They would eat all but about 2 per cent of that, and keep most of the excess for their future use. Many, many of the 940 non-Americans would be hungry and never certain of sufficient food to eat.

DISCIPLINE IN TODAY'S CHURCHES

From A Magazine

Date of issue printed Nov. 15 1970 (Bro. Ed. gave this to the editor. The author has several degrees of scholarship.)

One hundred years or more ago, evangelical congregations in America practiced church discipline. If a ember became guilty of gross sin failed to live up to the membership standards, he was excluded from the church. This meant that his name was removed from the membership roll and that he was forbidden to take part in the Lord's supper. However, he was still welcome to attend church services.

In our times, it is difficult to find a church which seriously attempts to maintain such discipline, even among the most fundamentalist churches. The New Testament certainly does teach that churches should discipline wayward members. Here are the offenses which require discipline:

Heresy (Rom. 16:17; Gal. 1:8-9; I Tim. 6:3-5; Titus 3:10-11; II John 9-11; Rev. 2:20-24).

Troublemaking and causing divisions (Rom. 16:17; II Thess. 3:6; I Tim. 6:3-5; III John 1:9-10). Immorality (I Cor. 5:1-7; 6:9-10, 18).

Drunkenness (Rom. 13:13; I Cor. 6:10; Gal. 5:21; Eph. 5:18).

Murder and other vicious sins (Mark 7:21; Rom. 1: 26-32; Gal. 19-21; I John 3:15; Rev. 21:8; 2:15).

Reveling and lascivious conduct (Matt. 24:46-51; Rom. 13:12-14; I Cor. 6:9-10; Gal. 5:19-21; Eph. 5:3-7; Col. 3:5-9; I Thess. 4:3-5;

I John 2:15-17).

Irreconcilable attitudes (Matt. 18:15-17; I John 2:11; 31:15).

Why is there such hesitancy to practice church discipline today? We all know that sins condoned and unjudged in the church hurt its spiritual vitality and lower its reputation in the community. Let us consider some of the reasons why we are reluctant to administer discipline.

1. Sin does not hurt or offend us as once it did.

2. We misapply such Scripture passages as that about the wheat and the tares (Matt. 13:24-30, 37-43) and about the woman taken in adultery (John 8:1-11). The tares are to be left in the kingdom, not in the church. Jesus did not condemn the woman taken in adultery, but the law of Moses did. There is no teaching here about the church.

3. Many churches become so big today that they lose contact with individuals, and ungodly conduct is ignored.

4. Officials in the church will not push discipline because some of them are guilty of the same sins or because they know of other prominent people in the church who are guilty of them.

5. Deacons and elders fear that disciplinary action may alienate some well-paying members and divide families—maybe even the church.

6. Other churches would readily receive into good standing excluded members of another church, and this nullifies the effect of the discipline.

7. It is simply easier to let discipline slide than to press it.

No wonder it is difficult to have revivals in such churches or to implement spiritual programs!

Is there anything positive we can do to remedy this situation? We believe there is, and we would like to offer some ideas.

... we should exercise more care in receiving members. As far as humanly possible, we should make certain that they are born again, surrendered to the will of God, and willing to live by the teachings of the New Testament.

... we should shepherd all members carefully. The deacons should assist the pastor in the care of the church. When members fall into sin, they should be prayed for and counseled with Christian compassion.

... the preaching and teaching ministry of the church should expose the heinousness of sin, warning against its subtlety and danger. Pointed sermons on the particular sins for which discipline should fall would be in order from time to time.

eager to hang on to members who have ceased to participate. Some method of reclaiming them or of dismissing them should be practiced . . . And we should not grant letters of transfer in good standing to members who are not really in good standing.

... a plan of receiving new members which weeds out the insincere applicants can be tried . . .

We recognize that none of the

suggestions we have made are identical with church discipline, but they do tend to minimize the necessity for it. That would seem to be about as far as most churches

care to go.

The modern practice of revising the church roll every ten years or so, dropping any names from it when the particular individuals can not be found or no longer respond to inquiries, is not a good one. Some of these members could have been reclaimed if efforts had been made in time; and perhaps some of them have united with other churches. The local church has a responsibility for the spiritual welfare of every member who unites with it, and this responsibility does not cease when a member becomes a dropout. The good shepherd is more concerned about the one lost sheep than about the ninety-nine who are safely in the fold (Luke 15: 3-7).

