COUNSELING FOR CHRIST

My family and I visited our Tokyo church, while Bro. John Klaus came to take care of our Shioda and Tamahata services.

After services in Tokyo, I had a talk with Enda-san, a young man who has been coming to church for several years and who has made some effort to repent and believe the Gospel. He has told me before that he had read many books, trying to understand life, and he always comes back to the Bible. He tells me he doesn't read much in other books anymore, but he is reading the Bible. When I asked if he believes Jesus Christ is the Son of God he answered, "Yes." When I asked if he believes Christ had died for his sins, he replied that he has not yet come that far. One wonders if the term, "Son of God" means the same to him as it does

Later in the afternoon a man who is perhaps in his late forties, a total stranger, came to the entrance of the church, and after greeting him I beckoned him in. His name is Motome-san. He told me that he went to his uncle's funeral, and was surprised that his uncle had been a professing Chris-

tian and therefore had a Christian funeral. Since the funeral he has been trying to find out what Christianity is all about, and to his great surprise has discovered that Christianity is not one group but many, many groups. I explained to him something of the history of Christianity in Europe, the Protestant Reformation, etc. . . . I proceeded to explain that true Christians did not become Christians because they were so good, but because they realized their imperfection and sinfulness. Jesus Christ is God's Son and He has borne the punishment for our sins in our place, and we serve him out of gratitude. I gave Motome-san a scripture portion and a cordial invitation to come again to our Tokyo Church, as he lives near by.

The following Tuesday, Lois had a phone call from Kazuo Amemiya, saying he wanted to come to see me that night. He is a college student who formerly came to our Shioda Sunday School and church, who has repented... I met him that evening and enjoyed the conversation. He explained that the man in charge of the dormitory where he lives has a Bible Class on Sunday and will

not give him permission to come to our church, instead of the meeting in the dormitory. This man is quite strict and once scolded Amemiya-san quite severely for walking into their meeting-place with one hand in his pocket. This man is also taking up collections to send money to Korea, to rebuild a church which was burned to the ground with its occupants by the Japanese military, either before or during World War II. Amemiyasan said, after he graduates in a couple of years he desires to serve the Lord with us.

While writing this on the train, I met a lady whose daughter formerly came to our English class. She told me that the doctors say her husband does not have long to live, because of a heart condition. She wonders if our life really ends at death, and I told her it doesn't. She says her husband's younger brother is a joyful, thankful Christian. I hope to meet her and he husband again soon, with the desire they might repent and believe the Gospel.

BIBLE RELIGION DEMANDS APPROPRIATE ACTIONS

The enclosed article was published in Tokyo's leading English language daily, The Japan Times. Bro. Willis R. Ehnle.

Many people equate religion with acceptance of certain doctrines . . . But this is not the Biblical view. In the great sourcebook of Christianity, a religious person is distinguished not by his stated beliefs but by his actions, his attitudes, his relationships—in short, by his style of life.

It is, of course, true that everyone's style of life ultimately reflects his deepest convictions . . .
But what a person says is not always a reliable guide to what he believes strongly enough to live by.
Some who profess ardent religious
faith are unwilling to take any
costly action in obedience to that
faith.

Anyone who thinks that religion is merely a matter of "believing in God" will find little comfort in the Scriptures.

So you believe that there is one God? asks the author of the New Testament Epistle of James. Good for you! The demons also believe that—and shudder."

Hundreds of years earlier, the great Jewish prophets had warned that God is concerned with the way men act, rather than their diligence in paying ritual tributes to Him.

Thus says the Lord, cried the Prophet Amos . . . I hate, I despise your feasts, and I take no delight in your solemn assemblies . . . Take away from Me the noise of your songs; to the melody of your harps I will not listen. But let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream.

The Prophet Micah was equally

scornful of a religion which expresses itself only in giving lip service to orthodox beliefs and attending punctiliously to ceremonies which are thought to honor God.

With what shall I come before the Lord, and bow myself before God on high? Micah asked.

Shall I come before him with burnt offerings... will the Lord be pleased with thousands of rams, with ten thousand rivers of oil?...

He has showed you, O Man, what

is good;

And what does the Lord require of you, but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with thy God?

Perhaps the most persistent all Christian heresies is the idea that a person is assured of salvation if he publicly professes belief that Jesus is the Son of God.

Jesus gave no encouragement to

that kind of purely verbal piety. Not every person who calls Me Lord, Lord will enter into the kingdom of heaven, but only those who do what My Father in heaven wants them to do, He said in the Sermon on the Mount.

On another occasion, when some of his disciples were proclaiming their devotion to Him, He told them they could easily prove it by

their deeds.

If you really love Me, he said, you will obey my commandments.

The Apostle Paul, in his letter to Christians at Rome, said that true worship consists of offering yourself as a living sacrifice to God.

Love one another warmly as brothers in Christ, and be eager to show respect for one another, he said. Work hard, and do not be lazy. Serve the Lord with a heart full of devotion . . . share your belongings with your needy brothers, and open your homes to strangers . . .

Do not be proud but accept humble duties. Do not think of your-

selves as wise.

If someone does evil to you, do not pay him back with evil. Try to do what all men consider to be good. Do everything possible, on your part, to live at peace with all men.

The Biblical emphasis on doing . . . in the Epistle of James.

Do not fool yourselves by just listening to God's word, it admonishes. Instead, put it into practice.

