HISTORY AMERICAN ELDERS

MINNESOTA

Morris

Stettner, Jacob. Born in Ohringen, Wurttemberg, Germany, Nov. 27, 1869, came to America in 1884. He moved from Elgin, May 1, 1911, returning to Elgin August 1928, but continued to serve the Morris and Winthrop churches until 1941.

Koehl, Henry. Born in Illinois, Nov. 14, 1882, and ordained elder in 1941 by Bros. Jacob Stettner (Elgin), Ernest Graf Sr. (Akron), and Elias Dotterer (Junction).

Fehr, Paul. Born at West Bend, ordained elder June 14, 1964, by Bros. Noah Schrock; Silas Leuthold, Paul Banwart and Leo Moser.

The Morris Church was served over the years by Bros. Gottlieb Maibach (Pulaski), John Anliker (West Bend) and August Mogler.

MISSOURI

Lamar

Several families of believers moved to Lamar in 1901. Services were held in the homes until the present church was built in 1902; it was remodeled in 1947.

The Lamar congregation was served by Bro. Jacob Somerhalder (Gridley Kans.) until 1932. Bro. Emil Schubert (Peoria) served from 1932-1940, followed by Bro. Noah Schrock, Oakville, 1942-1951, followed by Bro. Samuel Anliker, Gridley Kans.

Taylor

Grimm, Fred. Born in Elgin, Iowa, Aug. 14, 1909, and ordained elder Dec. 21, 1960 by Bros. Silas Leuthold and Noah Schrock. He died March 31, 1967.

In 1918, Bro. Andrew Yackley, with his family, moved to the community, followed by four or five additional families during the next three to four years. In 1926, Bro. Edward Grimm and family and Will Butikofer and Eli Sutter and families moved from Elgin, Iowa. The first services of the Taylor church were held July 4, 1926. Bro. Grimm had previously ministered, so was appointed the resident minister, and served until his death, Nov. 29, 1937.

For many years a small converted dwelling served as a meeting-place, until the new edifice was built and dedicated in August, 1950.

At that time there were 8 families serving, and 23 members.

Bro. Elias Winzeler (Tremont) was assigned the oversight of the church, followed by Bros. Emil Schubert (Peoria) and Noah Schrock (Oakville).

NEW YORK

Naumburg

Virkler, Joseph. Born in Switzerland, Sept. 24, 1816, ordained elder in the year 1852 by Bro. Benedict Weyeneth, and served from 1852-1866. He died Oct. 2, 1866. Joseph Virkler was extraordinarily active and traveled much for the proclamation of the gospel.

Virkler, Peter, Croghan. Born July 23, 1829, installed elder in the year 1867, served from 1867-1889. He died Nov. 14, 1889. Bro. Peter Virkler traveled extensively, and was founder of the Oregon church-

Virkler, Solomon, Croghan. Born May 5, 1855, and installed elder in 1891, and served from 1891-1897. He died Nov. 14, 1897.

Virkler, Alpheus, Croghan (1853-1918). He was installed elder in the year 1903, and served from 1903-1918.

Beyer, Philip, Castorland, New York. Born in Naumburg, Feb. 3, 1888, ordained elder Sept. 18, 1938 by Bros. Ernest Graf Sr. (Akron), Noah Hartzler (Rittman), and George Yergler (La Crosse). Served from 1938-1958. He died Oct. 23, 1958.

Bro. John Widrick is the present elder.

History of Beginning of Apostolic Christian Church

The oldest settlements and congregations arose in Lewis County (now New Bremen) in the state of New York.

A French emigrant, Count de Chaumont, in 1815 founded the settlement called "French Settlement" at Black River. Settlement was largely forest primeval, with wild animals, and it was still the battlefield of the Indians.

Among the early settlers were several Mennonite families, such as the Virkler and Farney families. (The history of the Virkler family goes back to the year 1698, to Peter Virkler, who lived in the Emmen-

thal, Bern, Switzerland. He was a Believer, who endeavored to live according to the truth of the apostles.

The Virkler and Farney families (Farney was an elder of the congregation) were on the ocean 42 days until their arrival in New York, and then traveled by ship up the Hudson River to the French settlement. They acquired a tract of land for \$703.11—\$1.50 per acre.

At the request of Joseph Virkler in Lewis County, who had heard of Bro. Froehlich, Bro. Benedict Weyeneth came to America in 1847. Born in Switzerland, June 2, 1819, he was chosen elder for this purpose, consecrated by Bro. Froehlich and commissioned to go to America. He preached among them and founded a congregation.

The first elder who was appointed in America in 1847 by Bro. Weyeneth was Bro. Jos. Virkler, eldest of seven sons of Rudolph Virkler.

The oversight of the New York church was in charge of Bro. Ernest Graf (Akron) from approximately the time he was ordained in 1922 to 1938.

OHIO Akron

Graf, Ernest Sr. Born in Schaffhausen, Switzerland, Nov. 9, 1873. installed Elder May 22, 1922 by Bros. Michael Mangold (Roanoke), Elias Winzeler (Tremont), and Joseph Ingold (Sardis). Served from 1922-1946. He died May 30, 1946.

