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JESUS CHRIST THE SON OF GOD CRUCIFIED AT JERUSALEM

About 3970 years after the creation of the world, in the 42nd year of the reign of Augustus, the second Roman emperor, when the whole world was at peace, Jesus Christ was born of the virgin Mary, in the little town of Bethlehem, being the only and eternal Son of God, the Word by which all things are made, yea, God blessed forever.

His entrance into this world, as well as His progress and end, were full of misery, distress and affliction, indeed it may be said: He was born under the cross; brought up under the cross; He walked under the cross, and finally died on the cross.

Touching His birth, He was conceived of the Holy Ghost. His birth ushered Him into great poverty; for He was not born in His maternal city, Nazareth, but Bethlehem, which was the cause that no suitable place could be prepared for His birth; yea, even more, He could obtain no place in the inn, but had to be born in a stable; and when He was born, He was wrapped in swaddling clothes, and laid in a manger.

Touching His bringing up, it was attended with much sorrow, for when He was still less than two years old, Herod persecuted Him even unto death; on account of which His foster-father, Joseph, and His mother Mary, had to flee into Egypt and remain there until Herod's death. Meanwhile there were killed all the children of two years and under in and about Bethlehem, so that the voice of lamentation was heard in all the boundaries of that region; of which the prophet, Jeremiah had prophesied: "A voice was heard in Ramah, lamentation, and bitter weeping; Rahel weeping for her children refused to be comforted for her children, because they were not.'

As regards His life and conversation among men, He was considered an enthusiast and vagrant, because He had no permanent place of abode; which latter was nevertheless thus bitter for Him: "Foxes have holes, and birds of the air have nests; but the Son of man hath not where to lay his head." Meanwhile He was reproached: as being the friend of publicans and sinners, a glutton and a winebibber, yea, that He was possessed with the devil ... and this until the hour of His departure was nigh at hand.

Concerning the end of His life, it was the most miserable, for it was, so to speak, the day when all the fountains of the great deep broke forth over Him, and the floods of suffering overflowed Him, to swallow Him up altogether.

First of all, He was betrayed by His disciple Judas, who sold Him for thirty pieces of silver to the high priests and Pharisees. Then He was delivered unto them, sharply examined, yea adjured to say WHETHER He was the Christ, the Son of God. . . And as soon as the Lord had confessed this they cried, "He is guilty of death."

Then they spit in His face, and buffeted Him. Others covered His face, saying, "Prophesy unto us, thou Christ, Who is he that smote thee?" They delivered Him to Pontius Pilate, the judge, to pronounce the sentence of death upon Him, and to put an end to His life.

Pilate said, "What accusation bring ye against this man?" They answered, "If he were not a malefactor, we would not have delivered him up unto thee." Pilate said, "Take ye him, and judge him according to your law", for he perceived that for envy they had delivered Him.

Pilate took Jesus into the judg-

ment hall, and having examined Him, said that he found no cause of death in Him. Therefore he sought a means to release Him; moreover, he caused Him to be terribly scourged. Crowned with thorns, mocked, and thus disfigured, brought before the Jews. "Behold the man!" (so that they might now be satisfied with His suffering, and spare His life). It was of no avail; they cried the more, "Crucify him, crucify him." "If thou let this man go, thou art not Caesar's friend".

Finally, when Pilate saw that the Jews were not to be moved, and fearing that they might accuse him before Ceasar, he went and sat down in the judgment seat, in the place called Lithostratos, and in Hebrew, Gabbatha, a paved elevation in Jerusalem; and there, though quite against his conscience, pronounced the sentence of death upon Christ.

They nailed Him to a cross, and raised Him up which was done, according to our reckoning, at about nine o'clock in the morning.

They parted His garments, and again derided Him shamefully and above measure. A great darkness came, continuing for about three hours; and the Lord cried out with a loud voice, "Eli, Eli, lama sabachthani?" that is, "My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?"

Then, having fulfilled all, He commended His soul into His Father's hands, saying, "Father, into thy hands I commend my spirit". Thereupon He bowed His head and expired, having suffered excruciatingly six hours on the cross, from nine o'clock in the morning till three in the afternoon (according to our reckoning).

Then the earth began to quake, the rocks were rent, the graves (Continued on page 2)

Orin Rufener, Rittman, presented plans for a building at the Desi-Scott Children's Home, Pine Ridge, Ken-tucky. It was reported that there are 66 homes for unwanted and needy children in Kentucky. A brother who visited these homes asked, "Who among us can deny help to a little child?"

