

Should I? . . . or Shouldn't I?

A Bible class teacher handed me the article . . . Several thought it might be beneficial for others to read, and asked me to send it to you, and you can do as you feel best.

Throughout the ages, Christians have been preplexed with the problem of making decisions. Many things, such as movies, dancing, drinking, smoking, gambling, etc., are thought to be wrong, but the best reason which many people have to give when asked why they are wrong is: "Because my church says so!"

We believe that the Bible is the word of God, therefore authoritative and infallible, and thus our only infallible rule of faith and practice. The Bible does give us many principles by which we are told to live our life so that it may

be pleasing to the Lord.

Here are ten principles from the Scripture whereby we may judge any questionable thing that presents itself in our lives. Whenever you are confronted with a questionable thing, prayerfully ask yourself these ten questions, answer them honestly before the Lord, and you can be sure that God will direct you through His word to walk in the right path.

1. IN DOING THIS THING, AM I TAKING INTO CONSIDER-ATION THAT I BELONG TO CHRIST, AND THAT HE DESERVES PREEMINENCE IN MY LIFE?

In I Corinthians 6:20 we read: "For ye are bought with a price: therefore glorify God in your body". The next time you are trying to make a decision on something of a questionable nature, remember first the awful price that Christ had to pay for your salvation. As a result of this tremendous price that was paid for you, you are supposed to glorify God

in your body. In Colossians 1:18 we read: "... that in all things he might have the preeminence." One sure way to give evidence that you belong to Christ is to give Him first place, at all times, and in all things in your life.

2. DOES MY DOING THIS THING GLORIFY GOD?

First Corinthians 10:31 says: "Whether therefore ye eat, or drink, or whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God." Man's chief end is to glorify God and to enjoy Him forever. In order to do all things in your life to the glory of God, it might be necessary for you to cut some things out of your life.

3. CAN I ASK GOD'S BLESS-ING ON THE THING THAT I AM ABOUT TO DO?

In I Thessalonians 5:17 we read: "Pray without ceasing." It is a good policy for a Christian to make everything he does a matter of prayer, asking for God's direction and blessing. It is very obvious that God's blessing cannot be sought for many of the questionable things.

4. DOES DOING THIS THING BUILD ME UP (PHYSICAL-LY, MENTALLY, SPIRIT-

UALLY)?

First Corinthians 10:23 tells us: "All things are lawful for me, but all things are lawful for me, but all things are lawful for me, but all things edify not." Paul realized that there were many things which in themselves were not wrong, but at the same time they were not edifying. The Christian life is supposed to be a life of growth and building, and in I Corinthians 14:26 we read: "Let all things be done unto edifying."

5. CAN THIS THING ENSLAVE ME IF I DO IT?

We read in I Corinthians 6:12: "All things are lawful unto me, but all things are not expedient: all things are lawful for me, but I will not be brought under the power of any." Again Paul said that while many things are not wrong in themselves, they may at the same time take over a place of lordship in our lives. Paul said in Philippians 1:21: "For to me to live is Christ. . ." and the fact is, Christ must be Lord of all in our lives or He is not Lord at all.

6. DOES MY DOING THIS THING GIVE THE APPEAR-ANCE OF EVIL?

First Thessalonians 5:22 says:

"Abstain from all appearance of evil." It is here clearly stated that while somethings are not necessarily evil themselves, if they even have the appearance of evil they are to be avoided. Rather than to risk the possibility of presenting an inconsistent testimony, it is always safe to say that it is no sin to abstain, while it may be sin to indulge.

7. IF I DO THIS THING, IS THERE A POSSIBILITY OF CAUSING SOMEONE TO STUMBLE?

We read in Romans 14:21: "It is good neither to eat flesh, nor to drink wine, nor any thing whereby thy brother stumbleth, or is offended, or is made weak" Paul realized that many Christians are more prone to fall into certain sins than others are. In I Corinthians 8:9-13, we are told to take heed, lest our liberty to do something questionable should become a stumbling-block to cause a weaker brother to fall into sin. Verse 12 clearly says: "... when ye sin so against the brethren ... ye sin against Christ." Just stop and think for a minute how great that sin is if we, by doing some questionable thing, should set up a stumbling-block which should prevent someone from coming to know Christ as his or her Saviour!

