

And there arose a great storm of wind, and the waves beat into the ship, so that it was now full.

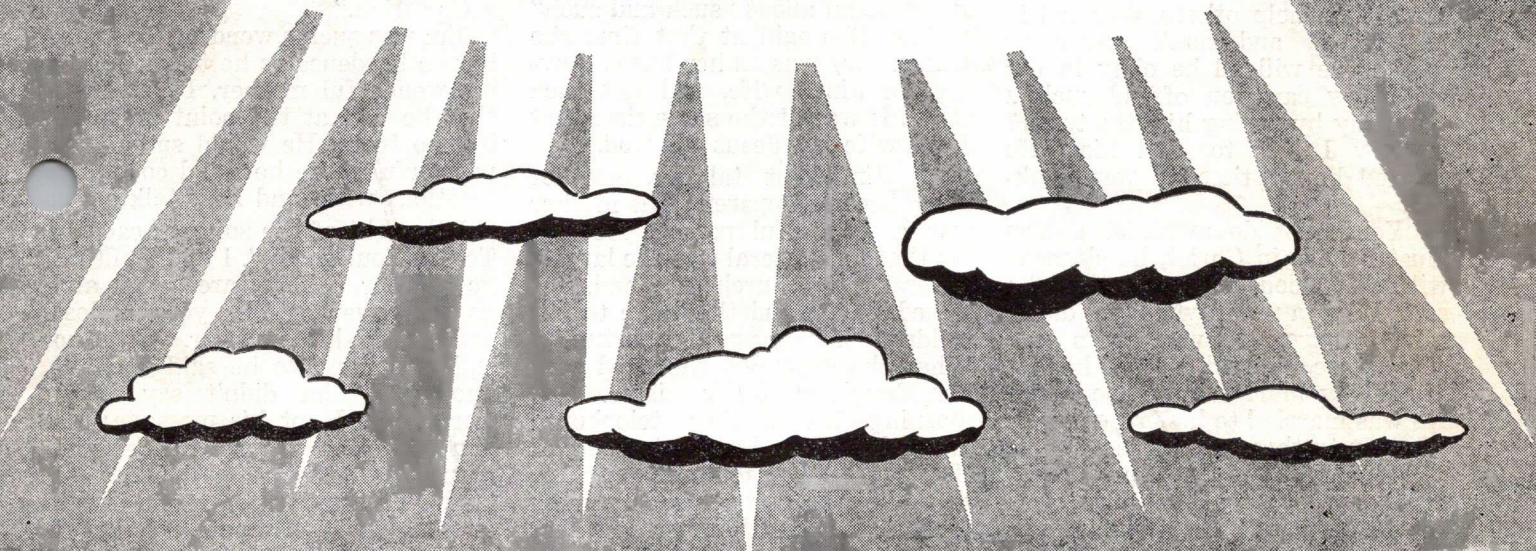
And he was in the hinder part of the ship, asleep on a pillow: and they awake him, and say unto him, Master, carest thou not that we perish?

I KNOW IT, BUT I CAN'T DO IT

Rain on a cool Saturday afternoon can be very depressing, but it didn't stop Jim Turner from making those around him happy. Jim was sixty, very common, unusually friendly, and successful as a chief mechanic in a large plant.

We met on business terms, but our conversation soon turned to religion. After discussing several religions, Jim said that he felt all religions are like a wheel with spokes: they all lead to one central hub, God. That simply isn't true, and I knew I had to tell him. I told him that Mohammedanism doesn't lead to God. This led to much more conversation, and Jim finally said that if we help others, do **good** in the world, and don't swear or smoke, we will all be okay in the end. How can you offend such a good guy by telling him the truth? I knew I had to, and his wife seemed happy that we were talking.

"You must do more, Jim. You must believe in Christ, be cleansed with His blood and be baptized," I said. What a relief when Jim didn't take offense. He wanted to talk some more. He told me that he was previously married for five years. He was married to his present wife for twenty-three years, came from a conservative religious background, was never baptized, was very active with his first wife in church work (even taught Sunday School), but didn't go to church much after his first wife died. I told Jim that he couldn't go to heaven if he wasn't saved. His answer was frank: "I know it."

Jim told me about his first wife. She died of tubercular meningitis. She was ill only three days and became completely delirious. She couldn't talk to or recognize anyone. Periodically, he would have to take his finger, put it into her mouth, and rake the peeled-off skin from the tongue and mouth, or she would choke on it. In this completely delirious condition she suddenly opened her eyes, sat up in bed, reached her hand out and said, "**Here** is Jesus! **Here** is God!" Jim's first wife then fell backward and soon was dead.

Soon after Jim's wife died, his sister came to him and asked him if he hadn't felt something strange and unusual about "such and such" a time. She said at that time she (his sister) was on her knees praying for Jim's wife, and felt **such** relief. It was at the same time that Jim's wife saw Jesus and God.