Heifer Project Operation in Dominican Republic was investigated by Bros. Pierre Niehouser, Wm. Klopfenstein, and Herman Norr. Since February 1963 Heifer Project has given training and animals to 351 families. In addition over 10,000 pounds of seeds were distributed, with instruction in planting and care.

Care in Dominican Republic: 20 million lbs. of food per year is distributed to 400,000 school children, home for aged, hospitals. Each child receives one warm meal daily; the attendance has increased 25 to 40% since lunch started. Funds were furnished since 1962.

Haiti: Hospital Albert Schweitzer visited. . . The average number of patients is 160. 1500 receive tetanus shots daily. TB cases are 50% less than five years ago.

I remember what a tragedy it seemed to my youthful mind, and I looked up to see how you were taking it. There you stood, with your thumbs tucked under your sweatstained suspenders. Yes . . . you had an oat-crop failure that year, but without realizing it you raised a far more valuable crop. You taught a growing boy the virtue of patience in the face of adversity and disappointment and to bear whatever the good Lord sent.

Sis. Lena was born May 5, 1875 on a farm near Forrest. Her father, George Scharlach being a tailor by trade forsook the farm and the family and moved to Fairbury. Here, he again took up the trade in which he was skilled. At one time he mended a pair of trousers for Abraham Lincoln, who was giving a speech in this area and had a mishap while horseback riding between stops.

At the age of 12, Lena went to work, away from home, for 50 cents a week. Later she told her family how lonesome she would get, but with the horse and buggy it was quite impossible to cover the distance to home for a month or more. She repented at the age of 19, and was married to Bro. Peter Bach at Fairbury at the age of 26, by Bro. Jacob Honegger. To this union were born 8 children. Having lived as neighbors, we remember many kind and neighborly acts, the sending over of food when there was illness, caring for our youngsters when we later moved. When our mother passed away, Sis. Lena was there

to meet us when we returned from the hospital, with words of comfort and tears of sympathy. Many, many times her home was opened to visitors, who were served willingly and hospitably. Being an efficient, orderly natured person, she managed her home in a like manner. Often she told her children. "Watch the clock!"

Bro. William Stahl was born February 9, 1873, the son of Leonard and Katherine Kieser Stahl, in Mortelstein, Baden, Germany. He came to this country in 1890 and settled in the Morton vicinity. (He returned to his homeland for a visit in 1894.) He married Sis. Karolina Herrmann August 25, 1895 in Morton, and they lived there until 1897, when they moved to the Princeville community. They attended church at Streitmatter Prairie, and Bro. Will taught Sunday School in the little schoolhouse across from the church and also in the new church for many years. In 1910 he visited Germany again.

He became a trustee of the church, along with Bros. Sam and Jacob Streitmatter. These three brothers had many responsibilities when it was decided to build a new church building in the village of Princeville. They made many sacrifices so that the debt could be paid, and we owe them much thanks. Bro. Will longed to once again visit Germany, and did so in 1922. Even in later y e a r s he thought he would like to go again.

Bro. Will and Sis. Carrie lived on farms in the Princeville vicinity, until they moved into a newly-built home in Princeville in 1947. Will was a most interesting visitor, and went to great details in explaining something. He kept a complete diary and everyday recorded the temperature, weather and daily happenings. He always looked into the sky before retiring and was always interested where the moon was. His eyesight was very keen, but his hearing not so good. He loved children and always had candy for them. Many were fascinated with the beard he wore until his death. He was one of the firm pillars of the church and was firm in his convictions. At the time of his death he had four daughters, six sons, 35 grandchildren and 5 great-grandchildren. Four of his children have been to Germany and saw his birthplace.

Memories

In the year of 1893, John and Anna Hoerr Rassi came to the United States from Bavaria, Germany with their four daughters and two sons. They lived at Morton, and while there, three of their daughters married and came to the Princeville vicinity to live. Marie Martin, Martha Kieser, and Elizabeth Endress lived on farms until their later years, when they moved to the village of Princeville. Marie lived on one side of the street, and her sisters Martha and Elizabeth lived side by side across the street. The three sisters enjoyed their later years together, and all kept their hands busy sewing and knitting. They all made beautiful afghans for their grandchildren and others, and it was a common sight to see one or the other going across the street with their knitting in their hands. They lived near the church and were happy they could assemble with their loved ones. They had all suffered many hardships during their younger years, but God was good to them in their later years, and they had many joys and blessings.

