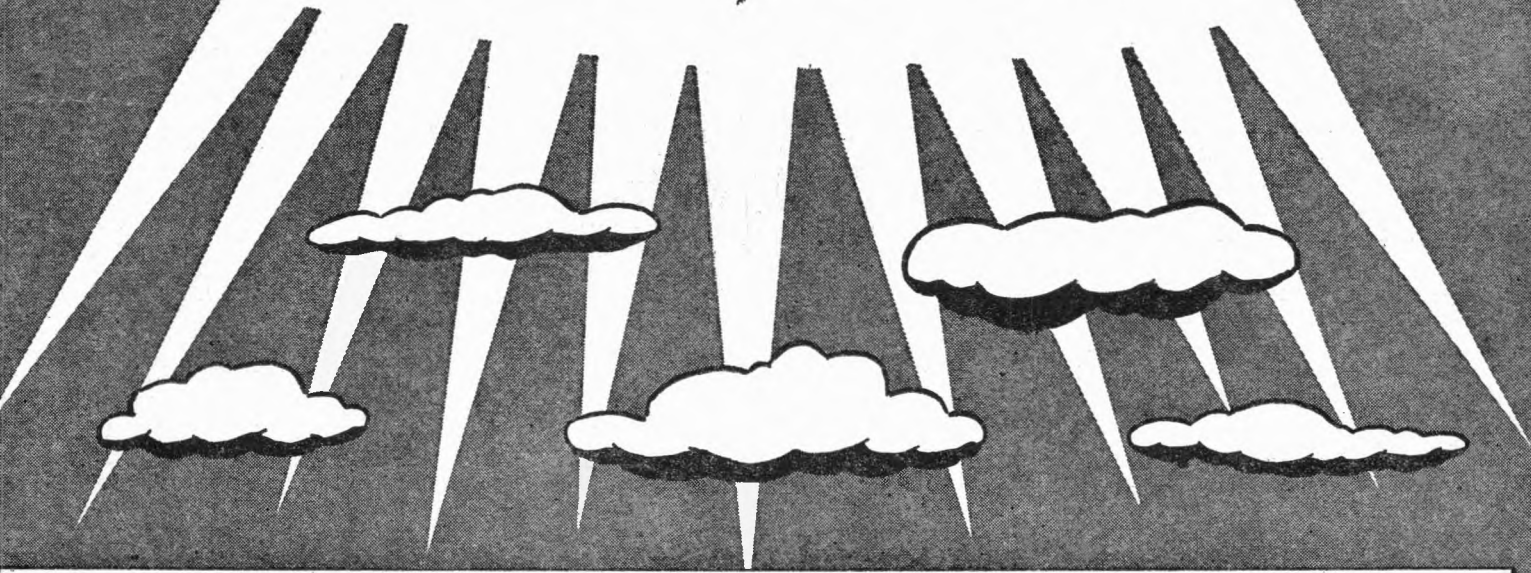

Are they sleeping, or are they conscious?—Surely the body is asleep in the grave, but this is not spoken about the soul. When Stephen was stoned to death, he committed his spirit to the Lord, and the Lord was ready to receive him. Moses and Elias were **present** when the Lord appeared to them on the mount. This was beautiful enough for the 3 disciples and they were ready to stay. The thief on the cross was told by Jesus: "To day

shalt thou be with me in paradise." The story of the rich man and Lazarus, each of whom died and went to his appropriate place, teaches that there is spirit recognition beyond death.

Paul said, "to be absent from the body, and to be present with the Lord", which was "far better". He meant what he said. When the Lord prayed for the disciples he said: "Father, I will that they also, whom thou hast given me, be with me where I am; that they may behold my glory, which thou hast given me . . ." In Revelation it is written, "And when he had opened the fifth seal, I saw under the altar the souls of them that were slain for the word of God, and for the testimony which they held . . ."

"I'm Coming, Mama." These were among the last words of a young girl seventeen years of age, whose mother died when she was a babe. Her name was Susie Craig. Her home was in West Virginia. For three years she had been an earnest, devoted Christian. After three weeks of typhoid fever, she was very near death. Her father was weeping, in a room adjoining the one in which she was lying. She heard him and said, "Tell him not to cry—tell them all not to shed a tear for me."

Then after speaking of the band of angels all around her, she added: "Yes, there's ma—I'm coming, ma," and then, "O Maggie," and thus greeting the friends from the other shore she went to be with them and with her Saviour. Her words, "O Maggie" were the more remarkable from the fact that Maggie was a cousin, also an earnest Christian, who had died only two days before, and of whose death the dying girl had not been informed.

You might think I am preaching, but I am not. When one goes through and sees what I saw, it would almost make a preacher out of him. Oh how I am suffering, but nothing compared to what Christ suffered for us. But, oh those gates.

How beautiful it was. Words cannot describe it . . . But I couldn't go; it wasn't time, but I'll get rest later." Very soon, he went to be with the Lord and passed through those beautiful gates that were now opened for him.

Dear Friends, now is the time to search the Bible and find out where you are going to go. This is very important. When you leave this world, there will be someone there to meet you. You must open the door and let the Saviour take over your life. Tomorrow may be too late. We all know that we are going to stay here only a short time. Our life is but a vapor; it is only a shadow. It is just an inch of time, and then eternal ages roll on. We should search the Bible to find out where we are going, and where our dear ones have gone on before.
