schaefer of West Bend. Sisters Ida Eisenman and Anna Beer were baptized by Bro. Reeb. Sis. Ida Eisenman said she can still remember one of his last sermons he had, on Thanksgiving Day. He said he was ready to go, but as the Apostle Paul said, for the church's sake he would like to be here. He passed away at the age of 64, after a year's illness in the year 1900.
