HISTORY OF APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN CHURCH OF PLEASANT RIDGE TWP.

Livingston County, Illinois

In the year of 1864, Joseph Virkler and family came from Croghan and settled on a farm in Section 21, Pleasant Ridge Township. In 1868, Rudolf Leutholds came to this country from Zurich, Switzerland, and also settled in Pleasant Ridge Twp. He purchased a farm to the west of the Virkler farm on Oct. 12, 1868.

He became the first minister of a small church that was getting started in a building on the southwest corner of the Virkler farm. He also served as the first elder. The church served a few families at the time, the Keller, Ramseyer, Metz, Swartzentraub, Huber, Abersol, Scharlach, Stoller and others.

The church was growing, and about this time the Jacob Honegger family came from Zurich, Switzerland to this country, in 1866, landed in Morton, and came to Forrest a short time later. Also being a minister of the Apostolic Christian faith, he helped fill the needs of the growing congregation as minister of the gospel and was elder until his death. A larger church was built in the year of 1875, also on the Virkler land, one-half mile further east, in Pleasant Ridge Township.

This site was deeded, along with the cemetery ground on the west side of the farm, by Joseph Virkler to the trustees of the church at that time, who were Bros. Nicholas Ramseyer, Frederic Metz and Rudolf Leuthold. By this time there were many more families settling in the region of Forrest, namely: Haab, Detweiler, Bollier, Schnei-

der, Geiger, Lear, Ebach, Nussbaum, Bach, Stortz, Mauler, Hess, Yoder, Fortna, Kilgus, Hirstein, Munz, Yakle and Moser.

In the year of 1893, it was again necessary to enlarge the building, and a 32 x 44 foot assembly room was built on the south of the old assembly room (which was changed to a dining room). The old dining room to the north was then used for Sunday School room and kitchen. At this time there was also more land acquired of the Andrew Abersol farm to the east, to meet the needs of a larger yard and also room to build stables for the teams of horses that pulled the buggies and wagons over the mud roads.

Elder Rudolf Leuthold passed away in 1892, and for a number of years this church received help in its times of need by ministers from the South Church and others, as Elder Honegger was called to serve in council quite often. Some years later, Bro. Gilgian Stoller began to serve in the ministry, along with Elder Honegger. Bro. Giligan Stoller passed away in 1919. Elder Honegger passed away in 1920.

Bro. Edward Honegger began to minister after his father's death, till the year of his death in 1925. In 1923, Bro. Peter Bach began to minister, was ordained as elder in 1933, and died in 1946. Bro. John Maurer started to minister in 1919, and moved to Fairbury in 1922. Bro. Henry Kilgus was put into the ministry in May 1931, and was ordained as elder in December 1946. Bro. Alex Stoller began to minister in 1934, and moved to

Fairbury in 1946. In 1946, Bro. Joseph Kaisner started to minister. Bro. Ben Wiegand moved here as a minister from Taylor in the spring of 1947. He died December 5, 1956.

By this time, the year of 1947, we had already held four meetings—feeling that it was time that something should be done to remodel the old church in the country could a new one. The first meeting was held April 24, 1944; the second was held June 28, 1944; the third was held June 27, 1946; and the fourth was held May 7, 1947.

In the year of 1947, much planning and deciding was done. The South country church was also in need of improvements. In 1948, the Southside country members had decided that, two-thirds to come to Forrest and build with us, and one-third planned to go to Fairbury.

Our new church was built in Forrest in the years of 1948 and 1949. The church was finished for

disposed of.

December 18, 1949 was the first time we gathered to worship in the new church building at Forrest, although it was not yet fully completed. Everyone enjoyed themselves in comfort and were thankful to God. We met for the second Sunday on Dec. 25, 1949, with many visitors to witness the Sunday School program which was enjoyed by all.

January 1, 1950, we met with quite a number of visitors, with everything completed. Many came to go through the new building for the Open House, from 2:00 till 4:00. Bro. Andy Nussbaum, Remington, was visiting minister. Dedication services were held at 1:00

o'clock on Jan. 2, 1950. Bro. Schrock, Bro. Mangold, and Bro. Getz filled the pulpit, with a full house.

During the year of 1950, we witnessed the blessings with 16 converts, 4 weddings, held the Lord's Supper once, and had only one friend to pass away, Mary Kemp.

Bro. Andrew Koehl began to minister in the South country church in March 1932, and came to Forrest in 1950. Bro. Clarence Kachelmuss was put into the ministry in 1957 . . . the ministers, Elder Henry Kilgus, Bros. Joseph Kaisner, Andrew Koehl, and Clarence Kachelmuss. Present trustees are Bros. Frank Honegger, Emil Sohn, John Kyburz.

(Editor's note: The following are figures which later show a growth.) Our church considers the Sunday School of great importance and is crowded for room, having

191 scholars. Nine brothers and seven sisters are teaching, with Bro. Perry Zimmerman as superintendent.

Bro. Perry Zimmerman started to minister May 20, 1966. On October 18, 1967 ground was broken to add a dining room and Sunday School rooms. Bro. Perry Zimmerman was ordained as an ordained deacon Nov. 29, 1967. First Sunday in new addition was July 28, 1968. Open House Aug. 25, 1968. Bro. Andy Koehl passed away June 27, 1969. Bro. Earl Gerber was elected for the ministry Sept. 5, 1969.