Marie Rassi Martin was born in Bavaria, Germany, August 26, 1871, and departed this life April 5, 1952. She was converted at the age of 18 years. Isaiah 43, verses 1 and 2 were revealed to her when she received peace with God, and she clung to those words as long as she lived. "But now thus saith the LORD that created thee, O Jacob, and he that formed thee, O Israel, Fear not: for I have redeemed thee. I have called thee by thy name; thou art mine When thou passest through the waters, I will be with thee; and through the rivers, they shall not overflow thee: when thou walkest through the fire, thou shalt not be burned; neither shall the flame kindle upon thee.'

She married Christian Martin in Morton, March 8 1896. Her husband was very ill about a year. Being a mother with nine children between the ages of $1\frac{1}{2}$ and 19, the thought of his not getting well worried her. She prayed very fervently that he should get well, and while she was praying she heard a voice, It shall not be so; my grace will be sufficient for this. With this faith she weathered many storms. Her husband passed away October 20 1917, and on October 5 1925, a 15-year-old daughter was called from this life. Her oldest daughter met her reward on September 16 1937, and her youngest son died very suddenly February 4 1949, leaving his young wife and two small sons. A grandson very dear to her heart passed away July 11, 1965, but she was spared the sorrow of seeing him to his grave. Two sons-in-law met tragic deaths, and when mourners went to share her sorrow and comfort her, they found it was she who had comforted them, with her abiding faith and trust. At the time of her death, she left a letter for each of her children, urging them to keep close to God.

She was a great lover of nature and could see the beauty in the flowers, trees, fields and birds, the entire creation of God. It was not an unusual sight to see her in her garden, looking for a bud to unfold.

She enjoyed reading very much, and did a lot of handwork. She pieced numerous quilts, and all the children, grandchildren, and even nieces and nephews received one. She pieced over 100 flower garden quilts. She made many pairs of mittens for the little folks, out of scraps of yarn from her afghans, Many beautiful pillows were made for her friends. She loved to have visitors, and all left after a visit with her feeling uplifted. Her outstanding faith was one that many of us would like to possess.

of us would like to possess. At the time of her death, she had 29 grandchildren, and it was a regular Sunday afternoon occurrence for her children and grandchildren to visit her, which brought her great joy. She was greatly loved by all, and has been sadly missed by all who knew her; yet we know she has been spared heartaches, and one can only thank the loving Lord for taking her home.

Martha Rassi Kieser was born July 16, 1881 at Bavaria, Germany, and was 12 years old when she came to this country with her parents, sisters and brothers. At the age of 15 she repented, gave her heart to the Lord, and remained true and faithful. She was united in marriage to David Kieser at Morton, on February 8, 1903. On June 29, 1916, he was seriously injured, and on July 2, God sent the death angel to call him Home at the age of 37, leaving his widow with 8 small children, the oldest being $12\frac{1}{2}$ years of age and the youngest son 2 months old (he is now a minister).

Just six months before his death, he wanted to purchase a farm near Speer, in the Princeville community, but she being afraid of debts and also wanting to stay near her aged mother, repeatedly prayed that the deal would fall through. One day before he made his last trip to bind the transaction she prayed sincerely, "Oh Lord, Thy Will, not mine be done;" and a loud clear voice answered her, "This time you prayed right." She was then assured it was God's will.

Then six months later came this terrible tragedy, with the sudden death of her husband. In faith she clung to her Lord as her only Refuge and Help. Then poverty came to her door, and not too long after came her turn to serve lunch at church. In sympathy the brethren wanted to pass her turn, but when she heard this, she asked the elder not to deny her this privilege, as she knew this would not make her any poorer. Hearing this he said, "We will not take this blessing from her." She had a dear brother, Carl Rassi, living near her, who so faithfully came to her aid with good advice whenever she would lean upon him, and this she certainly did in her great need and weakness.

Several weeks after her aged mother's death in June 1920, the landlady told her she would have to move (she had her own farm at Speer, Ill.), which she then did in December 1920 with much reluctance, as she had to leave her dear brother and his good advice. Knowing this must be the Lord's will, she took her brood and entrusted them unto God's care. He certainly provided for her and her family.

