for both you and Mom.

But then later when I really think about it, I feel that perhaps they'll never really understand my situation until they have experienced what I have.

I look at my husband and he looks at me. I have food in the car for 40 guests that are coming for Easter dinner... Twelve children at home that don't know anything about this visit to the doctor... But doc said you'll be home in time to do all you plant

in time to do all you plan! Surgery at 10 AM Good Friday. I was born on Good Friday so many years ago, but what has God in store for me this year? Sometime in the night I woke to look out my hospital window, and saw a cathedral above the skyline. I knew I had nothing to fear: "Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me."

But of course, my only thought was for my dear husband, if anything should happen, with a dozen children to raise. I fell asleep wi "Thy will be done" in my praye

I was coming to in the recovery room and I asked the time. "1:30 P.M." No need for anyone to tell me I had cancer—minor into major. The doctor said to me later, "Their is a greater physician than I, who doesn't need a knife." He felt terrible because he made so light of minor surgery before that day. I told him I had no fear of dying, but still the tears flowed—

Meanwhile at home, women came in to take over, housecleaned, gave food . . . care of the children. My family came from all directions to be with me during my stay in the hospital. Mom and Dad, "Bless them", came and Mom stayed so the school children could continue.

My hospital room was never empty. I had my entire family (by pictures) taped to my wall. Every card I received went on the wall to the shape of a heart. My heart was so full with all the prayers, cards and friends, that the wall was literally full. Flowers adorned my floor and window and dresser.

For only 12 days it took, bef I was discharged, but my life is God's hands. Every morning I thank Him for another day.

A car full of sisters-in-faith came from Morris to plant garden

and paint rooms for us to brighten ch day. Oh if they could only anow how wonderful and humble it makes one feel. There are no words to describe how unworthy we are of their love.

My 3-year-old asked why I cry when I read the Bible; how can one tell a little boy of being so thankful for the "word of life", and a chance to live by it. I pray I can still be a light to my children, that someday they will seek their Lord and live for Him. Will I see another Good Friday? We don't know, but my Lord died for me, and I'll gladly go too, and hope more souls will find their Lord before it is ever to late.

On June 11 at the office where I work part-time, the other employees and I were eating Japanese box lunches together when Mr. Yamada, with whom I work, asked me to tell them something interesting. I felt it was a time to speak, so I told about my own experiences in life, including my conversion to the Lord Jesus Christ, making it clear that before my conversion I was fearful of having to spend eternity in outer darkness and suffering.

At the end of my talk, Mr. Yamaka asked what is thought to be the proper conduct for a woman in the U.S. I replied that it was for the woman to be rather quiet, soft-spoken and modest in appearance, that this is the teaching of the Bible. He replied that he thought that it was the norm in the U.S. for the women to be just the opposite of that. I like to think that the women are the way I said, and that the men love their wives and respect the single women, even as Christ loves the church and gave His life for it. Is this only a dream of mine?

My family and I visited our Tokyo Church on the 4th Sunday of June, as is our monthly practice, and there met Bro. Ed and Sis. Vi Gerber, as well as their two teenage daughters, Fay and Sue. BEAUTIFUL, WONDERFUL THINGS!

How perfect, complete, and thorough are the heavenly things. We cannot grasp with physical sight. Our thoughts are missshapen if we only hear the run of current events. We need to search, and stop & purge our minds of formations that come from man alone. There are beautiful outlines of a coming city, and the life and activity of a people in full happiness. We need to look through, in the book of truth: "But as it is written, Eye hath not seen, nor ear heard, neither have entered into the heart of man, the things which God hath prepared for them that love him."

Our God is wonderful. Take all that is spoken of love in I Corinthians 13, and add much more, above all we think. Take the swaetest person you have met, at their best time. Patterned and made after Him. Take joy. What must the deep depths of His joy be. There is more, more, and much more. There are solid plans, unmistakably perfect, for His homesite . . . laughter of His children . . . songs like in a dream, perfect happiness . . . sights that kindle the deep down feeling. In His plans is perfect satisfaction.

He reveals, tells us His secrets, makes His words live in us: "But God hath revealed them unto us by his Spirit: for the Spirit searcheth all things, yea, the deep things of God."

Inside of our body is a human

spirit. Here we perceive what goes on about us . . . we grasp when we are hungry . . . we feel at home, and know what the things we see mean to us ... we sense our daily atmosphere . . . decide to get angry or stay calm. But we do not feel God's thoughts apart from Him. He knows His place, and the way He looks at things. His feelings are the finest, the tenderest, and the furtherest from man. "For what man knoweth the things of a man, save the spirit of man which is in him? even so the things of God knoweth no man, but the Spirit of God."

The atmosphere of heaven will mean more to us as we have sought His feelings. We enhance our grasp of the grandeur up there, as we forsake the natural down here. We grow in grace, as we know His scriptures and power. The life of heaven and eternity is the living in Him here. It is the cross carried that makes room for joy of the heart ... looking through a glass darkly but beautifully . . . with pain and clouds, and casting the burden on our Lord. It is not What, but How. Do we read, as we see Him asking more than once, in His word? Do we seek His power and try to be like Him? Do we live unto Him, and aim to die unto Him? Then there is joy and peace.

If days are dull, there is a reason (found in His word). If conflict has carried to unhappiness, we

have not listened. His word tells how life may be a merry tread, even in the midst of cross-bearing. Wonderful and boundless are the resources of God. "Now we have received, not the spirit of the world, but the spirit which is of God; that we might know the things that are freely given to us of God."

One little phrase of natural wisdom—how much commotion can it cause! Functions and offices, right and solid in scripture—sometimes their success are hurt because of a thought, appearing well-meaning, but not in the word. We add our little clouds and sharpen our hurting, but not of His cross.

The cornfield is more beautiful when the weeds are gone. The loveliness of the floor shines out when the foreign particles are gathered in a little dustpan. Successful things proceed, from the complicated to simplicity. So it is with our life, and the word of God. We must know the weed, and remove it. But how can we clean the floor if we don't see the dirt?

We need to know more, and go over His word. We need to weigh and compare, and go over again, till it becomes more familiar than our own house. Glorious things open in His steps. "Which thing also we speak, not in the words which man's wisdom teacheth, but which the Holy Ghost teacheth; comparing spiritual things with spiritual."