Bro. Graf was the youngest son of a Reformed Lutheran family. His father, as a widower, brought his family to Ohio in March, 1883.

Back in 1943, World War II was on. We had a Sunday School class of between 50 and 75 young people in total number. From our congregation and close ones, twenty-eight boys were in the service. (They all returned but one.) It was very important that there would be some

way we keep in contact with them. We came to the conclusion to get out a paper. The first paper went out October, 1943, to 35. Since that time the Korean War was on, and now the Viet Nam War. Many boys get their paper by air mail; this way it takes fewer days. We are mailing around 5500, which takes 12, or approximately, mail sacks. The cost of getting the paper out, the printing, postage, etc., is around \$600.00. Our work and our colaborers' work is without charge.

All reporters receive a letter every month from Bro. Ed Souder, who is the news correspondent. He gives them information for writing the news. The contents of the future paper are gone over very thoroughly.

On Monday a group gets together, and mail is prepared. We now have a new tying machine; this lessens and helps work considerably. We are now anticipating on getting a new addressing machine, which will be fully automatic. This also will be a good improvement, and will help considerably.

The staff wishes to thank everyone for their part in this work. Thanks for the hundreds of letters we get from those who get the paper.

The paper is available to anyone who wishes to have it. Keep your eyes open for someone that might appreciate it.

Here are a few suggestions which will help. It has cost as much as over \$1 a day, when the post office notifies that someone has moved. (Each form costs 10c.) IF YOU INTEND TO MOVE, please notify your reporter 30 days in advance, so they can let us know. We would appreciate it very much if every Church would set a time or two and make their collections in a group. You can work with your ministers and reporters. A number of churches are doing this. It works out very nicely.

tized at Ashtabula, Ohio, on Christmas Day, 1889.

Soon after Bro, Graf's ordination, he was called to be a regular helper to Bro. Chris Gerber at the churches in New York State, Rockville, and Union City. Following Bro. Gerber's resignation in 1930, he served New York State until Bro. Philip Beyer's ordination in 1938, and the Rockville and Union City churches until Bro. John Bahler's ordination in 1943. A mutual and lasting bond of love sprung up during the years of his services to the eastern churches.

Bro. Graf also served the Sardis church 1932-1946, Rittman—1922-1925, Girard and Mansfield, 1922-1946; and the Maywood church.

He traveled from coast to coast and to Europe, in the interest and promotion of church duties. He was helpful in numerous translations, German to English, including the Zion's Harp and Heftli. He was an avid reader and had a good memory, from which he could give interesting and detailed accounts of what he read and experienced.

Graf, Rudolph, Akron. Born in Akron, Oct. 21, 1902. Installed elder Dec. 1, 1946, by Bros. Noah Hartzler, Rittman; Elias Dotterer, Junction; and Otto Ramseyer, Bay City. In addition to Akron, he is serving the Sardis, Girard, Mansfield and Toledo churches.

The first members at Akron

came during the 1860's—family names such as Schwing, Brigger and Blumenstein. Bro. Geistlich of Switzerland visited Akron during his notable visit to America in 1866.

In 1880, the families of Brenner, Braun and Mueller came from Germany. In 1892-1893 families such as the John Meyers, Chris Von Guntens, Gottlieb Von Guntens, Carl Tschantz, Jacob Rupp, Albert Zollinger and Chris Roth came from Ashtabula, Ohio (among them were Ernest Graf & Sam Baumgartner).

It shows gladdening of the spirit. ". . . ask, and ye shall receive, that your joy may be full." Laughter awaits in the hereafter (and what happiness does that show!) What did Jesus mean when He said "joy"? He was a man of sorrows,

yet we can read in Luke 10 where He rejoiced. Joy is an everlasting trait of God. It is one of the things that is part of Him.

What He meant by joy is revealed in His word. It is a deep gladness of the heart. It rebounds from news, and things, that are forever and ever.

God's holiness is blessed to ponder, and wonderful to praise. Joy and wonder wait its deeper discovery. Why does God chasten? "for our profit, that we might be partakers of his holiness."

Being free from sin is so nice. Think about His holiness, a beautiful wealth. This holy God has not the slightest, smallest mistake or speck. Not one at all. Worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness. He is lovely and pure, spotless. His word glows with more and more adventure, to those who look.

Our grades are in His mind. God is working for our good. The flames heat the gold, our spirit, to liquid. Then the specks are taken away. Though we do not see Jesus, we know Him: "yet believing, ye rejoice with joy unspeakable and full of glory". Grasp that wonderful adventure!

Yet with all this, more wonderful life awaits at home. Those speakings that cannot be spoken, there is something wonderful. What is it that is to be spoken? It is not allowed a man to speak here. There is more, much more: the land, the home, the world to come. "He that overcometh shall inherit all things; and I will be his God, and he shall be my son."

He gives that we may discover the adventure to come.
