THE SILVER LINING

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IS ANY SIN "UNFORGIVEABLE"?

The words of Jesus in Matthew 12:31-32 and Mark 3:28-29 have always been a source of profound contemplation, misunderstanding and agitation. People ask, "How can there be any sin which God refuses to forgive?" "How is it possible to sin against the Holy Spirit in an unforgiveable way without sinning against Christ in the same way?" "Of what purpose is it to try to continue in the Christian walk, when once there is reason to believe the unpardonable sin has been committed?" Occasionally we meet souls who are convinced that he or she has committed the unpardonable sin. The despair of the damned is evident in their behavior, and nothing that most of us can do or say can convince them otherwise. However, the great tragedy of the unpardonable sin is that it is always the wrong people who are worried about it. As long as one is still capable of worrying about it, he is not capable of having committed it.

A closer examination of the circumstances surrounding Christ's utterance of those solemn and awful words will prove enlightening. He had just performed a miracle of healing, insomuch that the people marvelled and said, "Is not this the Son of David?" . . . but the Pharisees, blinded by their hatred and envy, tried to persuade the people that this was an evil act by an evil man for an evil purpose. They attributed it to an alliance with the forces of Satan. With the help of several illustrations, let us consider what a dreadful thing that was to do.

Imagine that the next time our brethren on the World Relief Committee take our contributions to the land of Haiti, a strange thing occurs. As they are about to distribute food to the starving folks of that unfortunate land, certain highly-placed and influential men step

between our brothers and the outstretched arms. They shout, "Don't touch it! This is a trick to deceive you! It is poison! Have nothing to do with these men and their so-called food. They are evil." Then, of course, the starving people might easily be forced away to die in their need.

Jesus, with His disciples, came bringing the very Bread of Life, the Food of the Soul. The Pharisees, blinded by hate, shouted "Don't touch it! It's poison! Have nothing to do with it! This work is of the devil!" This was a sin without forgiveness.

If you have visited Mammoth Cave in Kentucky, you have seen the deep underground river that flows in perpetual darkness, and you have been told that the fish that swim in those waters are totally blind. If you were to catch one of those fish and examine it, you would find that the structure of eyes is perfect, but the optic nerve is shrivelled and lifeless. It can no longer carry the impulse of light to the brain. The dread law of atrophy has been at work, whereby the misuse or disuse of a faculty results in that faculty's being withdrawn. Having eyes, they see not.

A fish, of course, cannot sin; it has no power of choice . . . But let us assume, for the sake of illustration, that the fish swimming in those deep waters had the power of choice, and that some of them chose deliberately to swim only in the darkness. Having chosen darkness, very soon such a fish could no longer distinguish between light and darkness. If later it swam into the light, it would be unaware of that fact. It now knows no difference between midnight and noon. It has so misused and disused the faculty of seeing that the power to see has perished. Illustratively, it has committed the unpardonable sin

Herein lies a solemn warning. If hatred, fear, envy or any other motive of the devil so possesses us that we are confusing light with darkness; if we say "That good person is evil", or "That good thing is in reality an evil thing", we had better realize that we are heading slowly into those dark waters where the power to distinguish between light and darkness will be withdrawn. If such a person were to be confronted with the full blaze of heaven and glory of God, he could not distinguish it from the blackness of hell. He has committed the unpardonable sin.

But here is a point of tremendous importance: The unpardonable sin is not unpardonable because God refuses any plea for pardon. There is no sin which man is capable of committing but what he can find pardon if he humbly seeks such pardon from God, longs to be in a right relationship with Him, is willing to forgive his brother also, and puts his relationships with man as right as he can. The unpar-donable sin is unpardonable because it leads a man into a situation where, through his own fault, he cannot discern what is sin. He has lost the power to distinguish between light and darkness, and therefore forgiveness is impossible. Man cannot be pardoned for a sin which he refuses to recognize as sin. Concerning such sin he cannot ask for pardon; his power to repent is gone.

Jesus knew that He himself was capable of being misunderstood. Some would hear garbled accounts of what He said, others would mishear and misunderstand. Even His own disciples often did, and reacted accordingly. It is possible that a person might reject Him, even turn against Him, on grounds that, however unfair to Him, are based on misrepresentation. While Jesus was in the flesh, goodness was media-

ted through a human personality, and for a great majority, through the lips and doings of others. But the Holy Spirit is within one's own breast. It whispers to us again and again, without any possibility of misinterpretation, "That is wrong; this is right; that you must not do; this you must not leave undone." To refuse that, to call that Inner Light darkness, is to silence that Spirit, a Spirit that will not always strive with man. And this makes pardon, because it makes repentance, impossible.

Along the banks of the Niagara River, some distance upstream from the mighty Falls, is posted a sign which reads: "Point Beyond Redemption". Still further upstream are other signs, warning of the rapids and falls ahead. Now, finally, is the grim warning to anyone who has as yet not turned back, that to go any farther is to be swept to certain destruction on the rocks below. May our Heavenly Father help us to obey the promptings of His Holy Spirit within us, lest we stifle it once too often and pass the "Point Beyond Redemption."

Memories of Grandmother by a 14-yr.-old girl

As I said before, I was always very close to my grandparents. Then it happened! My grandma got sick. I could tell something was wrong; before, when all of the family got together to sing, Grandma would sing right along, but then for a real long time she didn't. She just sat there listening to us, and smiling as if this was the most beautiful singing she ever heard.

