

EDITORIAL

OUR APOSTOLIC CHRISTIANS

(Submitted by Bro. Martin Kipfer R. R. 4, Bluffton. This appeared in the Decatur, Ind. newspaper.)

A beautiful, 300-page book. "The First One Hundred Years . . . 1870-1970", the history of the Apostolic Christian Church of Route 4, Bluffton, on the Adams-Wells county line by French township, has been printed and distributed.

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It is a beautiful book, and a fitting tribute to the earthly memory of John H. Baumgartner, the late author and compiler of the book.

This book includes not only the history of all of the early members of the church, but explains the church itself, its history, customs and meaning. Some of Adams County's finest citizens are members of this church, and related families.

A copy is being placed in the Decatur library, and is already found in the Berne and Geneva li-

braries. It is well worth reading, being valuable to genealogists and those just interested in our neighbors and their story.

The Apostolic Christian Churches of America have, according to the 1970 church book, approximately 75 churches, 8,955 members, 80 Sabbath or Sunday Schools, with a total enrollment of 8,085. They have 216 ordained clergy.

They firmly believe the teaching of their group to be a continuation of the teaching of Jesus Christ, the apostles and of H. Samuel Frohlich, an important early minister of the faith.

Elders, chosen by the local church, preach, hear confessions, give guidance to converts, direct the unconverted, baptize, laying on of hands after baptism, perform marriages, and serve communion. The church also has ministers who

preach the gospel and visit the sick and afflicted, and handle the charity fund.

The church maintains no schools, seminaries or universities. The ministry and eldership serve without pay, do not study or prepare sermons, but simply meditate on a portion of scripture from the Bible. They rely on the Holy Spirit.

Oaths are not sworn, members merely affirming when asked.

The book goes on to explain many of the customs of the church, which we do not wish to attempt to paraphrase for fear of distorting the meaning.

The history of the various families . . . quite a few of them . . . and with references to many others, is particularly interesting, recounting many cross-Atlantic trips from Switzerland, the problems of the 19th century, and the growth of the local congregation.

We strongly urge all interested in this county to read the book and gain a greater appreciation of the contribution made by these industrious farm families, and their fine Christian morality and customs.

One day when our oldest son. Tony was a very small boy, he was walking out-of-doors with an older friend. It had been raining, and the sun was breaking through, creating a beautiful rainbow which seemed to come down to the earth just over the way. Tony said to his friend, "Let's go over and get that rainbow and take it home to Mama." God has not only created beautiful rainbows, but has put into the hearts of small children a beautiful feeling of love and devotion toward their parents. If this can be nurtured rather than destroyed, as the child matures, the compensation to the individual, the family, one's church, one's country, and the contribution to the world and to heaven can be tremendous.

On March 7 I walked into my hotel room in Tokyo where I was to stay overnight, because of my parttime employment with a company. and I noticed a painting hanging on the wall. During my first years in Japan I was anything but a master; I was a student. I was clearly a servant and I still consider myself to be a guest of this country. Loved ones here have told me to be a stronger leader, and I am trying to be obedient to their suggestion, and at the same time remember that our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, at the time of eating the Passover Supper with his disciples, washed their feet and then said, "Ye call me Master and Lord: and ye say well; for so I am. If I then, your Lord and Master, have washed your feet; ye . . ought to wash one another's feet." When a perfectly able-bodied feudal lord, who could very well get off and walk himself, is carried along on a platform by two servants, I keep thinking it just doesn't match the picture of servitude which the Lord Jesus has left for us. As the spring season is welcomed, several of our families are busy with maple sugaring time.

When the first big flakes of "sugar snow" fall, trails are broken through the deep snow in the maple sugar groves, and farmers begin to make preparations to have all their equipment in good order. When the days begin to warm up, the farmer taps the sugar maple trees (with a drill), inserts a spout in each tap hole, and places a bucket at each tap.

When the temperature at night

goes below freezing and the daytime temperature is above the freezing mark, the sap begins to flow. The sap is gathered (on foot, and sometimes by wearing snow shoes to get through the deep snow in the woods) in a large "gathering tub" and taken to the sugar shanty, where it is boiled down to the final product, maple syrup. A large evaporating pan is used as the boiling pan, and every precaution must be taken to keep the fire under the pan hot enough to boil the sap down, and to keep the sap flowing into the pan so the syrup does not burn. It is a full-time job for one man to keep the syrup boiling. About 40 gallons of sap must be boiled down to make one gallon of maple syrup.

Some of the treats of sugaring time in New York are pancakes floating in fresh maple syrup, maple sugar cakes, and "wax on snow."
