# FOLLOW ME

This inspired message was written by a brother-in-faith, and came into my possession. Theo. Beer.

He who taught from authority said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life:" and "Verily, verily, I say unto you, I am the door of the sheep." As we further read God's word, our observation teaches that salvation and a Christian life wholly consists of a personal relationship and faith in the person and work of our Lord Jesus Christ, who ascribes to Himself the title, and rightly so, the "good shepherd", which giveth His life for the sheep. Upon the act of our faith in Christ, we may rest assured in His providential care, for time and eternity.

But you say, How can I know these things? How can I receive it for myself, and what must I do?

"Verily, verily, I say unto thee, Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God." But you say, How can this be? Friend, let us take Christ's "Follow me" in simple steps, as He Himself taught.

Do you really believe the Bible is true? You must, if you wish to expect any consolation for time and eternity. Truly believe and be honest with yourself. If you truly

believe the Bible, this leads to Conviction. "For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God."

Without this sense of need and guilt, it would be impossible to sense the need of a Saviour. If conviction is present, this will lead us to Contrition, deep, godly sorrow and humilation for sin. If there is not godly sorrow for sin, one is most likely to turn again into his own sin. If there is not contrition, there is hardly repentance. We need to be sorry for sin, not sorry we cannot sin.

If we have true contrition, this will lead us to Confession. "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins..." Man has tried since Adam and Eve to cover his sin, but let us be sure our sin will find us out.

When one has acknowledged his sin through conviction, contrition, and confession (before God and fellowman), transformation takes place. Things are different now. If any man be in Christ, he is a new creature. Old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new. If this transforming power

is present, we cannot but confess what great things the Lord hath done for our souls.

After whom do you follow? Jesus said, "... wide is the gate, and broad is the way, that leadeth to destruction" but "strait is the gate, and narrow is the way, which leadeth unto life, and few there be that find it." Jesus said, "I am the door". In Revelation we read of another door: "Behold, I stand at the door, and knock: if any man hear my voice, and open the door, I will come in to him, and will sup with him, and he with me."

Yes, dear Friend, why not follow Him who had the authority to say "Follow me". In times like these, you need a Saviour, an anchor for the soul. Jesus is the only one who can help you, for there is none other name under heaven given among men whereby we must be saved. In this stress and strain of life, He will be your constant companion and unfailing guide.

Heed His kind invitation, Follow me, all the way, buried with Him in the waters of baptism, wherein also you are risen with Him through faith unto newness of life.

# HISTORY AMERICAN ELDERS

### **INDIANA**

Leo

Souder Henry, Sr. Born in Wayne County, Ohio, August 17, 1846. Ordained elder 1902 by Bros. Chris Gerber, Fairbury; Michael Mangold, Roanoke; and Andrew Rapp, Morton. Died October 25, 1924.

From 1862 until approximately 1878, services were held in the homes. In 1878 the first church building was erected.

When Bro. Souder was a young man, he was a member of some other denomination. He felt he did

not have what it required to be a true Christian, and began to seek for a faith which complied with the word of God. In the meantime, he repented and received peace with God; then he prayed that God should lead him to the church where he would find the true light.

Bro. Souder was a kind and loving shepherd, was loved and esteemed by young and old. He served as elder, not only in the Leo church, but also in the Bluffton, Bremen, Junction, Latty and Bay City churches.

Bertsch, David, Leo. Born at Grabill, March 5, 1920. Ordained elder February 13, 1966 by Bros. Sam Aeschliman, George Yergler, George Sinn and Theo. Beer.

Milford

Beer, Theo. Born in Mansfield, Jan. 13, 1898. Ordained elder Aug. 5, 1956 by Bros. David Mangold, Roanoke; Samuel Aeschliman, Bluffton; George Yergler, La Crosse; and Joseph Klopfenstein, Gridley.

remodeled in 1940.

The Milford church was served by the following elders throughout the years: Bros. Henry Souder Sr., Leo, Elias Dotterer, Junction; and Samuel Aeschliman, Bluffton. Remington

First elder serving the Remington church was Bro. Chris Gerber, Fairbury, followed by Bros. Jacob Honegger, Forrest; Eugene Schladenhaufen, Cissna Park; Philip

Gutwein Sr., Francesville; George Yergler, La Crosse; and Irvin Lehman, Kentland (Ind.).

In 1900, services were held in the homes, each Sunday at a different home. In 1900, Jacob Von Tobel purchased a quarter section of land, on which the church now stands. He donated a parcel of ground to be used for the building of a church, including the cemetery. In 1903, Bro. John Schieler, who was a carpenter, with the aid of a few volunteer helpers built the first church at a cost of approximately \$1800. In 1910, an addition was made, this building serving its purpose for a period of 37 years, or until 1947. It was then abandoned, and the present modern church was built.

#### Wolcott

Lehman, Irvin, Kentland, Ind. Born in Wolcott, Oct. 21, 1909. Installed elder Jan. 19, 1958 by Bros. George Yergler (La Crosse), Samuel Aeschliman (Bluffton), and

Theo. Beer (Milford).

