SUCCESS?

In 1923 a group of the world's most successful financiers met in Chicago. Present were: The president of the largest independent steel company, the president of the largest utility company, the greatest wheat speculator, the president of the New York Stock Exchange, a member of the President's cabinet, the greatest bear in Wall Street, the president of the Bank of International Settlements, the head of the world's greatest monopoly.

Collectively these controlled more wealth than there was in the United States Treasury. For years newspapers and magazines had been printing their success stories and urging the youth of the nation to follow their examples. Twentyfive years later, let's see what happened to them: The president of the largest independent steel company, Charles Schwab, lived on borrowed money the last five years of his life and died penniless. The greatest wheat speculator, Arthur Cutten died abroad insolvent. The president of the New York Stock Exchange, Richard Whitney, was released from Sing Sing Prison. The member of the President's cabinet, Albert Fall, was pardoned from prison so he could die at home. The greatest bear in Wall Street, Jesse Livermore, committed suicide. The president of the Bank of International Settlement, Leon Fraser, committed suicide. The head of the world's greatest monoply, Ivan Kreuger, committed suicide.

All these men had learned how to make money, but not one of them had learned how to live.

SMOKING IS A SIN

"What is there about cigaretsmoking that is so deadly?"

Cigaret smoke is acid, a potent irritant made even more so by the fact that a cigaret is wrapped in paper, which adds still more irritant to the smoke.

More than 270 distinguishable chemical compounds have been identified in the smoke of a cigaret, no less than seven and at least 15 of which are known to be carcinogenic (cancer-causing) agents.

Cigaret-smoking paralyzes the cilia (tiny whip-like hairs on the surface cells of the bronchial tubes which propel irritating or poisonous substances out of the lung). As precancerous changes occur in the lung, the cilia disappear altogether, thereby completely destroying this natural protection against these dangers.

According to the report made by the Advisory Committee to the Surgeon General of the United States Public Health Service

For men who smoke fewer than 10 cigarets a day, the death rate from all causes is about 40 per cent higher than that of non-smokers. For those who smoke from 10 to 19 cigarets a day (about a pack-a-day) the ratio rises to 70 per cent higher than that of non-smokers. From

one to two packs a day means an approximate rise of 90%.

For those who smoke two packs a day or more, the death toll mounts to 120 per cent higher.

Over a 30 year period, death due to coronary heart disease increased 2000%, cancer 50%. American Cancer Society gives: For every 100 non-smokers who die of heart disease, 215 smokers (pack a day) die

THE CARD CREATED OF EVIL

The first deck of cards was made for King Charles of France, an insane man, in 1392. The unknown inventor apparently hated God and the Bible. Each card tells a story in picture, and not one of them is good. Here are a few samples: The King card represents the devil. The Joker is said to be Jesus Christ. In this way our Saviour is held up to mockery. The Queen card represents the Virgin Mary, but in the language of the cards, she is called the mother of harlots.

ALCOHOLISM

Cost of Alcoholism to business and industry is said to run about \$16 million a day, and is rising. (This is calculated on basis of absenteeism, tardiness, sick leave, wasted time, general inefficiency, accidents, inferior products and loss of trained manpower.

A professor of anatomy at the Medical College of South Carolina offered evidence to show that when a drinker begins to feel the least bit giddy, a few of his brain cells

are being killed. A heavy drinking bout can damage or destroy as

many as 10,000 such cells.

A good portion of the habitual drunkards on the southeast side of Manhattan get some sort of charity or pension. The men congregate and deteriorate. At sunup they have an "eye-opener," a fifteencent glass of wine. During morning and afternoon they panhandle and sell stolen goods for more drink. At night they battle each other for sidewalk sleeping space.

Most of them are desperately sick. The sauce eats them up. It burns the nerves of their brains,

it swells up their bodies. . .

A former executive for an employment firm threw away a \$75,000-a-year salary, a wife, four children, a home and all respectability to booze. "Drunks are the living dead," he says, "like zombies. You take me. Right now I haven't had a drink in two years, so I look young and clean. But give me a bottle and I'd look like a corpse in a few minutes.

MISUSED DRUGS IS SIN

In California juvenile arrests on marijuana charges, it is written have jumped 3433%. There is some evidence of lasting damage to some users, genetic that might be passed from one generation to another. In the use of marijuana is medical danger—it toxically lodges in the liver. There may be damage to the brain, eyes, respiratory tract.

There is a telltale lack of ambition to one so chained. Other sad effects are lack of muscular coordination, hallucinations, sometimes delirium. Motor control and judgment decline. Inhibitions which governed normal behavior are torn down. The person becomes giddy, irresponsible, very open to suggestion. There is a false sense of bravery—impulsive, danger of doing dangerous things.

A medical school professor stated, four out of five young people who rioted at the convention in Chicago smoke marijuna regularly.

THE MODERN DANCE

An eminent specialist in nervous disorders, of Chicago and Los Angeles, makes this indictment of the modern dance: "I attack the modern dance as a reversion toward savagery. As a medical man I flatly charge that modern social dancing is fundamentally sinful and evil. I charge that dancing's

charm is based entirely upon sex appeal. I charge that dancing is the most advanced and most insiduous of the maneuvers preliminary to sex betrayal. It is nothing more or less than a diabolical, animal, physical dissipation.

"A young girl enjoys the dance because she is drugged by suggestive music and emotional overstimulation into fanaticism. We doctors know there are mysterious currents, affinities that seem almost chemical. I tell you frankly it is not safe to subject even the strongest men and women to the subtle temptations of the dance. A trail of broken homes proves this.

Another says: "In 1890 I was a jailor and night man in a dance hall in a suburb of Chicago. The last words of my employer the night I quit were, "Remain with us three months longer, and you won't have any conscience to bother you: and as for a heart, you could not scratch it with a diamond point."

The dance has been the downward step for man, according to the agreeing testimony of reform workers and others in a position to

know.

An ex-dancing master investigated the moral situation in Los Angeles, and found that 81% of the fallen women of the city entered their life of shame by way of the modern dance.

A New York reform worker says, 'Of 1,000 girls under my personal care, every one of them traced their first step downward to the

dance.'

The dance HAS caused many to fall.