As Jim kept talking, another thing became apparent. His mother was a wonderful person. He told me that her funeral was the largest funeral their church ever had. She talked Christ and the Bible to her children at every opportunity. When she grew old, she lived with her daughter, Jim's sister. One morning his mother telephoned many friends and spoke to them of Christ. She then told her daughter that she was going into her room to lie down and that her daughter should get some rest, because she would soon need it. After about an hour had passed the daughter looked in and saw her mother, with her hands folded over her chest. Later, the daughter became worried and

checked again. She found her mother in the same peaceful position, but **dead**. Before Jim's mother lay down, she had written a note which gave directions for her funeral—the songs, and who was to be the minister. Jim's mother laid out all of her funeral clothes and found something that each of her children had given to her. She laid these in the room with a scripture verse on each item, including Jim's.

I finally asked Jim why he didn't live for Christ. He knew the truth. I told him he had to repent and be cleansed with Christ's blood or he couldn't go to heaven. You know what Jim said? "As you get older, it gets harder and harder to become a Christian."

Jim was such a wonderful person, but so hardened as he talked about his wonderful mother. I could tell that he was at the point of tears, but **no** tears. He would smile that wonderful smile he could cover his emotions with, and keep talking.

I thought of the song, "Lead Me To One Soul Today". I told Jim that you either believe, are saved and go to heaven, or else you are lost and go to hell forever. With **no** smile on his face he said only, "I know it." Jim didn't say it in words, but I got his message: As you get older, it gets harder and harder to become a Christian—I know you can't go to heaven if you aren't saved—"I know it", but I can't do it!

My dear friend, **please** listen to me. Are you, too, going to turn Christ away? Don't make Jim's mistake! It's heaven or hell **forever! Please.**

Travel to the moon. It is great and dramatic for men. They take pictures. They sample rocks. Much more beautiful, glorious with life, are the views that God gives. We see by faith right into the far heavens: "I will come to visions and revelations of the Lord."

How real will heaven be? Will we have the same grasp in thought? This one went to heaven one time, before he died. It was so actual, he didn't know if he had left his body, or not. "I knew a man in Christ above fourteen years ago, (whether in the body, I cannot tell; or whether out of the body, I cannot tell: God knoweth;) such an one caught up to the third heaven."

Repeated in scripture, it is for us to see. God is pointing to something; He wants us to see. While a certain moving, a soaring goes on, there is One above who is calm and knows what He is about. While we may have fears and worries, we can go to Him and get His calm collection of things to come. "And I knew such a man, (whether in the body, or out of the body, I cannot tell: God knoweth;)"

Heaven shall be much more wonderful than we imagine. How shall our occupation be? What beautiful joys will unfold to wondering eyes? What interests will engage us? There will be **speaking which cannot be spoken**. What portals of untold power, what subjects unkindled in imagination await? What joy to come! "How that he was caught up into paradise, and

heard unspeakable words, which it is not lawful for a man to utter."

A very important fact is revealed for a successful day: "Of such an one will I glory: yet of myself I will not glory, but in mine infirmities." So often what seems a headache is wings to glory.

Our mind needs training and exercise of God. We don't always grasp what power can be given to stir, till we spur us on. Left to itself, the mind and heart would get misshapen and dull, flabby in its own ways. Our height is measured of God, and that's what we should seek. "For though I would desire to glory, I shall not be a fool; for I will say the truth: but now I forbear, lest any man should think of me above that which he seeth me to be, or that he heareth of me."

Cut down to size, that's what we need. What the thorn was we are not told. There is a purpose. The shoe is fitted to each saint's foot. The verse becomes a part of our familiar experience as we draw it to us. The thorn means suffering of some kind. Pain helps us paint in pure color. "And lest I should be exalted above measure through the abundance of the revelations, there was given to me a thorn in the flesh, the messenger of Satan to buffet me, lest I should be exalted above measure."

We should pray about those things that bother us. Make it known. Paul had great faith; yet he had to ask three times. No answer for awhile? An example for us. He too wanted to get rid of the

pain. "For this thing I besought the Lord thrice, that it might depart from me."

There is a secret to successful suffering. Even death can be beautiful. So much difference abides in that **receiving answer**. It is not the nails, but the restlessness on the nails that is disagreeable. "And he said unto me, My grace is sufficient for thee: for my strength is made perfect in weakness."

What wonders for our overwrought life! Can our weakness be such that therein we should boast? Are hurts and pains such assets to glory in? Is this the way to true riches? Yes, yes. Power encamps on us, encloses us, and lifts us to the skies. "Most gladly therefore will I rather glory in my infirmities, that the power of Christ may rest upon me."

Opposing currents for the natural thought become the sailing currents. Sail on to the new shore, O soul eternal! Sickness and weakness are diamonded jewels on His compass. Insult and injury for Him are chances for faith in God. When we want . . . when we are pursued with word or deed for His sake . . . when we are cramped in something not our own choosing . . . Life's problems, narrow places, shorter ends, this is His choosing. This is the best route Home.

"Therefore I take pleasure in infirmities, in reproaches, in necessities, in persecutions, in distresses for Christ's sake: for when I am weak, then am I strong."