What good is it for a man to say, I have faith, if his actions do not prove it?... Show me how you can have faith without actions, and I will show you my faith by my actions.

If the church is in trouble today, especially with young people, it may be a result of trying to show the world faith without actions.

Is there some loved one you should be sending the Silver Lining? The love through the Silver Lining can go miles when perhaps you can't.

Do as you would wish you had done, if their lips would be silent

tomorrow!

"Evolution Theory Lacks Proof" He who can look into the sky with a telescope, or even with his natural eve alone, and see there the immensity of creation, its symmetry, beauty, order, harmony and diversity, and yet doubt that the Creator of these is vastly superior both in wisdom and power, or who can suppose for a moment that such order came by chance, without a Creator, has so far lost or ignored the faculty of reason as to be properly considered what the Bible terms, a fool (one who ignores or lacks reason): "The fool hath said in his heart, There is no God."

Some who deny the existence of an intelligent Creator claim that nature is the only God, and that from nature all forms of animal and vegetable developments proceeded without the ordering of intelligence, but governed, they say, by "the law of the survival of the fittest" in a process of evolution.

All about us we see that various creatures are of fixed natures which do not evolve to higher natures, and though those who hold to this theory have made repeated endeavors, they have never succeeded either in blending different species or in producing a new, fixed kind. Though there are fish that can use their fins for a moment as wings, and fly out of the water, and frogs that can sing, they have never been known to change into birds; and though there are beasts or brutes which bear some resemblance to men, the evidence is wholly lacking that man was evolved from such creatures. On the contrary, investigations prove that though different varieties of the same species may be produced, it is impossible to blend the various species, or for one to evolve from another. For the same reason the donkey and the horse, though resembling each other, cannot be claimed as related, for it is well known that their offspring is imperfect and cannot propagate

either species.

Surely if unintelligent nature were the creator or evolver, she would continue the process, and there would be no fixed species, since without intelligence nothing would arrive at fixed conditions. Evolution would be a fact today, and we would see about us fish becoming birds, and monkeys becoming men.

Giving due credit to nature's laws in every case, back of it all the intricate machinery of nature is the hand of its great Author, an in-

telligent, omnipotent God.

Let us realize that the existence of an intelligent Creator is a clearly demonstrated truth, the proof of which lies all around us, and even within us, for we are his workmanship, whose every power of mind and body speaks of a marvelous skill beyond our comprehension. He is also the Designer and Creator of what we term nature. The weather changes quickly in Kansas, perhaps because we're kinda midway—we get cold blasts from the north and warm winds from the south. We had some days up to the 60's, and our ground doesn't look pretty white anymore. There is a "happy side" to the cold weather too . . . one enjoys the warm fires of home and enjoys being home . . .

HIS CIRCLE

The days come, the days go. The seasons take their turn, come, and leave. The hours move, move, move. Time is spending. Limited. An end there is.

The very picture of A Day Gone is a picture of time. All will go, just like that. Glorious life eternal is different. We receive the Holy Spirit. We become one with the everlasting God. We partake of His beautiful nature, breathe and live in Him; "For none of us liveth to himself, and no man dieth to himself." Glory to Him!

We are the Lord's. The saints are a priceless purchase. The Lord takes great delight in them. Each of us needs to think of them by God's standard. That gives us good reason to think highly. "For whether we live, we live unto the Lord; and whether we die, we die unto the Lord: whether we live therefore, or die, we are the Lord's."

He keeps both those in heaven and those here. He had a great purpose in mind when He willingly laid down His life. He had a great reason for His resurrection. His purpose was not only to organize and manage, but to rejoice over His children, and love them, each one. To Him they stand. What a wonderful, kind circle He brings about.

"For to this end Christ both died, and rose, and revived, that he might be Lord both of the dead and living."

The bigger sins are sometimes echoed in small missteps. The gross sin is the hypocrite, with a rafter in the eye, wanting to pick a small splinter from another's. Yet, in small ways we can be picky. There are certain areas where the word says we have no business and no right to do so: "But why dost thou judge thy brother? or why dost thou set at nought thy brother?" There will be a time when the climate of the court will be present. That will be quite a different day. We shall stand, each before the bar; "for we shall all stand before the judgment seat of Christ.' What a day, when God's court is in session!

God gives His word, that we may gain the feeling of that day . . . That we may wisely apply the insight, so we do today with that day in mind. Then days will be in the past . . . Eternity will be here and now. The awesome judge will have attention. Perfect holiness. His is the right to demand justice and righteousness. God's look into the future then comes to pass: "For it is written, As I live, saith the Lord, every knee shall bow to me, and every tongue shall confess to God."

No Christian is exempt: "So the every one of us shall give account of himself to God." What's going to happen when the things are gone over that are so familiar and personal? What are we going to tell Him?

Our Saviour is the one that asks us not to judge. He knows the human frame, and understands where it's easy to err. His foresight is given to benefit thereby. "Let us not therefore judge one another any more: but judge this rather, that no man put a stumbling block or an occasion to fall in his brother's way."

It is not the thing itself that causes wrong, but the use. Drink, food, the body, the tongue, so many things can be used for right, or for wrong. There is a certain area that can become debatable, can ruffle the peace, without God's pleasure. We can step in with judging or setting at nought, looking down on, when God has accepted that one and causes him to stand. There is a common meeting place of forbearance, where love-links are probents is not meat and drink; but righteousness, and peace, and joy in the Holy Ghost. For he that in these things serveth Christ is acceptable to God . . ."
