AUTHENTIC THANKSGIVING

That first Thanksgiving in November 1621 was real! It was born out of suffering. The Pilgrims had reaped a good harvest from the Indian corn they had planted. The English pease they brought with them did not germinate. 47 out of their original group of 102 had died. The weather during those winter months had been hard. Their relationships with the Indians had been frighteningly uncertain. Because of suffering, there was a note of authenticity in their celebration. They had been through that crisis of suffering, without which there can be no initiation into the realm of the truly authentic.

You and I would probably have spared them all that they went through that first year. If I had been in a position to advise the Lord what to do, I would most certainly have recommended that He give them a mild winter, unusually good health, and acceptance with the Indians. Had not they acted on

principle? Did not they deserve not what makes Thanksgiving real. some encouragement? Had not they earned the "blessing of God," namely peace, security and plenty of food? That is not what He gave them. He plunged them into crisis after crisis. It is suffering like theirs, however, that gives birth to reality.

God's word has said over and over again that true thanksgiving is born of suffering. David said it in Psalm 116. Only when his soul had been delivered from death, his eves from tears and his feet from stumbling was he ready to pay his vows to the Lord in the presence of all the people. Only when his bonds had been loosed was he ready to offer thanksgiving. David could have gone through the motions of celebrating Thanksgiving and probably would have done an excellent job. He was a fine musician and could have entertained with his lyre; he was a poet and could have written a special poem for the day. That is

Only when we suffer can we know that we have nothing to boast of; only when we know that we have nothing to boast of can we be truly thankful. What is the call that comes to us on Thanksgiving Day? To put ourselves into the hands of God. We are not to try to protect ourselves from whatever trials and difficulties God may bring our way. Most of us have defense mechanisms we have developed over the years to protect ourselves from situations we do not like. Every time we put them into operation, we deprive ourselves of the opportunity of having God initiate us further into the priceless order of those whose lives are purged by His fire, and therefore are filled with His Spirit. Let us set these mechanisms aside and let God deal with us as He wants. The result? A real Thanksgiving Day.

Who is your neighbor? A billion human beings are undernourished. Could we see a little one nearby without food, we would pity. We are very nearby. Lives hang in the balance. Things are happening, the touch of mercy. It was written, that the largest armada of ships since D-day were used to carry grain to India.

God can change things, yet He predicts sad events. The outlook is grave. Sizable surplus are nowhere Of six great food exporting regions, only two remain. World population is greater and greater. From the flood, it took till 1830 to reach 1 billion. The 2nd billion came in 100 years or about, 1830-1930. The 3rd billion in 1960. The prediction is, 1980 for the 4th billion. Food production is not keeping up. A million new mouths to feed each week! Will

famine be a greater heart-rending catastrophe? One soul writes. It is scary. It is a challenging thing. By 1990, it is thought it will be over. So will many an opportunity.

Translate this into a child, looking at you. Listen.

Apostolic Christian World Relief

Heifer Project Inc.: To Americans, a cow may seem like a strange gift, but to Dominicans whose children get only a quart of milk a week, it is welcome. In addition to milk to drink, a cow gives milk to sell and a calf every year, providing both nutritious food and extra income. The first calves, however, will not be sold, but given to other needy families. Those families in turn will do the same, creating a chain of "living gifts".

Bro. Edwin Haas (Bro. Bill Klopfenstein accompanied him): We left on a trip through the Andes to view former Heifer project shipments and how the program is administered. We were to get our taste of seeing poverty, primitive agriculture, life expectancy of 35 years . . . Prior shipments included pigs, sheep. After crossing the equator, we stayed at the town of Tulcan . . . These people need and appreciate the little that our church has given them. These people are living be-tween 9000-12000 feet above sea level, trying to exist where it takes a whole year for corn to mature, and if they receive a yield of 7 bushel per acre, it is a good year . . .

We visited several Care projects: school lunch programs, sewing machines, school supplies, the building of the school with our church furnishing the material . . . The highlight, at least to me, was the visit to the only orphanage in the country . . . It was very crowded . . . Three little children approached the head-lady with a letter, begging for admission, the oldest about six, the other girl five, and a little 2vear-old brother. Here they stood with tattered clothes. bare-footed and hungry, tears in their eyes, pleading they be accepted. Their 16year-old uncle had led them for about 150 miles, walking, deposited them at the gate and disappeared. Both their parents were dead. They had nothing. The head-lady turned to us and said, "We have no room." She made room, and told us how often this happens . .

From a letter signed by Bros. Jim Hoerr and Bill Heimer (Bill has since entered the glorious rest):

... We were very impressed with the manager of the Heifer Project program (Santo Domingo). His day begins at 4:30 and does not end until late at night ...

The cattle will be kept at this farm for six months, which will give them an opportunity to get the first calf off to a good start . . . Education seems to be a vital part of the program. Classes come to this farm, ordinarily six or eight boys . . . The hogs for the most part had been put into other areas. One of these places was a small city . . . Here again they bring local people in and after suitable training, these hogs are put into rural areas.

