## SIMON PETER THE SON OF JONA

Simon Peter was one of the twelve disciples of Jesus. We know him as the disciple who was quick to talk, quick to express his opinions. Often we can compare with us, because many of us find ourselves quick to say what we think. He was called by different names. Sometimes it was Peter, then Cephas, then he was also Simon Peter. It was over 50 times that he was named in the New Testament. That is the time to take—take time to especially look up his life. Peter's work was a very special kind; he was a fisherman with his brother, Andrew, and with partners James and John.

John the Baptist said, "Behold the Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world." Andrew first met the Lord. He went, and he enjoyed to listen to the Lord for a short time. Then he went and met his brother, Peter, and said to him, "We have found the Messiah . . . Then Andrew brought Peter to Jesus. Jesus said "Thou art Simon, son of Jona: thou shalt be called Cephas", which means, "A stone". This was Peter's first meeting with the Lord. He felt that Jesus was a very outstanding person.

In Luke 5 we read, Jesus said unto them, "Launch out into the deep, and let down . . . for a draught. . . Simon said, Master, we have toiled all . . . night. . . at thy word I will let down the net." They enclosed so many that the net brake. The disciples were surprised. Jesus said, "Fear not; from henceforth thou shalt catch men." When they had brought the ships, they forsook them and followed Him.

Shall we not learn that who follow the Lord should let down the net for fish? He will with the blessing of the Lord cause men to enter the net. The net is the word of God, and if we send it out, some

will be caught. How shall we do it? By telling the people of the love of Jesus Christ. How glad He is to forgive. It is true, we will not always catch fish. We have tried to be good fishers of men, but we must admit we have toiled all night and caught nothing. Sometimes we will have to listen and cast the net on the other side of the ship. About the time we are about ready to give up, unexpectedly some will repent.

The time we said, "If the young friends would repent, we would have the courage to build a new church, a sister said, "If we would build a new church, then they would perhaps repent." We prayed to God about a new building. The old building was so small. The Lord taught us how to plan to build. Soon we had a nice group of converts. What a blessing that was. Often it was those we had the least hope for. One said, "I'll never repent." Soon he came crying from another room and was repenting. The evening dishes were in the dish water, but they left them there and went over to tell her parents they were repenting. They stayed there, and the dishes stayed unwashed. What came to our minds? It was the woman at Jacob's well. When He told her about her past life and she was convicted of her sins, she left the water pot she had come to fill, went back to her home, and told the people, Come, see a man, which told me all things that I ever did. Is this not the Christ? Then they came out of the city to see Him. We and this couple that left the dishes never failed to think of the woman at the well who went home without her water-pot.

How wonderful it was to us to find we could be fishers of men. There were nine that repented at that time, I believe, and at two intervals at later times, nine more

each time came into God's net. We read of what the Lord taught of things for us to do to tell of Jesus Christ, and different ways, showing our love to young folks, and taking a lively interest in them, and then we'll become satisfactory "fishers of men".

Dear ones, this still works today. Let us never get discouraged and give up. Many times we will have to fish all night, a whole month, yes a whole year or more without catching anything, but if we obey God's word and cast the net on the other side of the ship, we will catch more for the Lord.

The ministers who preach plainly to the friends in church, and the Sunday School teachers and any that will talk about Christ and His love for us are "fishers of men". Surely sometime some fish will be caught, if God's word is obeyed by the true fishers of men.