There were 4 Sunday School teachers elected Oct. 5, 1969. We now have 15 Sunday School teachers, 218 Sunday School scholars. 245 members, Jan. 1 1970.

This record has been brought up to date January 1, 1970 by Bro.

Henry Kilgus.

Services breathed divine blessings. How rich are the hymns, Word of Life" and "The Magnet". That a priceless privilege to be with John, Dave Knobloch, Leon Gerber, Floyd Frieden, Cleve Klopfenstein, Keith Kellenberger and all that assembly.

A voice from the recorder was Bro. John Yergler, Bluffton . . . we heard of the flood, and of the coming of the Son of Man. The saints who meet at Ft Sam have indeed riches that shall not fail.

John, Leon and Floyd took us on a tour. The Brook General Hospital at Ft Sam is the largest burn hospital in the world. Ft Sam is a great medical establishment.

Roger Hitz had been on guard duty. Now he was walking along. We backed up a little; there was conversation of our boys. We saw the place where one works in a mess hall. Others are in clerical work. We ate together. Robert Beebe is a veterinarian, and in service . . . his wife is the former Sue Kupferschmidt, who reported for the Silver Lining for Iowa City.

WINDOW TO BEYOND

Korea

Henry Souder Jr.

What is beyond the gateway? Shall we know one another? Shall we talk?

We can know from One who knows, our Lord Jesus. He inhabits eternity. He is from everlasting to everlasting. It's a familiar place to Him, where our eyes have never been.

He gives an account in Luke. The rich man is passed by without name. Jesus knows His own people by name. Mention that it is a parable is absent. It is a fact, a statistic. Notice the plush surroundings. "There was a certain rich man, which was clothed in purple and fine linen, and fared sumptuously every day:

There are a lot of contrasts: day and night . . . black and white . . . rich and poor. Those neglected of man are cared for of God. He has deep pity, wonderful compassion. He knows. "And there was a certain beggar named Lazarus, which was laid at his gate, full of sores, And" . . .

The God who sends the thunder, whose majesty can be told from the beauty of the storm sees things as they are. His memory does not miss little deeds that could have been . . . He knows every moment of suffering. Look how he read Lazarus's heart: "desiring to be fed with the crumbs which fell from the rich man's table:" . . .

The pathetic notes of this time are noted, for our learning. The rich man was the one in real misery. He was barren of true riches, while Lazarus had the splendid resources of God's promise. Lazarus, rejected, unwanted, unfed. Yet more: "moreover the dogs came and licked his sores." What

price pain? Only a little, just a little.

The scene changes. Death, like a sharp dagger, strikes. Death can be beautiful. Jesus points to the faithful, what happens right after departure. There is no state between. No soul-sleep. The Lord consciously omits "buried". The body sleeps, till Jesus brings the spirit with Him at His return. The Lord showed a sad contrast. "And it came to pass, that the beggar died, and was carried by the angels into Abraham's bosom: the rich man also died, and was buried;"

There was a time in Scripture where the disciple that Jesus loved was "leaning on Jesus' bosom" Now, style of furniture today is of many kinds. Between now and then, we have a different style of eating, a different method of arrangement and seating. It is said, at our Lord's table, the way would be not our way of sitting, but one hand or elbow would rest on the table. The feet would be away, behind. (Remember how one came and washed Jesus' feet with tears?). Kind of reclining.

In this way, the beloved disciple was in the bosom of Jesus. He was next to Him, a wonderful friend, so very close to such a very dear one. When this disciple, though, asked Jesus, who it was that would betray, a different word is used. "He then lying on Jesus' breast". Closer for a quiet communication. This "in his bosom" has a beautiful outlook, for our heavenly festivity. What a fellowship! But how sharply it cuts for the lost. "And in hell he lift up his eyes, being in torments, and seeth Abraham afar off, and Lazarus in his bosom."

Real people, real, individual names . . . the personality of the soul is the same as here. There is real sight, actual looking. There is real rest, relaxation, contentment. There is no dissatisfaction in that bosom picture. There is communication, talking, understanding, answering. Yet there is such contrast, severe, unreachable: such beauty and pain, light and darkness, jour and despair. "And he cried and sa Father Abraham, have mercy on me, and send Lazarus, that he may dip the tip of his finger in water, and cool my tongue; for I am tormented in this flame."

We live now in what will be, the remembering then. See that ability to recall. The sunshine is gathered richer to us, when we have known the sorrow and pain. What contrast, though. It will add to the anguish of one whose last hope is smothered in blackness! "But Abraham said, Son, remember that thou in thy lifetime receivedst thy good things, and likewise Lazarus evil things: but now he is comforted, and thou art tormented.'

It is terrifying to think of the concrete cast of one lost. Fixed. Unmoveable. Permanent. More than the sealed casket covered with smothering earth. It is utter dejected despondency, summed up so accurately and soberly by our Lord: There shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth. Let us cry and plead, before the sun goes down, forever, on Today!

"And beside all this, between and you there is a great gulf fixe. so that they which would pass from hence to you cannot; neither can they pass to us, that would come from hence.