In 1900 services were held in the homes, each Sunday at a different home. In 1902, there was need for a permanent place of assembly — a piece of land was purchased, and the church building was completed in 1903-1904. During the time the building was being constructed, townsmen offered the congregation the use of an old school building. The frame building that was constructed at that time was in use until 1952—last service being held on Oct. 5, 1952. Construction of the new stone building was started in May, 1951. First services were held on Oct. 12, 1952. Dedication services were held on Nov. 16, 1952.

Mogler, August. Born in Bochingen, Germany, Sept. 5, 1858. Ordained elder by Bro. Joseph Huber, Gridley, Kansas, June 1908. Served from 1908-1916. Died Oct. 20, 1916.

From 1890 to 1892, services were held in the homes of members and friends. The first church building was erected in 1892. In 1908 a small addition was added to the church. In 1948-1949, a new church was built. Dedication services were held Oct. 16, 1949.

The Lester church was served by Bros. Michael Zimmerman (Congerville), Rudolph Witzig (Gridley), Gottlieb Maibach (Pulaski), August Mogler (Lester), Jacob Stettner (Elgin), and Henry Koehl (Morris).

#### Oakville

Schrock, Noah, Burlington, Iowa. Born in Congerville Aug. 29, 1892. Ordained elder May 1940 by Bros. Emil Schubert (Peoria), Carl Rassi (Morton), and David Mangold (Roanoke).

The Oakville church was started in 1903, when there were 7 families. The following year others moved in, including Bro. Albert Reiman, who was the first minister. The first elder was Bro. Gottlieb Maibach, Pulaski, followed by Bro. Andrew Rapp, Morton, serving from 1908-1911; Bro. Barthol Rapp from 1911-1914; Bro. Elias Winzeler, Tremont, from 1914-1939 and Bro. Emil Schubert, Peoria, 1939-1940.

Bro. Noah Schrock began his ministry in 1918, at the age of 25. Bro. Schrock has charge of the churches in Oakville, Burlington, Pulaski, Taylor, Portland, and Silverton.

During various periods Bro. Noah had oversight of the churches in Burlington, Harper, Wichita, Lamont, Gridley, Ft. Scott, Sabetha, Bern, Lamar, Maywood, Altadena, West Bend and Elgin (Ia.).

#### Pulaski

Maibach, Gottlieb. Born in Bern, Switzerland, March 12, 1853. Ordained elder 1895 by Bros. Chris Gerber (Fairbury) and Rudolph Witzig, Gridley.

The first church was built in 1865, about 3 miles southwest of town. The second church was built in 1904, and the third, a new modern structure was erected in 1958 at an approximate cost of \$32,000.

Bro. Geistlich of Switzerland visited Pulaski during his visit to America in 1866. John Miller, Michael Miller and Johannes Nafzinger were among the early Pulaski settlers. Some of the families were living in log cabins. The Frederick Wuthrich family from Uttligen, Switzerland immigrated to Pulaski in 1889.

Pulaski was served by Bros. Rudolph Witzig (Gridley) Michael Zimmerman (Congerville), Michael Mangold (Roanoke), and Noah Schrock (Oakville).

#### West Bend

Banwart, Joe. Ordained elder by Bro. Joseph Huber, Gridley, Kansas. Banwart, Paul. Born in West Bend, 1890. Ordained elder in 1949 by Bros. David Mangold (Roanoke), Noah Schrock (Oakville), and Henry Koehl (Morris).

West Bend was also served by Bros. Jacob Stettner (Elgin) and Noah Schrock (Oakville).

#### KANSAS

#### Bern

Locher, Rudolf. Born in Walkringen, Bern, Switzerland Aug. 19, 1870. Ordained elder in 1935 by Bro. Emil Schubert, Peoria. Served from 1935-1944. Died Sept. 15, 1944.

Wittmer, Joseph. Born in West Union, Iowa, Sept. 17, 1887. Ordained elder Mar. 17, 1946, by Bros. Ernest Graf Sr. (Akron), Noah Schrock (Oakville), and David Mangold (Roanoke).

Bro. Lester Hartter is the present elder.

#### Ft. Scott

A number of brethren came to Ft. Scott in 1893; they held services in the homes. In January 1921, the present building was purchased.

The Ft. Scott congregation was served by Bro. Jacob Somerhalter (Gridley, Kans.) until 1932. Bro. Emil Schubert (Peoria) served as elder from 1932-1940, followed by Bro. Noah Schrock (Oakville) from 1940-1951.

#### Gridley

Huber, Joseph. Born in Gutmadinger, Germany, Dec. 29, 1938. He was installed elder in 1881 by Bro. Benedict Weyeneth, and served from 1881-1917. He died Aug. 7, 1917. Bro. Huber began his ministry in Germany at the age of 27 years, and came to America in 1876. He served the Gridley, Lamont, Ft. Scott, and Lamar churches.