She went into the hospital off and on, but I was just a little too young to realize she was sick. After all she was my grandma, she would live forever and ever because I loved her so much. I can still remember staying with her; we would go in on her bed for a nap, and she would sing to me; every now and then I would throw in a phrase or two. They had a picture of me at my aunt's wedding which they would always keep in their bedroom. She always told me how pretty it was, especially when I would cry, because one of my uncles would tease me about it.

Grandma had long black hair, down to her waist. I always asked her if she walked on it. I always wanted my hair to be that long, and I told myself that some day it would be. I admired her long hair because Grandpa always said that a woman's hair is her glory. I thought Grandma had a lot of glory, and I wanted to be so much like her that I wanted it too.

I had a birthday once when she was in the hospital. She hadn't forgotten, and kept telling Grandpa that she wanted to get me something. That something turned out to be a watch, one which I treasure

to this day.

Then she went into the hospital again, this time for a long time. I wasn't sure what was wrong with her, but I tried to pick up bits of conversation (I was noted for that). Finally her entire right side was paralyzed. She had cancer. One night she got up to go to the bathroom and while getting back into bed, she slipped and broke her arm. The nurse had forgotten to lock the wheels on the bed. All of these things bothered me very much, because this was my grandma and I knew that she wasn't going to be around very long.

Her brain was partially paralyzed, so she wasn't always quite sure of what was going on. She talked about Greg, my brother, flying planes and all sorts of things which had no meaning. I was a very confused little girl; each night I prayed that she would get well, or if it would stop her suffering that she would die. I always hesitated before saying the latter, for I loved her too much for this, but then I realized that if I really loved her I wouldn't want her to suffer. When they were quite sure of her not recovering, they allowed the grandchildren to go up to see her. I went up as often as I could, although it bothered me to see her in such a state.

I remember very clearly the day she died. My mother told me when I woke up the next morning. I burst into tears. I just stood there sobbing and grasping at my mother's blouse. Then I turned around and ran into my room and hid. I was frightened because I wouldn't know what to say to people, not

even my parents.

I remember sitting with my cousin and another girl. I was finally getting calmed down, and as the people were filing by the cas-ket she said to me, "Take a good look, because this is the last time. ..." I hadn't thought of that, and again I burst into tears of sorrow and buried my head in her lap. As I walked by the casket I looked, and I looked good, for there was lying a lady whom I wholly admired and loved. All I can say is that I'm truly sorry for all of my younger cousins who can't remember or never knew her, for she accepted you for what you were, not what you had.

"Dare any of you, having a matter against another, go to law before the unjust, and not before the saints?" One had been hurt. One had hurt. A law court. There was undefined ground, unsettled quarrel, something material. It had come up in that early day. Two members, like prize fighters in a worldly ring, exchanged blows before an unbeliever. It is the knowing dare, beyond charity's calm care.

"Do ye not know that the saints shall judge the world? and if the world shall be judged by you, are ye unworthy to judge the smallest

matters?"

Who would have the interest of the souls at heart? The mind of God knows perfectly and gives the correct answer. Not always as ex-

pected, but best.

We gain a glimpse into a future day, judgment. A perfect body and wonderful knowledge the saint will possess. God trusts some of the work of judgment to them. We peer into how God will carry out part of this very great work.

"Know ye not that we shall judge angels? how much more things that pertain to this life?" God asked the early church to take care of its own affairs. The chapter before showed wise handling of a case where a certain member had become wicked. In this chapter, we

see the calm hand of God outlining the best way to settle what is sometimes a difficult problem.

"If then ye have judgments of things pertaining to this life, set them to judge who are least esteemed in the church." Don't make a sure mistake! God, who is the Judge of all the earth, shows sure success. Not the world to settle. A brother. Things in the sphere of this life, this is the clear and limiting description of this needed know-how. Working in God's careful wording can keep from care that needs not be, taking the whole word.

"I speak to your shame. Is it so, that there is not a wise man among you? no, not one that shall be able to judge between his brethren? But brother goeth to law with brother, and that before the unbelievers."

There is wealth in the body of Christ. There is priceless ability. There is spiritual energy and wisdom, gaining a well done task. Somewhere there is a best pick for each task. (Take with you one or two more, Jesus says. There's a better chance of settling, the smaller the circle.)

"Now therefore there is utterly a fault among you, because ye go to law one with another. Why do ye not rather take wrong? why do ye not rather suffer yourselves to

be defrauded?"

Fault. Something lacking. Something diminished! A most vital chord, indispensable, is our link with our brother. If love has reached the stage of "Raca", there

is grave danger. If we hate our brother, then we are outside. Our words are a thermometer of our inner self.

If we in love take the shorter end, how the riches come. The one that does wrong, that is the one hurting. "Nay, ye do wrong, and defraud, and that your brethren." The finger of God hurts a sore spot. Diagnosis is the way to healing. Love cares about our future.

"Know ye not that the unrighteous shall not inherit the kingdom of God? Be not deceived:" Once saved, if a member falls to "unrighteous" and clings to the

end, the person is lost.

dolaters, nor adulterers, nor effeminate, nor abusers of themselves with mankind, Nor thieves, nor covetous, nor drunkards, nor revilers, nor extortioners, shall inherit the kingdom of God."

Such a group to which to be departed to without end. The noise, the clangs and clatter of sinschooled people will allow no peace. Iniquity has an end where the lost are entirely unrighteous. The bright shining of light, with even just this one thing, freedom from sin, is wonderful happiness. The tears of the condemned never have a comfort then.

Flee! "And such were some of you: but ye are washed, but ye are sanctified, but ye are justified in the name of the Lord Jesus, and by the Spirit of our God."

What a priceless heritage. Let us make our calling and election sure.