The native people were very appreciative. They do not want us to feel that we are giving them only a relief program, but it means more when they feel they are given the opportunity to earn something . . .

Haiti: We found a people who

JAPAN Yoshio Yamazaki

We had mostly fine weather when the American brothers, Noah Schrock and Ben Maibach were in our country. We surely appreciated that which our heavenly Father has blessed us with through the advice and encouragement.

In Tokyo, we held several special services, besides regular Sunday morning services. A number of people were attending and showed their interest for the Lord. I believe that it's pretty sure that our brethren really encouraged them, and so they will think more about the Lord and never have breakfast, never have lunch, and if they are lucky they have a bowl of beans or rice at supper. This can be less than 2 hours by air from our homeland . . . They would like to do, but have nothing to do with, and never any opportunity to succeed. The economic situation is still worsening. The people wonder how much yet they can stand before mass starvation is their end. We had the experience of being confronted by multitudes of people, begging for anything that we could give. These people either beg or they die.

Guided by the reports and recommendations from the brothers that investigated previous shipments of animals for self-help, the committee recommended a shipment of animals to the needy in Ecuador.

Ecuador: Average annual income, \$200 a person. 90% of people undernourished, nearly two-thirds of the children die before they are five. Life expectancy, 32 years.

Heifer Project has learned that a good way to help is by importation of quality livestock. One of the best ways to carry out this is through 4-H. These rural boys and girls are eager to accept new ideas and are more than anxious to improve their livestock.

Bros. Mel Steffen and Edwin Haas' June-July 1967 trip: . . .We arrived in Quito, unloaded the sheep on a truck and the pigs on two smaller trucks, and delivered them to the quarantine station.

Our first stop was at the town of Archidona, located at the headwaters of the Amazon . . . (Bro. Bill Klopfenstein and I delivered these cattle, but did not see their final destination.) The cattle were thriving in the hot, tropical jungle terrain; all had a calf by their side. We reviewed two schools; we visited an orphanage with about 140 children. Here is where I had the opportunity to see three orphans that arrived when we were visiting. They were very healthy looking, compared to their condition—upon arriving . . .

The next country was Paraguay; again proverty is everywhere . . . The natives do not have a balanced diet; malnutrition is prevalent in nearly all the children. Many have swollen faces, large distended midsections, and then the symptons in the final stages, spindley legs and arms. Care is providing without charge a balanced noon meal for all school children; however, many never attend school; about 80% never go beyond the 3rd grade . . .

Columbia, Honduras, Belice were visited. The people are very thankful for the self-help tools, seeds, agricultural hand tools, sewing machines, food, clothing, and medical supplies-given to the clinics and orphanages spread through the countryside . . . At Belice City, another orphanage was bursting at the seams . . . Seventy-five children, living in a home about the size of a single family dwelling in the States. Every orphanage we visited received their entire budget from donations; not one was very affluent. They had to make clothes out of flour sacks. Nothing went to waste . . .

We could say the need is very great

spiritual things.

In the country churches, Shioda and Tamahata, they also had a blessed time. On Oct. 7, Mr. Toshio Uchida was baptized in Shioda church, and his daughter, Hatsune Uchida, showed us about her spiritual desire by her daily life and her attitude. We hope she will repent and be baptized. Mr. Uchida said, "I really thank God that I could be baptized at this time and feel surely responsibility for the church in Shioda and also my own family." Many brothers and sisters attended his baptismal service at Shioda church.

At Tamahata, Bro. Akito's young-

er brother, Hisato Inoue, and younger sister Junko Inoue, were both baptized in the river near the church, on Oct. 15 in the afternoon. The service was really wonderful, and the Lord's blessings were with us. Fairly many people went to that river and watched the baptism. After the baptismal service, we brethren surely greeted them by holy kisses in the Tamahata church. No doubt most of our brethren from Shioda and Tokyo churches were attending that service and were blessed very much and encouraged by His grace. Bro. Akito Inoue and those new members were crying for

His blessings. It is no doubt no one can taste of those blessings except we true Christians. We surely thank God for His wonderful gift of Christ Jesus our Lord and Saviour.

After 3 weeks work here in Japan, the dear brothers left Tokyo airport at 9:30 P.M. on the October 23, Monday evening. Twelve of us brothers, sisters and friends meet off the brothers at the airport that night.

Our dearly beloved sister, Anna Haas, was visiting here and gave us real wonderful testimony. We had our brethren and friends like her very much. She left Tokyo on the October 18 Wednesday evening. We surely hope to meet her sometime in future if it is the Lord's will.

We also enjoyed the visit of Dave Moser of Lester (from Thailand) on Oct. 21, 22. May God watch over him until he returns to his home.

May the Lord bless us both, American and Japanese brethren, and keep and guide us—for all eternity—till the time where we meet together in our heavenly home. Amen.