Somerhalder, Jacob. He was born in Rahaage Canton-Argau, Switzerland, Nov. 29, 1853, and ordained elder in January 1921 by Bros. Barthol Rapp (Morton) and Jacob Kaufman. He served until 1932, died Nov. 5, 1945, and was laid to rest in the church cemetery, northwest of Gridley, Kansas.

The Gridley church building was built in 1881 (3 miles northwest of

Gridley). In 1895, the church was destroyed by a severe windstorm. It was rebuilt the same year. In May 1910, it was destroyed by fire. A new church was built that same year, remodeled in 1946.

#### Lamont

Anliker, Samuel. He was born in Cropsey, Ill., Feb. 19, 1905, and installed elder Dec. 15, 1951 by Bros. Noah Schrock (Oakville), Joseph Wittmer (Bern), and Roy Farney (Kiowa). Bro. Anliker also serves the churches in Gridley, Ft. Scott, Wichita, Sabetha and Lamar.

The Lamont church was built in 1881, remodeled in the fall of 1951, and again in 1956.

The Lamont congregation was served by Bros. Jacob Somerhalder (Gridley, Kans.) until 1932. Bro. Emil Schubert (Peoria) served as elder from 1932-1940, followed by Bro. Noah Schrock (Oakville) from 1940-1951.

#### Wichita

Wichita was served by Bro. Noah Schrock (Oakville) from 1940-1951. Bro. Roy Farney (Kiowa, Kansas) had oversight of the Wichita Church from 1951-1959, and resigned because of failing health, following which Bro. Samuel Anliker, (Gridley, Kansas) was assigned the oversight.

#### **MICHIGAN**

#### Alto

Katherine Wingeier emigrated from Switzerland and settled in the Lowell, Michigan, area (in approximately 1879), being the early settler in the area. She stood seemingly alone, as in a wilderness, for 13 years, with no members nor churches of her faith for more than 100 miles, but she had God as her companion. While baptized against opposition, her modest spiritual life was a help to others finding the faith. She was the mother of seven sons.

The first edifice was built in 1921, on Bro. Ferdinand and Sis. Anna Wingeier's farm, at a cost of a few thousand dollars. The building was remodeled again in 1946.

Alto was served by Bros. Gottlieb Maibach (Bay City) Ernest

It is suggested that, for every home into which the Silver Lining goes, there should be given \$2.00 per year, where it works no hardship. the editor Graf Sr. (Akron), Godfrey Rauch (Bluffton), Otto Ramseyer (Bay City), Rudolph Graf (Akron), George Sinn (Latty), and Joe Waibel (Pinconning, Mich.).

#### Detroit

The first services in Detroit were held in the home of Bro. Ben Maibach Jr., Feb. 9, 1948 by Bros. Otto Ramseyer and Henry Wackerle, with about 75 present. Services were later held in the Redford War Memorial Home, commencing Jan. 1, 1950.

First services were held in the new building, 26741 Five Mile Rd., July 2, 1950. The building was constructed at an approximate cost of \$30,000. In 1957 further remodeling was required, to provide additional facilities, bringing the total cost to \$60,000.

Bay City

Maibach, Gottlieb. Born in Bern, Switzerland, Mar. 12, 1853, and ordained elder in Pulaski, in 1895 by Bros. Chris Gerber (Fairbury), and Rudolph Witzig (Gridley). Bro. Maibach served as elder in the Pulaski church until 1905, when he moved to Bay City. He served in Bay City from 1905-1922, and died June 8, 1922.

Ramseyer, Otto. Born in Harper, Kansas, Sept. 16, 1888. He was ordained elder Aug. 3, 1941 by Bros. Elias Dotterer (Junction) and Jacob Stettner (Elgin). Due to ill health, Bro. Ramseyer was relieved of his duties in 1955.

Waibel, Joseph. Born in Forrest, May 26, 1899, and ordained elder Feb. 6, 1955 by Bros. Noah Schrock (Oakville), David Mangold (Roanoke), Philip Beyer (Castorland), and Rudolph Graf (Akron). He moved to Bay City in 1908 with his parents. They made their home in Kawkawlin, Mich.

Late in 1903, the Chas. E. Lambert and Julius J. Lambert families moved from Oklahoma and located on farms west of Linwood. In 1904 the Carl Wieland family moved from Cissna Park to a mile west of Kawkawlin. In 1905, the Henry Freidinger family from Cissna Park moved on a farm south of Linwood. Since 1905 regular church services were held in the homes of members, rotating from Sunday to Sunday, so as not to be burdensome to any one family. In 1906 the George Wackerle Sr. family moved from

Cissna Park to several miles west of Kawkawlin.

The little congregation grew. They located rough-sawed lumber from the woods many miles away, hauled it with horses, wagons and sometimes sleighs, and the church building was erected in 1907. The ground for the original building and cemetery was donated by Bro. Geo. Wackerle Sr.

This building served the fast-growing congregation until 1918, when the building was raised 8 ft., providing dining room, kitchen, Sunday School rooms and stairways. A new building was erected in 1953, dedicated April 4, 1954, with a seating capacity of 500. Bro. William Stevig helped with the design of these churches.