The quality of church membership is as important as—if not more important than—the number of members. And discipline is es-

sential to quality.

When older believers do not support the church of which they are a part, the young people are quick to pick up the voice of criticism. Thus the church and church leadership are sometimes blamed for all kinds of personal insufficiencies and problems.

On Sat., Nov. 28, three young men in high school uniforms appeared in our churchyard. They had come on their bicycles to ask me about Christianity. I ushered them into one of the class rooms in our church building, and we began our conversation.

The first question on their written list was, "What is Christianity?" I replied that it is the teaching that Christ is the Son of the living God, that he died for our sins, and that He arose again.

Another question was, "Is it not true that those who become Christians are weak and feel they must trust in God for support while strong individuals do not have this need?" I replied that actually it takes more strength, determination and effort to repent and follow Christ than it does to flow along with the crowd. Few people are willing or able to say "No" to things which even they realize are wrong and harmful to the individual and to society.

A further question was to ask my idea on the suppression of scientific research and progress by the church in Europe towards the end of the Dark Ages and during the period of the Renaissance. I replied that the church was wrong. I am very much in favor of scientific research and progress.

I was gueried as to the conflict between science and religion, and I replied that there is no conflict between true science and the Bible. They have been studying biology and along with it the various theories of evolution. Although plants and animals adapt to their environment, which Darwin observed on the Pescadore Islands off the coast of South America, there is absolutely no evidence that plants or animals can cross over from species to species. The evolutionists have not explained how the one-celled, something from which all other life, both plant and animal, supnosedly sprung, got its life in the first place. The first thing a

scientist should do is confess that there is a living God with super intelligence and super power, and

start from there.

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"ye are clean"

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The Master had a very important lesson: "He riseth from supper, and laid aside his garments; and took a towel, and girded himself."

He saw His church. He loved His people. The form is clearly marked out. What He does is for the best interests of children of His Father.

Our Lord had work in mind. See His determination. It's a Plan. It is carried out with purpose. "After that he poureth water into a bason, and began to wash the disciples' feet, and to wipe them with the towel wherewith he was girded."

Washing gets rid of dust and dirt. If they would not have walked and went, there would be no dirty feet . . . But the doing in daily life brings a clinging of particles that do not belong. The washing Jesus gave would separate this foreign dirt.

"Then cometh he to Simon Peter: and Peter saith unto him, Lord, dost thou wash my feet?" Here is a man who would fill a very important place. He would be a Shepherd and a Bishop. To him was committed the gospel to the circumcision. More than one impor-

tant key would be turned by him. Peter could sum up at a glance of his physical eye what was physically taking place. He could plainly see it was his turn, and the Lord was ready to wash his feet. If this was all, the Lord would not have pointed out to Peter as He did. "Jesus answered and said unto him, What I do thou knowest not now; but thou shalt know hereafter."

Peter knew He was washing, but he didn't grasp what He was doing.

The writer to Hebrews calls to His church to follow holiness, without which no man shall see the Lord. To be a glorious church, presentable to the great Bridegroom, there must be "the washing of water by the word." To win the race, Peter had to submit to washing. "Peter saith unto him, Thou shalt never wash my feet. Jesus answered him, If I wash thee not, thou hast no part with me."

The words of Jesus light up the clear structure of His unseen church. There is a difference in sin, in dirtiness. Jesus gives eyes to sense, to clearly perceive that line. "Simon Peter saith unto him, Lord, not my feet only, but also my

hands and my head. Jesus saith to him, He that is washed needeth not save to wash his feet, but is clean every whit:"

We see the light illuminating. There is a difference. "Whosoever is born of God doth not commit sin; for his seed remaineth in him: and he cannot sin, because he is born of God." The heavenly Father does not mean the believing won't have to cry and plead "to wash his feet". He does mean His people remain clean from the categories listed in I Corinthians 6:9, 10.

How keenly those flaming eyes of Jesus can see the line of demarcation. Then it was, "... and ye are clean, but not all." Such sin must be dealt with. Judas pushed past the last possibility of pardon. The last possibility lurks in every wayward path. Some sins are not as severe as others. There are some who can be saved, even to the greatly fallen: "And of some have compassion, making a difference: Arothers save with fear, pulling thout of the fire; hating even the garment spotted by the flesh."

Let us be happy servants, doing our Lord's will!