All of her children by the grace of God were able to repent. In her own handwriting she wrote in the Family Bible the following words, "If it had not been for our dear Lord's help, strength, mercy and infinite love, it would have been unbearable. To God be thanks, praise and honor for His great love and mercy shown unto me His poor child and unto all my dear children." Her greatest concern was for the soul's welfare of her children and grandchildren. The dear Lord richly blessed her spiritually and materially. She had a heart of love and sympathy, and so richly shared her blessings with others less fortunate. She loved to visit the sick and those who were shut-in, and seldom went empty-handed. It seemed the more she gave, the more she was blessed. Her greatest pleasure was doing for others and having company. She was often chided about her name being "Martha", but she loved company and to feed everyone who came to her door.

In 1948, she was stricken with a coronary heart attack and was confined to her bed for six weeks, but in due time fully recovered and was again able to entertain and share her blessings with much joy. It was not unusual for her to come on Sunday, if company was in church, and say, "Come, let us get supper for so and so." Everyone was welcome anytime, and she believed that sometime she may be entertaining a heavenly stranger unaware. She was always blessed with good health, with the exception of the siege with her heart, and then very unexpectedly within two days she was called Home as a ripe fruit, at the age of 77 years. Some of her last words on her

Some of her last words on her death bed were, to remain true and humble.

One daughter passed away at the age of 17. Eleven months prior she had surgery, and was apparently recuperating nicely when she repented, received peace with God and was awaiting baptism. Her bodily afflictions suddenly became worse, and she no longer could go to church. She then gave her testimony of faith at her home and was baptized by immersion, on a bed sheet. Her faith was one not many at such a young age possess, and it left an impression on her brothers and sisters.

Elizabeth Rassi Endress was born in Bavaria, Germany, February 23 1886, and departed this life January 22, 1956. She was eight years old when she came to this country, and lived with her parents in Morton, and attended school there. She repented in her youth and was baptized in Morton. She had a beautiful singing voice, and one of her greatest delights was going to singing, joining with others, singing hymns of praise to God.

She married Godfrey Endress December 8 1912, and they lived on a farm near Speer. He passed away February 28 1940, at the age of 54. They were the parents of eight children. One son passed away in infancy, and one son passed away recently.

She will always be remembered by her family and those close to her for the example of her Christian life, her cheerful disposition and ready smile. She had a quiet, friendly nature, and loved by all. One of her greatest concerns was that her children and grandchildren would repent and have hope of salvation for their souls. All but one of her children were converted, and several of her grandchildren also.

She also was a great lover of flowers, and one would often see her working with them and admiring the beauty. She found pleasure in going out to her daughters and planting flowers for her.

She loved her family and was concerned that they would not be deceived. She had a deep insight and could see Satan's ways of deception. May we all take a lesson from this, take more time to read our Bibles, and follow the examples our dear ones have set for us.

The Sunday School rooms adjoin the dining area in the basement. The Sunday School assembly is divided into individual rooms by folding doors. Two additional rooms are provided for the primary classes. The dining room has a seating capacity of one hundred.

POOR, YET SO HAPPY

Your editor It is not good. It will bring sorrow.

The world frowns. Their heydey is fun. They are off, more chase. They look on God's child as poor. We stay away from their broad road. We do not join their sin. Yet look closely . . . God's child has it beautiful: "As sorrowful, yet alway rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing all things."

Home is coming. We think of a holiday as in the future, away some days. Then. We are there. In the same way, we shall soon arrive at home. Then we may say, Here we are. Here is our God. Isn't it wonderful!

Do we know the value of a word in quietness? We would find richer measure of joy if our hearts would become bigger: "O ye Corinthians, our mouth is open unto you, our heart is enlarged." How rich can we get with growing, as we pass the hours.

Someone else don't hold us down. Nor stop us. The reason for not being sweeter is right in ourself. "Ye are not straitened in us, but ye are straitened in your own bowels." This is the inner part. Where we want to. Or don't want to.

What beautiful love we could have if we would ask. What lovely scenes would come to pass. "Now for a recompence in the same, (I speak as unto my children,) be ye also enlarged."

The children have a beautiful life. To be free is lovely for what it is. And for what it is not. "Be ye not unequally yoked together with unbelievers:" The Scripture shows our footsteps. Pulling together! Not with someone of a different heart?

The test of a church is its holding or falling back: "for what fellowship hath righteousness with unrighteousness?" It was our Lord Himself who told us to be careful. There will be righteous from every point of the compass, the Scripture shows. Yet, Jesus warned to look out for wolves in sheep's clothing. Remember, He does the adding. We do the proving. ". . . and what com-munion hath light with darkness? And what concord hath Christ with Belial? or what part hath he that believeth with an infidel?" There are certain points where truth cuts away, sharply. Certain points are matters very, very important.