8. AM I IN DOUBT ABOUT THIS THING:

In ROM. 14:23 we read: And he that doubteth is damned if he eat, because he eateth not of faith: for whatsoever is not of faith is sin. . You keep saying to yourself that there is nothing wrong with this thing, but you know that deep down inside there is a twinge of doubt. If you cannot do this thing in true faith, nothing wavering, then the Bible says you are condemned for doing it.

9. WOULD DOING THIS THING EMBARRASS ME IF CHRIST WERE TO COME WHILE I WAS DOING IT?

According to the Scripture the Second Coming of Christ could happen at any minute. Christ's own statements in the Olivet Discourse (see Matthew 24:36, 42, 44, 46) teach the imminence of His return. "Wherefore, beloved, seeing that ye look for such things, be diligent that ye may be found of him in peace, without spot, and blameless" (II Peter 3:14). If we would only realize that in one second we could

be standing before our Saviour, many of the things we do would be eliminated from our lives. . . But even more amazing is the fact that Christ is now with us, whether we perceive it or not!

10. CAN I DO THIS THING AND BE SURE TO RECEIVE WELL DONE FROM MY MASTER'S LIPS WHEN I STAND BEFORE HIM IN

JUDGMENT?

In II Corinthians 5:10 we read: "For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ; that every one may receive the things done in his body, according to that he hath done, whether it be good or bad." How often do we stop to think that we must give an account for all that we have done when we stand before Christ? If only we would ask ourselves before we do these things: "Could Christ say well done to this when I stand before Him?"

Have you asked yourself these questions prayerfully and honestly before the Lord? Then, the decision is still yours to make, but now you know something of what the Bible sets forth as guidelines, when you are confronted by something questionable. Can you still do this thing as a Christian?

MARVELLOUS GRACE

The workings and doings of God can be seen. If we are willing. Grace is what sets apart. The only-of-its-kind. It is that success in which the humble walk and work. The glory of His grace shines beautifully. . . But, we in human addition can bring a mistake, and we may think it to be right.

We need to recognize grace. "And when James, Cephas, and John, who seemed to be pillars, perceived the grace that was given unto me, they gave to me and Barnabas the right hands of fellowship; that we should go unto the heathen, and they unto the circumcision."

The grace of God works in us. This same grace brings fruit in our brother. We have a duty to join hands. We should give the encouraging right hand of fellowship. We need to urge to work and let work, where beautiful eternal fruits abound. "Only they would that we should remember the poor; the same which I also was forward to do."

How carefully do we search? What is **His** voice in the matter? God makes known how He feels when we ask. It may be in ordinary circumstances, by a regular brother, in an ordinary sort of way. If we are keen in spiritual matters, we will want this. To face a mis-

take can hurt, but Peter must have been happy when he looked back. How much it means to correct a course to be closer to what matters most. "But when Peter was come to Antioch, I withstood him to the face, because he was to be blamed."

Here was a current not from that sweet will of God. Peter drew a line, his own reasoning. He put a fence up which God never intended to go up. He pointed a finger of the heart at some with whom God was well pleased. He carried a rule and tried to attach to grace.

Galatians 2:12: "For before that certain came from James, he did eat with the Gentiles: but when they were come, he withdrew and separated himself, fearing them which were of the circumcision." It was a serious matter to tamper with grace. Then, when one is blamed, God is doing the speaking. It is just.

Peter was a shepherd. The sheep and lambs had found pleasant pasture. He had skillfully guided; no dangerous wolves robbed the elect. The brethren had found abundant joy. Now something else. Uncorrected error in his job would show up in a thousand and more diminishings. Much was given to Peter; much would be asked. To dissemble

was to separate in a manner that was untrue, to act in a false way. "And the other Jews dissembled likewise with him; insomuch that Barnabas also was carried away with their dissimulation."

The Lord had shown much patience and mercy. Peter's whole life was one thrown on the Lord's care and grace. Had the Lord demanded absolute justice without mercy? Peter never could have made it. Now his idea judged another. In God's sight, it was wrong, to elevate such a demand. Gentleness of the Spirit in dealing as we have been dealt with is a good feeling, wrought in grace.

"But when I saw that they walked not uprightly according to the truth of the gospel, I said unto Peter before **them** all, If thou, being a Jew, livest after the manner of Gentiles, and not as do the Jews, why compellest thou the Gentiles to live as do the Jews?"

When all is said and done, we do want what is right, don't we?
